Letter to the editor:

Dear Editor

Neaxt year we have council elections in March, so I'm putting an idea on paper for others to think about.

I've enjoyed getting to know people in Romsey – those who've just come and others who have lived here for twenty or fifty years. A mixed group, but for all that there's a kind of local sense of people knowing at least some of the community.

I know that older residents still miss the familiartiy of the smaller local council. I'm not sure how many council staff I meet really know this local community, and I ask how can this larger "regional" council best help people here? There's a mushrooming of plans and visions and consultants in these regional councils.

So...I'd like to elect councillors who agreed to a 10% reduction each year in the budget for consultants, and a 10% increase in managers spending time getting to know local people.

I'd like to have managers out there learning about the local community and being known. Dollars for consultants could be effective in emploving staff to work in our local area - keeping parks and streets looking good, and youth and others getting the help they need, but in the process coming to understand what the local area means to people. I want managers who know local people well enough to know which groups may be concerned, have the confidence to work with them to bring the issues to council in a considered way, and build local projects which last. Not just have another vision or plan on paper, written by someone who comes and goes. There are no magic skills in this. Sue Kirkgard.

PS. I'm not critical of consultants, but in this situation believe their transitory involvement is not worthwhile, and counterproductive to building the base for good local community planning.

"ROMSEY HOUSE"

The disastrous bomb explosions at Kuta Beach, Bali, on 12th October, 2002, are not only a reminder of the World Trade Centre and Washington disasters on 11th September, 2001, but also of the Indonesian invasion of East Timor from 16th October, 1975.

Some readers may not know the story of the five Australian journalists who were slain in Balibo, East Timor: Greg Shackleton, Gary Cunningham and Tony Stewart were sent on assignment by HSV 7 Melbourne, while Channel 9 sent from Sydney, Malcolm Rennie and Brian Peters. These TV journalists were mostly in their early 20's and they established a base in a house in Balibo which became well-known as the home of the "Balibo Five" and was a centre for Australian hospitality near the border with Indonesia – the present Foreign Minister of the new nation of East Timor, Ramos Horta, was a frequent visitor as was Jill Jolliffe who published her account of the role of the Whitlam government in hiding the facts of the Indonesian invasion, in her book "Cover Up". During the invasion the journalists filmed the attacks by

the Indonesions on the Timorese, but they were caught, stabbed to death and buried in an unmarked grave.

In June, 1978, the widow of Greg Shackleton bought and 118 year old Romsey House which had been converted from Romsey Hotel. Shirley Doreen Shackleton converted the bar room into tearooms and installed a new kitchen in which she prepared lunches and afternoon teas. By late 1980 it was apparent that the "Romsey Larder" was not a profitable venture to Shirley returned to live in Melbourne and tried to sell her property in Romsey. This took until July, 1982 when Graham and Jean Newell moved in, with their three sons. Graham died in August, 1994 but Romsey House remained in Newell hands until 2002 when it was sold.

The house used by the "Balibo Five" in East Timor has fallen into disrepair but in October, 2002, it was agreed to restore it for some form of community use to be negotiated by World Vision; this project is a partnership of Multiplex, the Victorian Government, Channel 7 and Channel 9 who have agreed to invest \$50,000.



Protecting Your Animals From Wildfire

When developing your bushfire survival plan, it not only means protecting your home and family, but also the extended members of the family, the pony, the goat, the dog and anything else that has endeared themselves to the family. Farm stock should not be forgotten either — remember that animals will also suffer during bushfire, this is highlighted by some horrific news footage of sheep and cattle after a fire has ripped through the area. By including them in a bushfire plan, you can help provide them with their best chance of survival.

Romsey Fire Brigade's 3rd Lieutenant Ralph Hermann said there are many things that can be done to help protect animals against bushfire. "It's all about forward thinking and planning. Animals will be frightened during a bushfire, so think about how they will behave and prepare around that. On high fire danger days, if you have to go to work decide whether to take your animals to a safer place before leaving home. Remember, in the event of fire, you may not be allowed back to your home to rescue them", Ralph said

"If your bushfire survival plan is to take your pets with you on a day of high fire risk, shut your pets in the house early so you can quickly get them in order. Have a kit prepacked – thinking about leashes to restrain animals, any medication, food, a water bowl and kitty litter or newspaper as your pet may be restrained for a long time. Also, ensure your pets are registered in case you become separated", he added.

Cats, rabbits and guinea pigs need a secure cage; snakes and lizards need a container with a tight fitting lid and air holes. A pillow case (tied firmly) or an overnight bag (firmly shut) is also an alternative for all of these animals. Birds, ferrets, mice etc need to be moved in their cages or ir recure boxes with small air holes. Fish may be transputed in a large jar, with a wide neck and a secure lid, filled two thirds with water. Preparing contact details and attaching it to your pet can help if pets become separated.

"Include your name, address, phone numbers and the number of a friend or relative who is not in a threatened area, your vet's phone number, your pet's name, vaccination history, medical information and food requirements", Ralph said.



If caught driving into bushfire, remain in the car and cover yourself and your pets with woollen blankets, keeping down below the level of the windows.

If deciding to stay and defend the home in the event of fire, remember that animals will be frightened. CFA advises to restrain small animals inside, giving them plenty of water to avoid dehydration and to make a curtain out of wet hessian to fit the cage of poultry and aviary birds which will be affected by smoke.

"If possible, identify the safest paddock on your property or neighbouring property to move animals to. Ideally this would have a large dam, clear access and closely grazed surroundings with minimum fuel for fire.

If fire does threaten, hose your animals off, remove all equipment such as horse rugs, plastic headstalls and metal buckles, and move animals to open space.

"Don't shut animals up. They can cope well on their own if they're given maximum space and can move in the open. That doesn't mean allowing then to escape onto public roads where they will be a threat to themselves and other road users. Try to provide them with plenty of water, as one of the most common threats after the fire has passed is dehydration."

Ralph added that by acting responsibly, being prepared and developing an effective bushfire survival plan, animal owners can help ensure the safety of their pets and stock during a bushfire.

With a judging panel of seven highly respected judges from Sydney officiating each day, we are hoping that some of those rare breeds will be out and about strutting their way around the rings.

All we can hope for now is that the weather will be kind to us. Hope to see you there.



TEMPERATURE'S RISING ON BIG THERMOMETER

Romsey's push to get its own Community Bank is steadily progressing, with residents subscribing almost half of the pledge level required to go the next step. We can all keep an alert eye on how we're going, with the red paint in the neck of the thermometer on the big white sign in Main St charting our progress towards the \$400,000 target.

Members of the Romsey Steering Committee – solicitor Maureen Wiltshire, retired school principal Trevor Turnham, earthmoving contractor Doug Newnham, butcher Peter O'Rourke, management consultant and vigneron Bruce Knight, barristers' clerk Ric Howells, estate agent John Woodham, publican John Chisholm and journalist Graeme Walker – are watching the contributions come in with keen interest, and are always ready to answer questions on the project.

Mrs Wiltshire, who chairs the Steering Committee, said local residents and businesses needed to realise that a pledge – to take out shares in a Romsey Community Bank branch of Bendigo Bank – was vital if the project was to succeed. "There are now more than 70 Bendigo Bank Community Bank branches around Australia, all of them owned by people in their towns and suburbs who took out a pledge and bought shares," she said. "What we're doing with Romsey is nothing new or nothing different to what Lancefield and the other communities which have their own Bank have already done. Having our own Community Bank means we can 'bank-proof' Romsey, and ensure that we will always have a Bank branch in our town. Pledge forms have been mailed to all Romsey households, and are available at a number of shops and

outlets around the town. I urge people to make a pledge without delay, which will enable us to get our Bank up and running as soon as possible."



The Rag In Retro

The December 2002 edition of the Romsey Rag is also our 200th edition! Who would have thought that we would still be going strong, bigger and brighter than ever, way back in August 1984 when the first ever Rag was published?

The Rag has seen a lot of changes over the 18 years of its history. The first edition was just four and a half A4 sheets, double sided, with no advertisements and no graphics. The circulation was 500 copies. By 1985 advertisements began to appear, and the number of pages varied from month to month depending on the amount of copy submitted. Over the next few months the front cover was printed on a different colour pink, yellow, white, blue and green. In February 1987 the front cover became consistently green and the circulation was 625 copies. In October 1987 the beautiful Old English masthead vears have been many and varied. The Rag chronicles appeared, and continued until the very late 1990's. In November 1987 - a small line drawing to accompany an advertisement. This trend grew, and in April 1990 the first separate "Trade and Business Directory" appeared. Circulation steadily increased over the years as Romsey's population grew, reaching 1000 copies in September 1993, incidentally, the 100th edition of the Rag. By March 1997 1100 copies were produced, and this year we reached a monthly production rate of 1550 copies. Photos appeared for the first time in the June Bolinda, Lancefield, St Mary's and Hesket, have been reliable 1999 edition - number 161, and have been used ever since to add interest and visual appeal to our stories.

Throughout the history of the Rag we have been able to track issues, events and projects important to our community. Projects like the Ambulance Station, Centennial Track, the building of the new school and the kindergarten and Infant and Maternal Welfare Centre, are but a few examples. We have shared the optimism, the hopes and the frustrations and the setbacks of the individuals and committees who worked tirelessly to achieve these vital goals. In the July '85 edition we learned of plans to rebuild the school on its old site, and in subsequent years we see glimpses of the efforts, hopes and disappointments of the committee which ultimately triumphed with the building of the new school. In 1991 the tendering for planning and construction of the new school was announced. with the hope that it would be ready for occupation by term 3. 1992. In October 1993 the Junior School Council conducted tours of the new school, but it wasn't until January 1994 that classes commenced there. Since then we have kept abreast of major improvements to the school, including the construction of the Performing Arts Complex, and significant developments of playgrounds, gardens and other facilities. This is but one example of how the Rag has kept us abreast of community developments.

Over the years the Rag attracted a number of regular correspondents. Syd Wheller, for many years, submitted detailed and well-researched articles on gardening. The Romsey Rambler, later revealed to be clergyman Adrian Peglar, wrote a regular, sometimes provocative, commentary on local events and life. He covered a wide range of topics including the behaviour of youth, local p'anning and development issues and policy, traffic in the town, litter, church matters, dogs, compulsory voting and the list goes on. Local police officers made regular contributions for a period of time, as did solicitor Maureen Wiltshire. There have been other regular, and some not so regular correspondents, and shire councillors have been very reliable in their contributions. Sporting and service clubs and churches too numerous to mention have also been faithful contributors to the Rag, and continue to contribute to this day.

Through the Rag we have shared the successes of groups

and individuals in our area. Sporting and academic achievements, completed community projects and support of individuals in need have all been recognised through articles in Rag. The Rag has paid tribute to local identities whose passing has left a gap in our community over the years. It is very interesting, when one looks at articles over a period of time, to realise that the same names appear in connection with many of the voluntary community organisations to be found in the town, such as the CFA, the CFA Ladies Auxaliary, the Ambulance Committee, the Centennial Track Committee, the various sporting club committees, the churches, the Red Cross, the CWA and so on. Our community owes a huge debt of gratitude to these people who keep things purring along, mostly without acknowledgement.

The issues and events brought to light in the Rag over the changes in our community (apart from those mentioned already) such as the changes to the speed limits in town, land subdivision and development in and around Romsey, the forming of the Safety House Committee (and its demise), the amalgamation of councils, the establishment of the new fire station, the closure of the Commonwealth Bank; and issues that remain unresolved such as connection to natural gas.

Romsey Primary School and other local schools including contributors to the Rag. In particular we have been able to follow the development and growth of programs at schools brought about not only by change of Education Department policy over the years, but also because of the dedication, the striving for excellence and the professionalism of the staff at the schools.

Sadly, too, we can follow the rise and fall of some of the local businesses in our community through the Rag, particularly from the advertisements. Who can remember Cruise In. Miss Millie's Mercantile, the Toy shop, Road Board Market and Muffinry. Roseallan Tearooms, Corner Crafts, The Strawberry Patch, Little Poppet, the Book Exchange, to name a few? It prompts one to ask - what happened?

What is the future of the Rag? It would seem that its future is assured, judging from the continued support it receives from its sponsors and advertisers. But it would be great to see many, many more contributions from members of the community who want to spread the word about matters important them, their friends and families, and the organisations they k long to. In these rather difficult times of world politics we need to be using the Romsey Rag to promote cohesion and harmony and a sense of pride in our community. One does realise, however, that from a global perspective, not much has been achieved since this article was published in the December 1986 edition, commemorating the Year of Peace: In response to the question,

If you were given a chance how would you create peace in the world? Aaron Dalton, then in grade 5, wrote:

"I would get all the leaders together and form peace around the world. If a leader went against it I would another and if he tried to start a war he would be punished. We would put all the nuclear bombs in a rocket and blast them up in space so there would peace throughout the world. There would be no starving countries and no terrorists. There would be no drugs and people who killed would be sent to an island for the rest of their lives."

When asked for his thoughts on the current state of the Rag, inaugural editor Trevor Turnham said he believed th the Rag continued to meet its original three primary aims:

- To keep residents informed about their own community (particularly with a large and increasing population of commuters in the district);
- To provide a vehicle for accurate reporting of events that may not otherwise get coverage in other local press, and
- To provide a regular interface between the school a the community.

times.

And finally, it would be unfair to close without mentioning

the people whose hard work has brought the Rag to us every month for 200 editions. In the early days, without the benefit of computers, digital technology and high volume printing machines, the Rag was produced using typewriters, spirit printers and stencils (and then photocopiers), and was, and remains a hand collated paper. The editing, typing, printing, collation and until recently delivery of the Rag has been achieved all this time thanks to the efforts of many very willing, enthusiastic and dedicated volunteers. 

Water Saving Ideas for House and Garden By Kerri Mewett

Jse the rinse water from the washing machine on the garden (use a low or no phosphate detergent)

- Bath the kids together, put the bath water into the washing machine.
- Only use the washing machine and the dishwasher with a full load.
- Hand wash clothing in a bucket.
- Flush the toilet less.
- · Clean teeth using a cup of water for rinsing.
- Put a basin in the sink to collect rinse water and tip on pot plants.
- Mow the lawn at the highest setting the longer the grass, the larger the root system and the longer the grass will cope with dryness.
- Choose a small area of lawn to try and maintain (eg. Near the front door) and let the rest go.
- Deep watering of lawn encourages deeper root growth and more tolerance of dry conditions.
- Mulch, mulch and more mulch.
- Mulch around trees and shrubs within lawns. This reduces the competition from grass. Make a circle 1 metre across keeping mulch away from the trunk.
- Mulch garden beds, vegetable patches etc. Never use straight grass cuttings or sawdust. Lancefield Tip sells mulch or source stable straw with manure.
- Water plants deeply once a week or fortnight rather than daily sprinkling. Deep watering encourages deep root systems which cope better with dryness.
- Change your plant choice. Steer away from northern hemisphere style plants and try meditterranean plants better suited to dry conditions. Avoid annuals in times of drought.
- · Group plants with similar water requirements.
- Plant indigenous plants which are best suited to our local weather conditions. Once established they require little or no watering.

Indigenous Plant Profile

Indigenous plants, or in other words plants which are native to our area, are best suited to our local soil types and weather conditions. Indigenous plants have adapted to rely on natural rainfall and so, once established, additional watering is not required.

Consider using indigenous plants in your garden or on your property.

Acacia verticillata - Prickly Moses

Prickly Moses varies in size from 2 – 6 metres in height with a spread of 3 – 5 metres, depending on soil types and available water. It naturally grows in most forests, scrub and forest foothills. It can tolerate periods of waterlogging. Prickly Moses has spiky, needle-like green foliage which provides an excellent refuge and nesting site for small birds. Flowers of yellowspikes occur from June to December. Prune young plants to encourage denser growth and prune once a year if in the garden environment. Plant in clumps of 3, 5, etc to create a cat-proof haven for small birds. The spiky foliage provides a contrast within the garden setting. In my Romsey garden Prickly Moses has grown to nearly 2 metres in 8 months with only a couple of waterings over summer to help establishment. A good choice for a spiky hedge.

Eucalyptus ovata - Swamp gum.

Swamp gums vary in size from 8-25 metres in height with an 8-20 metre canopy. It grows on swampy flats and poorly drained slopes and hollows and on foothills (to 800m). It is often found growing amongst swamp paper-barks, manna gum and messmate. The swamp gum is a fast growing tree which provides useful shade for swampy areas and creek banks. Foliage is dark green and shiny and flowers are creamywhite, occurring between March and November. Swamp gums shed long strips of bark in summer and autumn, revealing new smooth grey bark. Swamp gums are a useful and valuable tree for moist areas and will tolerate winter waterlogging and summer dryness. The leaves are eaten by koalas.





From Your Councillor, Alice Aird

Hullo everyone! It's been a full month again and here we are at the last issue of the Mercury for the year. Something's got to be done about the rate at which our years are disappearing! It's just not possible that it's December is it? Seriously, it seems that the more busy we get the faster time goes, so perhaps we DO need to find a way to be less busy and have more time to get things done!! Hmmm.

As my family's two minutes of fame on Channel 9's "Getaway "program showed, having WWOOFERS (Willing Workers on Organic Farms) is a very useful and enjoyable addition to our rural life. Having visitors from many countries expands all our horizons and the contribution wwoofers make to the upkeep of our place, in exchange for their board, is fantastic. What's ordinary and even boring for us is fascinating for them, so everyone wins. Good for the Shire too, as they help with land management and things like weed removal. To find out more call WWOOF on 5155 0218 or go to www.wwoof. com.au on the web.

The Drought

The dry goes on. Some good news here in one respect, with Macedon Ranges being 'officially' declared as a drought area. This does give farmers the possibility of being eligible for up to \$20,000 in drought relief. Bruce tells me that from his aerial photography work you can see a narrow band of green from Trentham to Lancefield so Mt William farmers have a little more reserve than some parts of the region. Anyone affected by the drought can ring the Statewide Drought Response Network on 13 61 86. This number links to Dept of Natural Resources and Environment support as well as providing personal referral to support services like Centrelink and Lifeline if needed. I rang this line and found knowledgeable and individual support available to find solutions to drought related problems. The Shire is coordinating a meeting with DNRE, neighbouring shires and water authorities to focus on stock emergency water supply and other technical matters related to the drought. Watch the Shire Newspage in the local papers for updates.

Quarry Trucks

The experience of the trucks varies a lot with location and outlook. In general, the impact is greater on quieter rural roads than in the town it seems. Generally the drivers are staying within the agreed speed limits but we are passing on reports of breaches. Alternatives are being examined still to reduce impact in specific locations. Please let me or Nick Haslinghouse at the Romsey service centre know if you have a particular problem.

GAS is coming to Romsey! And getting closer to Lancefield! There is an absolute commitment from the Shire to get gas to all our towns. Realistically, it must happen in stages and this first announcement about Woodend, Gisborne and Romsey is most welcome. Lots of people are claiming credit for this, but I for one would like to acknowledge the persistent work of our current Mayor, Geoff Neill, on this issue over many years. Although Geoff is very pro Romsey, he is a former Romsey Shire councillor and care about Lancefield (and the whole Shire) as well and has joined me in pushing for gas for Lancefield too. Even though the pipeline is so near Lancefield, there is a huge cost (millions!!) for each pressure reduction valve and therefore the success of the first stage will set the scene for adding in towns like Lancefield. So, when it comes, the more people in Romsey switch to gas for heating and cooking the better! Better for the environment than electricity too.

The Farm Safe Forum at Lancefield Park was a great initiative by the CFA. It brought together many services including police, ambulance, WorkCover and although the attendance was low, there is commitment to keep doing it and determination to get more people along. Those who attended got a lot out of it and hopefully will tell their friends to come next year. The statistics about injury and death on farms are startling and we need to take these messages about prevention seriously.

If you are interested to give your views on the Draft Rating Strategy, the Rural Zone Amendment to the planning scheme, and the General Local Law No. 8, all of which are out for public exhibition. Call in at the Romsey Service Centre to read or obtain a copy. A great deal of innovative work has been done on all these strategies and we really want feedback form the community. Copies of the recently adopted Natural Environment Strategy are also available. This is a fine document which has reached a much higher level through further officer work. This further work was prompted by response to the draft version from many people, from both within and beyond Macedon Ranges. Many local people's suggestions were adopted and included. This is what public exhibition is for – to allow the creativity and expertise of our community and other interested parties to increase the quality of our plans and strategies - and it works. Please give your community the benefit of your unique perspective.

Merry Christmas to everyone and may you have a peaceful and happy holiday period. May 2003 start well for you.

Relay for Life is an overnight team event to raise funds for The Cancer Council of Victoria (formerly the Anti-Cancer Council of Victoria). In Victoria, Relay for Life has grown from just one event in 1999 that raised \$75,000 to 22 events in 2002 that will raise approximately \$1.9 million and in 2003 in Victoria aiming to raise over \$2 million.

Teams are formed of 10-15 people – friends, colleagues, family or workmates who take turns to walk or run a few laps at a time, to keep their baton moving around the track. Many teams create a theme with costumes, banners and decorated campsites.

There will be a festive village atmosphere with entertainment and games for everyone to enjoy.

Relay for Life celebrates people who have survived cancer and the Survivors Walk opens the event. A Candle-light Ceremony remembers friends and family who have died from cancer and supports people fighting cancer. The Relay for Life is open to everyone in the community. We are seeking teams, sponsors and businesses who could provide goods or services, and volunteers from community groups and individuals in lancefield and surrounding towns.



- 3. Beat cream cheese until smooth, add sugar. Fold in chocolate, gelatine mixture and evaporated milk. Po into a prepared cake base and chill.
