IN YOUR ROMSEY GARDEN No. 21

Lawns & Compost Bins. We are indebted to the editors of "Garden Cuttings" (now known as Australian Garden Journal") for permission to reproduce the following from the February 1983 edition of "G.C.":

Energy Budget of a Lawn On a 110 square metre lawn in California, U.S.A. grass cuttings and litter removed by mowing and raking equalled, in one year, 3.3 kg of nitrogen, 0.96kg. of phosphorus and 1.85kg. of potassium. To maintain the lawn in a healthy state took 14.5 kg of fertilizer, equal to 1.72 kg. of nitrogen, 0.43 kg of phosphorus and 0.86 kg. of potassium. Therefore there was a net deficiency of nutrients. This same lawn took 1865 calories per square metre per year in the form of labour, petrol, fertilizer and irrigation; this compared with 715 calories per square metre per year required to grown an equivalent area of maize.

On economic grounds, therefore, the energy budget of a lawn makes no sense - especially as no crop of any sort is harvested from it. (Source: Jennifer Owen; Journal of the Royal Horticultural Society, Sept. 1982). NOTE: One Colorado city, faced with dwindling water supplies, recently passed an ordinance restricting the percentage of residential landscaping area which home-owners may establish with Kentucky bluegrass lawn.

Compost Bins: Around the world various local authorities are taking the initiative in establishing community composting programmes and encouraging home garden composting. This not only recycles useful waste products to productive ends, but also significantly lessens the burden and cost of municipal waste collection services.

Our own government, regrettably, looks in the opposite direction. It imposes a 20% sales tax on compost bins, while incinerators, which add to environmental pollution rather than reduce it, and which produce an end product of negligible value, attract only $2\frac{1}{2}\%$ tax. The logic of this differentiation is hard to follow.

NEW SCHOOL? - AN UP DATE ON A VERY DRAWN OUT DEVELOPMENT

Following a site inspection by two members of the Regional Board of Education last week, the Board will shortly make its decision regarding the new priorities for major building projects. Kyneton H/Tech and Romsey P.S. currently have been allocated the top two positions on the sub regional priority list, but now must be slotted into the Region Wide listing. It should also be pointed out that our Region commences at Riddells Crk. and extends to the South Australian and MSM Borders. Even allowing for other needs within that area and the huge annual budget cuts in the Education area, it is expected that both the Romsey and Kyneton projects will be listed in the top ten by the regional board.

Our School Council has had an active subcommittee working towards the re-development of the new school on its current site which is divided by Palmer St. The Ministry however have indicated that they are not prepared to build on a divided site and so in order that the program proceed, either Palmer St. would need to be closed on a permanent basis or a new site found for the school. School Council would like to hear from any members of the community who have strong feelings in this regard. (Note: residents of Palmer St. have been informed by letter of this situation and the school council is in the process of making direct contact with these families).

There is also the strong possibility that a secondary school could be developed in Romsey. School Council would also be interested in hearing from the community with regard to joint or adjacent Primary/Secondary School facilities being developed.
