DATE SLICE 1 cup dates


125 g butter







True Blue

Every year in April the Macedon Ranges Autism Network (MRAN) endeavours to increase awareness of Autism Spectrum Disorders (ASD) through the Macedon Ranges Light it up Blue campaign. World Autism Awareness day on April 2nd launches a month full of events in our own backyard.

Each year we light a town up blue. The First year was Romsey and this year the focus was on Woodend. The Woodend Clock Tower was glowing with blue lights thanks to the RSL and the Macedon Ranges Shire Council. Businesses were invited to decorate their windows in a blue theme and received information about ASD's to display. Events included a Professional's Breakfast at Brahms and List cafe, a Mini Expo, a Family Fun Day BBQ and seminars by Chris Varney from the *I Can network*, and Professor Tonge and Dr Brereton.

The MRAN currently supports over 200 families in the Macedon Ranges with regular coffee mornings, dinners and social media support. The MRAN is supported by Cobaw Community Health.

We currently run a <u>Lego Brick Club</u> for children each Wednesday afternoon of term. This group has been kindly sponsored by *The Shared Table*.

We have also developed a training package to train parents to act as mentors for new families-Parents helping Parents, thanks to a Community Funding grant from the Macedon Ranges Shire Council.

We have recently trained a number of teachers from school around the shire to run the <u>Secret Agent Society Social skills program for young people aged 8-12</u>. This evidence based program will be rolled out select schools and other community settings.

In Conjunction with the Shire's Youth Team, young people with an ASD can also attend the <u>Youth Engagement Program at the Woodend Neighbourhood House</u>. This group

of 12-16 year olds hangout playing PlayStation, football, board games and pursuing shared interests.

We are looking to start <u>The Lab computer club</u> in term 3. The Lab is a technology club for 10 to 16 year-old young people diagnosed with an ASD who enjoy working with computers. It offers one-to-one tuition by technology professionals in areas such as programming, 3D, digital design and gaming. We are currently seeking sponsors for this exciting project.

Romsey Streetscape Community Forum

The notion of streetscape obviously has resonated with the people of Romsey! Around 70 community members attended the Romsey Streetscape Community Forum on Wednesday 15th April 2015 at the Romsey Community Hub., 7pm for 7.30pm start at the Romsey Community Hub.

The evening was divided into three sections. Firstly, Mr. Shane Power (a Romsey resident and Manager Operations MRSC) gave a presentation based on Council streetscape and amenity initiatives in the Macedon Ranges. The middle portion involved the presentation of 3 community streetscape case studies relating to Jerilderie, Avoca and Terang. These demonstrated the why and how such communities went about improving the amenity of the town for both local community members and visitors.

After a brief opportunity to collect a cuppa and a scone, the audience then commenced the "feedback session". Attendees could either be a part of a formal group brainstorming session, speak one-on-one to a RRBATA committee member or Council officer, or put ideas to paper privately. The enormous amount of feedback collected prior to, during and subsequent to the forum will be collated into a Discussion Paper by mid May and distributed to all Forum attendees, those interested others who were unable to attend and relevant stakeholders such as Macedon Ranges Shire Council (MRSC). Romsey Uniting Church 150th Anniversary

On Sunday the 16th of August the Romsey Uniting Church will be celebrating its 150th Anniversary with a Communion Service at 10.30 am in the church followed by a spit roast luncheon in the Mechanics Hall at 12.30.

The church has had an interesting history dating from the mid 1800's, when the Presbyterian and Methodist pioneering people began settling in the Lancefield-Romsey area.

To satisfy their spiritual needs, two clergymen, Rev. James Forbes, Rev. William Waterfield and later Rev. Peter Gunn, rode their horses around the bush. Services were held in homes and later, as numbers increased, in farm barns,

The earliest recorded meetings of the general committee was on 3rd March, 1862. In October 1863, a Kirk session was formed with Peter Mitchell, James Ochiltree, Joseph Andrew and James Stewart as Elders.

In 1864, a grant of land to build the church was received. The 3rd March, 1865 by William foundation stone was laid on Campbell, and the church opened in July of the same year. Peter Mitchell was secretary of the building committee and the stone was quarried locally from his property. Mr. Mitchell was secretary, treasurer of the church for fifty years.

On Pentecost Sunday 29th May, 1977, a celebratory service was held in the already merged Presbyterian – Methodist Romsey church, to celebrate the beginning of the Romsey Uniting Church. All who wish to join with us to celebrate in this momentous time of Christian presence in the Romsey area, are most welcome to con-

MRIMAG trappers make an impact

With simple wire traps our members have trapped more than 1700 Indian mynas in the last 12 months. MRIMAG's goal is the reduction and control of numbers of this invasive pest species and we are thrilled with these results from the 205 trappers across the shire and town coordinators.

But the icing on the cake is feedback on the return of native birdlife. Jenny Zimmerman, a trapper in the local area, said "I had a flock of a dozen Indian mynas which pretty much ruled my garden. In my first month of trapping I very easily caught 13 mynas, and that pretty much cleared my garden of them. Then last spring a pair started checking out next-door's eaves for a possible nesting site: I moved the trap closer to where they were hanging out and caught three birds. Since then, no mynas to speak of.

"What I have noticed – and this has been quite dramatic and exciting – is a marked increase in the smaller native birds in my garden: two species of thornbills; silvereyes; smaller honeyeaters such as yellow-faced and white-eared; blue wrens; a pair of grey fantails and red-browed firetails. These birds did occur before, but their frequency and numbers have increased. That gives me all the reason I need to persist with my trapping."

Not too late to change smoke alarm batteries

CFA is reminding families that it's not too late change the batteries in their smoke alarms.

North West Region Community Education Coordinator Paul Tangey said with the end of Daylight Savings falling on Easter this year a lot of families might have missed their usual routine to replace batteries when they changed their clocks.

"If one piece of equipment in your home is going to save your life it is your smoke alarm," said Mr Tangey.

"That is because you can't smell smoke when you are sleeping – all your senses are reduced and without a smoke alarm there is a very good chance you will not wake up unlit it is too late. So if you haven't changed your batteries this year then do it now," he said.

"Last year CFA attended 1650 house fires, which resulted in 16 deaths. Firefighters see far too many preventable house fires every year and they can be heartbreaking."

"Changing the batteries in your smoke alarm only takes five minutes but could be the difference between you keeping your family safe or a devastating outcome."

Mr Tangey also said anyone who thought their smoke alarm might be more than ten years old should have it replaced. "Past that ten-year mark the electronics in a smoke alarm can't be relied on." he said. CFA recommends:

- Monthly: test smoke alarms by pressing the test button with a broom handle
- Annually: gently dust around the outside cover of your smoke alarm
- Annually: replace your 9-volt battery at the end of daylight saving
- Every 10 years: replace your smoke alarm units, and when you do consider installing 10-year sealed smoke

Big names to talk justice again in Bendigo

Some of Australia's most renowned thinkers and speakers will gather together at Bendigo's Ulumbarra Theatre on 15 -16 May to discuss justice issues. Professor Mick Dodson AM, Human Rights Commissioner Tim Wilson, Oxfam CEO Helen Szoke, Professor Eva Cox AO, Justice Mordecai Bromberg and Ken Marchingo are just some of the presenters of the Talking Justice program, presented by the Loddon Campaspe Community Legal Centre.

Former Australian of the Year Professor Mick Dodson will open the event with a discussion about welfare, entitlement and recognition for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders.

Other sessions in Ulumbarra's intimate Strategem Studio space will unpack the complex issues of racism, radicalisation and free speech, Australia's tax and welfare system and our nation's lifters and leaners and whether the state should intervene in the individual's right to choose – to eat bad food, to smoke, not to vaccinate – given their impacts on the health system.

Talking Justice is an opportunity to hear a wide range of perspectives about justice issues facing our community from experts and leaders. ARC Justice Executive Director Peter Noble said "Talking Justice seeks to highlight that at the core of many issues that appear in the media are matters of social justice. Justice isn't just about whether someone gets an appropriate sentence for the crime they commit. Justice is bigger than that. It's about whether someone has a roof over their head, enough food to eat, access to opportunity, health, education and employment."

Following the success of last year's inaugural Talking Justice event, this year's event coincides with Law Week 2015 and has already attracted funding from the Victoria Law Foundation and a range of local businesses and agencies including Arnold Dallas & McPherson Solicitors, City of Greater Bendigo, La Trobe University, Bendigo Community Health Services, Stuthridge Legal, O'Farrell Robertson McMahon, Clayton Utz, Community Sector Banking, Bress Winery, Ulumbarra Theatre, Robertson Hyetts, Juliana Smith and The Schaller Studio. When the things we humans build are gone, nature continues. Grows and blossoms. Fills the air with scent. Fills the eyes with beauty. Reminds us how persistent life is. And tells us again how patient God is.

It's a parable of hope.

Our best efforts and plans may be shattered by violence, as people struggle for power and advantage. Anger explodes, but when the guns have moved on, there in the rubble of pain and anguish, God begins again. Pulls life together. Gives us another chance.

One day, perhaps, we'll take it, and the smell of honeysuckle will push out the smell of fear. Then we shall be whole again, and through us the fragrance of Christ will spread abroad, intangible but indestructible.

Lord, it's a bit insubstantial, honeysuckle against explosive. Love against hate.

Forgiveness against violence.

And yet it's your way.

A way of patience, suffering, and vulnerability. It's hard. I like the theory, but when it comes to living, then I reach for something firmer.

I like the strength of walls, deceptive shelter, things I can hold, and count, and see.

But you, Lord, had nowhere, no home to lay your head. No empire, No army.

Just a few men and women, simple folk, vulnerable as you. People like Peter, whirling like a weathercock in a storm, facing all ways.

Yet you chose him to be a rock.

And built a kingdom of hope.

Not to be measured by this world. Intangible as perfume.

Moving like the wind.

Blowing where it will, over the walls that divide us.

A breeze of hope, turning the flank of opposition.

Covering the stale smell of old fears and infidelities with the fragrance of forgiveness.

Teach us, Lord, that love can't be measured, Eternity can't be weighed. Just lived.

And put a little in my heart today.

What is Croup?

My child sounds like they are barking like a "seal" when they cough!

Croup is a problem of swelling in the airway (windpipe or trachea), almost always caused by a virus. Croup usually starts with a cold or cough and results in noisy breathing and a harsh, barking cough. Most children who have croup are under five years old. Some older children (aged between three and eight years) may develop occasional croup, It may occur in adults, but this is extremely rare. The worst time of year for children to have croup is in the winter months and often at night (although it can happen anytime). Croup is very common, but can be scary for children and parents.

The symptoms include:

- Noisy breathing (inspiratory stridor) a high-pitched sound
- Harsh, barking cough like a seal or dog
- Hoarse voice
- Difficulty breathing depending on how severe the illness is

Most children with croup can be managed at home with lots of hugs, lots of love, and if they feel awful some paracetamol. It is always a good idea to have your child checked out by your local doctor, nurse practitioner, physician associate or other health provider.

Mild croup generally settles within a couple of hours and the child goes back to sleep. If the croup doesn't settle, or if your child becomes more distressed or unwell, take them to your health provider, unless you think it is an emergency, in that case call an ambulance.

The treatment by medical health providers for croup usually include:


Steroids – Steroids decrease the length of the croup episodes. They also reduce the need for admission to

When does Croup become an emergency: if the child's symptoms don't settle quickly with comforting, if they become short of breath, unresponsive and stop crying, the child needs urgent medical care. In very rare cases, a severe croup attack can cause a child to stop breathing. The symptoms of croup are also similar to those caused by other, much more serious conditions. For example, your child could have epiglottitis (inflammation of the epiglottis).

Call an ambulance paramedic (dial 000) immediately if your child:

- Is obviously not well
- Has a high fever
- Is breathing more quickly or has difficulty breathing
- Makes a noise while breathing (particularly a snoring sound or on breathing out, even when resting)
- Has difficulty swallowing
- Suddenly starts to cough
- Conscious state changes or patient becomes lethargic
- Is restless, anxious or sweating
- Has a bluish tinge to the lips
- The tissue and skin pull inwards in the neck or chest while the child is breathing

The emergency care of croup usually requires treatment with nebulised adrenaline. Nebulised adrenaline by be administered by paramedics and your child will need to be followed up at hospital, that is why it is best to call an ambulance.

line - in severe symptoms, adrenaline may be given (by paramedics or in hospital) to relieve the swelling in the windpipe. A device called a nebuliser is used to administer the medication in the form of a mist that is inhaled into the lungs.

Prevention: Unfortunately it is not usually possible to prevent croup. Many viruses can cause it and there is no immunisation available against most of them. However, immunisation against influenza is recommended as this may actually prevent croup caused by the influenza virus (influenza-induced croup). All children who are aged six months and older can be immunised against influenza. This is especially important for children with an underlying chronic illness such as asthma or cystic fibrosis. Antibiotics will not be of use as the viruses that cause croup will not respond to this treatment.
