COUNCIL NEWS

Throughout Victoria on the first Saturday every August, Local Government Elections (if required) are held. This year it is Saturday August 4th. Geoff NEIL is the Romsey Riding Councillor due for re-election. He has nominated for a further term. Nominations close at 4pm on Wednesday July 11th at Shire Office.

On Wednesday June 27th, a special Council Meeting was convened to determine the future growth of the Shire in light of the HARATSIS report. At 6pm that evening, Councillors were given a summary sheet on submissions received. This sheet also stated that "from a strategy point of view, the submissions suggest a compromise could be workable. The compromise would be as follows:

- low growth option in Riddells Creek and Lancefield,

- limited growth in Bolinda and Monegeetta,

- growth in Romsey,

- restructure hobby farm zones and rural residential zones to achieve maximum environmental amenity"

This could be thought of as a third option, and to gain public opinion it was decided not to finalise the matter until July 11th and give residents and landowners a chance to comment. It was hoped that with local press assistance, people would become aware that further submissions are requested. In any event, it is important that the matter be finalized prior to elections.

Planning approval was given for a shop/warehouse north of Five Mile Creek on the west of Main Street. Council refuse applications for a two lot sub-division at the north end of Wrixon Street, and a Childcare Centre intersection of Barry Street with Metcalfe Drive. Negotiations with the applicant for the Childcare Centre are ongoing as we believe the facility is one the town needs and alternative locations are available. Streetworks on Old Farm Way/Bowkett Close are proceeding. A primer seal has been put down with a fihal seal/completion early next year. Murphy Street, between Williams Street and Rogers Street has received an improved sand pavement and will be sealed early next year after some rework. Tenders to complete the Main Street footpath (between Kathryn Street and White Avenue) have been deferred pending a sub-division application.

The proposed name of the short street between Main Street and Station Street is Grant Terrace. Apparently Mr GRANT was the longest serving, if not last, Station Master at Romsey. Council will contact the Historical Society for their comment. The Ranger has reported he is checking properties for unregistered dogs. A late fee of \$75 will be imposed with registration costs. Failure to register when directed will add another \$200. Twenty-six sheep were attacked recently in Stranges Road. Five sheep were killed outright, 12 required destruction and 9, with treatment, may survive. Lambing has begun in some areas and owners of dogs found straying face heavy fines and/or compensation and/or a dead dog if it is located in the wrong place. Chevrons signs are to be placed opposite streets intersection Main Street south of the town, to indicate to people that they are approaching/at an intersection. Night-time visability is poor.

Residents were quick to pick-up the alterations to speed zones around the town, especially Main Street, Melbourne side. Urgent discust ones between the Riding and Shire Engineers Department resulted in Vic Roads personnel attending on Thursday 21st June and agreeing to extend the 60 zone to 20 metres south of White Avenue. They were not prepared to go further. This is an overall extention. from where it previously commenced, north of Regan Drive. Council has also written requesting urgent linemarking be done on Melbourne - Lancefield Road where resealing etc. has taken place. Finally, someone has nicked the Shire dog trap. Cost of replacement is \$138. Til next time,

Plant Classification & Evolution Pt. 1. Whether the Story of Creation as a "balance" to the Theory of Evolution should be taught in schools as proposed by some writers, I leave to the judgement of others. Nevertheless, as any keen nature observer will testify, there is often considerable diversity within a species and many affinities between species and hence much dissent among scientists as to where one species ends and another begins - especially within the Plant Kingdom - one of the reasons for many of the name changes which so confuse the lay person. For this reason, it is not always possible to define a species with absolute precision. Unfortunately, the classification of living organisms into species, genera, families etc. up the scale, is merely a convenient and arbitrary device to facilitate international understanding between scientists and other interested individuals, established by Carl von Linne (1707-78), to which plants and animals have sometimes declined to conform. This is of course, not the only reason for name changes. In some cases plants have been brought into cultivation under a name given in ignorance of an earlier given name, in which case the law of priority must bo adhered to. Errors, omissions, misspellings, wrong identifications and other valid reasons as outlined in the Botanical Code often account for others. While in many cases, obvious physical characters will enable even a lay person to readily identify a species, this is not always the case and the criteria required to distinguish one species from another similar species may require the use of a microscope. After all, many genes are common to many species, including vastly different forms of life a strong argument in support of the Theory of Evolution - a brief account of which will be found in "Nature's Jumping Genes" by Lowell Ponte in Readers Digest, March 1988. - Syd Wheller.
