

DEEP CREEK LANDCARE GROUP 3434

Covering Lancefield, Romsey & Monegeeta Districts

One of the Deep Creek Landcare Group's biggest projects in recent times would have to be the Sheehans Crossing project in Romsey.

We began years ago by sourcing a natural area restoration management design plan authored by Andrew Pawsey and approached MRSC, Melbourne Water and Park Vic for permission to restore an area than was then degraded from years of overgrazing and pest weed and animal. There was very little

biodiversity in this now beautiful site and our work restoring it over a period of time was rewarded when the Port Phillip & Westernport Catchment Management Authority awarded our group the "Caring for public land" award in 2012 for our

work particularly at Sheehans Crossing.

Much volunteer time and effort went into site preparation such as the removal of dumped rubbish and wire, weed removal (to the tune of 3 ute loads), site spraying in preparation of planting out what is now closer to a thousand trees and shrubs so as to restore biodiversity, protect the integrity of remnant vegetation and the intrinsic value of the wildlife corridor and to contribute to the site's environmental assets which are classified as endangered and vulnerable in its environmental vegetation classification (EVC).

In the last few years (and last year with the assistance of DELWP funding), we have successfully established roo exclusion cages (as seen below) which have been incredibly successful and we wish to share this success with the com-

There is often nothing more defeating than planting out hundreds of staked and guarded trees for them to become merely fodder for pest animals but the roo exclusion cages have proved extremely valuable in getting the native vegetation off to

a good start by protecting them whilst they are young (tubestock). Once they establish, the fencing then can be moved to another position nearby and we begin the process again. This is a very effective way of establishing vegetation that is prone to pest animal grazing. Fences are 1.2mH and up to 10mL wrapped into a circular cage with galvanised posts and anchored by gal pegs on all sides. If you are doing any revegetation on your property and would like to see the set up, design and success of these roo exclusion cages, feel free to have a gander at those along the Deep Creek on Sheehans Rd Romsey. Deep Creek Landcare Group would also like to take this opportunity to thank our outgoing Landcare Facilitator Grant Godden for all his hard work, attention



assistance to our Landcare Group and wish him well with his future endeav-

Some excellent news with one of our recent applications for funds being successsful. The MRSC has approved our Small Communitite Grant application, these funds will see the RMI purchase two locakable cleaner's cupboards so that cleaning equipment and other materials can be securely stored and out of the way of patrons.

The 2017-18 Bendigo Bank Community Investment Fund has just opened. Over the years the RMI has received wonderful support from this community minded local business. We will be applying for funds to finish off our two-stage heaters improvement project that was begun last year.

The CoM hopes to see the fully repaired and restored WW1 Honour Rolls back within the RMI before the end of June. These two treasured community artefacts will soon again be on display for all to see

Work to strip back the timber fireplaces and other timber in the Supper Room is continuing. Once all the paint has been removed the bare timber will be sanded back, waxed and then at least three coats of shellack will be applied. This will be a slow process but once it is completed it will really help bring the Supper Room back to its original appearance Many people who have used the RMI in recent years will be aware of some of the damage to the rendered walls in the main hall and the Supper Room. The CoM has contacted the relevant trades to get quotes for repairs to the obvious damage and for preventative maintenance works to areas where the render is beginning to come away from the bricks. We hope to present our case to DELWP and gain some funds for these works. The damage was originally caused by the rising damp, now that the building is drying out repairs will stop the areas slowly growing causing damage to the floor and seriously detracting from the look of the hall

The event will be held during NAIDOC Week, a national celebration from 2 to 9 July that honours the history. culture and achievements of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples.

Accomplished author Bruce Pascoe will be discussing his latest award-winning work, Dark Emu; which presents a radically different view of Australia's first peoples as hunter gatherers.

Through extracts of early explorer's journals and records, Bruce asserts that Aboriginal people across the continent were engineering sophisticated dwellings and irrigation systems, along with domesticated plants, sowing, harvesting and storing.

The evening is in honour of the late John Morieson, an academic of Aboriginal history and cosmology, a social activist for Indigenous education, and local member of the Macedon Ranges Reconciliation Group.



Bike Safe Macedon Ranges - Light Up the Road

Council encourages responsible use of wood fire heaters for the comfort of all

Council is reminding residents with wood fire heaters to check their chimneys for excessive smoke, as it can disturb neighbours, affect the environment and cause physical discomfort to those with respiratory illnesses.

Council's Manager Community Safety, Anne-Louise Lindner said while wood heaters can be a great source of warmth during the winter months, they can be a major contributor to outdoor air pollution.

"If not operated correctly, wood heaters and open fire places can cause problems for neighbours and adjoining properties.

"Smoke should almost never be visible from a working chimney, yet we're hearing neighbourhood complaints about air pollution from wood fire heaters," she said.

There are some simple steps that owners of wood fire heaters can take to reduce wood smoke. These include:

When lighting a cold heater, use plenty of dry kindling.

Only burn dry and seasoned wood. To check this, knock two bits of wood together. It should make a 'crack' sound rather than a dull thud.

Use several small logs rather than one large log and stack them loosely in your heater so air can circulate around them. Don't cram the firebox.

Fire should only smoke when first lit and when adding extra fuel. Open the air controls fully for five minutes before and 20 minutes after reloading.

Don't let your heater smoulder overnight - keep enough air in the fire to maintain a flame. Expect the ash to be fine white powder. If coals are present after the fire has burnt out, there is a good chance your fire is smoking excessively.

Inspect and clean the flue at least once a year. Check it regularly to see if smoke is being emitted (wood heaters should only smoke for 20-30 minutes when first lit and for 10 minutes after more wood has been added).

Ms Lindner encouraged people adversely affected by smoke from wood fire heaters to try to resolve the issue amiably.

"Neighbourhood complaints concerning wood heater smoke occur at this time each year, and these issues are best handled by working together.

"If after speaking with your neighbour you don't see an improvement, contact Council", she said.

If you are experiencing excessive smoke emissions from your wood heater or if you are still concerned with smoke coming from a neighbour's wood heater after speaking with them,

contact Council's Environmental Health Unit on 5422 0333.


