



# FRAN CALLS FOR APPLICATIONS FOR GRASS-ROOTS WATER SAVING FUNDING

Local Federal Member Fran Bailey today welcomed the launch of the third round of the Australian Government's \$200 million Community Water Grants programme.

"I urge all agricultural groups, Indigenous groups, sporting clubs, schools, service clubs, local government, and other community organisations in our Macedon Ranges region to apply for a Community Water Grant to save and protect our water," Fran said.



"Funding of up to \$50,000 will be provided for water saving, recycling and treatment projects that demonstrate community involvement and a clear public benefit. Applicants and projects that meet special eligibility criteria can also apply for a larger grant of between \$100,000 and \$250,000.

"The programme encourages better water use and improvements in water health and quality through practical on-the-ground projects, such as reducing pollutants reaching our streams, and water recycling and efficiency initiatives.

"It promotes wise water use and community engagement and awareness about water efficiency and conservation, water re-use and recycling and water health and so far, almost \$2 million in funding has been secured by groups in our electorate of McEwen, for projects which save more than 673 million litres of water each year.

"As our Macedon Ranges region suffers from the severe effects of water shortages, groups like Riddells Creek Primary School, Macedon Ranges Shire Council, Mount Macedon Golf Club and Lancefield Football Club are to be congratulated for taking the initiative and applying for funding to carry out water saving projects.

"I encourage all of our local schools, sporting clubs and community organisations to follow in their footsteps, and apply for funding through this great initiative."

The Community Water Grants programme is the community component of the \$2 billion Australian Government Water Fund. In the previous two rounds, community groups from our electorate have been very successful and Fran said she would be pleased to support further community applications.







### Lions Children of Courage Awards 2007

The Lions Children of Courage Awards began with the presentation of awards to five young people in Western Australia in 1983. These awards have continued since then and now there are around 80 recipients of these awards each year. Last year our District 201v4 started its own Children of Courage Awards, with the inaugural 2006 awards being presented in Melton to five recipients. Lancefield Romsey Lions sponsored one child last year, Harley Bombardier from Lancefield.

To be eligible for an award children need to be between the ages of five and fifteen. Children of Courage Awards are awarded in three categories:

- Children with special needs who have shown courage in the face of adversity. This includes disabled children, or those who have undergone long periods of medical treatment, surgery or hospitalisation, causing pain or trauma.
- Children who, without regard for personal safety, have been instrumental in the preservation of life and/or property, or who have rendered assistance in an accident, or whose concern for others is worthy of recognition.
- Children who have overcome personal hardship and/or disadvantage to achieve a high degree of sporting prowess, either individually or as a team member.

This awards day is held so that the achievements of each individual child can be recognised with an inscribed plaque and trophy, with the aim of fostering their self belief and self-esteem for the future.

This year the Lions International District 201v4 Children of Courage Awards 2007 were held at the Romsey mechanics Hall on May 6th. The awards were presented by the District Chairperson P.D.G. Lion John Thorpe, assisted by one of last year's recipients, Loren Di Bernardo of Sunbury. Also present were District Governor Margaret Sheriff and her husband Lion Philip Sheriff, the District Chairperson for the Australian Lions Children's Mobility Foundation, representatives from many Lions Clubs and over 100 family mem-



bers and friends of award recipients.



Then he committed himself. With a flurry of feathers he landed on my hand, almost weightless, took the bread and was off again. He didn't wait to say thankyou – or did he? I felt privileged. That moment of trust was thanks enough.

And that was it. Our encounter was over. The robin flew away with his piece of bread. I went away with a smile on my face, my day brightened by a flash of red, a snatch of bird song, and a moment of trust.

Trust takes time to build. The confidence to trust someone doesn't happen in a flash. It's an act of faith. In trust we surrender something of ourselves to another person. It can be risky, but it enriches life.

### QUEEN'S BIRTHDAY WEEKEND 8 - 11 June 2007

The Woodend Winter Arts Festival is a unique celebration of the arts held in the picturesque Victorian township of Woodend over the Queen's Birthday Weekend in June. This year the festival showcases music, literature and the visual arts in intimate historical venues over three pleasurable days.

Jazz maestro Don Burrows joins pianist Kevin Hunt for the opening night concert at the Macedon Spa. From 8.00 pm on Friday, June 8 they will improvise on a mixed bag of tunes, some by Don and some by the jazz greats of yester-year. Don is 79-years-old and still wowing audiences when he performs. This will be a night for jazz fans of all ages and is proudly presented with the assistance of Musica Viva.

On Saturday, June 9 and repeated on Sunday, June 10 there are six concerts that will offer musical delights for all tastes. The historic St Ambrose Church and St Ambrose Church Hall are the perfect venues for these concerts.

Guitarist *Gareth Koch* will present his own transcriptions of Carl Orff's *Carmina Burana* and songs of the Trouvères. This concert is presented with the assistance of Musica Viva. Soprano *Helen Gagliano* joins the festival's own *John O'Donnell* for the Lieder Recital. Their program features Robert Schumann's well-loved *Frauenliebe und Leben* and a variety of songs by Johannes Brahms.

The vocal and instrumental ensembles *Ensemble Gombert* and *Accademia Arcadia* join forces to present, in association with Musica Viva, a tercentennial performance of Handel's youthful and energetic masterpiece *Dixit Dominus* and Domenico Scarlatti's moving *Stabat Mater*.

Internationally acclaimed Melbourne-born pianist and composer *Ian Munro* will perform works by Mozart, Chopin and Schubert, as well as his own *Blue Rags*. Ian Munro is presented with the assistance of Musica Viva.

Accademia Arcadia, including the festival's *Jacqueline Ogeil* on organ and harpsichord, will perform Vivaldi's *La Follia* variations, trio sonatas by Corelli and sonatas by Scarlatti. Accademia Arcadia is presented with the assistance of Musica Viva.

And one of Schubert's best-loved chamber works is performed by *Rochelle Bryson* on violin, *Christian Read* on viola, *Josephine Vains* on cello, *Stuart Riley* on double bass and *John O'Donnell* on piano.

To close the musical component of the *Woodend Winter Arts Festival* on Monday, June 11 will be the *Australian String Quartet* with a program of Schubert, Haydn and Mendelssohn.

And on the final day there will be a piano marathon where the 153 pieces that make up Bartók's *Mikrokosmos* performed by piano students of all ages. Entry to this event at the Macedon Spa Convention Centre is free.

But there is much more than just music at the Woodend Winter Arts Festival. On Saturday, June 9 at 10.30 am at

Holgate's Leadlight Room the pub philosopher *Professor Roger Sworder* will discourse on 'festivals and dispassion'.

The botanical artists of the Macedon Ranges will exhibit works inspired by the local garden environment and the beauty of indigenous forests and surrounding countryside. Exhibiting are *Margaret Castle*, *Jenny Phillips* and *Steph Goss. Dr. Peter Wells* offers a different perspective with an X-ray image of a 1475 Hans Memling painting from the NGV. Many of the local artists will open their studios during the festival. And the Gallery of Mt Macedon will hold an exhibition of 40 local artists who have each decorated an artist's palette at Café Colenso.

Campaspe House will host a special exhibition of exquisite silver from *Flynn Brothers of Kyneton*, the makers of the Melbourne Cup.

Lovers of the written word can enjoy workshops and discussions on memoirs and biography over the three days. On Saturday, June 9 the 8 to 12 year olds will be able to meet *Michael Wagner*, the author of the hilarious *The Undys* and *Let the Games Begin*. Readers will be able to take part in a live book group discussion with *Alice Pung*, the author of the memoir *Unpolished Gem* that has been a hit since its release last year. Novelist and teacher *Carmel Bird* will hold a workshop to help would-be writers.

Writer *Alice Pung*, editor *Bryony Cosgrove*, playwright *Michael Gurr* and biographer *Brenda Niall* will discuss the art of biography and memoir and Jocelyn Terry will be in conversation with writer, broadcaster and former Labor parliamentarian *Barry Jones*.

And if you are feeling stressed and need something a little different in your life, don't miss the special event on Saturday, June 9 – African drumming and dance for kids of all ages. At 10.00, 11.30, 2.00 and 3.30 *Guinea Faré* featuring *Aliou Sylla*, the master drummer from Guinea, West Africa will present a dynamic and colourful performance of traditional West African rhythms, using a range of traditional instruments. There will be up to 50 drums available for each workshop. Come along and feel the rhythm.

The Woodend Winter Arts Festival is an intimate arts festival and will be held at St Ambrose Church and Hall and various venues around the town over the Queen's Birthday Weekend from June 8 to 11. Local restaurants will celebrate the festival with special menus. Patrons will be able to enjoy a sumptuous meal before or after a concert. 



This month, the toy library committee will be applying for a Shire of Macedon Ranges grant to help improve and extend our range of toys. If successful, the toy library is likely to begin a 'party pack' which will be able to be hired by members and people in the wider community. Details are still to be finalised, but it's likely the party pack will comprise lightweight, child-sized tables and chairs and a range of toys people will be able to use when hosting a party at home. Items such as our nylon collapsible tunnel and games which children can play i.e. sacks for a sack race, will take the burden off parents having a party at home. The party pack hire fee will enable the toy library to gain some much-needed income and reduce our reliance on grant money to improve and expand our service.

Our only income apart from grants is our subscription money from members, and this is almost entirely spent on insurance, rent and other running costs so, as you can see, without a generous grant from the council and fundraising, the toy library cannot prosper and grow. We have been lucky enough to have received strong support from the council in the past in the shape of an annual grant, so we hope very much they will help the toy library again this year. We believe we offer a valuable service to the town, especially to low-income families, and deliberately keep our fees very affordable so our toy library is very accessible.

In other news, our new 'pretend play' range will be available for borrowing next month.

These is a range of dress-ups or costumes – very handy if you have a fancy dress party coming up! Most fit children aged between 3-7 years. The costumes are – nurse, doctor, chef, Indian boy/girl, pirate, Arabian belly dancer, wizard, witch, and there are two colourful clown costumes of varying sizes. The dress-ups are bound to be popular – after all, what child does not like dressing up?

As well we have purchased a giant collapsible circus tent which looks fantastic, is easy to erect and makes a fantastic temporary cubby. I am sure parents and children will want to borrow this tent with one or two of the clown costumes!

If your child has a costume birthday or has to go to one, you don't have to make or buy a costume, simply borrow one from the toy library!

As always, we need new members! Memberships are still \$15 for 6 months or \$25 for one year, regardless of the number of children in your family.





### FRAN WELCOMES END TO NUISANCE CALLERS

Local Federal Member Fran Bailey has welcomed the launch of the Government's national Do Not Call Register.

"Our residents and small businesses in our Macedon region will be protected from nuisance telemarketing phone calls with the launch of this register, which will begin at the end of this month," Fran said.

"Not all of us are interested in purchasing items or contributing to surveys via telemarketers and calls from these groups often come at extremely inconvenient times – when you're preparing dinner, sitting down to dinner with your family, or up to your elbows in potting mix in the garden.

"This register aims to put an end to that inconvenience.

"Even if the call is being made from a foreign country, if the call is made on behalf of an Australian company, it will be illegal.

"While a very limited amount of calls will be allowed, including those from charities and market research companies, evidence shows the Register will greatly reduce the number of unsolicited calls.

"Based on overseas experience, there is expected to be a high level of demand for the register - as many as one million registrations expected in the first week."

Fran said the number of unsolicited calls in Australia has grown significantly in recent years, and has led to rising community concerns about the inconvenience and intrusiveness of telemarketing.

"From today, our residents can register their personal home and mobile numbers, making it illegal for telemarketers to call these numbers after 31 May." Fran said.

Registration is free and can easily be done by completing a short form online at <a href="www.donotcall.gov.au">www.donotcall.gov.au</a>, while telephone-based registrations will be available later this month.

Forms will also be available through Australia Post Offices from mid-May.

"Registrations are valid for three years, and people can withdraw their registration at any time," Fran said.

Registrations start today and the scheme becomes fully operational on 31 May.

If consumers receive telemarketing calls more than a month after registering on the Do Not Call Register, they can lodge a complaint online at <a href="https://www.donotcall.gov.au">www.donotcall.gov.au</a> or through the Do Not Call complaints line, on 1300 792 958.

Telemarketers will be required to 'wash' their telephone contact lists via the Do Not Call Register from 25 May 2007 and from 31 May 2007 will be bound by the legislation and new rules for telemarketing calls.

### **Volunteer Thank You Evening**

Last week the Macedon Ranges Shire Council hosted an evening in recognition of the effort volunteers put in to a huge number and variety of organisations in the region. It was held at the Kyneton Town Hall and attended by about 100 people representing a large range of groups from kindergartens to the CFA, church groups to local hall committees, neighbourhood houses to play groups and more. A light meal was served, and this time was a great opportunity to network and share experiences with volunteers from the many different groups. It was interesting to hear of their particular projects and affiliations, as well as their successes and frustrations in achieving the goals of their particular organisations.

The formal part of the evening consisted of addresses by representatives from the council, the Department for Victorian Communities (DVC) outlining the availability of grant from local government and state government sources, and quite often projects are funded from several different local and state grants.

This was followed by a series of talks by individuals who have been successful in applying for funding for some very significant grants to undertake major community projects.

The message from both government speakers and community volunteers was very much that funding is available for a range of major and small projects, for groups that wish to put the effort into applying, but there is also a lot of competition for grants. The application process is often quite a complex one, and requires a fair degree of commitment and effort. Applications need to be well presented and researched, with a lot of supporting evidence for the request. However daunting this may seem, there is help and advice available from the DVC when putting together an application.

### Box Ironbark Ecology Course Nagambie, October 2007

### The course
