

HOW TO MAKE COMPOST

WHAT TO USE IN MAKING COMPOST

Most organic materials which will readily decompose are suitable for composting.

Materials which you may add to the compost heap include:

Garden wastes

Grass cuttings, non-woody garden prunings, leaves, flower and vegetable remains.

Kitchen wastes

Vegetable peelings and leaves, fruit peelings and cores, cooked table scraps, tea leaves, coffee grounds, egg shells, stale bread.

Paper and cardboard

Sawdust and wood shavings

Animal manure

Woodfire ash

Seaweed

Materials which you should **not** add to the compost heap include:

Woody garden clippings

Branches, roots (unless chipped)

Some garden wastes

Pine needles, cypress clippings, rose cuttings and other garden wastes with thorns or nettles.

Weeds

Seeds, bulbs and runners, for example, couch grass, oxalis, sorrel.

Garden wastes recently sprayed with pesticides.

Meat Scraps

Tollet waste or septic tank sludge

Used Paper tissues

Diseased animal carcasses and plant material

Treated pine sawdust and shavings

Wastes which do not decompose — metals, glass, plastics.

For best results coarse materials should be chopped or ground into small pieces before being added to the heap as this will speed decomposition.

Building up the compost heap

For maximum efficiency a compost heap should be built up in layers of about 150mm. Each layer of vegetable matter should be moistened if dry, sprinkled with a thin layer of lime and then covered with soil to avoid attracting flies and the escape of smells. The process is repeated until the heap is the required height.

A 20mm layer of 'starter' material can be added to the top of each layer to increase the rate of decomposition. Animal manure or blood and bone meal can be used.

Turning the heap with a fork will also speed up decomposition. The more frequently it is turned the faster the material will decompose. If the heap is turned every third day after it is built, the compost should be ready for use in a fortnight. After turning, the heap should be covered with soil. It may be left unturned, however the process will take about a year.

The heap should be sufficiently moist so the composting material feels damp. However, it should not be allowed to become water-logged as it will soon begin to smell. If the compost becomes too moist, absorbent material such as sawdust, straw or manure can be added and the heap turned regularly.



HOME BUYER/OWNER INFORMATION NIGHT REVIEW Cobaw Community Health (cont.)

This is the first in a series of summaries of the talks given at the Home Buyer/Owner information Night, and comes from the Macedon Region Water Authority. It is important to remember that if you cannot come to an agreement about your loan or debt with any bank/government authority or Shire, you can get independent advice from the Cobaw Emergency Accommodation Service (C.E.A.S.) or a financial counsellor. RECOVERY OF OVERDUE TARIFFS AND CHARGES

Under the provision of the Water Act 1989, The Authority must allow 28 days from the issue of the first account, before any recovery action can be commenced. Penalty interest, at a current rate of 15% per annum, can be applied on a daily basis from 28 days after the tariff becomes due. If payment is not made, or an agreement for payment not entered into, the Authority has three options under the Water Act 1989:-

to reduce, restrict or discontinue water supply;

2. to undertake recovery action by litigation;

3. in extreme cases, to sell or transfer ownership of a property.

HOW TO AVOID RECOVERY ACTION:

- Contact the Authority's Revenue Section without delay, if you cannot possibly meet the payment deadline, and discuss your problem with Revenue Staff.
- 2. Establish your financial status and:
 - (i) decide whether you can possibly clear the debt within a <u>short</u> period of time after the deadline; this is generally acceptable but penalty interest may still apply
 - (ii) decide whether you can pay off your debt by making <u>realistic</u> payments on a weekly or fortnightly basis; penalty interest will continue to be applied periodically on any overdue balance.

In both instances such proposals are to be discussed with Revenue Staff and be mutually acceptable to both parties. Any agreement is to be submitted in writing by the debtor and forwarded to the Authority within 5 working days of the verbal acceptance.

 Any request for deferment or waivering of Tariffs and/or Charges must be submitted in writing, giving any and all relevant reasons and details for such request.

NATURAL GAS HEATING - What is it of recent time that makes one think of natural gas heating We know that the Gas & Fuel refuse to connect the town as domestic usage is negligible (in dollar terms) and there would be no return on the investment (ie. cost of connection etc.) Gas & Fuel state that if we had an industrial user of natural gas, financial viability would be assured. Do YOU know of an industrial user of natural gas? Would they open up in Romsey? Council WILL provide incentives. ASK!!

The Supplementary valuation for the Shire (period 1.10.92 to 31.3.93) has been completed. Currently, the value of privately owned land in the Shire is \$29,478,255.03.

The Riding is assisting the Bowling Club to have their green re-surfaced with "synthetic grass". Total value of this project is \$70,000 plus.

Works on Station Street are proceeding as best can, given the vagaries of the weather this time of year. It is still hoped to have it sealed by school opening. The Minister of Education still refuses to see a deputation from the Shire regarding Station Street road funding arrangements. We will keep trying.

The extensions to the Recreation Centre came in under budget to the tune of \$38.25. Revised project cost was \$165,928.75. An excellent effort by all involved.

Finally, there will be another hard garbage pick-up of unwanted goods in July. Full details this column next month.

Changes to Local Education-

A Supplement to The Romsey Rag June 1993

With the many policy changes that the new State Government is currently implementing so quickly, it is essential that we do not let the opportunity pass, to inform the community of the most recent proposals which will have a real effect on our lives. New terminology and organisational patterns are emerging and these often confuse the real issues that need to be communicated to parents.

Due only to changes in the Regulations, the new School Councils will take office as from the 1st of July this year after election procedures are completed in June. At Romsey Primary School

we are again currently calling for nominations for school Council membership. Nominations must reach the Principal by 4pm on June 9th and the election meeting will be held in the staffroom at 7.30pm on June 23rd. Nomination forms, and expectations of School Councillors are available at the school office.

School Councils will take on even more important roles than ever before. Just one of these will be to ensure the "Provision of Quality Education facilities and programs". In a new document entitled "A Quality Provision Framework for Victorian Schools", released by the Minister last week, he clearly outlines the community planning necessary to provide sound educational facilities. I urge all interested parents to read the booklet in full. Copies are in the hands of all teachers and school councillors as well as being available on at the school office.

"The Quality provision Framework is designed to create the highest quality of Educational opportunities for students

- It challenges School Communities and the Directorate of Schools Education (DSE) to examine local patterns of schooling.
- * It recognises that some schools were established long ago to satisfy curricula and community need that have since changed dramatically.
- * It complements the planning for 'Schools of the Future' to develop educational resource viability.
- * It is responsive to changes in the educational, social and economic environment.

The Quality Provision Framework:

- recognises changing demographic patterns & the need for redirection of existing resources to meet better the educational needs of this and future generations of students
- establishes points of reference for curriculum, funding and facilities, which take cognisance of the type of location of schools and the need to optimise resources to deliver quality education.
- * ensures consultation with local school communities on any proposals for change
- provides guarantees for students, parents, teachers, principals and school communities affected by changes.

The major results expected when the Quality Education

Framework is implemented by school communities are:

- * greater clanty as to what constitutes a quality learning environment and how it can be achieved
- * enhanced richness and diversity in school curriculum provision
- * significantly improved school buildings through the upgrading and maintenance of facilities.
- * processes to ensure a quality education is sustainable, despite changing circumstances
- an extended period of stability resulting from the consolidation of our school system.

The Quality Provision Framework assumes that school communities:

- will wish to provide quality education for their students
- * with appropriate guidance and processes, will recognise when there is a need to change schooling arrangements and will seek to do so.

It is anticipated that the Minister's decisions to change schooling arrangements will be based on substantial community support. However where the DSE perceives that students are being disadvantaged because of a school or group of schools not willing to consider change, recommendations considered to be in the best interests of students will be made to the Minister."

Addressing the Heads of schools recently, the General Manager of our Region. Mr Ian Stevens foreshadowed the intentions of the Ministry, as set out above. He further outlined the timetable for the change processes. The documentation to which I refer above would be in schools by the middle of term 2, so that communities can come to grips with the thrust of the Framework in time for local groups to be formally set up to discuss the issues in term 3. Decisions would be with the Minister so that reorganisation procedures can be undertaken throughout term four. In short any school closures /amalgamations would take effect from the beginning of the 1994 school year. No more schools will close during this year.

Parents may not be aware that our Region has a higher percentage number of the State's Schools compared with our percentage share of the pupils attending state schools. Geography and history are responsible for this discrepancy.

Parents are ofcourse aware that there are a number of smaller schools in our local district close to larger facilities. It is for this reason that a task force will be set up in our area and we need to be informed as to the basis of its operation and have objective input to the recommendations that it will make next term to the Minister.

"If we are to improve the quality of our Primary Schools, we should actively pursue the following goals, where possible:

- * Provide planned experiences in the eight learning areas and have fiexibility in the area of staffing and facilities.
- * Be able to formage level class groups at each age level or if they choose, establish multi-age groupings or composite classes, depending on the needs of their students. ...
- * Provide teachers with specialist skills in such areas as LOTE (Languages Other Than English) and physical

education, ensuring more effective use of these teacher resources.

- Provide a variety of programs to cater for individual differences.
- * Offer children increased opportunities for interaction with a range of students of similar age with similar interests, as well as opportunities to interact with older & younger children
- * Offer children access to an increased number of adult role models.
- be able to make organisational arrangements that best provide for the professional development of staff.
- Allow teachers co-operatively to plan programs and to moderateassessment.

For all students to have the highest quality of educational opportunities we need larger Primary schools which can offer wider curriculum choices and better facilities. Therefore, school communities will be expected to review their schooling arrangements and consider plans to improve educational provision.

It is recognised that improvement to the educational provision of the kind outlined above will not be available to students in some isolated areas where there is no alternative to attending a very small primary school. In these instances, services specifically dedicated to isolated rural schools will continue to be developed so that quality programs can be provided in the eight learning areas."

Merger closure and structural change are the three perceived strategies available to alter the provision of Education in an area.

"Any change involving closure will be educationally driven and designed to give students access to the highest quality educational opportunities. At the same time it is important to protect the legitimate interests of all affected parties. There will be therefore guarantees to Students, Parents, Principals and the school community. These guarantees will be a mix of financial, resource and career security undertakings intended to provide certainty for members of school communities while changes are being implemented."

Parents should note that although all the quotes used above are derived directly from the recent publication, "A quality provision Framework For Victorian Schools", they comprise only a small portion of the information set out there and I would again urge you to be informed. Read the document and discuss the issues with others.

At Romsey Primary School our Education Sub-committee meet on the second Tuesday of each month at 7.30pm to discuss issues such as these. You are always welcome to attend and participate in the open forum discussions that take place. Participation in education of quality is a right of our children so that together we can co-operatively "LEARN ANDGROW."

THE NEW ROMSEY SCHOOL.

Residents of Romsey can be justifiably proud of the planning, and the construction of the first phase of their new education complex in Station St Romsey. The current construction will be completed next term and is designed to accommodate the pupils from the existing school site in Palmer St. This project is the direct result of public lobbying over more than a decade.

The large new site will eventually house a P-10 college, i.e catering for the children from Prep to year 10 level, when the post-primary buildings, already master planned for the site, are constructed. (Students from a P-10 college would proceed to another secondary college to complete their VCE studies at years 11 and 12.) Unfortunately there is no time line for this second construction phase and given the current economic climate, the addition of the secondary component will be many years away

The new Primary School buildings comprise a full administration area, staff rooms, large Library and counselling rooms. There are ten permanent classrooms in the main building, with large carpeted general purpose areas linking the two sets of five classrooms. New portable classroom buildings provide an additional four classrooms, which this year will be fully occupied by our grade 3/4 unit. The school also has a gymnasium, artroom, darkrooom, music room and canteen, housed in another separate building which will be available for community use.

The staff will be inviting all interested people to view the facilities in operation, during the third week that the school is open. An open day is planned and will be advertised in the local papers.

The "old Romsey Primary School" site will be eventually cleared of all its portable classrooms and the land on both sides of Palmer St sold for residential purposes. The future of the "old red brick school house" has yet to be finally decided. The community, over many years has strongly requested that the building not be demolished and this has the full support of the Shire Councillors. It is highly unlikely however that the building be given to the Shire for community purposes and it is unlikely that the Shire would purchase the building for use as a Library, or community centre. Time alone will solve this particular concern but if you have strong feelings in this regard, make them known to your Councillors.

Bearing in mind that the new school is directly adjacent to the Romsey Kindergarten and Health Centre, and the Recreational facilities in Romsey Park, the total new Educational Complex will be highly used by young families and a source of genuine pride for our "caring, country community."
