CHEMICAL BAITS NEED SPECIAL CARE

The use of baits containing the active ingredient 1080 is an important tool for farmers managing rabbit and fox populations. NRE currently supplies 1080 products to farmers, with the three main products being 1080 carrot bait for rabbits, 1080 oat bait for rabbits and Foxoff fox bait.

These products are highly effective against the target pests when used according to the label, and for these products 'the label' also includes the additional information provided to users when they are supplied with the product.

All of the registered 1080 products are classed as 'Restricted supply' products by the National Registration Authority, and because all 1080 products are Schedule 7 poisons, t' are also classed as 'Restricted use' products by the Dept of Natural Resources and Environment.

In order to be supplied with a 1080 product a person must complete an application for supply (available from NRE) and take it to their usual NRE office together with an accurate map of the area to be treated. In addition, each person who wishes to be supplied with 1080 products will need to show their Agricultural chemical user Permit (ACUP) before 1080 supply can occur. The message here is simple; NO ACUP - no 1080 PRODUCT because it is an offence under the Agvet Code for NRE to supply 1080 products to unauthorised persons.

Once a person has been supplied with a 1080 product they must adhere strictly to the directions for use and the additional information provided by NRE. The additional information is regarded as part of the label, and being Scheduled 7 poisons, 1080 products must be used in strict accordance with all directions and instructions.

All of the 1080 products are potentially highly toxic to dogs, and it is critical that the neighbours of the property to be treated are notified in advance that a 1080 product is to be used. This will allow the neighbours time to take precautions to ensure that their pets do not get access to the treated area or baits.

Used wisely, 1080 products can provide effective method for control of rabbits and fo. _____ as part of an integrated control program. For detailed information on the use of 1080 products, and the specific details relating to their supply, contact your local NRE Catchment Management Officer.

1 EP CREEK LANDCARE GROUP (Romsey / Lancefield)

GORSE FIELD DAY

30 people attended the Gorse Field Day on Sunday November 18th at Green's shearing shed, Lancefield, despite the terrible wind and rain.

Guest speakers informed participants about gorse, its invasiveness, and described different techniques of control and eradication available.

Speakers included Raelene Kwong, a leader in biological control research with the Keith Turnbull Research Institute; David Richards from Dupont Chemicals; Gordon Meyer, an experienced local contractor and Lachlan Milne, Environmental Officer for the Macedon ranges Shire Council. Dr Janey Jackson from the MRSC was available for discussion about local environmental issues.

After lunch a guided tour of a range of sites showed participants the results of various management techniques of gorse removal and a demonstration of a "gorse muncher".

Gorse is a very serious weed which is found in all states except the Northern Territory. It is a very invasive environmental and agricultural weed which threatens bushland and reduces pasture productivity. It harbours pest animals such as foxes and rabbits and can increase fire hazards.

Gorse is described as a woody, erect, many-branched shrub which is very spiny. It has yellow "pea" flowers in spring and autumn.

What's News

As I write this, the NSW bushfire crisis is finally beginning to ease, although the potential danger remains high. It was strange sitting in cool and wet conditions whilst our near neighbours were facing such devastation.

The exceptional weather conditions during December may have lulled some people into a false sense of bushfire security. I feel, however, that most people recognised that it would only make things worse later on. As with last summer, the extra greenery early in summer is potentially even more bushfire fuel when it dries out. As we faced twelve months ago, the danger is very real.

Some people face life with the same attitude. Whilst things are going well, we enjoy it, not trying too hard to worry about what might happen next. For farmers, there is always more balance, as experience has shown that a good season needs to carry them through the bad ones.

So what about faith and belief? In the early church, many people didn't make a commitment to God until their deathbed. This wasn't because they didn't believe, but because they didn't want to risk doing something to offend God after making their commitment.

My attitude, and I think that of the Bible, is a bit different. Part of what I believe is that God's commitment to me is much greater than the commitment I make to God. When I screw up, I turn to God and start again. Whilst humans may get sick and tired of continually forgiving one another (ask any parent – children will try the patience of any saint!), God's patience is endless, just as God's love is limitless.

There is nothing wrong with a deathbed commitment to God. If it takes that long to realise that God is important, so be it. But we can make our decision at any time, knowing that God will stick with us through thick and thin. Life is a constant learning curve. The life of faith is no different.




