



"That's not a playground... *This* is a playground"

Around the kindergarten I have recently heard a lot about a fantastic playground in Gisborne. I have been asked by parents and TOLD by their children to both inspect the Gisborne playground and then make it happen in Romsey! The new Gisborne playground it is located behind the aquatic centre, has BBQ facilities and is a great place for a weekend picnic. This playaround was not council funded nor was it a council project. It is the result of some very hard work by some very organised and dedicated individuals committed to improving their town.

Helen Gray was instrumental in the establishment of the playground and has advised it took approximately 24 months from concept to completion and cost approximately \$340,000. The processes involved in this project, fundraising, design, council negotiations etc, would differ little between towns. Economies of scale can be achieved if Lancefield, Romsey & Riddells Creek work together. One team, three towns, three playgrounds! After the success of the Gisborne playground a project in Woodend has commenced for which Helen has provided guidance. The Woodend project team have setup the following website which shows they have approached the task very professionally.



KINDER CORNER ROMSEY KINDERGARTEN NEWS

As the end of the year rapidly approaches, "it's all happening", as they say, at Romsey Kindergarten. The approaching winds of change forecast a new Committee, new management system and new early childhood educationfocused playground. Despite these "changes", the ongoing commitment by all of the key players at the kindergarten is to a best practice early childhood education for the children of Romsey.

Management Review – The Association Votes

On Tuesday 14th October, the Association of Romsey Kindergarten Inc. met to vote on the motion which proposed a change from the current parent committee of management system to management by Try Youth and Community Services. The motion was carried in a secret ballot (47 votes for, 2 votes against). Cr. Geoff Neil, Heather Fagan (National Australia Bank, Romsey), Peter O'Rourke (Macedon Ranges Meat Specialist, Rotary) and Chris Durston (Rochford Lawyers) attended as guests to supervise the ballot. This meeting was the culmination of a 14 month review process conducted by two successive Committees of Management.

The attendance at the meeting was great - this was a subject which obviously resonated with the kindergarten community. The contribution from Association members in this process was a vital contribution to the Kindergarten. The process that lies ahead is as follows:

- Committee will organize a steering committee for transition and to be briefed by TRY Youth and Community Services as to the schedule of tasks for completion
- Association members will be informed as to progress of transition
- Association members to be surveyed as to committee tasks to be retained when negotiating agreement with TRY
- Annual General Meeting in on 17th November to ٠ elect a Committee of Management to function as such until agreement with TRY negotiated and TRY assume role as licensee (hopefully, early 2009)
- Early 2009 Constitution amended to allow for reduction in number of Committee members

Playground Redevelopment – It's Almost Complete!

The excitement is building for children, staff and parents as the redevelopment of the playground approaches completion. New pathways, tanks, water features, shade tree seating, cubby houses and digging patches are finally emerging from the "construction zone". The children



have already had a "sneak preview" play in part of the playground. This has been a big event at Romsey Kindergarten, made possible by three grants. Macedon Ranges Shire Council's Community Funding Grant last year enabled the commissioning of the architect to design the concept plans. The State Government's Children's Capital Grant Scheme provided the very large sum needed to realize the development in a single stage, and the Bendigo Bank Community Grant Scheme has funded two pumps which will be important infrastructure to the water feature aspects of the development. The official opening ceremony is penciled in for Friday 21st November – not long to go now!

Sign Design Competition - Budding Artists Required

The Committee of Management has approved the purchase of a new sign for Romsey Kindergarten, given that the current signage is not very prominent. Committee has decided to run a **COMPETITION** to come up with a design for the artwork on the sign. We would like interested parents, children or community members - there is no age restriction - to submit a design for the new sign. This may or may not include a logo and it does not necessarily need to include the "kinder clown" (the current logo). The Riddells Creek Kindergarten signage, which was inspiration for the concept of a new sign, will be on display in the Romsey Kindergarten foyer. There will be an age appropriate prize for the successful design. Entries should be submitted electronically

The 2008 Community Newspaper Association of Victoria (CNAV) Conference in Castlemaine was summed up at Sunday's Wrap Up in the Chewton Town Hall as a very positive and rewarding experience. "The conference fosters a sense of belonging to a wider, broader community" and "Well worthwhile, will definitely be back next year," were just two of the many enthusiastic responses received.

After CNAV President Liz Hart welcomed the 80 delegates in the historic setting of the Old Castlemaine Gaol, Mount Alexander Shire Mayor Alan Elliot opened the conference. He gave an introduction to the community newspaper scene in the shire. With about half of the shire's 17,000 population living outside Castlemaine, community newspapers play important roles in terms of being a social conscience and recording the histories of the districts they serve. They are also a window to the district and its attractions, and as such council is supportive of them. Council was also very supportive of CNAV in the staging of this conference in Castlemaine. In closing Alan re-emphasised the importance of community newspapers by foreshadowing the birth of the Faraday A very busy and successful day at the Farrago! Alliteration is alive and well in Community Newspaperland.

ABC Centralvic's Station Manager Jonathan Ridnell gave the keynote address. He explained how the community newspaper scene fitted beautifully into the operations of a major regional radio station. As Breakfast Announcer, Jonathan has supported communities and community newspapers for many years with a daily seqment called Talking Towns. This segment is so popular that podcasts of them are now available on

www.abc.net.au/centralvic - and the podcast of the 14th of October is Berni Campbell of Mia Mia/Redesdale's Bridge Connection talking, amongst local news, about her experience at the CNAV conference! It is worth a check. Questions fielded by Jonathan after his address indicated that community newspapers from other parts of Victoria would love to have the same support that ABC Centralvic offers those in this region.

The continued growth of the community newspaper movement and CNAV

was outlined by CNAV Secretary Mary Jo Fortuna (Waranga News) before an Open Forum which saw free-flowing lively discussion on topics of mutual interest - legal situations and government advertising among them.

After a superb lunch Jim Mynard (Sister Cities News) spoke on the role of community newspapers in recording the history of communities. He emphasised that in 50 years time they will be major research tools for people trying to piece together clues about the past. This responsibility emphasises the need for accuracy and careful reporting.

A mini-Expo followed with emphasis placed on starting out and small newspapers, setting up a website, production issues with several techniques demonstrated, finance issues and legal issues. A quick overview of the Expo topics by the participants was followed by the CNAV AGM. Four new committee members were elected to join the on-going members – Berni Campbell (Bridge Connection), Tim Huggans (Kinglake district's Mountain Monthly), Daniel Allen (Around Altona) and Karen Bradfield (Churchill & District News). With all committee positions filled CNAV can look forward to the future with confidence.

Old Castlemaine Gaol came to an end - and yet Brenda, a staff member at the Gaol, still found time to conduct a guided tour, and about 90% of the attendees found time to follow!

The scene shifted to the Theatre Royal for the Annual Awards Dinner. The big screen featured a slide show of photos taken during proceedings at the Old Gaol during the meal, and the MC and CNAV Vice-President Jo Vondra (Lorne Independent) took the stage to announce the winners. Ten categories, each with a winner and two other finalists, ensured the presentations were a lively event. Highlights included the Loch Express assuring us succession planning is possible if you are patient, the Carisbrook Mercury dedicating their win to the late Daryl McLeish, and the Blackwood News explaining how the Silly Old Goat is spawning a succession of Silly Old Others!



Meditation

Matthew 10: 26-31.

'Are not two sparrows sold for a penny? Yet not one of them will fall to the ground apart from your Father. And even the hairs of your head are all counted. So do not be afraid; you are of more value than many sparrows. (Matthew 10: 29-31. Visiting a parish church on Sunday morning, we were handed a hymn book and a sheet of notices. I read through the notices. They were details of the coming week's events, but at the bottom of the page was a short list of items for praver. First came "Pray for world leaders in Geneva, talking about nuclear disarmament". Next, "Pray for Maggie Smith and her housing problem."

It seemed a bit incongruous. First the subject of earthshattering nuclear weapons and their control. The tensions of world problems. And, next to it, Maggie Smith and her house. It was important to her, I was sure, but it was a small local problem that would never hit the headlines.

On second thoughts, it wasn't incongruous at all. That's what God is like. He's concerned about every aspect of life, everyone's life. Yours and mine. God tells the prophet Haggai, "I will shake the nations..." And Jesus assures us, "Not a sparrow will fall to the ground apart from the will of your Father". And that's all the same God. Nothing too large for him, nothing too small. He's as concerned about my small problems and needs as he is about the great political issues. As concerned about my future as about the world's. Whatever concerns us today, he's there with us, lovingly involved and we can take comfort.

A tall order, Lord. Expecting you to be concerned about the lot. Nothing too large, nothing too small. Yet that's exactly what he said. Jesus, I mean, "Your heavenly Father knows," he said.

It's reassuring, once my scepticism goes to sleep. I must admit to lingering doubts at times. There are bits of me that wonder if it's really true. Perhaps because there are bits of me I wish you didn't know or care about. Parts of my life I'd rather hide away. Lock up and throw away the key.

I'm doing it again, Lord. Making you in my own image. Fashioning a god I can control, predict, be comfortable with. Not worth the effort though. A god made in my image wouldn't work.

Who wants a god who doesn't care? Or, just as bad, a god who doesn't know? What strength or joy can flow from flawed divinity? If I could gain your love only but putting on a mask, pretending other than I am, there'd be no point.

Your love is love because you know precisely who I am, and what I do, yet love me still. And value me beyond the sparrow fall.

And not just me. I'm not the centre of your world, although I think I am at times. Your love encompasses creation's struggle, music of planets, cosmic cries. The pain and heartbreak of a world in conflict with itself.

Lord of the great, it's difficult to understand guite how, but all the world's concerns that scare me so, are somehow in your hands. And taking that to heart, I find my courage a little greater than it was before.

VIEW FROM THE VICARAGE.

Dear Friends

Our water shortages continue and rain is a fair way off. What can we do?

Pray for the end to this drought and it is a need that is more so evident in this area as well as others on the land in the state of Victoria. In world and biblical history this is not a new problem. Look at these words from the Old Testament Book of Haggai.

"You expected much, but see, it turned out to be little. What you brought home, I blew away. Why?" declares the LORD Almighty. "Because of my house, which remains a ruin, while each of you is busy with his own house. Therefore, because of you the heavens have withheld their dew and the earth its crops."

The house that is referred to here is our own relationship with God, the God who creates the materials and resources that we have today. Implied in what is written in these words from the Book of Haggai is that whilst our own relationship is strong, then blessings will be abundant. A sign of strong church relationships is full church buildings regardless of denominations of people who want to worship the Lord Jesus.

What's the solution to the drought? ALL of us need to constantly pray to God for relief to our current water shortage and no one in this town is exempt from this. We do this at our church and the restoration of water supplies is permanently in our church newsletter.





Dear Romsey Rag

Invasive species from other countries spreading across Australia are the most immediate threat to Australia's own flora and fauna, according to CRC for Australian Weed Management (Weeds CRC) scientist and President of the Council of Australasian Weed Societies Dr John Virtue. With the historical period of large-scale land clearing for agriculture now over, invasive weed species continue to expand in cleared country and bushland remnants. Dr Virtue said, threatening the survival of native plants and animals already stressed by severe habitat loss and changing rainfall and temperature patterns.

'Much of the current focus is on establishing biodiversity corridors to enable native plants and animals to migrate in the future, to more suitable climates. Yet this won't happen if exotic weeds destroy the remnants of natural habitat we still have left. We need to actively manage weed threats now as a fundamental part of our response to climate change', he said.

Launching a new series of weed management guides for Australian landholders and bushland managers by the Weeds CRC, at the inaugural SA Weeds Conference in Adelaide today, Dr Virtue said the plight of Australia's native plants and animals under these pressures is poorly recoanised.

'Research by the Weeds CRC shows that invasive foreign weeds now threaten the survival of almost half the 945 native plants and animals on the threatened species list for NSW alone', he said. 'We think this pattern of threat to native biodiversity by invasive weeds is likely to be widespread across Australia, especially for patches of remnant vegetation near cities, towns and farmhouses where exgarden plants have jumped the fence.'

Dr Virtue said the weeds chosen for these new management guides were selected after a survey of Australia's

NRM regions. 'They are high impact environmental weeds, seen as a priority by a significant number of regional bodies. The perennial grasses, shrubs and vines all have the capacity to out-compete our native plants and deny food and shelter to our native animals. Some also pose fire risks. Dr Virtue said that for the first time plainly written yet detailed colour brochures suitable for use by local weed managers and community groups had been brought together for this important but overlooked suite of problem weeds.

The eight species covered in the series are:

- 1. Lycium ferocissimum (African boxthorn)
- Hyparrhenia hirta (Coolatai grass) 2.
- Cenchrus ciliaris (buffel grass) 3.
- 4. Vinca major (periwinkle)
- 5. Erica lusitanica and other Erica spp. (Spanish heath etc.)
- 6. Cytisus scoparius, Genista monspessulana and related species (brooms)
- 7. Macfadyena unguis-cati (cat's claw creeper)


