

Vale Laurie "Chooka" Thomson

Laurie Thomson passed away on Sunday May 5th, a much-admired community member who was loved for his gentleness, humour, common sense and community involvement. Laurie moved into the Romsey area in 1931. He attended Romsey P. S., and often butted heads with Headmaster Mr Murray. The Headmaster had a large strap which disappeared suddenly and was not found again until the renovations at the old school. Laurie then owned up to one day in Gr 6 deciding "Enough is Enough!" and he found a good spot for it behind one of the blackboards.

Laurie was too young for WW2 but his elder brother Charlie served, losing his life in New Guinea. Not long after Laurie also lost his mother. In the early 2000's Laurie, with children Bev and Steven and nephew Robert, was able to visit his brother's grave at the Bomara Commonwealth War Cemetery, a very moving and meaningful trip for all.

Laurie met Jan Keleher in Springfield and the two married in 1952. They were together for the next 62 years and had four children, Beverly, Steven, Kathy & Roz



Laurie was a keen sportsman representing the town in football, golf, tennis and bowls. He played over 250 games for Romsey Football Club winning one premiership. He was also a determined and competitive pennant golfer who often left his more fancied opposition scratching their heads wondering how he managed to scramble the win. Laurie was a member of three winning pennant teams, two flags in 1978 (Inner Western & Dalhousie Districts) and again in 1981. In intraclub competition Laurie teamed with a number of partners to win the W. E. Tom 4BBB knockout in 1968, 76, 77, 85, 86 & 87. The shield for best junior net performance in the club championships is named after Laurie.

Laurie spent many years farming close to Monegeetta and also in Trentham. One of his favourite stories was of the annual droving of sheep from Romsey across to Trentham, try that now! With his father Stephen he farmed largely sheep and potatoes. He even "developed" a special breed, "Laurie's Spuds" which were highly sought after by family and friends.

He was also heavily involved in the community as a vestry member and church warden at St Paul's Anglican Church. He was on the reading list right up to his passing. Perhaps the most important element of his life was his family. Every family member spoke of how special he made them feel and the great support and life lessons he was able to give.

Laurie always seemed to know everyone's name and what was going in in the town, he had a positive opinion on most things. He will be remembered as an honest, reliable, kindly and gentle man. One who lived his life according to his beliefs, who was a good example to others and who was always around to help if and when needed.





Help Young People by Skilling up on **Youth Mental Health**





Entertaining Pets in Winter

Let's face it. It can be hard enough to motivate ourselves to go outside during winter, but it can be even more difficult encouraging your pets that dislike the cold to go outside • too. Chilly weather or not, our pets do need their exercise!

By being creative with your pet's entertainment during the cold of winter, you will be more likely to avoid unwanted behaviours as a result of boredom. There are many things • you can do to encourage your pet to come outside with you for exercise, and here are just a few tips:

- coat is well fitted. You might want to consider a fleece water at all times! lining to keep them extra toasty!
- Use pet waterproof gear for wet days.
- warm during winter takes more energy. Make sure you 2019. are careful to not over feed however!

If you have tried everything and your pet is still reluctant to venture outside (or you are experiencing extreme weather), a great way to keep your pet stimulated is to engage them in extra activities indoors:

Consider some trick training for mental stimulation. This


