

Dear Friends

Since I was elected on 1999 I have been lobbying for a better deal for train commuters travelling on the V/Line services.

I am pleased to announce changes to the ticketing system which will give a much better deal to train users outside the metro system.

From April 2006 passengers with V/Line tickets to Melbourne will now be able to use their tickets on metropolitan trains, trams and buses within the zone of their destination, at no extra cost.

This is a great incentive that will make it much easier for commuters to travel across the train, tram and bus network with fare reductions for many journeys.

To make sure of integration V/Line tickets will specify the date of travel, rather than being 'open ended'. This will allow V/Line tickets to be accepted as valid on the metropolitan system.

In other train news I would like to take this opportunity to thank all of you who have been so patient through this period of disruption while the regional rail upgrade has been taking place.

This is a massive project, and the biggest rail upgrade in 120 years, with a new signalling system, 42 level crossing upgrades and the installation of 14,500 tonnes of heavier, high speed rail and new trains among many other things.

Overall we are looking at a much safer and reliable service for the long term.

Ripper Reads from Macedon Ranges Library Service

Stinking hot days and sultry nights - summer in south east Australia. Settle down with a relaxing read, a long refreshing drink and feel yourself getting cooler all the time.

Fat, fifty and f***ed – Geoffrey McGeachin

This book was enthusiastically recommended by a workmate and I must admit that the title certainly appealed. Martin Carter is the bank manager of a branch faced with imminent closure, husband to a selfish nymphomaniac and step-father to a couple of feral adolescents. On top of that no-one seems to have remembered his 50th birthday. But all that is about to change dramatically.

He soon finds himself heading north to Queensland, as a sidecar passenger to the intriguing Faith, with a million dollar payroll for company. The narrative is laced with deprecating humour and interesting social commentary en route. Whilst there are some rather contrived coincidences, this is McGeachin's first novel, and allowances should be made as the story romps along at a cracking pace. So suspend the disbelief and enjoy

The Fig Tree – Arnold Zable

The Fig Tree is Arnold Zable's latest book and a superbly crafted example of the art of story telling. Zable takes the stories of others and weaves and blends them together in such a way that the reader becomes totally absorbed in the lives of the protagonists. In The Fig Tree his characters range from Yiddish poets to Greek partisans to Holocaust survivors. Each story is unique but linked to its companions by the recurring themes of refuge, home, survival and renewal. A gentle, insightful read.

Dougal the Garbage Dump Bear – Matt Dray

This book is a gem. It was shortlisted for the CBC Awards in 2005 and if the vote had been decided by children it would have been a clear winner. Matt Dray has used photographs to tell the story of Dougal, a slightly battered teddy bear, who gets left out in the rain and as a result is relegated to the local tip. There he meets Bumble, a toy bee, and they both have lots of adventures together. The subtlety and humour of the text will appeal to older children, while younger children will just enjoy the simple toy story.







Further push for Sunbury Rd upgrade I was part of a Council meeting with local MP and Federal Minister for Small Business & Tourism, Fran Bailey, on February 10. There was a range of topics raised both by Council representatives and Minister Bailey.

Road. I have been pushing for passing lanes to be built on the road to help ease the congestion

I attended a meeting in Romsey on February 15 – one of several I've been to already this year – to be updated on where we're at with our Romsey Hub proposal.

The Shire is currently in the process of seeking funding from the Federal and State Governments so that we can take the next step.

We're also waiting on the Living Library Funding application we submitted last year for the permanent library.

But things are still progressing, and the Council aims to seek expressions of interest from architects in the next two months to enable us to enter the design phase.

Two-wheel tourists to hit the road

One of Victoria's biggest recreational bike rides will be taking place throughout the Shire next month (April). It's a chance for us to showcase what we offer to visitors and tourists.

Up to 800 cyclists are expected for the Melbourne Bicycle Touring Club's 'Mad Ride Rocks 2006'. While it will start from Woodend, the two main routes then head east.

It starts off from the old Woodend racecourse, but the routes for the two main rides - 110km and 60km - take in Hanging Rock, Rochford and Lancefield, and head back to Woodend via Cobaw.

The April 23 ride is a Sunday event, but many of the riders will no doubt make a weekend of it and travel up on Saturday. That's where we get the real opportunity to cater to their tourism needs and encourage them to come back.

I've spoken to Melbourne Bicycle Touring Club officials and offered them the support of the community. If we're able to give them a big welcome as they ride through our region, there's every opportunity we'll get them

The school was very fortunate to have a wonderfully dedicated band of parent and staff volunteers who worked at keeping our vegetable (and other garden areas) alive and healthy over the school holidays. Valanga Khoza Performance



Students of all ages greatly enjoyed the performances of Valanga Khoza recently. This performance facilitated by the Macedon Ranges Shire introduced a range of African drums and rhythms, as well as some very interesting instruments not already known by our students. Valanga has great story telling skills and told the students something of his background and journey to Australia.

Quality Beginning

All classrooms started their school year with our Quality Beginning program. This program focuses on understanding and living our school values and developing an agreement about how classrooms can run smoothly and students best learn. Students and teachers have played a number of getting to know you games. The question like "What we have to do to achieve a learning and happy class-

room?" helped explore our school value **learning**. Graphs have been displayed to show students' preferred learning styles.

Each class has used the questions 'What is good work?' 'What is a good student?' and 'What is a good teacher?' to set expectations for the year. The value **happiness** has produced some colourful displays in the classrooms. **Inclusion** and **relationships** have also been a focus.

The Positive Behaviour Management has been revisited and forms an important part of this program. This is also linked to "Bounceback," a program we use which refers to an acronym used to build resilience. This assists students to take responsibility for their learning and behaviour and to improve their coping skills.

Caring is an important value for students in the way they interact with each other. It is important to link this with the way we care for our environment. This year Ann Skinner, our cleaner visited each classroom to talk about caring for our classrooms. Kerri Mewett has been another guest to classrooms talking about caring for our environment and gardening projects. Classes were introduced to their Buddy class and shared some time together. Throughout the year these classes will support each other in their learning and the development of social skills.

This program is a positive way to start school and all students have a common understanding of what is expected of them, their teachers and the school.



Clean Up Australia Day – Shone and Scholtz Land, Riddells Creek

Riddells Creek Landcare have conducted 6 wildflower walks in the bushland northwest of Riddells Creek in the last 12 months, attended by over 120 people. This area has a great diversity of plant and animal species, and is relatively free of weeds and is rapidly becoming known for its conservation significance.

The area is an 'inappropriate' subdivision, that is, it is bushland that can't be developed. As such the area is like an unmanaged reserve regularly used by the public for passive recreation.

Unfortunately this public access also means the area is a target for rubbish dumping. Rubbish dumping is pretty minimal at this stage. However part of the psychology of dumping (or lack of it) is that people see rubbish and think that they can add to it. Over the time the area develops the aura of a dump, and repeated dumping becomes a 'habit'.

Rubbish dumping encourages pest animals, looks disgraceful and worse, is a serious vector for weed spread.

The Riddells Creek Landcare Group is attempting to keep the area clear of rubbish to help stop people developing this habit and to help preserve the biodiversity and beauty of this area.

If you have any ideas or an interest in finding a way to make this area a protected reserve, we would love to hear from you.

Please RSVP by Monday 27 March to ensure we have enough bags and safety gear etc.





These stories come from the working lives of the amazing range of people who live in our community of Romsey. Hi, I have the privilege of being the first guest in this column. We bought our farm in Romsey five years ago and moved in two years ago.



I am a Program Manager with the National Stroke Foundation, which is the leading organisation working on stroke issues in Australia, so that:

- The public understand the signs, symptoms and risk factors for stroke
- Australians have a better start on the road to recovery
- Stroke survivors are encouraged to recover their quality of life
- Australia leads the way in stroke research.

Did you know stroke is the third largest cause of death and a leading cause of disability amongst adults in Australia?

Over 50,000 strokes occur in Australia each year. One every 11 minutes.

Approximately 324,700 Australians who have had a stroke are living in the community.

Stroke is a medical emergency. But as survivors can tell you, there are often early signs of stroke. These signs may be any or one of the following:

- Weakness or numbness or paralysis of the face, arm or leg on either or both sides of the body
- Difficulty speaking or understanding
- Dizziness, loss of balance or an unexplained fall
- Loss of vision, sudden blurred or decreased vision in one or both eyes
- Headache, usually severe and of abrupt onset, or an unexplained change in the pattern of headaches
- Difficulty swallowing

Did you know that stroke is preventable?

There are risk factors that you can control to reduce your chance of having a stroke. Please complete our risk factor tick sheet (also in the Romsey Rag) and discuss your risk for stroke with your doctor.

PROPOSED REGION NAME CHANGE FOR **MACEDON RANGES & SPA COUNTRY**

You may have heard the exciting news that our local tourism region will be the focus of a significant destination marketing campaign this year with the support of Tourism

In June 2003 Tourism Victoria launched Phase 7 of its Jigsaw campaign. Phase 7 aims to raise awareness of regional destinations in Victoria and consists of two streams - Melbourne and Surrounds and Touring Victoria. A key component of this strategy will be focused on Destination Daylesford with a major national campaign to promote Daylesford and the greater region to the interstate market. This campaign is a collaborative effort between Tourism Victoria and your local regional Campaign Committee, with the launch planned for April/May this year.

A further component of this multi-faceted promotion is the repositioning of the branding of the region itself, which reflects Tourism Victoria's strategy of destination marketing rather than marketing regions. Thus, Daylesford is being branded as the iconic destination for the entire region. This strategy is to establish Daylesford as a hero destination and subsequently encourage dispersal of visitors throughout the region.

The campaign will be predominantly media-based to a national audience, but in particular targeting Sydney and Adelaide. Renowned advertising agency, Publicis Mojo, are working on the creative direction of this campaign. To support this media coverage, the Campaign Committee is currently creating a new motivational and information booklet, known as a "Jigsaw Brochure", which will underpin the overall message of the brand campaign. This important publication will also offer very useful advertising opportunities for local tourism operators.

Consequently, the Campaign Committee is considering changing the region's name to better align itself with the identified "hero" destination. Thus, it is proposed to change the region's name from "Macedon Ranges and Spa Country" to "Daylesford and the Macedon Ranges" to reinforce the new destination marketing strategy.

The rationale for this proposition is compelling:

- To reinforce the destination marketing message.
- The proposed name provides a direct link and synergy with the upcoming brand campaign.
- "Spa Country", as a part of the existing region name, is somewhat vague and provides no sense
- Research suggests that the target market does not know where Spa Country is, nor are prospective visitors able to name the main towns of the region.
- With a clearer definition of our location there are positive spin-offs for those areas of the region outside of Daylesford

The Campaign Committee will certainly continue to proactively use the term "Spa Country" in its marketing collateral to ensure our continued "ownership" of this descriptor. particularly as this region can rightly claim the largest concentration of naturally occurring mineral springs in Austral-

The recently re-structured Campaign Committee is committed to ensuring that efficient consultation occurs during this process of investigating the region name change. We encourage and welcome feedback regarding the region's proposed name change. Please forward your feedback by Monday 13th February via letter or email to:

Officer's Training School

A number of people have asked about Rev. Alan Williams. How did he get on with the Air Force Chaplaincy training and where is he now? The following is a summary of an article Alan sent to the Romsey Uniting Church for inclusion in the monthly Clarion. The full article including pictures was 2.5 pages—too long to include in the Romsey Rag. Those readers who would like to read the whole article are welcome to contact Noel Shaw or Jeni Clampit at the above phone numbers.

Officers' training School (OTS) began with a "briefing" on Sunday afternoon. This involved a very brief introduction to the Course Director. For about 1.5 hours we practised making our beds in the approved manner and acceptable standard (eg. 45 degree hospital corners and 300mm of sheet folded over, pillow width from the bedhead), followed each time by practising "Reveille". Reveille involved taking the bottom sheet from the bed, putting it over our right shoulder, running downstairs, and forming up under the breezeway and reciting our "creeds". We were to be awoken to the cry of "Reveille, reveille, reveille" at 6 am each morning and had to be formed up in 60 seconds. That might seem a little silly. Its purpose was to introduce us to military life and discipline. Whilst I was ready to guit at 5.30 on Sunday afternoon, things did improve and reveille only lasted 2 weeks.

The highlight of the first week was the issue of our uniforms, including being shown how to iron and wear them. Of course this was accompanied by our first inspection. The preparation for inspection is known in the military as "panic", and the first panic at OTS lasts until before reveille, as we have to get our rooms clean and arranged (things in the right cupboard or drawer, correctly folded) and dust-free, but also the common areas (hallways. stairs, bathrooms etc). And to round the week off perfectly we had our first fitness test. The Training instructors were fairly scary. Ours was about 6'4" and weighed 115 kg-all muscle! The first fitness test was especially difficult for me as I had cut my finger earlier in the week affecting the flexed arm hang, and I had bronchitis affecting the 2.4 km run. Somehow I passed! Whilst we continued to receive briefs and begin drill (marching etc) the focus of the week was Exercise Discovery. This began with half a day of team-building and problem-solving activities. The follow-up was a day of caving, something that I am glad to have done, but don't particularly want to try again. Week three was the beginning of weapons handling. It was very interesting to carry a semi-automatic rifle all day and to handle deadly ammunition on the rifle range. I didn't get the best score on the day - that went to the Anglican chaplain (a perfect score).

Our exams started, the early exams included Occupational Health and Safety, Laws of Armed Conflict and Fire Safety. Briefs and drills occupied our days up to week 5.

Week six included a second fitness test in preparation for

our Ground Defence assessment of week seven. It involved taking over a corner of the airfield at RAAF East Sale and protecting it form "enemies". My week was interrupted by a strained back on day 2 and cracked ribs on

Week eight was our introduction to navigation. Navigating up and down steep gullies in state parks just outside Ballarat did not do my knees any good. I got through, though, and was put on restricted activities for the next couple of weeks.

In week nine we began our parades. So in addition to 7 am inspection of our living areas on Tuesdays, we now had a 7.20 inspection of our drill and presentation on Thursdays.

In week 12 we began our leadership and operations classes. Operations was all about the structure of the military. Knowing which squadrons or units do what, where they are based etc., will be very helpful to what I do as a chaplain.

During weeks 12 and 13 we also welcomed some senior ranks who were being commissioned as officers. Week 14 was our leadership practice in Wombat State Forest. We returned the following week for our leadership assessment. If we made it through (and a couple didn't) week 16 began the home stretch. The only things left to learn were sword drill and have the drill assessment. I still think it's crazy that chaplains have to pass sword drill when they aren't allowed to carry one!

Week 17 was essentially practice for graduation parade, final assessments and debriefs, and packing up. That, in a nutshell, occupied my time from August to December last year.

Rev. Alan Williams graduated on December 9th 2005. His title now is: Chaplain (Flight Lieutenant) Alan Williams.




