



ROMSEY PRIMARY SCHOOL

Dear Parents.

As you have been made aware through previous newsletters. a school's staffing and funding entitlement to conduct educational programs is set strictly by a formula based upon the number of children enrolled at the school on census day in February each year.

As our figures at Romsey Primary School were 334 on census day, Feb 4th 1993, we had an entitlement to 17 Effective Full time teachers (EFT). This figure legitimately included one child whose father had signed an explanation that the child and his mother, were on extended holidays overseas and would not be attending another

Australian school before returning after the census date.

The Directorate of Schools' Education auditor visited Romsey on Feb 12th and after checking the figures as accurate and complementing the staff on the neatness and accuracy of their records, noted that another pupil had already enrolled on Feb. 8th thus making our legitimate total at that date 335. Since that time other children have also entered the school. As a direct result of our increased enrolment we became eligible to an additional one EFT., and (two .5 time permanent local) teachers were selected from the "Pool of excess Teachers" created at the end of 1992.

On Wednesday morning March 3rd, I received a direction from Audit branch in Melbourne, that, despite any increased enrolment after the census date and as a result of the pupil holidaying overseas not returning by the end of February, our census figure would be adjusted to 333 and our staffing entitlement reduced to 16 EFT.

The overall effect of this situation on our established programs is that Mrs Cooke & Mrs Batty will be again placed in the "Pool of (STRT) Short Term Relief Teachers", who will be expected to cover the absences of staff in schools up to one hour's travel from their school base. When not used in this way they will be employed in a teaching capacity, at their base school. Mrs Batty will commence at her base at Riddells Creek on Tuesday March 9th and Mrs Cooke will continue to be based at Romsey Primary.

These effective, locally selected teachers have been conducting the Art program throughout the school, as well as assisting with Language instruction and organising the Perceptual Motor Program and Library programs for Infant grades. Their regular contribution will be missed by staff and pupils alike. These programs will now rely

on class teachers and voluntary parent assistance.

The facts are clear. * Under the changed Directorate of Schools Education guidelines, we will not be eligible for any additional teaching staff this year, despite the long established pattern of growth experienced by this school.

* Under changed staffing schedules 334 would have entitled us to 17 EFT in 1993 in 1992 the entitlement would have been 18 EFT. We now have an entitlement to 16 EFT

* The Schools Bulletin earlier this year stated that " Increased enrolments after audit would

have no effect on staffing." * The census figures as verified by audit were legitimately completed.

* As the result of a loss of staff, established programs have been severely disrupted, and we as a total staff are united in our disappointment concerning this effect on the teaching programs at Romsey Primary.

New School Progress: Since speaking to with the parents of the pupils in the grade 3/4 unit at their Curriculum information evening recently. I outlined some of the plans we have for moving to the new site. At that stage it was proposed that the children would vacate their current buildings up to six weeks before the date on which the school was to move into the new school, and move into the Gym or the local church hall. As a result of the builders demands to take posession of the buildings at the end of this term, considerable negotiations were initiated. I am pleased to inform parents that the grade 3/4 children will not have to move out of their current classrooms before moving to the new site. Two similar Mod 5 buldings (held in Melbourne in case of major fire), will be moved onto the new site and totally refurbished. This will greatly reduce any delays in completing the surrounding landscaping and the total contract. All portable classroom stock on our existing site will be removed to other schools, before the end of the school year.

Despite the fact that the Ministry has to date only been forthcoming with half costs for the road construction costs, we are of course very pleased that the Shire Council has decided to procede with the establishment of the roadworks and external parking areas in Station St - between the School and Kindergarten sites.

At the next School Planning Committee meeting to be held this Thursday evening the 11th of March at 7.30pm, the Shire Engineer Mr Chris Bannon will present the plans for the Station St road and parking development. He will also be looking for opinion from the Committee/ school,

regarding the direction of traffic flow along Station St which it is planned would be a one way road.

At approximately 8pm our architect Mr Peter Jones will present suggested interior color schemes and answer questions regarding the development of the school. Samples of furniture will also be on display.

Tidy Towns: A clean, tidy environment engenders pride. It is for this reason that we thank all those who took part in the Shire's "Clean up Australia Day program conducted last Sunday morning. Please remember that the Glass recycling depot next to the Scout hall is well used but does not accept paper. Leaving paper or cardboard there is a littering offence. as part of the School's contribution to the clean up effort, all children participated in a detailed "emu bob" inside the school yard and along the outside boundaries of the school.

WHO CAN BE A SAFETY HOUSEHOLDER?

To become a Safety householder, interested people need to:*be available during the times that children are travelling to and from school, Mon.-Fri. 8-9am and 3.30-4.30pm.

*have a telephone.

*have clear and safe access to the front door or shop entrance.

*be aged 16 years or over.

*accept the responsibilities of being a Safety Householder.

*be prepared to have their details checked against police records. Safety Householders need not have children attending Romsey Primary School. Senior citizens and parents at home with small children are ideal. Shops on the route to school are also good places for Safety Houses.

"MONTHLY MONITORING"

Our LCC will monitor their zone once every month. This is to ensure the highest security for the Program and that all uses of Safety Houses are reported. All houses in each monitoring area, not just Safety Houses, should be checked. This is an important safeguard to ensure that only authorised Safety Houses display the sign.

LCC check to see that:-*all house plates and signs including Zone and school signs are in good condition;

*all designated Safety Houses are displaying the Safety House sign;

*each Safety House sign is clearly visible;

*signs have not been placed on unauthorised houses.

A monitoring slip goes into each Safety Householder's letterbox to remind them their house is being monitored and to keep them in touch with our local Safety House committee.

GOSSIP IS MUCH MORE THAN JUST IDLE CHATTER

When we use the word gossiping it usually refers to meaningless or malicious chatter. When women spend time together talking it is usually referred to as gossiping, that is, time wasted with inconsequential or silly chatter.

It is interesting to find out about the origin of the word "gossip" - it is time when we share problems and stories and give support to each other.

I heard this story from a friend of mine who is researching the way,

traditionally, midwives have gained and shared their knowledge.

Apparently, in Medieval England, a woman would invite several close women friends or relatives (at least six) as well as the local midwife to attend the birth. Their role was to prepare the room for the birth and to support the woman while she laboured and after the baby was born.

This included sealing the room from air and daylight and lighting it

with candles, so creating a special place in which to give birth.

Only the midwife and the women chosen were allowed to enter this birth place. When the labour was in progress the women would while away the time talking about other births they had attended, sharing stories and probably some good ideas about how to manage the labour pain. In essence this is a sharing of wisdom.

The women chosen to attend the birth were given the title of god siblings, in much the same tradition as people may have chosen friends or relatives

to become their children's god parents.

This term, god sibling, was commonly shortened to gossip and the practice of women being together at births and sharing stories became known as gossiping. Some gossips, having attended several births, went on to become midwives and so passed their special knowledge from generation to generation.

We can learn a lot from the wisdom of women of yesteryear. We have a great deal to tell each other about the way we feel, they way our bodies work, what makes us sick, and about what can help us. As we well know, just talking is a wonderful healer.

ROMSEY COUNCIL NEWS

ROMSEY RIDING

Residents will be aware that no tip passes were issued by Council for 1993. As of 1.1.93 all Shire residents are required to pay a \$5.00 tipping fee. If your load consists of tree prunings etc., these can still be dumped at the tip FREE OF CHARGE.

Many residents were unhappy about paying the \$5. with a petition presented to Council at the February meeting. As a result, sometime later in the year, Council will probably implement a "hard garbage" collection to take items that cannot, or people are unble to dispose of, through the weekly garbage pick-up.

Council have lodged an expression of interest in the Government sponsored Landcare & Environment Action Program for works at Riddells Creek. The program will run for 26 weeks and targetted to the 15-20 y.o. group. More on this later when

finalised.

Works on the new school are progressing rapidly. Unfortunately the Government has not been as co-operative with providing funds to make the road outside (Station St.). total amount required to do the job properly is \$203,000. Government contribution is \$96,500, leaving a shortfall of \$106,500. Council have agreed to fund this shortfall to ensure the roadworks are of good standard but further representations will be made to Government for extra funding.

Finally, we are also trying to hold discussions with Education Department people regarding retaining the old/current school building and immediate surrounds for community use. This facility is very important to the township and its retention is

being pursued vigorously by Riding Councillors.

AROUND YOUR ROMSEY HOME NO.16. Fruiting Loquat Trees. Following reports of success in fruiting loquat trees in Romsey Township and Darraweit Guim while others in the district failed even to flower, an inspection of a tree budded onto quince at Darraweit Guim in November 1991, revealed a good crop of excellent, oval, thick-fleshed, single-seeded fruit on quite a small tree. seedling trees in Romsey are also reliably reported to bear well in most years, while that of the writer, budded onto quince and planted 14 years ago close to a lemon, grapefruit and macadamia, which all bear well, has flowered only once and never borne fruit, so buds from the other trees have been inserted in hope of success. Inquiries from likely sources having revealed no likely cause recourse was made to Albert E Wilkinson's "The Encyclopedia of Fruits, Berries and Nuts" citing USA experience which states that "it (Loquat) thrives almost anywhere in California except in the mountain and desert regions, but does best near the coast. variety Champagne does best in the interior and Thales on the coast". It therefore seems reasonable to speculate that introductions to Australia, possibly by Chinese gardeners in the last century originated from several different climatic regions of China or Japan, giving rise to the unreliability seen in today's

cultivated varieties when grown in climates dissimilar to their native habitat.
