AROUND YOUR ROMSEY HOME No.18

Pests & Problems - Birds & Nuts. One of the most common problems in many country and some outer suburban gardens is the loss or damage to nut crops by parrots and cockatoos. While the writer's solution to the problem may not suit those who are determined to grow almonds and walnuts, it will certainly appeal to those who are prepared to grow another kind of nut - macadamia nuts! Given a well-drained position, sheltered from frosts and cold south winds - a situation where citrus can be grown - there is no reason to expect failure although it may take seven years or more to produce a reasonable crop.

Bearing about 150 nuts in 1991, after about seven years in ground, the writer's tree, obtained from Queensland in 1984, alleged to be a grafted tree of a large-fruited variety - which is doubtful - is producing a larger crop each year, and as the nuts are borne inside the branches of a dense, bushy tree, not readily visible to birds, and would probably be too hard to open, we expect no problems. A special nut cracker copied from a Queensland design has been made to cope with this problem ourselves.

At Romsey Primary School on Monday morning the 8th Feb. assembly was attende by a member of the Safety House Committee, Mrs. A. Hendricksen, and Senior Constable John Rogers, who along with School Staff outlined the aims of the Safety House program. The School is a very important part of the program and during the week following the 8th Feb. students will be taught how and when to use a Safety House. The aim of the Safety House Program is to give children travelling to and from school a safe place to run to, if they are approached by a stranger, being bullied, offered drugs or in any way feel threatened. When a child does use a Safety House, the householder is instructed to call the Police immediately and to follow their instructions.

All Safety Householders are assessed by the local Committee and the Victoria Police. Committee Members regularly monitor Safety Houses to ensure that only genuine Safety Houses display the sign. In the next few weeks you will see approved Safety Houses displaying the sign, and at the main town entrances will be larger signs declaring that "You are entering a Safety House Zone."

At this stage we have approximately 35 houses approved to become Safety House but we need many more. The success of the program relies on there being a good even spread of Safety Houses in all areas of the town and surrounding areas. Properties on the outskirts of town are as important as any. We invite any householder who will be home approximately between the hours of 8-9am and 3.30 - 4.30pm most days, Mon.-Fri. to contact Michael Lane 295 566 or Anne Hendricksen 295 891 for more details.

For allowing this program to be funded in its early stages, we gratefully acknowledge generous donations from the Lionesses Club, Romsey Medical Centre and Movieland. The Safety House Program is totally community funded and would appreciate donations from any local Club or organization to assist in ongoing expenses.

ROMSEY RIDING

Welcome to 1993!

On behalf of all residents, the Riding Councillors extend their congratulations to Mrs. Jean Tom, who was awarded an Officer in the General Division Award (AO) in the Australia Day Honours, in recognition of service to the welfare of women through the Country Women's Association.

While on the subject of Australia Day, a very pleasant evening was spent at Riddells Creek on 26th January to celebrate Australia Day.

Planning Scheme Amendment L20 was approved by the Minister and gazetted on 14th January, 1993, and now forms the Planning Scheme for the Shire. Future planning decisions will be made under its guidelines.

Construction of Rogers Street and Pohlman Street have been commenced. These, together with Murphy Street, should soon be sealed. The wet weather has caused long delays in these works. The 400 metre section of Glenfern Road off Woodend Road has been sealed, and the turning lane at Old Farm Way is also under construction.

The buildings on the site of the new school continue to take shape, and the extensions to the Recreation Centre are well under way.

Permits have been issued for a "granny flat" in Whelans Place, for a sign on Romsey Hotel to indicate the drive-in bottle-shop, and for the "Muddy Rock '93" motor sports and music event to be held on 20th and 21st March, 1993. Council and its officers have put in many extra hours to assist the promoters of this event, and to try to ensure that any adverse effect on residents will be minimised. It is hoped that the weekend will be a great success for the participants and for Romsey.

So we feel your award is richly deserved, Dorothy, and extend congratulations and best wishes.



Grade six children provided the following presentation to assembled parents and pupils.

"January 26th is the day Governor Arthur Phillip landed in Australia after a very long sea voyage with the First Fleet. The re-enactment has been seen many times but rarely is it clear just how hard life had been, especially for the hundreds of convicts aboard the fleet. Professor Manning Clarke describes this day as the one on which civilization began in Australia. It was also the day which marked a start to dramatic changes in the lives of the Aboriginal people. These Koori people had been wandering around, hunting, gathering caring for the land and educating their children in an incredibly rich culture. They were suddenly introduced to new diseases and a strange life style by these new English invaders.

This Year of 1993 is the International Year of the Indigenous Peoples. That is, we recognise this year the rights and heritage of the People who were here first, our Koori People.

We at Romsey have been encouraged to Respect the rights of All People, and we look forward to Learning and Growing in our understanding and appreciation of our Heritage.

Australia's history reflects the input to our society of immigrants from all over the world, who have arrived here since January 26th 1788. We are one nation and proudly recognise the contribution we all make to our Nation.

Certificates of Appreciation were presented to citizens, nominated by the school families. "This cerificate is presented to a lady we have come to know through her long term involvement with this school.

Mrs Helen Clement is not only our longest serving teacher of Religious Education but founded the Junior Red Cross Group at the school and by so doing has maintained her contacts with Romsey Primary, the school she served through Mothers' Club involvement when her sons came here.

Mrs Clement continues to be an active Community worker. She is a foundation member of the Shire's Community

Services Committee and Tidy Towns Committee.

She is involved in the Meals on Wheels Program, our local Uniting Church and its outreach programs, the Historical Society and through her extended involvement with Red Cross has held official positions both at the local and Regional Level.

Mrs Clement's contribution to our Community was also recognised by the Shire when she was honoured as the

first person awarded as Citizen of the Year on Australia Day 1984.

Dr Lindsay Francis came to Romsey in 1952 and since that time has not only practised medicine to its highest ideals but also he has deeply involved himself in local affairs, for which alone he is a worthy recipient of this honor.

He has served as a much respected member and executive member of the Lancefield Bush Nursing Hospital for over 36 years, until its closure in February 1992. He has been a member of many local committees and for many years served as a member of the Romsey Mechanics Committee and the Romsey Progress Association Committee. He is the faithful organist at St Paul's Romsey, Church Treasurer, and Vestry member for over 35 years.

He has served on the "Back to Romsey" Committees and has been a loyal and faithful supporter of all local affairs

in the district.

So many people in the district can testify to his wonderful demeanour as he practises the profession he loves, as one of the true caring family doctors.

He is a very worthy recipient of our esteem that is indicated by this certificate.

We all know Mr Ron Cole as our reliable Post Master and as Captain of the Romsey Fire Brigade. Mr Cole joined the CFA when he was 17 years old, with the Dunolly Fire Brigade and transferred to Bayswater in 1975 and later to Romsey. In 1981 he was elected as 2nd Lieutenant and then in 1983 was elected Captain. His dedication to the Brigade has some times seen him leave his family on the side of the road. Not long after moving to Romsey Mr. Cole and family were out for a Sunday drive when a fire truck was heard approaching. He pulled over and waved the truck down and left the family to find their own way home. Thank goodness Mrs. Cole can drive! Mr. Cole joined the Romsey Youth Club committee and took the position of secretary in 1987 and has continued his position since. He often drives the bus for youth group outings and always dresses up on fancy dress nights much to the amusement of the children.

Mr. Cole enjoys sport and played football for Romsey as well as being the President for three years.

He also played cricket for Romsey before taking up golf. He became President of the Golf Club in 1990 and is still in this position. Mr. Cole has been known to hear the fire siren while playing golf and leave his clubs and run to his ute, only to realise his keys were in his golf bag and then he has had to continue running to the fire station. Needless to say missing the first truck!
