

Make your kids safe this winter

ith winter approaching and a number of house fires occurring in recent weeks, we would like to remind all Romsey residents that everyone needs to take care to ensure that we don't experience a house fire this winter.

New research by insurer AAMI highlights that many children would not know what to do if a fire broke out in their home. The findings, published in the 2004 AAMI Firescreen Index, also shows that cooking accidents are the single biggest cause of fire in the home.

"Our experience shows that when it comes to fire safety, the highest at risk groups in the community are children under the age of 5 and people over 60," said Robert Smith, Romsey captain. "With young children, their level of development and their inability to anticipate dangerous situations impact on how they behave in a fire situation."

Parents need to make sure that children know what to do if a fire was to start in their home, how to safely exit the building by crawling low in smoke, where the agreed meeting place is and how to dial 000.

CFA runs Brigades in Schools lessons for primary school 'udents where they are taught important fire safety lessons including how to crawl low in smoke, how to dial 000 and how to make a home fire escape plan.

"CFA personnel, both volunteers and career staff, have

been working hard in their local primary schools for many years to get these important fire safety message across to children. Hopefully children take this information home so that the whole family becomes more aware about fire safety in



the home," added Region 14 CFA Community Safety Manager Gill Metz.

CFA's Early Fire Safe program targets parents with children under the age of 5. The program aims to show parents some simple steps they can take around their homes to prevent burn and scald injuries, such as not drinking teas and coffee around small children, using guards around heaters and developing home fire escape plans.

Seniors groups can also participate in winter fire safety presentations that highlight the common causes of house fires and ways people can reduce the likelihood of a fire in their home. These sessions include demonstrations on how to use basic home fire safety equipment.

I urge community groups, play groups and elderly citizens groups to avail themselves of these opportunities," said Robert.

msey Community Bank Your Bank survey - get it in NOW!

The deadline is fast looming for the closure of the Romsey Community Bank independent feasibility study, and residents who want their own Bank should return their survey forms without delay. The Romsey Community Bank Steering Committee chair. Maureen Wiltshire, said the survey forms were crucial in enabling Bendigo Bank to determine there was enough support to make a local branch economically viable. The forms were delivered to more than 2000 households in Romsey and surrounding areas in the second half of last month (April), and it's vital that they be filled out and returned, she said.

"We had 33 come back within a day of the mailout officially starting, so that was wonderful support for the start of the campaign," Mrs Wiltshire said. "But we need everyone to get the forms back now. From talking to residents and businesses around the town over the past two years, I'm absolutely convinced that the minute Community Bank opens its doors in nsev, almost everyone would transfer their accounts from culer banks and fully support it.

"However, Bendigo Bank can't make its business decisions on our local knowledge, and needs the hard data and information on a business plan to be drawn up from the surveys. Residents have demonstrated with their pledges that they are prepared to put up the capital to establish the branch - we now have to demonstrate to Bendigo Bank that we would use it. We must have a firm financial basis on which to plan - and we won't get those firm figures for the balance sheet unless everyone re- Above: Members of the Steering Committee for the proturns their survey form.



posed Romsey branch of the Bendigo Bank.

"We need everyone to take just five or 10 minutes, carefully read the survey, fill out the form and send it in. If that happens, we expect to get the green light from Bendigo Bank to proceed. After that, a prospectus would be prepared and issued, the residents who pledged more than \$425,000 to provide establishment costs and working capital would be contacted along with other people who may wish to invest in our town's future, and we would hope to open our doors within six months."

The survey forms have to be completed and returned to the independent consultant by May 10. Mrs Wiltshire said a Romsey Community Bank would operate in partnership with - not opposition to - the Lancefield branch.

ANZAC Dav

A number of our students again attended the local ANZAC service, held this year in Lancefield. While the ranks of the old diggers may be getting thinner over the years, it is so good to see that the community remembers ANZAC Day with another healthy crowd in attendance for this annual ceremony of remembrance. The Romsey Primary School students had prepared two wreaths from donated flowers at school. These were laid on the war memorial in High Street during the ceremony by our school captains Stephanie Barnes and Jake East.

Cross Country

On Thursday 1st April, our Cross Country team headed off to Hanging Rock to compete in the Cobaw District Cross Country around "the rock," We had a team of 48 students (the first 6 place getters in our school cross country) attend the day- 9 year olds through to 12/13 year olds. Again we did really well at this event with approximately 14 of our students going on to compete in Bendigo at the Regional Cross Country Championships on 5th May. Bus Safety

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Create Windbreaks and Shelter Belts

Using Indigenous PlantsBy Kerri

Mewett - Deep Creek Landcare Group

There is plenty of fresh air in Romsey, sometimes a little too much!

Indigenous plants are the obvious choice when deciding what to use to create windbreaks and shelter belts around your property.

Indigenous species, grown from local seed have naturally evolved to be adapted to the local soil type, rainfall, and other weather conditions like frost. Plants would ideally be watered during their first summer and then left to grow on their own. If summer watering is unavailable, a good initial watering will usually carry plants through until it rains. You really will be amazed at the high success rate I the rapid rate of growth these plants produce.

Plant tube size plants, these are small plants which have the most vigour and will develop the best root systems and trunks. Tube stock will quickly outgrow plants from larger pots and be far more successful. Tubestock cost under a dollar per plant and so are very economical.

Do not plant single row tree lines. Shelter belts are more effective if they are 3, 4 or 5 rows deep. Plant lower growing shrubs on the outside rows with the taller trees in the middle

Tree guards are recommended for the first 6 months to reduce damage by rabbits. Do not tie tube stock to stakes, as the plants need to develop their own strength. Weed competition must be kept to a minimum for the first 12 months. Consider using weed mats or mulch. Weed mats must be porous to let in water and mulch must be pt clear of plant stem.

INDIGENOUS VS CONIFERS

Indigenous plants have many qualities which leave conifers looking very dull and inadequate. Not only are indigenous plants naturally suited to our landscape on a physical level as already mentioned, they also provide shelter, habitat and a food source for native birds, animals and insects. Indigenous plants grow flowers, fruits and seeds which not only are attractive to look at but encourage our precious native wildlife to be a part of the windbreak and shelter belts we have created.

CORRIDORS AND REMNANTS

Create corridors of vegetation by joining up your windbreaks and shelter belts to other patches of vegetation. Talk to your neighbours and between you create a 'double' effect by planting trees and shrubs on both sides of your boundaries. The wider the planting, the better the protection for you, your stock, and the native wildlife.

Include remnant vegetation into your shelter belts to help maintain their protection and health. Remnant vegetation is native vegetation which has naturally grown pre European influence. Remnant trees are usually hundreds of years old and are precious for many reasons including having hollows crucial for habitat for birds and mammals. Remnant plants, including trees, shrubs and grasses struggle when isolated (usually in paddocks) and die prematurely from pasture competition, cropping, compaction from stock etc. Remnant vegetation and shelter belts must be fenced off from stock to ensure maximum success.

INDIGENOUS PLANT CHOICE

There are some excellent Indigenous nurseries which grow a tremendous range of plants to choose from. The days of being limited to a couple of gum trees and wattles are gone. Now you can have a marvellous mixed planting in your shelter belt including banksias, tea-trees, melaleucas, bottle-brush, casuarinas, many wattles and gum trees, native daphne, hop bush, native daisy bush, mint bush, kangaroo apple to name a few. There are also indigenous daisies, clematis, grasses, reeds and lillies available.

ITS EASY

Creating indigenous windbreaks and shelter belts is easy. Some simple preparation before planting is required and you don't need to know the plant names to choose what species to plant – there is help available.

Break away from the conifer hedge and go indigenous! You can't lose and yourself and the environment will be winners!

The annual Romsey 4WD Mud Races were held in Springfield on Sunday the 21st of March 2004 with nearly 900 people coming to see all of the action. The event was organised by the 4WD Mud Racing Association with promoters such as Prendergast Earth Moving and Kyneton Equipment and Party Hire assisting to raise money that is spent on Local Community Projects or donated to organisations like the CFA and St Johns Ambulance.

The event is very different to other 4wd events held in Australia, as they are particularly viewer friendly. They are held in confined, easy to view areas making it the perfect environment for spectators. Many families attend the event with chairs,

rugs and picnics packed for

the day. Those who forget their picnics are not forgotten, as the local Scouts put on a BBQ, and other fare is available for purchase provided by other clubs in the area such as the Romsey Cricket Club.

they raced around the track in their team made go-carts, built without nails and held together with rope. The boys must be commended as it was colder than years gone by, and yet they still raced through thick mud and slush eventually to be sp down by the water carter at the finish line.

The races are a treat with car enthusiasts as both the vehicle and the driver are put through their paces on race day.

"The races are extremely hard on the vehicles, as engines run at high revs and running gearboxes and diffs are operated un-

der extreme loads. The mud doesn't help, together with submerged grass somehow finding it's way into everything it can possibly foul, clog or seize. Competitors take great effort into preparing and waterproofing vehicles, motors and drivers. Invariably most vehicles wind up receiving copious amounts of maintenance and attention even between heats", says Simon Christie of the 4WD Mud Racing Association. The drivers and their crews must be commended for the sheer effort that they put into their sport.

It is not uncommon for drivers to face a rollover (a crowd pleaser), a blown motor, diffs and gearboxes and failed drive shafts, brakes and steering. Children as young as 10 race in a special classed called "Toyhatsu Juniors". The races are professionally run by the 4WD Mud Racing Association who have been holding races in Romsey for more than ten years. The Salaryman's Wife - Sujata Massey

This first book by Sujata Massey introduces the reader to Rei Shimura, a 27 year old Japanese-American living and working in Tokyo. Although raised in California Rei wants to prove that she can live independently and also explore what it means to be - konketsujin - of mixed ethnicity. She is subsisting on her English teacher's salary and living in a seedy neighbourhood when she takes the opportunity to celebrate New Year in Shiroyama. While there she becomes involved with two things - the murder of a beautiful wife and a Scotsman, Hugh Glendinning. This is the first of several mystery books that feature Rei and was awarded the Agatha Award on publication. Whilst the mysteries provide entertaining reading the other interesting feature of the books is the way they depict contemporary Japanese life and customs.


Eats, Shoots and Leaves - Lynne Truss

A highly amusing little book that treats a normally dry subject with verve and dash. Learn, lament and laugh.

One Night - Margaret Wild

Margaret Wild is well known for her award winning picture book texts, but in recent years she has turned her considerable talent to writing for Young Adults. This is her second story for 'older kids' and like her first one is written as a verse novel. It is a fantastic, compulsive read. One Night explores the repercussions of 'one night' at a party. Gabe and Helen, in particular, are irrevocably altered as a result of their actions. Wild uses sharp, brutal observations of her character's personalities and the reader becomes a part of their world. Don't be put off by the structure of the novel, the characters are worth caring about and the plot is tightly drawn.

What's News

As I write this, the nightly news is dominated by the ongoing violence in Iraq and David Beckham's infidelity. Putting the deaths of hundreds of people next to the love life of one person seems a little absurd to me, but that, apparently, is the world we live in.

We are a voyeuristic society. We want to know what is happening in the lives of others. Whether it is the raft of reality television shows or the rich, famous and powerful, we don't seem to be able to get enough. Exclusive interviews, in magazines or for the television cameras, are

ught and sold for hundreds of thousands of dollars.

"id people will buy or watch for them. If they didn't, they wouldn't be worth so much.

So what is it about life that makes us so interested in what other people are doing, whether they are the 'instantly' famous from reality television or the genuinely famous, like David Beckham? There probably is no single answer, but a whole range of reasons.

It might be escapism, living vicariously through those whose lives seem a whole lot more interesting than ours. It might be a bit of wishful thinking, that one day we might live like that, too. The other side of that is jealousy. Seeing what they have and we don't, we relish the opportunity to put the boot in whenever something goes wrong for them.

That last point certainly seems to be the case for David Beckham. In his case, it may also be that he met our need for a hero, but not anymore.

During my lifetime, there has been a seemingly endless procession of admired and respected leaders (secular

religious) who have, ultimately, fallen from favour turough infidelity or errors of judgement. These include American presidents Richard Nixon and Bill Clinton, religious leaders Jimmy Swaggert and Jimmy Baker, sports personalities Wayne Carey and now David Beckham, and I could go on almost endlessly.

The one thing that all of these have in common is that they are human, and were burdened with superhuman expectations. I maintain that the only reason our heroes fall so far is that we put them on too high a pedestal in the first place.

I don't condone the behaviour (or alleged behaviour) of these and others, but I do believe they have the opportunity to admit to their mistakes and try again. That really is what the Christian faith stands for.

We are all human. We all make mistakes. For most of us, it doesn't get reported in the nightly news. But even when it does, all that it proves is that they are human. Only one person has even been perfect. And even he was killed for it.

The next time you read a character attack on someone in the spotlight, ask yourself if it's the full story.

utumn. It is that time of year when the air starts to get a little chilly and the streets disappear under a multi-coloured pile of leaves. Autumn leaves can be used in many creative ways for play.

Tumble in the leaves

On a dry day, find or rake up a pile of leaves. Roll in the leaves, throw them, kick them in the air and generally be silly. It's a lot of fun (and even better if you are accompanied by a child!)





Odd one out

Hide one green leaf in a huge file of autumn leaves and let your children try to find it!

Autumn collages

Collect lots of different leaves and paste them onto large sheets of paper or card. Younger children may like to paste the leaves onto a trunk they have drawn, while older children

and textures to create a picture (e.g. brown leaves for dirt, orange leaves for the sun etc).

Leaf collection

Walk around your neighbourhood and see how many different types, or colours, or shapes of leaves you can collect. Back at home, leaves can be ironed (on a warm setting) be-



tween two sheets of greaseproof paper to be tened out and can be strung together and hung on the wall, or made into a mobile.

Crayon rubbings

Peel the paper off a crayon, then place a piece of paper over a flattened leaf. Rub the side of the crayon over the paper to reveal an image of the leaf's texture

Splatter painting

Arrange some leaves on a piece of paper. Dip a toothbrush in paint and then rub it over a piece of flyscreen or a sieve to create fine droplets that fall onto the paper. Remove the leaves to reveal their negative shapes.


