Red Cross is at present helping Kurdish Refugees mainly along the Iran and Turkish borders. They are supplying food, shelter, medical supplies, sanitation and most importantly hope to the displaced suffering people caught up in the Iraqie conflict. The Role of the Red Cross in the event of a tragedy is to be there as a last resort in cases of severe and unexpected personal disasters. Every case is assessed individually. Russia has recently given Red Cross 400,000 files listing people who died in the concentration camps in Auschwitz, Dachau and Buchenwald. These are being made available to the Jewish Community in Melbourne in the hope of solving some of the fates of loved ones and friends. Red Cross is also helping some families who are unable to cope because of retrenchment due to the recession. Without your help this would not be possible. In Memory of Jack Carter Reynolds 11.10.1909 - 31.5.1991.
 Born 11th October 1909 at Medindie in South Australia where he attended Prince Alfred College until the family shifted to Melbourne in 1923.
 In 1942 Jack purchased a farm in Bolinda and the rest of his working life was spent on that farm and in 1970 Jack and Edna retired to live in Romsey. During their time in Bolinda, Jack was keenly interested in the life of the area and particularly the activities of the school and made several firm friendships with teachers who came and went. Jack was a long standing member of the Masonic Lodge and he was instrumental in the establishment of the Romsey Masonic Temple in Main St.
 He was also a Justice of the Peace, a service appreciated by many in the Romsey area. Jack gave over 40 years of service to the Local District Schools Combined Sports mainly as the starter for events. Because of his contribution in this field he was made a Life Member.
 Jack excelled in sport in school days being captain of both football and cricket teams. He was selected to play for the Victorian Country Eleven against the English Test Team. He excelled in high jumping at school and held the record of 5ft7in for 25 years.
 He had an invitation from 4 League football clubs to play and although he signed with Geelong was not able to play in the main team.
 He was secretary of the Gisborne Tennis Assoc. for over 20 years and was made a Life Member of the Assoc in 1964 and also the Romsey Club in 1963.
 He excelled at Golf, Lawn Bowls and even Table Tennis and has hundreds of Trophies, and played his final country week tennis match at 60 years of age.
 Jack suffered a great loss when he lost his partner of 55 years. Edna passed away some 21 months ago after 4 years of ill health.
 My prayer for people who are bereaved is that they will find peace and comfort in family and friends and their religious faith and belief.

COUNCIL NEWS

Just a short reminder that the contents of this article are the previous months Council decisions.
 An application for sub-division of land in Boundary Road has been deferred pending further information. It related to dividing 57.5 hectares into minimum 8 hectare allotments.
 The Liquor Licensing Commission will be advised that Council have no objection to a B.Y.O. licence being granted to Shop 9, Romsey Central (Perfect Grounds Cafe).
 The A.A.T have informed Council that they have upheld Councils decision not to grant a permit for continuing use of 81-83 Barry Street as a bulk fuel depot.
 A donation to the Romsey Bowling Club will assist in the purchase of a new mower/roller for their greens.
 A letter is to be forwarded to local Police seeking their assistance in "Driver Attitude Re-adjustment" for those that persist in travelling the wrong way in the service roads.
 A number of property owners have written to Council concerning their inability to pay their rates. LEGAL NOTES

SMOKING IN THE WORKPLACE:

In February 1991, the Federal Court of Australia held that there was overwhelming scientific evidence available, to establish a casual relationship between passive smoking and asthma, and that there was more than a little evidence that passive smoking caused middle ear infection in children.

The court's finding that there is compelling scientific evidence that cigarette smoke causes disease in non-smokers may have implications for employers who permit employees to smoke in the workplace. Both at common law and under the Occupational Health and Safety Act, employers have a personal duty to provide a safe and healthy workplace.

So far, there have been no court decisions awarding damages on the ground of negligence to employees alleged to be suffering from passive smoking-related injuries. All legal actions brought by employees against their employers have resulted in out-of-court settlements with no admission of liability by the employer.

In order to succeed in an action for damages for injury on the ground of negligence, an employee must prove that his or her injury was reasonably foreseeable. As a result of the Federal Court's recognition of the casual link between passive smoking and disease, any employer who fails to provide a smoke-free environment increases the likelihood of successful negligence claims and WorkCare claims made by his or her employees.

The obligation to provide a smoke-free environment extends to all building owners and occupiers. They are at risk of being sued if they do not provide adequate ventilation in their buildings and injuries relating to passive smoking result.

GARDEN SPRAYING EQUIPMENT

If a Rega or similar stirrup or bucket pump is attached to the inside wall of a short length of 6" PVC pipe with brass, copper or plastic saddles and a plastic bottom fitted to the pipe, those of us with only two hands will have no trouble keeping pump in its place while moving from one place to another, pumping with one hand and spraying with the other. These pumps require much effort to use than two-handed pumps and can often be bought at clearing sales for one or two dollars.

A further improvement in versatility is to dispense with the usual garden hose and fittings and fit an air hose socket to the pump outlet, replacing the garden hose with a light air hose suitably fitted to enable it to be quickly removed and replaced by a similar, longer, hose connected to a two-handed "Unispray" or similar sprayer for use up ladders when spraying tall trees with the container left of the ground, thus eliminating the need for a separate strainer on the "Unispray" line and avoiding the hose being pulled out of the container.

HOW TO HELP PREVENT HEAD LICE IN YOUR CHILD.

1. Lice eggs take 7 days to hatch so please check your child's head 2-3 weeks after treatment to ensure no eggs have been overlooked and have rehatched.
2. Lice are transmitted by children touching their heads together or by sharing hats combs or brushes.
3. Good combing can damage or kill lice before they have a chance to lay their eggs.
4. After treatment, wash all brushes combs and bed linen in hot water and dry in the sun as the heat will kill the lice and their eggs.
5. If one member of the family is found to have Lice, check the other members as well.
6. Vinegar will help to dissolve the glue substance that holds the nit (egg) to the hair strand. Apply the vinegar liberally to the hair and then comb well with a metal fine toothed comb. They are available from the Shire at a minimal cost.
7. Nits look like little pieces of white dandruff on the hair. When pulled however they do not come out. The Head Lice themselves are a little smaller than a flea and live down at the scalp level of the head.
8. The "Lice Rid" which is available free from the Shire if used according to directions will give one month's protection from any further reinfection. It does tend to dry the hair out when used. Do not use too often as it can be toxic. If your child has a sensitive scalp test some lotion on a small area of skin at the back of the neck first. Wait an hour or so to see if there is any reaction. If there is, then it would be better to use a product such as "Bioallethrin" as this is a low toxic preparation.
9. If there are a lot of eggs (nits) in the hair a second treatment is usually necessary in 7-10 days time to destroy any Lice that may have hatched in the meantime.
