

New waste collection service helps residents to 'bin better'

We are improving access to our services while increasing recycling across the shire -helping us move towards ZERO WASTE. Council has improved and expanded its waste and recycling collection service: not only is there a new garden bin collection for residential properties, new contractor Wheelie Waste will also provide an improved and extended service to all residents across the shire.

"Through the new contract with Wheelie Waste, we are now able to offer our waste and general recycling collection service to virtually every property in the shire," said Mayor Henry McLaughlin. "Council is offering this service for only \$215 a year - that's \$18 a month for a regular weekly collection. But most importantly, the service extension means we can increase the collection of recyclable materials across the shire. Up to 65% of recyclable materials still goes into landfill - so we encourage everyone in the Macedon Ranges to use our service and fill their recycling bin correctly," he said.

If you live in a rural area, you may see a truck collect both your garbage and recycling bins at the same time – this truck is split in two compartments, to keep your garbage and recyclables separate.

"We also encourage residents who have received a green garden bin to start recycling their garden clippings, as Council audits show that up to 20% of garbage truck contents consists of recyclable garden materials," he said.

The fee for the garden bin service, which is being provided to designated residential properties, is \$1 per week or \$0.50 per week for pensioners.

"These initiatives are in line with the Victoria Government's Toward Zero Waste strategy, which requires Council to increase the amount of waste that is recycled in the shire from 35% to 65% by 2014," said Mayor Henry McLaughlin.

Council's new contractor, Wheelie Waste, aims to employ local people and use local industry wherever possible, and will have an operational base in Woodend.

"The new contract with Wheelie Waste will result in a significant and visible improvement for residents in the quality and reliability of our waste collection service," said Mayor Henry McLaughlin.

As part of the new contract, during October Council aims to repair or replace all damaged bins put out on the day of collection. There will also be a more rapid turnaround on the repair or replacement of damaged bins after October.

Digital Learning Prep ICT Project

The students of Prep CM are excited to be participating in a study by the Department of Education and Early Childhood Development entitled "The

Contemporary Literacy of Preps" this term. As part of this project the preps have had focused lessons that are designed around the safe and responsible use of technologies, finding and selecting information, critical and creative thinking and evaluation. Embedded in the project is an emphasis on effective communication and collaborating beyond the classroom walls. The inquiry topic of "Living & Non-living Things" has been an excellent vehicle for the preps to demonstrate their learning. To celebrate the conclusion of this project the students with the help of their parents took a photo of a farm. All their photos were displayed in an exhibition in the gym for parents and the community to enjoy.

The Ultranet

We have been recognised by the Loddon Mallee Region as a school that has embraced and supported the implementation of the Ultranet. To support this project we have been granted \$5000 to extend and further develop our teacher's expertise. Two Ultranet coaches from the region will spend 10 days working with our teachers and students next term. Our school will be available as a host school for visits by other schools' leaders and teachers. The focus for our project is on using the Ultranet to improve student learning in literacy. Early in this term the Ultranet coach for Macedon Network supported Mrs Emond and Mrs Dettmann. These teachers have been training their colleagues and students and many students have become experts and taught other classes various skills. The Victorian Government is fully committed to the continued implementation of the Ultranet as an online student-centred learning environment that supports quality learning and teaching and connects students, teachers and parents. We look forward to our continued success in this area.

Video Conferencina

We are also pleased to announce that we have recently had delivered two sets of video conferencing equipment. One has been installed and we are awaiting the installation of the other. One is part of the funding we received for The Learning Neighbourhood and the other is being paid for by the region in recognition of our continued excellence in this area. We are excited about being able to have this advanced equipment available to all students.

Our Whole School Approach to Teaching Reading

This term, as part of our whole school approach to reading, daily explicit instruction is being provided to all students in developing questioning strategies to both actively construct meaning and to monitor com-

prehension. Questioning is an important strategy in developing comprehension. Fluent readers actively and strategically engage when reading by asking questions. This helps them to focus their reading, delve deeper into the text, clarify meaning, and critically reflect on what they

It is through asking meaningful questions that students learn to monitor their comprehension. Smart readers recognise when they are losing meaning, whether it be at the word, sentence, or text level, and are able to ask questions about what strategies they need to use to help them

Some of the questioning strategies our students are using include asking before, during and after questions, locating answers to literal questions in the text, thinking and searching to answer inferential questions, making and recording wonderings, grandma reading, partner reading and question webs. The pictures below are a sample of what is happening in classrooms as our students develop their questioning skills and abilities.





The Australian Personal Property Security Register was due to commence in May, then October this year and now, will commence in early 2012. 
There has been a great deal of work happening at the Cottage as well.

Gas Heating








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Australia Day Awards and Events 2012

Australia Day Festivities from Baynton to Bullengarook



Personal comment and Reflection: God's Grace among us.

As a Minister, I have the opportunity to attend many Wedding Receptions.

Typically, as I enter the reception room, the first thing I do is look for the board containing the seating arrangements. Mostly, I am placed on a table that is situated toward the back of the room, next to the table where the band adjourns for refreshments. I usually wear a clerical collar with my dinner suit.

This means that as I meander across the room toward the assigned table, the guests freeze suspecting the minister is coming to sit at their table.

As I pass their sense of relief is obvious.

Finally, arriving at the assigned table. My table party consists of people like, Uncle Jim, a retired Police Officer, Sam, the family accountant, Trish, the bride's long lost girlfriend, and a distant cousin from Liverpool.

They are polite but uncomfortable, as they try in vain to mask their misfortune. Without fail, the guests proceed in turn to announce "I am not religious" or "I'm spiritual but do not go to Church".

We end up, however, having a wonderful evening, my companions say in all sincerity that they enjoyed my company and that they were surprised to discover I am perfectly normal.

Sure we had some laughs, but the wedding experience reminds us that the public image of the Church leaves a lot to be desired . For some people, the main stumbling block is summed up by the question, "If God is a loving and powerful God, why do bad things happen?" From Auschwitz to earthquakes, the history of of suffering represents a serious judgement on the God of Christianity and requires a major shift in thinking from a God "as a power over us" to God "as grace among us"

But surely, if the cross has taught us anything, it is that God feels for us and with us in our suffering.

And for us, Jesus is a potent and impassioned symbol of hope, and with God's grace, we can move forward with hope.


