### WELL DONE ROMSEY...

ROMSEY MEDICAL CENTRE – The Sandakan Fund Raising Effort..

When a Romsey resident set out to raise funds for the *Romsey Medical Centre* last November, he was not sure whether he had set the bar too high at \$10,000. He wanted to repay the medical centre for their professionalism in diagnosing a rare form of lymphoma that was virtually unknown in Australia. He was subsequently treated successfully by oncologists at the *Royal Melbourne Hospital* and is now in full remission.

"It is thanks to the generosity of Romsey business people and residents that I was able to raise the funds so successfully" said Mike Garnett. "In fact the final amount is in excess of \$14,000, not bad for a small community".

Many of the fifty sponsors were on hand at the *Romsey Mechanics Hall* on Friday 27 June, to witness the presentation of the cheque to Dr. Noel Cunningham by local councillor Sandra McGregor on behalf of the sponsors. "The gift will allow the centre to replace its emergency resuscitation equipment with the most up-to-date available," said Dr. Cunningham. "It will assist us to treat the medical emergencies of all our patients more rapidly and effectively."

Mike Garnett said that he could not have reached the target without the core sponsors, however many others generously gave what they could and all deserve the community's sincere thanks.

"It is a credit to the reputation of Dr. Noel Cunningham and his team at the Romsey Medical Centre that we were able to achieve our target", says Mike.

On August 21 Mr. Garnett and his two sons Nick and Andrew will set out to walk the *Sandakan Trek* in North Borneo – 127 kilometres through tropical jungle in nine days. Known as the *Death March*, it is the scene of one of the worst military atrocities of the *Second World War* where 2,400 Australian and British POWs died of malnutrition, maltreatment and disease. Those who did survive this march were massacred at the hands of the Japanese – all except three who hid in local villages and lived to tell the tale. 21 (City of Melbourne) Squadron RAAF, with which Mike Garnett served post war, was based at Balikpapan just south of Sandakan at the time of the Japanese surrender, and so he feels an affinity with North Borneo.

"I wanted to do this to show those involved in this project that I am fully recovered," said Mike, "but more importantly as a thank-you to the sponsors who supported my fund raising efforts. I could not have gone cap-in-hand for money without doing something substantial in return."

The money goes to the medical centre, and will surely give Romsey residents of all ages added confidence should they ever require the services of the new emergency medical equipment.

"Too often the generosity of sponsors goes unheralded", says Mike, "and so it is only fitting that the *Romsey Rag* has published their names below – and sincere thanks go to the staff of *Romsey Rag* for printing this article."

### Nurse-On-Call - At your service

Dear Friend

I thought it timely to remind residents of the free 24 hour telephone service for healthcare advice called *Nurse-On-Call*. Celebrating its second year of operation this month, *Nurse-On-Call* has become a vital resource for families in the Macedon Ranges with over 3,000 calls made to the service from our area since it began.

*Nurse-On-Call* is staffed by highly-trained professionals who can help residents decide if they need to attend hospital or see a doctor straight away, or whether their illness or condition could be treated by their GP the next day.

More than 10% of the callers to the service in Victoria, who had intended to care for themselves, were told that they needed emergency treatment. Just over one in five callers who had planned to ring an ambulance or go to the hospital emergency department, were advised they could manage their condition at home. The most common ailments about which calls were made were vomiting and fever among children, abdominal pain or discomfort, adult nausea and vomiting and chest pain.

Throughout Victoria, *Nurse-On-Call* has taken more than 740,000 calls since the service began, which is 1000 calls a day, or about one call every 90 seconds. To contact *Nurse-On-Call*, telephone 1300 60 60 24 for free any time of the day or night



Romsey is the third-largest town in the Macedon Ranges Shire, having overtaken Woodend in the five years up to 2006. Recent population growth shows that Kyneton's position in second spot is within sight. An excellent analysis of the 2006 census results by the Council's Social

Planning Co-ordinator, Dr Lorraine Beyer, has thrown some insight on what makes Romsey and the Shire 'tick'. For example, the top towns by population in the Shire are Gisborne with 6398. Kyneton with 4286. Romsey with 3527. Woodend with 3170 and Riddells Creek with 2627, with daylight to Macedon next on 1439 and Lancefield on 1184. But Romsey has grown by 3.2% per year from 2001 to 2006 while Kyneton has grown by just 0.3% - so there's every chance that the growth spurt will continue. The overall annual growth of 1.2% for the Macedon Ranges Shire makes us the 11th-fastest growing local government area in regional Victoria.

Overall we're a younger population as well, with 11% of the Shire's residents being aged over 65 compared to a Statewide average of 14%. The youth focus in Romsey also reflects in the family constellations, as 55% of the households in the town are couples with children. This compares with the level for top-of-the-table Riddells Creek (60%) and Gisborne (58%). This carries over into the average household size -3.0 people in Romsey, compared to a Shire-wide average of 2.8. These important statistics showing our younger profile show that we need to ensure we retain a focus on developing and providing services for our young people - they're our future, and the figures confirm that we need to ensure we are catering for their needs.

Lorraine Beyer tells us that the Shire's population on census night was 38,360. While our annual population growth is 1.2%, we've tapered off from the 2.1% annual growth from 1996 to 2001, which at that stage

had us the fourth-fastest growing regional LGA. Some 95% of the Shire's growth since 2001 has been in Romsey, Riddells Creek and Gisborne.

Our middle-aged guys across the Shire have a window of opportunity – the analysis shows an apparent shortage of males compared to females in the 35 to 44 years age group. However, we've got slightly more males than females in the age groups up to 24.



Home ownership in the Macedon Ranges Shire is higher than Victoria as a whole, with 83% of our residents buying or owning their own home, compared with a State-wide average of 74%. However, just 16% of our households are renters compared with 25% for Victoria as a whole - primarily because there is a shortage of rental properties available locally.

These figures give us as a Council and as a community plenty to think about, and we need to closely analyse them to ensure that our services and priorities match the needs of our residents. Anyone wanting more information on the census results can phone Lorraine Beyer on 5427 8237.

### **Lions Park Roadworks**

Work is being carried out on the reconstruction of the service road and car park adjacent to the Lions Park, with the contract awarded to Newearth Construction.

The work includes the replacement of an old asbestos cement water main on a shared cost arrangement with Western Water, the excavation and construction of a new road pavement, and kerb and channel works.

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

### Out of Little Things, Big Things Grow – Grant Success

Recently, Romsey Kindergarten was delighted with the news that we had been successful in an application for funding under the State Government's Children's Capital Grant Scheme to fund the redevelopment of the playground areas. The idea to develop a longer term vision for the playground area began two years ago at Committee level when the teachers raised the idea of making better use of the verandah areas, especially during the winter months. From this discussion came a bigger picture discussion of a quality development. Funding was obtained from the Shire of Macedon Ranges to commission a concept playground development plan from the Mary Jeavons Landscape Architect group which specializes in early childhood facility developments. The major grant (\$98,610) from the state government allows the redevelopment to be done all at once rather than as a staged development dependent on fundraising. It has been a wonderful result all round, with the redevelopment to be completed, hopefully, before the end of this year.

### Meditation

Luke 5: 27.

'After this, Jesus went out and saw a tax collector by the name of Levi sitting by his tax booth. "Follow me," Jesus said to him, and Levi got up, left everything and followed him.'

Take a few moments to imagine the scene.

Picture yourself among the disciples walking with Jesus. The customs house is on the edge of the busy main road, a trade route from Damascus through Capernaum to the cost and all the way down to Egypt.

It's a warm day. Outside the house is a chaos of carts and wagons carrying grain, wine, olive oil. A confusion of horses, donkeys and mules kick up the dust, their drivers shouting and quarrelling and sweating in the sun.

We follow Jesus as he walks through the crowd, brushing away the flies, ignoring the smells, watching where he puts his feet. He goes through the gate in the high wall, past the guards armed against robbers, and enters the courtyard. It too is crowded with reluctant tax payers. The tables are covered with papyrus scrolls and wax tablets for note taking, invoices, and bills.

Businessmen sit and argue with accountants, pleading poverty. "It's been a bad year for olive oil.... I can't afford to pay." Poor men ask for mercy, not even expecting justice.

Levi sits in the main room. Jesus stands quietly in front of the table, but Levi continues to write, head down. He's a bureaucrat enjoying the taste of power in the ten second wait. Then he looks up at Jesus and as their eyes meet there is some strange compelling transaction between them. "Come," says Jesus and as Levi responds to the invitation, pushes back his chair and stands, he becomes Matthew, "Gift of the Lord". Matthew was a tough, shrewd and cynical tax collector, a man

willing to accept deep unpopularity in his pursuit of wealth. I wonder why he gave it all up to follow Jesus. It wasn't just a weekend adventure, but a deep commitment involving his whole life.

Perhaps it was the fact that Jesus, this new teacher and miracle worker who was beginning to attract crowds to hear him, was

willing to take him as a friend, accept him as he was. Jesus made no accusations, no recriminations. Matthew wasn't used to that.

Jesus gave him a simple invitation, and offered it with love. "Follow me. Come as you are." Centuries before, Moses reminded his people of the way God had freed them from slavery in Egypt. He told them that it wasn't because they were more in number that the Lord chose them but because he loved them (Deuteronomy 7:7) Jesus was saying a similar thing to Matthew

We can all build that into our understanding. It's not because we're better, more intelligent, harder working or even more enthusiastic that the Lord chooses us, but because he loves us. It's a plain unconditional fact.

Matthew deserved nothing. His life-style had made him unacceptable to most people but that wasn't the point. Jesus offered him and offers us unconditional love.

It has been written – "We need the courage to accept that we are accepted in spite of being unacceptable."

God welcomes us, not because of anything we've done or are, but because he loves us. That's the truth and we can take it or leave it. And even if we choose to leave it he still loves us.



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### 100 PEOPLE VISIT MOUNT WILLIAM STONE **AXE QUARRY**

On Saturday 24 May 2008, Deep Creek Landcare Group had the rare privilege to host an open day at the Mount William Stone Axe Quarry, located north-east of Lancefield, and attended by about 100 people.

The Mount William site was a greenstone axe quarry, worked for thousands of years by the Wurundjeri people. The green stone at Mount William is of a quality unique in Australia, and is part of the dreaming stories of the area. The stone was traded extensively for things such as possum skins for clothing. The part of the quarry which has survived European settlement has been declared an archeological area under the Archeological Relics Preservation Act



1972, and is owned by the Indigenous Lands Corporation. The site has recently been granted National Heritage listing

Annette Xibberas, a member of the indigenous land owners and member of the Wurundjeri Cultural Heritage Council, opened proceedings with a Welcome to Country, and then led groups through the quarry, explaining the process of extraction and trimming of the stone.

Lachlan Milne, Environmental Officer of Macedon Ranges Shire Council also provided visitors with information on the native vegetation, present in abundance on the site.

Group President, John Blamey, declared the day a great success, with good numbers taking advantage of the rare access to the site, and the benefit of learning of its heritage significance from Annette Xibberas.



### LOCAL FILM GOES WORLD WIDE

The three hour, nine part film FORGING THE ANZAC TRADITION - The Untold Story of World War 1- made almost entirely in Romsey and mainly by Macedon Ranges based people, is receiving wide acclaim by historians and enthusiasts from New Zealand to France.

Released early in June, the film states at the start that it is an endeavour to correct the ANZAC nations' history books that over-emphasise the importance of the Gallipoli tragedy – and The Untold Story is about the Western Front in France and Belgium.

The film was made by Romsey husband and wife team Alan and Norma Young to commemorate the 2008 90<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the ANZACS remarkable victories in 1918 when their gallant actions and tactics shortened history's bloodiest war by at least six months.

Over two years in the making, many people from the Macedon Ranges region contributed to the film. Two former Romsey Primary School students were active in the film's production. Cameron Baker was on the editing team and Tom Watts was involved in post production work.

Romsey resident and ABC announcer, Colin Fox, did much of the film's narration. Woodend film maker, John Studley was assistant director and with Macedon's Lisa Kirby, now a trainee film maker - were also editors.

The film has been sent to three war museums in France, three in Belgium and the London Imperial War Museum. So far, compliments have poured in to the producer from educators and historians in three countries.

Although the Youngs have poured about a million dollars in cash and kind into the project, profits from the non-profit film will go to establishing a Kyneton RSL educational trust fund, for Macedon Ranges students to study on the Western Front where 59,000 ANZACS paid the supreme sacrifice.

Although FORGING THE ANZAC TRADITION comprehensively covers the now famous battle of Fromelles, including a role by regular Romsey visitor, Lambis Englezos, who after 92 years discovered the missing 170 diggers. Alan Young's next film will be one devoted entirely to the Fromelles shambles.

It was the Australians' first battle in France that became Australia's worst one day tragedy costing nearly 2,000 dead in one night and over 3,500 other casualties. This exceeds the total number killed in such famous battles as Tobruk, Kokoda Trail and Korea.

### Stronger laws for the safer restraint of travelling children

Recently I have been alarmed at the number of children being inadequately restrained while travelling in the family vehicle. Many of us parents may be unknowingly placing our kids at risk. Seatbelts designed for adults do not provide adequate protection for our children and can even cause serious injury in the event of a accident. While usage rates for child restraints with infants and toddlers are high in Australia, the number of children in booster seats between the ages of three and seven are disturbing low.

The RACV has recently released alarming findings regarding our children's safety on our roads. They have found that children restrained in adult seat belts are 3.5 times more likely to sustain significant injury in an accident compared to children restrained in their correct chairs. The RACV found that in the last 5 years ending in 2007, the deaths of 48 children on our roads might have been prevented if they were seated in correctly fitted and appropriate restraints.

The Australian transport minister has recently released new laws which will soon come into effect. These new laws will:

- 1. Require that children up to six months old travel in a rearward facing infant capsule.
- 2. Require that children six months to four years of age travel in a forward facing child restraint.
- 3. Require that children four to seven years travel in a booster seat.
- 4. Require that children under seven be seated in a rear seat of the vehicle. This is unless the child is aged 4-7 years and all other seats are occupied by children under seven.

While these proposed laws cater for the majority of children, a provision has been drafted to ensure a child is not required to use a restraint unsuitable for their size and weight. The RACV recommends that children under 12 years do not sit in the front seat, ever! The RACV research has shown that children are 70% less likely to be killed or seriously injured in the even of an accident if seated correctly.

A free brochure is available from your local RACV shop, which gives you more information about the RACV research including information about how your child's restraint stacked up in their tests.

Penalties may also apply for drivers who do not ensure that their passengers, (under the age of 16), are properly restrained. These penalties might involve a fine of \$165 and three demerit points or, if convicted in court, a fine of up to \$500 and three demerit points. Possible suspension or cancellation of licence may also apply.

A child's safety remains in the parents' / guardians' hands so please restrain your children correctly and ensure their safe arrival at your next destination.
