he club is pleased to note that we had several new members at the latest meeting. They came from Gisborne, Monegeeta and Riddells Creek to attend, giving our regulars new and interesting topics of discussion.

One member has been involved in tutoring Wordperfect users, through her work, and has friends trying to convince her to branch out and operate her own small business along the same lines. There are some very enterprising people and ideas centered around computers. Needless to say, anyone interested in the software package Wordperfect, could do well to attend our next meeting and pick up a few tips.

Have you ever wanted to put some of your favourite music on diskette? It can be done with the right software and we had the opportunity at our last meeting. A shareware program available on the front cover of a magazine, in CD format, enabled us to convert a song from a music CD into computer format and play it back. The file size for the entire song required some 85 megabyte of disk space once converted, so we opted for just 40 seconds of play and ended up with a file size of 5 megabyte. This worked fairly well with only minor problems to be sorted out for a perfect reproduction of sound.

The music was then available for use within programs. For example it could be programmed to play whenever windows is closed or opened etc. Also anyone with a microphone connected to their PC could have endless fun making their swn windows sounds. The shareware program itself is small enough to fit onto one floppy disk.

At the April meeting of the Deep Creek Landcare Group, the guest speaker, Gordon Meyer, gave a very informative talk about fox eradication. The fox problem is greatly underestimated in Victoria and the Department of Conservation and Natural Resources believes that the average number of foxes are around 20 per 400 hectares. Foxes are a particular problem for stud, wool and prime lamb producers, but there have been many reports of damage to calves, cows in birth difficulties, deer, ostrich chicks, free range poultry enterprises and losses of wildlife in most fauna reserves. The effective control of foxes needs a major co-operative effort by landholders around Australia, requiring small individual efforts by a large number of people to significantly reduce fox numbers over rural areas. Eradication may be achieved in three ways: fumigation of dens, shooting, and baiting.

The Department of Conservation and Natural Resources are currently co-ordinating a fox control program using buried Foxoff Baits with good results. Foxoff Baits can only be obtained from DCNR offices and strict guidelines control its use. For more information on baiting or other methods of fox control, the Macedon Office of DCNR should be contacted. Their phone number is 261 866.

Another issue of relevance to rural Australia is the increasing impact of algal blooms on waterways. These blooms have been observed more frequently in recent years. In Victoria, over 40 outbreaks of bluegreen algae were recorded in each of the last three summers, with about half of these occurring in town water supplies. Blue-green algae occur naturally in aquatic systems but under certain circumstances their numbers increase to such an extent that a "bloom" is formed. Algal blooms may cause many problems including:

- production of toxins which can cause serious public health problems, result in livestock deaths and impose a significant cost on local communities through the need for treatment of algae-affected water supplies;
- unsightly and smelly scums which reduce the recreation potential of a waterbody;
- detrimental effects to the natural ecology of a waterway, resulting in the death of fish and other aquatic animals.

Several factors influence the development of algal blooms but the most important factor is the increased level of nutrients entering waterways. The management of nutrient levels, particularly the levels of phosphorous and nitrogen, offers the greatest potential for the long-term control of blue-green algal blooms. Nutrients may enter local waterways via soil erosion, agricultural runoff such as fertilisers and animal wastes, stormwater runoff from townships which contains high levels of detergents and garden fertilisers, discharges from wastewater treatment plants etc.

The State government has just released a strategy, Nutrient Management Strategy for Victorian Inland Waters, to address this issue. As a part of this strategy, DCNR will be incorporating algal bloom and nutrient management issues into teaching programs through the existing Landcare schools program. The problems caused by algal blooms affect all people and the broad range of practices which result in high nutrient levels in waterways involve all people. Therefore, everyone in the community can contribute towards the management of this problem. For more information on this topic, contact the local DCNR office.

ATTENTION ALL DOG OWNERS

All dogs over 6 months of age must be registered. All dog registrations expired on 10th April and therefore if you have not already renewed your dog registration please do so now to avoid incurring very expensive penalties.

If your dog has not yet reached the age of 6 months you can still register it if you wish. Registering your dog helps to identify it should it wander away from home and be found by someone else. Registered dogs must wear a collar with a registration tag on it.

Are you looking after a dog for someone else? For your own protection ensure the dog is registered and wearing its collar and tag. Anybody caring for a dog is liable if the dog is not registered or if the dog is found wandering or causing other problems.

Romsey Public Recreation Reserve Committee Triennial General Meeting President's Report 1992-1995.

During the three year term of this present committee, a number of significant improvements and additions have been made. Before outlining these, I would like to thank all the committee members for the insight and hard work that has allowed so much to be achieved; and in particular a special thanks for the work done by the secretary Sam Howatson and the treasurer Rod Conway.

The former shire council must also be thanked for the increased grant given to this committee over the last three years and with rents received promptly from the main users of the park, that has enabled this committee to carry out the necessary maintenance together with a number of improvements and additions.

As far as general maintenance is concerned, the existing playground equipment has been repaired. The drains in the northern section of the park have been cleared and the area tidied up. Improvements have been made to the parking areas at the side of the football/cricket pavillion and behind the bowls/golf clubrooms. The boundary fence in Park Lane has been upgraded. The oval has been mowed regularly and the surrounding park areas tidied up. It is certainly pleasing to hear comments from visitors about how neat our park is kept. A big thank you to Bernie Millburn the park caretaker who has gone about his task diligently and frequently has worked for long hours cleaning up the park.

Some maintenance items are of course done by voluntary labour so I would like to thank committee members for jobs done such as painting the seats of the rotunda and other areas and a special thank you to Robert Clement for pruning the hedges at the entrance to the park.

An improved driveway has been constructed at the recreation centre together with a fence between the driveway and the golf course.

During our term we wrote to the clubs and main users of the park asking them for projects that they would like to undertake. As a result the committee donated funds to assist (i) the golf club to purchase machinery and installation of heaters (ii) the bowling club to concrete under seats (iii) the football club to improve the pavillion and (iv) donations to the scouts and the cricket club.

Part of the committee's policy was to provide facilities that would benefit general park users. To this end we have installed an electric BBQ and playground equipment suitable for young children. We hope that more people will make use of these facilities. One of our last tasks was to remove dangerous trees from near the scout hall and front entrance to the park. This is an ongoing project and more trees will need to be removed and others pruned in the future. As trees are removed new trees will be planted in an effort to further beautify this park.

Another project under consideration is the possibility of sinking a bore within the park. Presently there are council funds held by the committee for this purpose.

In closing, I would like to thank the present committee for all the work they have done and a special thank you to Robert Clement for much guidance and many years of service on this committee. I would like to take this opportunity to wish the incoming committee a successful and rewarding term of office.
