### **Future Location of Council Offices**

Council is seeking community feedback on nine options relating to the longterm location of its offices. As a minimum service level, a customer service facility would be retained in Kyneton, Woodend, Romsey and Gisborne. The options consider the cost, benefits and practicality relating to Council work groups being based in one central office, or two, three or four offices.

Have your say....The 'Office Space Review' document is available from Council service centres and Council's website.

The status quo is one option; however, some of the emerging influences to be considered include:

- The need for a library in Romsey;
- The decision to build a depot in Woodend, which will result in some operational staff relocating from the Romsey office to the new depot;
- The lack of direct access to services in Gisborne, which is the Shire's largest township;
- The 2006 expiry of the lease on the Gisborne building currently occupied by Western Water. If Western Water were to vacate this building, Council would have little option but to relocate some of its offices to that site as it would be a difficult property to lease out;
- Doubt over the location of the proposed new Kyneton library. Some options consider the Kyneton library occupying the existing Council offices in Mollison Street.

Options that consider increasing Council's presence in Woodend, proposed that new offices would be built adjacent to the community centre and library.

None of the options propose to relocate the Gisborne or Woodend libraries.

### NEIGHBOURHOOD HOUSE PUBLIC MEETING

A public meeting has been called for next Tuesday night, November 30th at 7.00 pm at Romsev Primary School in the Performing Arts Centre to ratify the constitution of the proposed Neighbourhood House for Romsey.

An interim committee of dedicated people has been working over the past 3 or 4 months to develop a proposal for a Neighbourhood (or Community) House in Romsey to provide a range of learning and leisure programs for the members of the Romsey community. This project has received very positive and encouraging support from local council and our state MP Joanne Duncan.

The next step is for the constitution drafted by the committee to be presented to the community for its approval and acceptance, and for the committee of management to be appointed. An application will then be made to Consumer Affairs for the incorporation of the Neighbourhood House. After that, a temporary location will be found to be able to commence some programs and activities in early 2005, while negotiations continue with council for a permanent home for our Neighbourhood House.

You can support this project by attending the public meeting next Tuesday night, and perhaps making some suggestions about the kinds of activities and programs you would like to have run at the Neighbourhood House.

### Rural Ambulance Victoria

### HOUSE NUMBERING SAVES LIVES

Rural Ambulance Victoria is encouraging residents to help emergency services by ensuring that houses can be visibly identified from the road.

"Lack of visible house identification is a major problem in many rural areas," said Romsey Branch Station Officer Olga Bartasek, "and valuable time is wasted when we and other emergency services are unable to locate an address."

"This is often due to the poor visibility of house numbers which may be too small to be seen from the road, particularly at night, or are placed in an obscure location."

Olga said shrubs or trees often obscured many house numbers.

"While this might not seem to be a significant problem, even a few minutes delay n an ambulance finding a property, can make the difference between life and death in an emergency.

"This problem can easily be resolved by the use of reflective numbers painted on a post at the front of the property, as the numbers are highlighted by the headlights of a vehicle making it easier for emergency services to locate the appropriate house."

"At night time, please ensure an outside light is operating and have a person stand at the gate or property entry to guide the ambulance to the patient."

"Ideally, all the numbers should be in a uniform location and at a uniform height, at the front of the property, by the road."

Olga said residents could have reflective numbering undertaken by a private contractor for a minimal cost.

"We urge the community to support the numbering system to help emergency services in helping you. It may be worth driving past your property yourself to see if the number is clearly and readily visible."

Olga said residents should be aware of their property number, or Vicroads or CFA map reference numbers.

"Providing this information assists emergency services in locating a property."

# Romsey Fire Brigade

Stay or Go

I visited an elderly couple in recent weeks to talk to them about fiving in country Victoria.

Having moved from the city they are a little apprehensive about the approaching summer.

Our discussions were centered on CFA's Stay or Go policy.

Briefly CFA suggests to those that are unwilling or unable to actively look after their house should leave

By early we mean before any fires. have started. On bad days fires tend to start late morning to early after-

To be well out of the area you should leave by 10:00am.

Unfortunately many tragedies have occurred where residents have made a late decision to leave and have been caught in the open or in their COY.

The tragedy is made more poignant when, in nearly all cases, the house from which they fled was untouched."

### People save houses and houses save people

There will be a possibility that a fire may start in a day that has not been identified as a day of high fire danger.

Therefore you must have a contingency and plan what you do to look after yourself.

That could be as simple as closing all the doors, windows and vents and wait for the fire to pass.

During any discussions it is possible to either frighten the resident totally or underplay the risk and full them into a false sense of security.

They have heard stories of houses exploding; they have seen television footage of a wall of fire bearing down in a village. They have also seen photographs of a row of houses razed to the ground.

With these images in their mind, I agree that it is hard for them to accept the stay and protect concept. Our approach over the last 10 years through Bushfire Bitz and other programs is to provide as much information as is possible.

I know it is a much used cliché howover knowledge is power.

The new program, Fire Safe Victoria, developed from the Bushfire Bitz. program, will provide information on


- what constitutes a bad day
- when the fire comes
- after the fire has passed
- what steps you can take to protect your property
- what steps the local community can take to help one another.

Armed with all this information individual residents can make informed decisions.

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
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# ROMSEY LANCEFIELD RSL SUB BRANCH


The book launch will take place on Sunday 5 December 2004 at 2 pm in the Romsey Mechanics Hall in Main Street, Romsey; everyone is welcome.

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

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
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

### News from Monegeetta Ward

The year has disappeared and here we are thinking about whose turn it is to cook Christmas dinner! When I look back on the council year it seems to be full of planning meetings. Little wonder, as the push to live this side of Melbourne has increased, as prices have increased in Melbourne. Macedon Ranges is accessible and is a "sea change", without the sea change price.

It may seem that our planning department is stretched to the limit with this increase in planning referrals. However, after a period of adjustment the council now has a full compliment of planners, including strategic planners and an environmental planner. We are getting on top of the planning referral register and moving on with strategic planning by bedding down amendment C 21 with many changes, updating the Municipal Strategic Statement which introduces our planning scheme, completing development plan overlays for townships and finishing a Sustainability Framework. Our Macedon Ranges Habitat Quality and Conservation Significance Study recently won two Victorian planning. awards and is in the running for National awards.

I know there are people who are worried about the impact of creeping subdivision on our township character and ambience. I cannot deny that this is happening. The answer is to have Development Plan overlays for the townships that preserve the rural township character.

I am often asked about our slashing programme at this time of the year. The slashing is done along roads designated as fire breaks. The primary firebreak roadsides are slashed or groomed to the fence line. The secondary firebreak roadsides are slashed near the road only. Contractors, supervised by the shire environment officer, do this work. Fivery effort is made to reduce the spread of weeds during this process.

have all been saddened by road accidents this year. Please take care on the roads over the festive season. The new speed limits in townships are sometimes hard to remember. However, they are there for a reason.

### From The Revd Laurie McIntyre, Acting Vicar, Lancefield/Romsey Anglican Church.

I read recently that there are now two types of Christmas in Australia, the secular one and the religious one! I think. this is great that there are now signs that this phenomenon of two forms Christmas is now being recognised?

The "secular" Christmas is a great gift from the Christian Church to the world. It provides a festival of celebration of family, friendship and fun. It was interesting to be in Japan a few years ago and find that a similar secular, non-Christian celebration was becoming popular there, with gift sharing and celebration of family and friends. I am. sure that this idea is catching on more and more. People are joining in the fun of Christmas, with street parties and fabulous decorations competing for prizes. May the funof secular Christmas continue! But not that it gets too far out of focus with big credit card and other debts haunting. us for the rest of the year!

The Christian Christmas also calls us to celebrate with gifts of gratitude, with family re-unions, offers of friendship, the sharing of greetings and exchanges with those with whom we may have lost contact.

There is however a different basis for Christians. The time between now and Christmas is called Advent, a time which asks us to prepare for the coming of the Christ child. Advent reminds us that, central to the Christian faith is the message that God comes to earth in human form. Jesus, the Christ child, is the great gift of God. who shows us what God is like and inspires us to give gifts to those around us.

An abstract 'god' has always posed a problem for human.

beings, hence the proliferation of carved idols and artistic representations seeking to explain what that "god" is

Have you heard the story of the child drawing a picture of God? The teacher, when told what she was drawing, exclaimed, "But no-one knows what God is like". The child replied, "They soon will when, I've finished drawing him?" Christians believe that in the person of Jesus, born as a human being and living in this troubled and confusing world, we are shown what God is really like, in hi man terms which we can understand.

So Advent, like Lent is a time of forty days of preparation calling us to examine ourselves, our relationships with others and with God.

It is a sad reflection that there are often many marriage. break-ups and family tragedies at Christmas. It is almost as though in the midst of all the fun and fellowship, that many find the reality of their lives is just too hard to take.

The world into which Jesus was born is incredibly like the world into which we have been born, especially if you look at the Middle East today. Mary must have had many anxious times as she cared for the Christ child, and sought to provide him with a home which was secure and stable in her world.

The challenge for us today is to examine again what Christmas is really about, and to see how we can enrich our own lives and the beautiful part of the word in which we live. How can we share with those in need? All churches are appealing for financial help for the vantaged and gifts for the needy. What can you do to help?

### VALE MARION SPRING

-4 - 2004

Marion Spring was the first born child of William Ernest Torn and Muriel Anne Ochiltree having three younger brothers Bill, James and Doug. She grew up on the family farm. "Chintin Grange" attending the Springfield State School and later Penleigh Girl's School. In 1927 a disastrous fire swept the farm and it was sold to a Mr. & Mrs. Mellor. The Mellors built a new home, but by 1932 were unable to keep up the payments. on the farm and it returned to the Tom family who gladly came home. At this time Marion's elder brother Bill left school in the middle of the year to help with the work as his father was not well. James and Doug also came back to the farm as they left school. Their father had died, so the three boys worked the farm for the family which included their elderly Uncle Jimmy, his wife Lify and daughter Jean. During World War 2, first Bill enlisted for service in the Army, and then Doug, firstly in the Air Force and then in the Army. James kept the farm going.

Marion married Bill Spring in 1941 as his second wife. Bill's first wife Venie Mitchell

had died some years earlier leaving a small son George who then came back to live with his father and Marion. Marion and Bill had three children, an infant son who died at birth, then David and Elizabeth. Bill Spring was in partnership farming with his brother Jim on the corner of Ochitree's Road and the Romsey- Lancefield Road. Bill also had another small farm of his own across the road where he and Marion spent their early married years. Eventually Bill

Aarion purchased "Range View" in Ochittree's Road and farmed there until their son David married and took over th, rarm. Marion and Bill then bought the home that Tom Reynolds had built in the Main Street. Romsey, and moved in with Murray and Wynie Clement as neighbours on one side and Josie and Lindsay Francis on the other side. Bil's brother Jim Spring and his wife Ellie lived just across the road.

Marion loved meeting and conversing with people. She was a most welcoming hostess and enjoyed outings. She had belonged to the Darrawelt Guim Red Cross and then as a member of the Romsey Branch must have been a member of Red Cross for fifty years. She had just received her certificate celebrating her 50 years of membership of the Romsey Branch of the Country Women's Association of Victoria. Here Marion was always the willing worker and the one who brought the birthday posies to the meeting. She was a lovely friendly member.

Marion was born into the Prestyderian Church and remained a regular member of the Uniting Church congregation. also supporting the women's group of the church; first the Presbyterian Women's Missionary Union and then the Uniting Church Adult Fellowship where she again was always the willing worker.

When the Romsey Artists' Group was formed Marion was there as an original member as she enjoyed painting in oils. and watercolour. She produced pictures that people wanted to own. When the Artists' group hetd Exhibitions her paintings always sold well and are treasured in many homes parity because of their appeal and also for the remembrance of the painter herself.

Marion loved being with people and so enjoyed the mornings of fun that Rose McCarthy arranged weekly at the Catholic Church Hall.

Marion nursed her husband Bill at home through a long illness until he died in 1983. She then lived alone welcoming "s and enjoying the company of others until her frailty necessitated her going into care at The Elms in Gisborne. I she went on every available bus trip, and was visited by many faithful friends until she died aged 90 years.

The family wish to thank those carers who looked after Marion so lovingly at this time.

Marion would have been the last surviving grandchild of James Tom and his wife Marion, who purchased "Chintin Grange" in 1859. She was probably also the last surviving great grandchild of Parson Tom who arrived in Australia with his wife Anne from Comwall in 1823.

Being your elected member of the Macedon Ranges Shire has been a steep learning curve, but I have quickly stepped up to the plate in strongly advocating for our residents and towns. There is a number of matters for us to focus on over the next year.

The road to Melbourne needs to be further upgraded, with passing lanes. While some significant work has been done on it this year, there is still the need for lanes to ease the peak period congestion. The condition of the main road in Romsey has become uneven and oracked, and needs to be repaired.

Romsey, Lancefield and surrounding areas are part of a most liveable environment and we must ensure that it is sustainable for re generations. We have to tread carefully in the debates between development and the environment to ensure that we can accommodate progress without significantly impacting on the factors which make Romsey and surrounds such a wonderful place to live.

These are just some of the matters which I will be tackling on your behalf over the next year.

# Romsey Community Bank

### NEXT STEP FOR OUR BANK

Independent legal advisers have been appointed for the final stages of the project to establish a Community Bank branch in Romsey. Lancefield & Romsey Community Financial Services Ltd deputy chair Maureen Witshire said David Rush from experienced legal firm Rennick & Gaynor has been engaged to help the Board work through the necessary legal requirements leading up to the issuing of a prospectus.

"David Rush is experienced in this task having already helped a number of communities through the legal steps required to achieve their aim of establishing a Community Bank in their town or suburb," Mrs Witshire said. "Due diligence is a legal requirement to be carried out to ensure that Board members have fully explored the legal and financial position of the project, and is a formal step before a prospectus is prepared and issued. The prospectus is the legal document which formally sets out details of the project and the share offer and invites members of the community

to buy shares in the company which will run our ! k."

Company Chairman Russell Pattinson said the Lancefield Community Bank - which would operate in partnership with Romsey - had recently passed \$40 million in business on its books, which gave great cause for optimism about success at Romaey. Mrs Witshire said during the pledge phase of the project over the past two years, around 300 local residents and businesses made commitments to take up \$425,000 worth of shares - the minimum capital which was assessed at the time as needed to open the doors.

A detailed business plan being developed will determine the amount of shares needed to be sold to provide sufficient capital - which will also be written into the prospectus. "A desire for a larger buffer of working capital means that we will be aiming to raise well over our minimum target," Mrs Witshire said, "This will ensure that the residents who pledged will be able to purchase extra shares, and that other residents and businesses will also be able to get in and be part of our own Community Bank."

The year has flown by and Christmas approaches very quickly. We wish everyone a very happy Christmas and here is our recipe for the festive season.

Individual Plum Puddings.

250g pitted prunes

200g pitted dates

250g raisins

100g glace' ginger

500g mixed fruit soaked in rum (if desired)

250g melted butter

4 eggs lightly beaten

1/3 cup Marsala or other fortified wine

1 cup dark brown sugar

1 1/2 cups of plain flour

1/4 cup SR flour

2 teaspoons mixed spice

1/4 cup treacle

Extra 14 cup Marsala

Preheat oven to moderate 180C. Grease 12 teacups and cut 12 squares of foil and baking paper to cover each cup.

Finely chop pruned, dates, raisins, ginger and mixed fruit. Add cooled melted butter, eggs and Marsala and mix well. Add sugar and sifted dry ingredients and stir well with a wooden spoon until well combined. Spoon mixture evenly into each cup. Place a piece paper and foil over each cup and scrunch . \_around the cup to secure. Place cups in a baking dish.

Pour enough boiling water to come a third of the way up the sides of the cups. Bake for 55 minutes. Remove from water and set aside to cool. When cool. un-mould and wrap well in plastic wrap and refrigerate until required.

To serve: Combine the treadle and extra Marsala. Place about a tablespoon of treacle mixture in each cup, return the puddings to the cups and cover with foil. Reheat in moderate oven for 5 minutes. Turn each pudding onto a serving plate, add a dollop of cream and enjoy.
