We hope to sand back and polish the floorboards. Once the room is refurbished it will be available as a base for the CoM as well as for hire by the community.





Interest Sought for Activities that Encourage Older People to Keep Moving



The project is funded by the Federal Government [Move It AUS Better Ageing Grant](#).

The Expressions of Interest process will run from 1 July to 26 July. Those interested in applying for funding are encouraged to visit Macedon Ranges Shire Council's website to determine eligibility and to register to attend an information session about the project.

Expressions of Interest open on 1 July for funding to help get older residents in the Loddon Mallee Region up and moving. A total of \$1.2 million is up for grabs across 10 participating local government areas.

Sporting groups and recreation providers are among other organisations encouraged to apply for funding to support inactive people aged 65 and over to be more active.

The Loddon Mallee Move It project aims to reach over 70,000 people over the age of 65, offering new and modified sport and recreation activities, strengthening partnerships and workforce capacity, and raising awareness of the benefits of regular physical activity.

Macedon Ranges Shire Council and Mildura Rural City Council are leading regional implementation of the Loddon Mallee Region Move It project. Participating councils include Macedon Ranges Shire Council, City of Greater Bendigo, Loddon Shire Council, Mount Alexander Shire Council, Central Goldfields Shire Council, Campaspe Shire Council, Mildura Rural City Council, Swan Hill Rural City Council, Gannawarra Shire Council and Buloke Shire Council.

RRBATA Update

Romsey Streetscape Enhancement Project – It's nearly finished!

The recent installation of the heritage lamps in Romsey's Main Street is the last large component of the Streetscape Enhancement Project which began back in April 2015 when the first community forum was convened by RRBATA to discuss ideas.



Garden development, bluestone curbing installation, raised pavement crossings, historic building and tree illumination and the lamps were all conceptualized with community involvement. Funding from Macedon Ranges Shire Council and Regional Development Victoria made it possible. Still to come is some directional signage and new information boards at the Lions' Park and Community Hub.

Although it has been a long process, this project's implementation has demonstrated a productive collaborative relationship between community and Council.

Romsey Business Marketing Campaign

As previously reported, Macedon Ranges Shire Council's Economic Development and Tourism Unit is supporting RRBATA to devise

a marketing campaign promoting Romsey businesses who are RRBATA members to both local community and potential visitors to the town. The project plan has been completed, with the implementation of this campaign to be evident over the next few months.

Book: *Boy Swallows Universe* by Trent Dalton

Usually I avoid reading books which have received prizes because of the hype that goes along with them. I'm often very disappointed but in this case, Trent Dalton's book is an engaging page turner. Dalton has won the 2019 Australian Book Industry Award and I must say very deservedly. (He has even

made it to Oprah Winfrey's Book Club!). This novel is loosely based on Trent's early life in Queensland. The novel is told through the eyes of twelve-year-old Eli Bell growing up in a working-class suburb of Brisbane in the 1980's. It is a heartfelt story of a young boy trying to find his way in the world against all odds. A novel that will stay with you long after you have finished it!

PS Don't read the back cover! It gives too much away!



DVD: *Loving Vincent*

This DVD is quite an artistic achievement. Not only does it have a captivating story line, it contains thousands of paintings produced by 100 artists. The paintings are seamlessly animated together to produce

Cooking with Peter Russell-Clarke 'Beer Pot Roast'



I was filming in Tasmania for the ABC. We were doing a program on hops, so it seemed appropriate - indeed necessary - to drink Cascade beer. I not only drank the good drink, I cooked a meal for the crew as well. I don't remember if it was a success. But try it nevertheless.

Originally, I was going to write a recipe on how to cook with Green Tea, but I tossed up between green tea and beer, and the beer won!

1 x 1.5 corner of beef topside;
1 tablespoon butter;
125g bacon, chopped;
1 large onion, chopped;
2 cloves garlic, chopped;
2 large carrots, coarsely chopped;
2 stalks of celery, sliced;
2 cups beer;
1 bay leaf;
1/2 teaspoon turmeric;
Pinch of dried thyme leaves;
Freshly ground black pepper.

Trim the fat from the topside. Melt the butter in a flameproof casserole, drop in the bacon and saute till crisp. Take out the bacon and put in the meat. Brown it on all sides then take that out too. Drop in the vegetables and garlic and saute for a couple of minutes, pour in the beer, scraping the bottom of the casserole to take up any pieces of the meat that may be stuck there.

Put the meat back in the casserole, toss in the bay leaf and

the bacon, sprinkle with thyme and freshly ground black pepper then pop on a lid.

Turn down the heat and simmer very gently until the meat's tender (about 2 to 2 1/2 hours). Take the meat out of the casserole, keep hot, turn the heat up under the casserole and let the sauce boil until it's reduced.

Cut the meat into thick slices and serve with a little of the sauce and vegetables spooned over with whole, buttered new potatoes beside it.

And, in addition, the great muscular python-stretch of her
tail.

There, she shan't have any more peppermint drops.
So she wistfully, sensitively sniffs the air, and then turns,
goes off in a slow, sad leaps. On the long flat skis of her
legs,
Steered and propelled by the steel-strong snake of a tail.
Stops again, half turns, inquisitive to look back.
While something stirs quickly in her belly, and a lean little
face comes out, as from a window,
Peaked and a bit dismayed,

Only to disappear again quickly away from the sight of the
world, to snuggle down in the warmth,
Leaving the trail of a different paw hanging out.

Still she watches with eternal, cocked wistfulness!
How full her eyes are, like the full, fathomless, shining
eyes of an Australian blackboy
Who has been lost so many centuries on the margins of
existence
She watches with insatiable wistfulness.
Untold centuries of watching for something to come
For a new signal from life, in that silent lost land of the
South.

Where nothing bites but insects and snakes and the sun,
small life.
Where no bull roared, no cow lowed, no stag cried
No leopard screeched, no lion coughed, no dog barked,

wonderful liquid eyes.

Progress has slowed down with the Seymour Cottage storage shed and the extensive termite investigation required for determining the extent of damage to internal structural and related cosmetic components. The commencement of the storage shed is hopefully to be undertaken shortly so the historic goods and chattels can be moved from Seymour Cottage for safety and preservation during investigation and rectification works.

The Macedon Council has provided further financial assistance to your Romsey & Lancefield Historical Society of \$2,500 for the termite investigator report stage. This has also required an extension to the grant acquittal date to 30 June 2020. These two initial aspects of the project are fundamental before any rectification estimates, provision of more finance, actual works and heritage approvals plus building permit works can be considered for implementation. As you may suspect there are a remarkable number of statutory authorities involved before works can be defined and undertaken to a heritage registered building like Seymour Cottage which is on the State Governments Register of Historic Building.

part of an overall Master Plan strategy is how do we (or if we) make Seymour Cottage thermally efficient for effective summer and winter




use? The external walls being constructed of single thickness 1850s Singapore-manufactured meranti panel doors are ineffective for keeping out the heat in summer and freezing cold drafts and breezes in the winter. If effective use of Seymour Cottage is proposed when (if) the structural & historic rectification works are successful then 'usability' of this drafty old cottage is one of the main matters that will have to be addressed.

Your local Romsey & Lancefield Districts Historical Society would like to have access to abundant financial resources likely to be needed in the hundreds of thousands of dollars to immediately undertake the heritage investigation, restoration with old trades expertise but sadly our Society is very dependent on external authorities and their financial grants. It is a policy direction of the Society's Executive to make haste slowly and not start anything we cannot afford to finish without final Heritage Approvals and Permits plus the funds to cover these very expensive processes and works.

Horse Care in the Winter Time

It is officially winter season meaning it can become excruciatingly cold for us humans! This is the same for most animals during winter and horses are no exception. Here are three tips on how to keep your horse healthy and happy during the winter months.

Nutrition

The biggest responsibility during the colder months is making sure that your horse is eating enough feed and receiving the nutrients needed to keep them in shape and maintaining the much needed weight. As horses burn calories to stay warm, their feed may need to be increased as the weather drops. Increasing the amount of hay fed is the best way to keep weight on horses during the winter, as the fermentation process generates internal heat. Even though it may be cold, horses still need to consume water to stay hydrated. Research has proven that by only providing warm water to horses, they will drink a lot more than they would if they only had icy water available. By having a tank or bucket heater, you can encourage your horse to drink more and therefore stay healthy and warm during the cold weather.

Rugging

When it comes to whether or not your horse should be wearing a rug depends on a couple of factors. In general most horses should be wearing rugs during extremely cold temperatures, however if a horse has a thick coat, adequate shape and enough shelter from the weather, a rug may not be necessary. If you do feel the need to rug your horse, a waterproof/winter rug is the best way to go. This will need to be checked regularly though to see if it is rubbing on the horse as well as to check the horse’s body condition and

whether or not it is at a healthy weight.

Exercise

Just like humans, horses still need some exercise even when it’s chilly outside. If conditions are still not terrible, keep riding your horse during the winter months, however if the weather is severe allow your horse to roam in a paddock daily if it safe to do so. An indoor arena is your best option for daily exercise, although they can become quite dusty in winter – seek out a binding agent that will hold water and try to water as frequently as possible to hold the base down and reduce the dust. Try to spend more time than normal warming up your horse and cooling down as the cold weather tends to seize up their limbs.

Continue to keep a close eye on all your horses as the weather drops, check their body weight, whether or not they are eating properly and continue to give them options for shelter from the weather. If you take all the precautions over these colder months, you and your horses will be safe and healthy this winter.

I am Woman...Hear Me Roar!

Recently, Macedon Ranges Shire Council partnered with Romsey Neighbourhood House to run an intensive Women's Chainsaw Course over the month of May. Funded through 'Safer Together' this course ran for 7 days over 3 consecutive weekends, enabling 20 successful candidates from across the Shire to participate for free. Out of 120 applicants these women were chosen from high fire prone areas across the Shire. The course enabled women to undertake an accredited chainsaw course in chainsaw cross-cut and trim, a weekend on emergency fire prevention, safety and property management and finally a weekend workshop where students got to consolidate their skills in chainsawing by undertaking a chainsaw sculpting component. Women produced some incredible results! Some of the feedback from the program were as follows:

"Before starting the course, I was feeling very reliant on my ageing parents to both supply my firewood but also to guide me on fire planning. I now feel much more confident in so many areas, not just in chainsawing which has been so empowering. I now feel confident enough in my abilities to venture out, learn new skills and to give things a go. I no longer feel reliant on others to do what needs to be done on my own property. The knowledge gained has enabled me to know what to do in case of a fire."

"Last weekend I was chosen to participate in Women's Chainsaw Group, how lucky we all are. The weekend started

at the Kerrie CFA. The first weekend was the introduction to using a chainsaw. It has been such a fabulous experience to spend time with a divine group of women and watch us all succeed with our newfound confidence and skills in handling a chainsaw. I feel so much more equipped to create a set of fire plans that will keep my family and I safe and help to connect me with my community."

"Receiving the phone call was very exciting, normally I find excuses to not participate but I felt honoured to be chosen. I have found this course to be very empowering for me as a woman. It has opened many more doors and challenges that I have now faced head on with my property. A most enlightening experience. Thank you"

"I now know that I cannot be treated as an ignorant woman who knows nothing, even with tradies and staff."
