#### Re<u>cipe</u> MEXICAN TORTILLA PIE 4 Tortillas

1 onion finely chopped 2 cloves garlic crushed 500g lean minced beef 1 red capsicum finely chopped 125g can corn kernels drained 2 tsp chilli flakes 415g can diced tomatoes Quarter cup fresh coriander leaves One and a half cups grated tasty cheese

Preheat oven 180 degrees

Cook onion and garlic in a frying pan until soft. Add mince, cook until browned. Add capsicum, corn and chilli flakes. Cook, stirring until capsicum is just tender. Stir in diced tomatoes.

Reduce heat, simmer and stir until mixture is thick. Add coriander. Season with salt and pepper. Mix well. Set aside to cool.

Place a 6cm deep, 20cm round pan on a baking tray. Place one Tortilla in base of pan. Spread one third of mince mixt. on top. Sprinkle with one third of cheese. Repeat layers twice. Finish with Tortilla on top sprinkled with cheese.

Bake until cheese is golden. Set aside for 5 minutes before removing from pan.

In weeks 3 and 4 of the term the Year 5/6 students performed Alice In Wonderland which also celebrates its



**Former Romsey Primary** School Site Acquisition by Macedon Ranges Shire Council Finalized – Bring on the Park!



Greater Romsey All Abilities Park (GRAAP) Inc is thrilled by Mary-Anne Thomas' (MLA Macedon) recent announcement confirming finalization of the sale of the former Romsey Primary School site to Macedon Ranges Shire Council (MRSC). This site holds a special place for many Romsey residents, current and former. It was a priority for GRAAP to lobby for its retention as a community open space project. After years of GRAAP lobbying local, state and federal governments for this historically significant site to be retained for community open space, MRSC voted unanimously in March 2013 to purchase the site from the State Government.

GRAAP is most grateful to MRSC's support of this project's concept and its patient negotiations with the State Government to purchase the site. GRAAP is now looking forward to initiating the Master Plan process for the all abilities park open space development as soon as possible. MRSC will, as property owner, be charged with the responsibility of determining the future tenants of the historic former primary school building which under the terms of the purchase contract must be not for profit use only. GRAAP has



expressed its nope that the building's use will be sympathetic and complimentary to the park development space. GRAAP would like to

thank all at MRSC, State Government and our local community who have worked hard to get to this milestone point.

Of course, there is much hard work to do, but the road ahead for this project and the old school site is now heading toward a positive outcome rather than the uncertainty of many previous years. The Romsey region and its visitors can now look forward to an innovative passive recreation space which will engage the senses for all ages and all

#### "Project Romsey" Streetscape Forum #2

The second Romsey Streetscape Community Forum was held on Wednesday 19<sup>th</sup> August 2015 at the Romsey Community Hub subsequent to Project Romsey Update #2 being circulated and posted at Romsey Online (www.romsey.org.au). The primary purpose of this forum was to form working parties from community members to progress Project Romsey. They are as follows:

#### Trees and Main Street Garden 1.

Aim: To enhance natural aesthetics of the Main Street boulevard Barry Street to Palmer Street.

This will include consideration of trees, possible nature strip gardens, planter boxes, watering systems, etc.

#### 2. Five Mile Creek Precinct

- To enhance and maintain the natural Romsey Aim: Five Mile Creek watercourse in partnership relevant stakeholders.
- This will include the waterway and its immediate environment (pre-existing and future development).

#### **3.** Lighting and Roads

- To review and identify opportunities to en-Aim: hance lighting (aesthetics) and functionality (incl. street lamps, feature building lighting, festive lighting).
- This will also address parking signage, A frames etc, safe crossing points, Barry Street intersection.

#### 4. Arts, Culture and Events

To review current Romsey events and consid-Aim: er possible future events attractions for Romsey (including possible 5<sup>th</sup> Sunday market). To also include consideration of possible Street Art projects. This group will also be available to assist the Historical Society (for example, to implement a broader historic building plaque program and to assist making their walking tour more readily accessible to visitors).

#### 5. Town Pride

- To enhance visual aesthetics to visitors and Aim: locals on arrival at town entry points.
- Tasks will include assessment and management of roadside rubbish and coordinating design of town entry features (north, south, east and west) whilst mindful of sustainable practices.

The focus for each working party was determined from feedback from the first Forum and subsequent meetings with key Macedon Ranges Shire Council (MRSC) officers. Each of these working parties will liaise closely with the Romsey Lancefield Historical Society in the formulation of their project plans.

#### Lone Pine Precinct







JERUSALEM .....
