

COURAGE PERSONIFIED

How many locals would know that a highly decorated war hero lies buried in the Lancefield cemetery?

HUGH JOSEPH SLATTERY, a labourer from Garvoc in the Western District, enlisted in the A.I.F. in July 1915 aged 33. A small man of 5ft 6ins* and weighing just over 10 stone which makes his later physical exploits seem even more remarkable.

He became a stretcher bearer in the 8th Battalion and first saw action at Gallipoli and then later in France. He was twice recommened for the Distinguished Conduct Medal (the next bravery award after the Victoria Cross) and was awarded the D.C.M. once and the Military medal on another occasion. During his war service he was also mentioned in despatches three times, was wounded on three occasions and gassed several times.

The citations for his two main awards read as follows:-

Military Medal at Pozierer - France -July 1916

"As stretcher bearer in B Company, performed superhuman work in getting wounded out of front trenches back to the aid post. On his return to the front line he invariably brought two tins of water for his company. This work was performed under terrific fire."

This recommendation was originally for a Distinguished Conduct Medal, but on this occasion a Military Medal was awarded.

Distinguished Conduct Medal at Zonnebke east of Ypres - France -October 1917

"Private Slattery did excellent work as a stretcher bearer, working continuously between the front line and the aid post, declining rest, and with utter disregard of safety. On one occasion a party of 9 men were caught in a barrage, three being killed and six wounded; Slattery tried to get through to them with his squad of bearers but the squad were all knocked out. He then went forward into the barrage alone, dressed the wounded where they lay and then carried them one by one to a place of comparative safety. He then returned to the line, organised a squad of bearers and got the wounded back to the aid post. His courage and devotion to duty was an inspiration to all ranks who came in contact with him, and his gallantry was the means of saving many lives."

Returning home after the war and due no doubt to the horrors he'd not only seen but also experienced, he was unable to settle down and became an itinerant labourer wandering over many parts of Victoria. His lifestyle continued into the Great Depression of the thirties and it was in 1934 at Romsey his body was found in the Five Mile Creek just north west of the town. He was buried at Lancefield and lay in an unmarked

grave for 58 years until a niece who just happened to be in the area, attended the grave to pay her respects and was greatly disturbed that su war hero had lain there totally unrecognised over all those years by the country he had served so well.

This niece with the assistance of her two brothers and a close friend and having obtained Slattery's war service record, approached Canberra and after extensive negotiations the authorities finally agreed to pay for a headstone and grave surrounds. When work was completed a dedication service was organised for many of his relatives and conducted by the local Romsey/ Lancefield R.S.L. About fifty people attended and fittingly the Last Post and Reveille were sounded by one of the hero's great, great nephews.

The Government allowed the 1 to choose a suitable epitaph, and, after the usual particulars on the head stone are these words:-

HERE LIES A MAN OF EXTRAORDINARY COURAGE. AT PEACE WITH CHRIST?

Hugh Joseph Slattery - you were indeed a very, very brave man.

If you have already installed Office 97 then the proper way to fix this is to uninstall and reinstall Office, choosing the Custom option. The easy way is to open Control Panel - Keyboard -- Language and install Australian English keyboard, then make it the default.

I smell the printer's ink, and books, and dust that flashes when raindrops hit it as it takes the rain into itself.

Vincent Buckley.

One of Romsey's favourite sons if Vincent Buckley -

who was born in a cottage at the rear of his grandfather's Romsey Hotel in 1929. His formative education was provided by an Australian order of nuns, the Sisters of St. Joseph, at the local Romsey Catholic primary school From there he won a scholarship to a Catholic school in Fitzroy, but Father Timothy Daley from Lancefield arranged a place of Vincent and his brother to attend St. Patrick's Iesuit College in East Melbourne. Vincent's intellectual life centred around the University of Melbourne where he held a personal chair in English. Another local, Tim Peglar, son of the past Uniting Church minister, who has taken instruction from Vincent says:

He lectured in a relaxed and amused manner as if he had long accepted the fact that the bulk of those in attendance would not be paying attention.... Professor Buckley was a popular tutor in a world where intellectual egos and aggressive opinions could scare students into silence.

Whilst Buckley is internationally recognised for his poetry, he is acclaimed at home for his work as an editor, essayist and reviewer. His largely autobiographical book

'Cutting Green Hay' includes many reference to Romsey and the stimulation of Frances Buckley who had been responsible for the Mechanics Institute Libraries in Romsey and Lancefield. Vincent Buckley's contribution to the field of literature was recognised with the release of a canonical anthology of modern Australian verse soon after his death in 1988.

GIVE CREDIT WHERE IT'S DUE

Generally speaking, we are quick to iticize our politicians and public gures when we aren't happy with them, but praise seems slow in coming. Many would say. "that's because they seem to do more things that are worthy of criticism than praise", and if we look at our ever worsening plight under our numerous civil and civic "leaders" it would often be hard to refute that sentiment. But never mind, I will start off this article with a good measure of praise, and it's for Cr. Geoff Neal (again).

On Feb. 12 The Express, reported that Cr. Neal and Cr. Dunn moved and seconded a motion to put a halt to any further spending of ratepayers funds this year for Councilors to attend seminars and conferences. The Express reported

to cost ratepayers \$11,500 for 6 councilors to attend. As Councilor Neal said, in a climate where we are \$9 million in debt, this

expenditure is simply not justifiable. However, all other councilors opposed the motion. It was defeated.

Along the same lines, both *The Express and The Regional* recently reported Council fielding a proposal to provide a pay rise of around 12% for Councilors and the Mavor after consultation with the ratepayers. In *The Telegraph*, (27/2) Cr. Neal has again voiced concerns regarding the value of such a proposal, considering the Council's financial situation. (And still it seems he's a lone voice). However, the ex Mayor (Cr. Harvey) who supports the rises has gone one step further and stated publicly that it is insulting and demeaning to have to ask the people for their opinion on these rises (*The express 20/3*). Oh really,!!

By no means am I a member of Cr. Neal's 'fan club', but I feel morally bound to staid up and support him in his lone stand for the sensible allocation of his constituents resources (their money). It seems that Cr. Neal understands that it is the people who elected him, and his primary responsibility is to represent the will and the well being of the people and not the Council, the Mayor or the CEO. I'll bet Cr. Neal is copping some flak in Council over his outspoken and brave stand regarding these issues. (It wouldn't hurt to keep him in your

prayers if that's what you do). Good on you Cr. Neal.

Sadly, all these things come amidst an ever increasing drain on rate players funds. We only need to read the local paper, and every week the Council is funding some new project or service, issuing a grant or employing someone else that creates additional drain on our financial reserves and our rate dollar. Granted, all those things may be of some value, but we must be aware, as Cr. Neal says "this is amidst an environment of substantial debt and requirement for funding allocation for existing financial programs. It was Mayor Harvey himself (Ihe Telegraph 27/2) who said "we shouldn't get too excited about the Governments allocation of an extra \$IM for road maintenance as the Council was still severely limited in funding for road maintenance and many other of the basic and fundamental disciplines it is required to service".

As Cr. Neal has suggested, "it all comes down to responsible budgeting and priorities", and I pray daily that our Council will remember that.

Primary School News

Literacy Development at Romsey Primary School

The development of Literacy skills for all children is a high priority for the educational program at Romsey Primary School. The school has a strong commitment to this area of the curriculum with a designated two hour literacy block for all classes every day. We have two of our teachers trained as coordinators, in turn training staff members in advanced methods of teaching literacy skills to our children.

The school has implemented a special Literacy Support program for students who need extra help in reading and writing. This program is being conducted by our Assistant Principal, Ms Tracy Hammill. Currently twentynine children who have been assessed as benefiting from extra assistance in addition to that provided through classroom programs are being targeted through this program. It builds on the classroom Literacy program and involves parents as important key players in accelerating the progress of these children. Children in benefiting from Literacy intervention are drawn from the Junior, Middle and Upper Units. To date parents, students and chers are very enthusiastic in regard the likely success of this program in helping our students meet their true potential in Literacy aquisition.

This program is offered in addition to the Reading Recovery program for selected Year 1 students conducted by Mrs Margaret McLennan.

Junior School Council will meets regularly throughout the year working to represent the opinion of students to the Principal and school leadership as well as having direct involvement at our full School Council. 
ANZAC Day in Romsey



We sometimes hear about art imitating reality. There is an almost constant debate about whether the media reflects reality or shapes reality. Oddly enough, sit-coms seem to be just as much a part of this debate as dramas.

The Games was almost prophetic in the way it raised issues about the Olympic Games, especially with last week's news on the problems at Stadium Australia. Yes, Minister may have been a little extreme, but most of us probably believe it was closer to reality than politicians are likely to admit.

In the life of the church, we have The Vicar of Dibley. There are times that the stores and characters are just a little too much like reality

In one episode, the Christmas sermon is described as "the keynote address at the annual party conference." Whilst this is a useful analogy, I believe it applies more to Easter Sunday than Christmas.

Christmas is an important festival in the life of the church. It is a unique event in history, where God enters human existence. However, the full significance of Christmas is not made known until Easter.

Good Friday is also an important day for the church. The death of Jesus Christ on the cross has become a symbol of both human weakness and failings, and what God has done to give us hope. That is why crosses are so prominent for Christians. A Roman instrument of execution is, for the church, a symbol of victory over human limitation.

But the Easter story is incomplete without Easter Day, the remembrance that Christ was raised to life (the resurrection), The death of Christ would be meaningless without the resurrection. This is the greatest celebration on the church's calendar.

In fairness, Easter Day can only have its full meaning because of both Christmas and Good Friday. After all, if God didn't come to us and die, the victory over death could not be won.

COUNCIL NEWS - MT WILLIAM WARD

What should a councillor do?

As a councillor, there is no clear position description, each of us has to invent and reinvent the job. There is plenty of guidance available, and some of it is very useful, however ultimately we each have to develop our own understanding and do what we believe is right. We must of course attend the Council meetings and we must conduct ourselves at the formal Council meetings according to the local law. Many are unaware (as I was before I joined the Council) that a councillor must vote when a vote is called for in the Council eting by the chair. Abstaining is not wed. This means that it is vital to be well informed about a matter before it is put to the vote. It is for this reason that we have an agreement to give at least a few hours notice of our intention to put a motion in the 'Other Business' section of the meeting. Because of its

formal rules of debate, a Council

meeting is a difficult forum in which to

discuss a new issue. Sometimes the

words in which a motion is framed do

not clearly communicate the intention

of the mover and trying to clarify this

in a formal debate and amend the words

to say what is intended can lead to long,

frustrating and confusing debates. At the

end of one of these, when the vote is put, I can sometimes find it very hard put up my hand either for or against e motion, and yet I must. This to me is not good decision making, and making sound and well informed decisions on behalf of the community is surely what the Council is there for. One of my key reasons for wanting to serve on Council is because of my very strong belief in the democratic process. Democracy is not perfect, but I agree with Winston Churchill: 'Democracy is the worst system of government, except for all the others.' We have to keep defining and redefining what democracy really is. There are no tablets of stone telling us without any doubt when we are and are not being democratic.

One of the most difficult questions is what to pay politicians. One view is that to represent the people is an honour and our representatives should be volunteers. It is an honour and I wholeheartedly concur that there is nothing greater than to serve the community as a volunteer. I greatly appreciate and admire those who keep so many services going in a voluntary capacity. On the other side of the debate however there is the question of good governance. The role of a councillor is complex and getting more so every day, as State government and the community increase their expectations of local government It requires many hours a week to do it well. Really the problem is to find a balance - because there is so much to become informed about and so many requests and issues to respond to, because there is so much public scrutiny, and because it is so interesting, the challenge is to not let Council take over your life! So, who can afford to do it for nothing? No-one admires a person who spends all their time in voluntary work to the detriment of their family's well being. In some types of employment serving on council is supported, but this is not the norm. The councillor allowance goes some way to addressing this issue. If the allowance is too low, the number of people who can put their hand up for the job is severely limited. Does restricting the candidates in this way serve democracy well? It is proposed by the current Council that the councillor allowance (currently \$12,000 annually) be raised to \$15,000 and that the mayoral allowance be raised from \$36,000 to \$46,500. The mayor performs a very demanding role, which in my view is at least equivalent to a full time job, and includes a huge number of engagements in the evening and on the weekend. There will be public consultation about this

issue and I ask you to consider the points I have made here, and other information which will be presented to you on this issue, and to contribute your thoughtful views to the debate.

Consulting the community is now a fundamental part of local government. The question is no longer whether to consult but how we will do it, and the methods are becoming more interesting. Participating in consultations is a very important way of serving your community! Lancefield people have given a resounding thumbs up to the Regional Transaction Centre proposal, both by attending the consultation meetings in good numbers and by a pleasing over 25% response to the survey. The survey results indicated very strong support for banking in the town. Surprise! This won't need to be part of the RTC of course, because our community bank is being prepared for opening right now. Staff ads have been placed and soon the bank will open its doors. Congratulations to all who have worked so hard for this and in particular to those who have backed their community by investing in shares.

The business plan to apply for the RTC funding looks like including professional rooms (for medical and similar services), a tourist information service with an outlet for local produce, other community information and government agencies and good public toilets! You can still contribute to shaping this plan. Look out for how to do this soon.

I am aware that I have talked a lot about Lancefield lately, due to the bank and the RTC process. Next month I want to focus more on Romisey!

Helping grieve for the unborn

Pregnancy loss is a deeply sensitive issue that affects women through miscarriage, adoption and abortion.

But no matter how a woman loses her unborn baby, it is something that remains with her for the rest of her life, says Anne Neville, of Open Doors Councelling in Ringwood.

Ms Neville said the service had supported many women through their grief. She said women who were pregnant or had lost their unborn baby could receive independent councelling at Open Doors.

"We have a very wide age range of women," Ms Neville said. "We have girls as young as 14 through to women in their early 40s. We had a lady in her 70s who came in to talk about her pregnancy loss that she

went through years ago."

Twenty-two female councellors work at Open Doors, most of them volunteers.

Ms Neville said the most common scenarios for clients were women aged between 19 and 25 who were unexpectedly pregnant and confused about whether to

keep the baby.

"Often well-intentioned people, friends or family, may push the woman for an abortion," she said. "A lot of people say it will be too hard for them and that saps their confidence. We're here not to make decisions at
