Over the past twelve months we have been advertising for Brownie Leaders, unfortunately without success. As three of our four Brownie Leaders are leaving we cannot do anything else but close one of the Brownie units, transferring the girls to the other unit. Whilst we realise this is a backware step for Guiding in Romsey, we cannot continue without people coming forward and training as Leaders. The remaining Leader does not even have a child involved but is still willing to give of her time, and herself for the small girls.

IN YOUR ROMSEY GARDEN by Syd. Wheller

Most decidious fruit trees will grow and bear reasonably well, although usually several weeks later than Nelbourne suburbs, provided they are properly planted in well drained soil, protected from strong winds, heavily pruned each year until a strong framework has been stablished, and more moderately thereafter, sprayed with the right materials at the right time to prevent diseases and control insect pests, fertilized and watered when required to encourage growth, kept free of competing weeds, mulched in summer to conserve moisture and interpollinated with other suitable varieties where necessary by bees or by hand if bees are absent. Penalties in the form of poor tree growth or death, ever-production of poor quality fruit and consequent broken down branches, pest damaged fruit, partial or complete crop failure, management difficulties with overgrown trees and inaccessible fruit on high branches are to be expected eventually where these matters are neglected. Proliferation of pests to the annoyance of neighbours may also occur.

Warm climate fruits such as lemons, grapefruit and passionfruit are unlikely to succeed unless given the protection of a north facing wall or similar barrier, as well as the requirements of other fruit trees. Most small growing berry fruits are however, usually less demanding. Given the time and onthusiasm research the growing of fruit in the Romsey home garden can be quite rewarding. Detailed information on this subject is available from the Department of Agriculture, plant nurseries and technical bookshops or libraries.

Open Day at 13 Metcalfe Drive on March 3 being a warm and sunny day attracted a stream of visitors from places such as Werribee, Heathcote, Whittlesea, Kilmore, Strathmore, Sunbury, Heidelberg, Lancefield, Macedon, Riddells Creek and Broadmeadows, as well as three or four from Romsey — an estimated total of over 100. A later unscheduled visit on April 21 by a District Group from Eltham of the Society for Growing Australian Plants (S.G.A.P.) was also made.
