COUNCIL NEWS

Steve Krstic, the vet, may be moving business to the residence south of the old C.F.A. shed. Council has determined the matter be advertised. The seven town houses to be erected in Barry Street will go ahead. The proposal caused much debate and, after a very close vote, Council will allow the development to proceed. 100

When food is sold by or for a charitable organisation at a street stall, fete etc., Council have determined that the organisation shall abide by a 'Code of Practice of Voluntary Food Workers'. Copies can be obtained from the Shire Health Surveyor. The code is being promoted by the State Gov't. and will probably be enforced on a Statewide basis.

Please do not use 240 litre mobile garbage bins for your household rubbish. garbage contractor will only pick-up from standard sized bins. Please note that garbage will be picked up on Wed. 24th Dec. and Wed. 31st December over the Christmas break. The Heatlh Dept. have issued a bulletin regarding canned tuna of various makes but all with EX 10 A stamped on tin. Possibly contaminated. Approx. 40 tins found in Shire, these have been removed from sale. Please check pantry shelves and if suspect tin located, return it to point of sale.

We are still awaiting advice from the R.T.A. concerning the extension to the speed restriction zone in Barry Street East. A sign is to be erected in Grahams Road advising people travelling south that the intersection with Forbes Road is a 'T' intersection. Due to restricted visibility on the bend in Newnham Drive, warning signs will be erected and a white line painted on the road surface. The Wrixon Str., /Barry Str., drainage problem is to be fixed (estimated cost \$2,000). Council has decided to proceed with a B.M.X. track at Romsey Park, with Park Management Committee approval, if users/parents are prepared to pay half the cost (approx. \$350, total cost est. \$700). This was brought about as some years ago Council developed a B.M.X. track in Reynolds Drive at considerable cost (then) and it wasn't used. Estimates will be prepared shortly to assist in solving the "open drain problem' which runs through 3 or 4 of the estates.

Council has decided that areas within the Shire be 'targetted' re driveway crossings. First on the list is the McKenzie-Smith Estate. There have been complaints regarding the use of recreation vehicles in another part of the Shire. It may be timely to advise that Council By-Laws regulate the use of recreation vehicles. They must be:

muffled, i.

ii. muffled, ii. cnly used between 9 am and 6 pm Mon. - Sat. and 12 noon to 6 pm Sunday, iii. used for continuous period of 2 hrs. then break for 1 hr. before using again.

Approximately 30 people took advantage of the free adult immunization session last month. Council are considering making this an annual event.

An excellent response was received for an indoor pool at the recreation centre. Council will now move to the next step in the hope of making it a reality but it will take time and plenty of money to achieve the desired result. A fair estimate would be \$350,000 to \$400,000.

At the moment we are without a Shire Ranger. The position has been advertised. If there are any after hour matters that need to be attended to a call to the Shire Engineer (291 534) or Overseer (291 281) should do it. The Shire Offices will be closed between Wednesday 24th Dec. and Monday 5th January.

Finally, as this is the last Romsey Rag for 1986 we would extend to all Christmas cheer and goodwill and a safe and prosperous New Year.

IN YOUR ROMSEY GARDEN No. 15
Some Lesser Known Fruits Pt. 2 Quoting from a letter from my daughter written in 1975 after returning to England via Malaysia, Hong Kong and India and enjoying a variety of tropical fruits on board the aircraft: "I particularly liked the star fruit (Averhoa carambola), so called because of its shape when cut. It had a pale yellow, smooth, shiny skin like a thick skinned plum and was roughly the size of a pineapple and had an almost green plum texture with deep ridges in the flesh and was scrunchy to eat. Richard just drooled at the mouth every time he saw them". That a large number of delicious tropical fruits which are seldom seen in Victoria, is gown in Queensland, especially around Redlynch and Cape Tribulation near Cairns, as well as in Northern N.S.W. may surprise many people who think only of bananas, pineapples, mangoes and paw-paws. Unfortunately, plants of most of these fail to perform satisfactorily in southern states. Passionfruit of several species including granadillas as large as small marrows were once common in Chinese gardens and several yellow-fruited species of these and of guaves (Psidum spp.) are among the many delightful surprises awaiting the more adventurous southern visitors. In most suburbs of Melbourne however, it is possible to grow purple guaves (Psidium cattleianum), pineapple guaves (Feijoa sellowiana), purple passionfruit (Passiflora édulis), banana passionfruit (P.mollissima and similar species), tamarillos (Cyphomandra betacea), pepines (Solanum mericatum), and possibly several other tropical or sub-tropical fruits given some protection and care.

In a Romsey garden however, most of these suffer from lower temperatures and shorter summers, but with the advantage of a north facing wall, protection from frosts, good drainage and good cultural practices, success at least in good seasons is quite possible. A species of Carica known as "mountain paw-paw" is now being grown on the Mornington peninsula. The tropical "paw-paw" (Carica papaya) is known to Americans as "papaya" and is not related to their "paw-paw" (Asimina triloba) a native of southern U.S.A. - Syd. Wheller

From a Police point of view, Christmas is usually referred to as the "silly season", particularly where it concerns the motorist. They sure do some silly things. They bundle the kids and the tamily pet in the car, hook up the caravan and away they go. Did they check the brakes and lights? The object of the exercise is to get there, wherever it may be, as quickly as they can so that they can relax and enjoy the holiday.

Just for once, put a bit of thought into what and where you are going, plan the trip and slow down, you'll still get there in plenty of time.

Don't forget to make arrangements for the pets that you leave behind, let your neighbours know that you are going and how long, then come up to the Police Station and pick up a form, fill it out so that we also know where and how long you will be away for.

Over the last month I have attended two accidents, the first and probably the most distressing was a young motor cyclist, who was pushed off the road by a car, WHICH DIDN'T STOP. As a result of this accident the motor cyclist is now a paraplegic, just think about that, he's got a HELL of a Christmas ahead of him.

The other accident which could have been very serious, involved a 17 year old youth in a Toyota Ute, he was on a farm property andthey were having an end of year H.S.C. party, no alcompinional involved, he decided to drive a number of people back to the main house, apart from the fact that he wasn't licensed and they were driving on a highway. There were 7 in the vehicle, 3 in the front and 4 in the back, he got caught in the gravel, lost control and rolled it over, the 4 in the back were thrown out, and the 3 in the front had to get out through the window after the vehicle came to rest, age of the passengers 16 years. That could have been a sorry Christmas for 7 sets of parents. Fortunately no one was injured, just shaken up, how I*II never know.

Then last Sunday night I was called to the Mt. William area north of Lancefield, a 15 year old girl had gone walking with her two younger brothers in the bush, she got tired so decided to rest, the brothers walked on home. When they came back for their sister she wasn't there, she wandered round in the bush for about 3 hours before she walked in toa farm property. It appeared that the family had only lived in the area for about 4 weeks.

I guess that there must be a moral somewhere in the last two stories, the only one that I can think of is let's take a bit more interest and care in our young people.

There is a new Club being formed in Melbourne, you may have heared it advertised on the radio, or the electric wireless as it used to be known, it's called the "No thanks I'm driving club". What it means is that if you are going to a party or office function and you can bet that there will be a lot of those around, you elect a driver who isn't or doesn't drink and the rest of you can let your hair down, knowing that you don't have to drive home.

Did you know that the statistics show that one in five drivers will be breathtested this Christmas, how about trying to fool the statistics and making sure that you are not one of the five.

Police throughout Victoria will be mounting a massive campaign over the Christmas period, you can't say that I didn't try to warn you.

Well after all that, have a safe and Happy Christmas and safe driving as we would like to see you back in our town after the holidays. Merry Christmas.
