ASTHMA FRIENDLY SCHOOLS

Asthma Victoria has launched an initiative aimed at involving whole school communities in the management of asthma. In Victoria this program was rolled out based on the Victorian Schools Asthma Policy.

Asthma Friendly Schools adopt and work towards strategies that actively support the whole school community in the management of asthma. Asthma is Australia's most common chronic health condition affecting two in five primary and one in seven secondary students.

All schools in Lancefield, Romsey and Bolinda have enrolled in the program and have received their Asthma Friendly Guidelines. Once these schools have fulfilled the eight criteria to become Asthma Friendly parents can be assured that these schools are safe places for children with asthma to attend.

Funded by the Commonwealth Government, the 'Asthma Friendly Schools' program will target students, school staff and parents/carers. The program includes guidelines and criteria to assist in self-management of asthma, asthma education that fits within the health curriculum in both primary and secondary schools, professional development for school staff and education programs for parents/carers. In Victoria it is mandatory in all Education Department schools that all staff, teaching and non-teaching are able to administer asthma first aid to students experiencing an asthma attack or any other breathing difficulty.

The local Rotary Club is organising a visit from Asthma Victoria on 17th July, 2002 and the staff of all local schools will be invited to attend a professional development asthma session in the afternoon and all members of the community are invited to a free evening asthma education session at 7-8.30pm at Centrevic, Lancefield sponsored by Rotary. Supper provided.

HOW TO ENJOY THE MITCHELL LIBRARY WEBSITE - Part 3.

VICTORIA'S VIRTUAL LIBRARY

Welcome to another rather useful little item on the Mitchell Library home page. At the library we mainly use it as a window into all the other Victorian Library systems' catalogues - an extremely handy little tool as we shall see later on. However, it does have other features that can come in handy from time to time.

Click on Government Information and whacko, suddenly you have access to the following:

Victorian Government home page

Multi-Service Express - Victorian Government services

Australian Government home page

National Library of Australia - Government information page

National Library of Australia - Worldwide government information page

Now go back and click on <u>Weather</u> and a comprehensive weather report for any area of Victoria or any state of Australia is yours.

By clicking on Newsflash you can have access to the day's news via The Age website.

The <u>Libraries Victoria - yours to explore</u> logo answers your questions about any Victorian library - be it bricks and mortar or marvellously mobile. Type in your home town and see.

By clicking on the <u>State Library of Victoria</u> icon an even bigger world is available to you with the State Library's collections, exhibitions, on-line catalogue and even a virtual tour at your fingertips.


Now, let's return to the address boxes in the middle of the page.

<u>Search for a Victorian library website</u> - you can click on any library service in Victoria and see what is on offer at the various libraries, from displays to author visits and everything in between.

Search for an on-line catalogue - Extremely useful little tool. If you are after the absolutely latest novel by Grisham, Steel or Binchy and can't remember the title click into any one of the large library services in Melbourne and chances are that an entry will be made in their catalogue. Just print off the information, bring it along to your local branch and we can reserve it for you (or if you have read Part 1 of Enjoy the Mitchell Library Website, you can do it for yourself.) Likewise if your life wouldn't be complete without an extremely obscure little book that you read several years ago, but we no longer have in our system, then by searching other library's catalogues you can maybe find your heart's desire. Once found just print its details, including the library system where it is located, and then for the princely sum of \$1.10 we can organise an Inter Library Loan (I.L.L) for you.

<u>Search for on-line information</u> - a good starting point for up-to-date information about current topics with a great little sub-section entitled "Picture Australia". This is a gallery of people, places, events and objects throughout Australia's history. Great for printing off for school projects, etc. Try following the trails - they're great!

Until next time, hope that this keeps you happy and active surfing the library's website. Enjoy!

"The feedback already from our presence in Romsey is that residents support and appreciate the fact that our Bank is owned and operated by our local community, has a local manager working here six days a week and is a Bank that was set up specifically to meet the needs of our region. Romsey businesses and tradespeople appreciate the convenience of being able to deposit cheques at the local facility, while our branch offering full Bendigo Bank facilities is just 8 km away at Lancefield for all their other transactions."

Mr Chisholm urged all Romsey residents and businesses to utilise the Community Bank and transfer their accounts and their support. They can either drop in to the hall or make an appointment with Mr Browning by phoning the accepted branch on 5429 1977.

"Our Community Bank has a Board comprising Lancefield and Romsey residents, and our decisions are made in our two towns, for the benefit of our residents and community," he said.

Macedon Ranges Shire Council's new web site, macedon-ranges.vic.gov.au, has been described as one of the best sites online today, both in Australia and overseas. The comment came from Municipal Association of Victoria (MAV) consultant, Peter Lowe, who said that the new site would provide residents with 24 hours a day, seven days a week access to Council information.

Macedon Ranges Shire Council was one of only five municipalities in the State to participate in the MAV's Local Government Online Services project, each receiving funding to work with their own software designers to develop a web site that would provide the local community with online access to their Council and serve as a model for other councils.

Council's Chief Executive Officer, Lydia Wilson said our aim has been to develop a site that is easy and quick to move around and one that is easily maintained.

"The site's features include 'breadcrumb trails' that enable people to see how they've got to the current page. Every page has a printer-friendly button enabling people to print the content without the colour images, and documents will show the time needed for downloading," she said. "Many councils are facing the need to reinvent their web site to make them more functional, particularly for people with vision impairments and for those who have older and slowe. modems. Our new site has been designed with these needs in mind."

Along with general information on Council's services, details of contracts and employment vacancies are now available online. Although online payments were not part of this pilot project, the new site does provide connection to BPAY facilities. There is also a comprehensive data base of community organisations, leisure facilities and an Arts Register.


Council's Corporate Services Director, Glenn Owens said the pilot project was really only the beginning.

"Now that we have established a presence online, our intention is to continue to enhance the site, particularly in respect to the amount of information that is available," he said.

From Your Mt William Councillor, Alice Aird

What is your neighbourhood?

Those who regularly read this column will know that I am very keen that the diverse neighbourhoods of the Macedon Ranges are preserved and enhanced. I also want to make it easier for people to make positive contributions to their communities. I want to bring local government closer to all people, ensuring that it is responsive. It was to learn more about these things that I went to a short seminar last week by Carolyn Carlsson from Seattle's Department of Neighbourhoods. It was an inspiring couple of hours. The commitment to people initiating and leading and truly owning the projects in their neighbourhoods was so clear and strong. The achievements of this community centred approach were wonderful to hear about. Even the neighbourhood boundaries are defined by the people, and sometimes overlap! When asked what she had learnt through 13 years in the Department of Neighbourhoods, Carolyn said: "To step back. To truly trust and know that the people know the problems and have the solutions. My department's role is to offer resources and tools and a structure to work from and then to let things happen in a natural and organic way. What I've learned is that the more people who are truly involved in a project, the better it works "

Mt William Reference Group

The idea of a reference group in Mt William Ward is with same sort of approach in mind. My goal is to get together regularly with a diverse bunch of people who care about their community, to listen and talk to each other about a range of issues and see what emerges. I want to know better what people value and what they are concerned about. I want us all to understand better how we experience our district and brainstorm ways we could enhance and improve it. Planning Matters

The Planning Forum held in Romsey was attended by about 200 people and I heard comment that it was a useful, informative evening. Good explanations were given about planning processes and current reviews in process of the Macedon Ranges planning scheme which are underway. The key principles which have now been developed for the Rural Land Review are now available for your comment. It is very

important that many people read and give feedback on this as the final zones, overlays and policies of the Macedon Rang Planning Scheme for rural areas will be based on the key principles adopted. Please be part of the development of our planning scheme, before amendments are adopted. Don't wait until years down the track when a planning issue affects you, to express your viewpoint.

Roadworks

I hope that by the time you read this there will have been truly useful rain for the farmers and growers in the district. A positive thing about the lack of rain has been the good conditions for road works. I was pleased to see the work on vegetation clearing on the Woodend Romsey road, also the Lancefield Romsey Track completed at last and work proceeding on the streetscape in Romsey. Works on Pyalong Rd Lancefield and Romsey Rd near Da Bridge should see completion soon, weather permitting. The last section of Don's Rd is set to start but may now have to wait till spring. There has been much discussion of the treacherous Don's Rd-Three Chain Rd intersection and there will be a stop sign! We're nearly there!

Lancefield Streetscape

Discussions about Lancefield streetscape are beginning and you will hear about opportunities to contribute your ideas soon. The first priority is safety and convenient parking and access to shops and services. Angle parking will help by making it easier to get in and out of cars without falling into the gutter or struggling against the car door! It will also narrow the driving area and make it safer to cross the road. Mar people have complained of these difficu. ties so it will be good to get this underway at last. The process will involve a long term plan for the streetscape which will be tackled in stages.

Newham Crossing

While we're on roads and safety, it's good news that the Newham School crossing has been approved by Vicroads and will be installed in June. It will be a supervised crossing with a person on duty at peak crossing times. The crossing will not be located directly outside the school but on a highly used pedestrian route to the school from the Newham village. This has been a significant issue for Newham and I am very pleased with the work of the Infrastructure Unit at the Shire and the cooperation of Vicroads in addressing the corcerns of this community.

ROMSEY REFLECTIONS AND ROYALTY

 Among the last events in the life of the independent Shire of Romsey was the Logo Competition in 1993 won by "Romsey - The Heart

of Victoria". Soon afterwards Romsey amalgamated with other Shires to form Macedon Ranges Shire and now, despite the efforts of Councillors Alice Aird and Geoff Neil and Joanne Duncan, M.P., Romsey is becoming on of Victoria's best kept secrets.

There is only one other village named Romsey in the world and that is in Hampshire, England. A kinship has developed between the two Romsey Historical Societies. Hampshire has many larger towns/cities including the first capital of England, Winchester; Southampton and Christ-church. Literary associations exist with Izaac Walton, Jack Austen, John Keats, Alfred Tennyson; there are associations with the British Army at Aldershot, the Royal Navy at Portsmouth and the Isle of Wight, home of Britain's most elite Yacht Club and Osborne House the favourite home of Queen Victoria.

Romsey, Hampshire, has several claims to fame including the Abbey and Nunnery which was built in the Norman style by the Saxons in 1130 on the site of an earlier abbey destroyed by the Danes. Around 1536 the citizens of Romsey bought the land and buildings for 100 pounds; that was during one of King Henry VIII's purges. The third Abbess of Romsey, Lady Ethelfleda, reputedly crept out of bed at night and stood naked in the Test River to recite the psalms of the day. When King William the Red was seeking a wife he heard that a beautiful Saxon princess, Edgyth, was a ward of the Abbess of Romsey. He and his entourage rode their horses to the door of the Abbey; Ethelfleda hurriedly dressed Edgyth as a nun and had her kneel at the altar. The Abbess told the King that the princess had taken vows of chastity and belonged to Christ but the King insisted on searching the abbey; he did not notice the nun kneeling at the altar so departed disappointed.

For many years this story was treated as mythology but in 1839 some credence was given when a leaden coffin was found during excavations near the abbey. It was dated from the Saxon period and contained only a tress of auburn hair in an oak box.

The White Horse Hotel in Romsey was built in the 16th century and still displays wall paintings for that period. In the U.K. hotels of that age are not specially uncommon, the oldest continuously licensed hotel may be The Bingley Arms in Yorkshire, established in 953.

Another feature of Romsey is the statue of Lord Palmerston on a plinth in the marketplace. Nearby is the big white house in extensive grounds "Broadlands" where Palmerston lived for most of his life. Born Henry John Temple in 1784 he became the Third Viscount Palmerston; he was a politician all his life and died as Prime Minister of Britain in 1865.



Since the Union Jack was first flown from a pole in Sydney on 26th January, 1788, there have been 9 monarchs of Britain. It was King

George III's health which was toasted in 1788; he was born in London in 1738, his father was from the House Hanover and his wife was Princess of Micklenburg-Strelkik. George III was popular with all classes of his subjects but sadly his health failed; he lost his sight and his sanity and died in 1820. He was succeeded by his eldest son who became King George IV. This George had many flirtations and ran up huge personal debts. In 1795 he married Princess Caroline of Brunswick in return for parliament paying off his 650,000 pound debts. This marriage rather cramped his social style (he was only 33 years old)

and he was evidently not enthusiastic about Caroline; he was trying to find a way to divorce her, when she suddenly died in 1821 - the nation mourned her passing even if George did-

n't. He was only 68 years old when he died in 1830, leaving to the nation a valuable collection of books and paintings in Windsor and Brighton.

King George IV was succeeded on the throne by a younger brother as King William IV who is best remem bered as the "sailor king" as he had joined the Royal No. , as a 14 year old, serving in America and the West Indies. In 1789 at age 24 he was created Duke of Clarence and St. Andrews and Earl of Munster with an allowance of 12,000 pounds per year. He continued in the Navy, rising to the rank of Admiral in 1811. From 1790 to 1811 he lived with an Irish actress Dorothy Jordan, who bore him 10 children of whom the eldest inherited the title Earl of Munster.

In 1818 King William married Adelaide the daughter of the Duke of Saxe-Meiningen. The capital of South Australia was named in honour of Queen Adelaide and Woodleys still sell some of their wine with a picture of her on the label. Adelaide produced two daughters both of whom died in infancy so when King William IV died in 1837 he was succeeded on the throne of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland by his 18 year old niece Alexandrina Victoria, daughter of George III's fourth son Edward and Victoria Maria Loisa of Saxe Coburg.

Queen Victoria was crowned at Westminster on 28th Jurie, 1838. Although when she was growing up in the Duke of

Kent's house, Kensington Palace, the prospect of her becoming Queen was not contemplated, she proved to be well suited to the task. In the first three years of her rule she was given frequent guidance by her uncle, Leopold King of

Belgium and by her Prime Minister Palmerston - perhaps she occasionally visited Palmerston at Romsey on her way to the Isle of Wight.

In 1840 at age 21 Queen Victoria married Prince Albert of Sax-Coburg and Gothra and they had 9 children. The united Kingdom and the British Empire (on which "The sun never set") prospered and in 1876 Queen Victoria was able to add Empress of India to her titles. The disrepute into which the monarch's role had fallen under her licentious old uncles George IV and William IV was restored to an office of public duty, family care and personal restraint

Sadly, her consort Albert died in 1861. This sent Victoria into a state of depression from which she never fully recovered; she spent increasing periods away from London, either at

Osborne House or at Balmoral Castle where she had an unusual personal relationship with her highland gillie, John Brown.

There were great celebrations in London and throughout the Empire when Victoria's reign reached the Golden Jubilee on 21st June, 1887 and again on 22nd June, 1897 for the Diamond Jubilee. More than 2 million people attended each event in London.

The Golden Jubilee was marked by the first Colonial Conference to discuss defence and communications and lasted far more than a month. All the Australian premiers and their wives went to London for the 1897 celebrations and the premiers were created members of Victoria's Privy Council. Victoria travelled in an ornate carriage

awn by 8 cream ponies in the procession from Buckingham Palace to St. Paul's Cathedral. In the 1880's and 1890's there was vigorous debate on Republicanism in the

Australian States but they settled and loyalty to the monarchy continued.


One of Victoria's last official acts was to sign the Act of Assent to Australia's Constitution so in 1901 the Commonwealth of Australia arose from the colonial governments.

Queen Victoria died on 22nd January, 1901. She had reigned for 63 years and 7 months. Tributes were paid by the editors of the "Romsey Examiner" and "Lancefield Mercury" in the Australian State named in honour of Queen Victoria.

Her 60 year old son acceded to the throne as King Edward VII. He had married the glamorous Princess Alexandra of Denmark who produced two sons and 3 daughters. In

general Edward and Alexandra lived a life of frivolity: Edward had many mistresses and devoted much of his time to yachting, horse racing and the theatre. Edward died in 1910 and Alexandra in 1925.

DON'T RISK FIRE IN YOUR DRYER



It had to come however the sudden change in the weather may have caught a number of people off guard. Ron ColeRomsey Captain offers this advice:

"We all leave some of our maintenance jobs until we really need to do them, like sweeping the chimney, cleaning out the drier and heater. What usually happens? We promise ourselves that we will do jobs when there's a break in the weather. In the winters around here that may be October! In the meantime there is further build-up of lint, dust or soot and the risk of a major fire increases. Throwing wet or damp clothing into the clothes dryer is a tempting option, particularly in winter when it can

rain for days at a time. But don't forget, drying clothes creates a fire risk. Clogged lint filters can easily catch alight, and not letting the dryer run through its cool-down phase can also be dangerous.

Taking short cuts can cause difficulties. People who whip clothes out of the dryer and switch it off before the cooldown cycle, are asking for trouble," Ron said. "Tea towels which aren't grease-free, even after washing, can catch fire in a domestic dryer. Underwire bras are also a hazard, because the wire can work itself free of the garment and catch in the drum, preventing the dryer from operating safely."

And care is also needed when using electric blankets, he added. But much of the danger can be removed by simply making the bed and checking the blanket is off each morning. "You shouldn't be sleeping with the electric blanket on. But making the bed means you can check each morning to ensure it hasn't been left on," Ron said.

Electric blankets need to be tightly-secured and free of crumples and creases, which can damage the wires and cause fires, and prevents the controls becoming twisted or caught in between mattress and bed linen.

"Electric blankets should be stored flat, not folded. They can be left on the bed year-round, or hanging them up in the wardrobe is a good idea. We also recommend you get your blanket checked by a professional at the beginning of each winter."

Gas Wall Oven Safety Alert

CFA, Office of Gas Safety (Victoria) and the Plumbing Industry Commission advise that the following wall ovens may have been installed incorrectly. The two models concerned are:

WESTINGHOUSE SEPARATE GRILL GAS WALL OVEN Model Numbers: GWH 538, GWH 540, GWH 645, GWH 745 Installed October 1998 to 2002

CHEF SEPARATE GRILL GAS WALL OVEN Model numbers: GXC 611, GXC 641, GXC 651 Installed August 2001 to 2002

These models of oven require a flue pipe. The flue pipe must be installed and terminated correctly.

This safety alert has been issued because an incorrect installation has caused a house fire, and other incorrect installations have been found. Correct installation in a two-storey house is difficult if not impossible. The absence of the proper flue can cause nearby combustible materials to be affected and eventually to ignite. This process may take a number of years. CFA advices that if you have this particular model installed you should not use it until the installer, or a qualified gas fitter has checked the installation. If you cannot arrange this checking contact the Office of Gas Safety on toll free 1800 069 588 during business hours. You will need to supply the name of the installer or the builder, and the number of any Certificate of Compliance that may have been issued. The Office will then arrange for checking. The Deep Creek Landcare Group hosted an informative morning at Whitebridge, Lancefield on 21st April, in which over 40 enthusiastic people attended. The purpose of the day was to provide information about.

Lachlan Milne from M.R.S.C. spoke about ways of identifying indigenous plant species and how to match species to certain situations, eg some species prefer to grow along creeks whilst others prefer sloping ground. Lachlan discussed fencing off remnant vegetation and other environmental issues.

Jim Robinson from Greening Australia described different methods relating to collecting and propagating seed from indigenous species, with the aid of dozens of examples of seeds. Jim also spoke about the process of using a direct seeding machine to plant trees and shrubs as an alternative to using tube stock. The direct seeding machine is available free of charge with technical advice included. Contact Penny Richards at the Port Phillip Catchment Board. A B-B-Q lunch was enjoyed afterwards.

The Deep Creek Landcare Group meet on the second Monday of the month at 8pm, Lancefield Mechanics Institute Hall. Next meeting is June 10th.


INDIGENOUS PLANT PROFILE

Woolly Tea-tree Leptospermum lanigerum

The Woolly Tea-tree is a very attractive shrub which can grow between 3 – 6 metres in height. It grows in a range of soils, however, it is often found along creeks as an important understory plant. The Woolly Tea-tree is also a useful plant within a garden situation. It grows very well in a wet position and pruning encourages density, to make it a useful screening plant. Foliage is grey with new foliage having a silver, hairy appearance. Masses of white flowers appear from September to January. The Woolly Tea-tree is quick to establish in my Romsey garden, growing over 1 metre in 5 months with only a couple of summer waterings to promote successful establishment.

Silver Banksia Banksia marginata

The Silver Banksia ranges in height from 2 – 10 metres with a spread of 1 – 5 metres (depending on soil and water conditions). It grows in a variety of situations, preferring good drainage but will tolerate wet winter and dry summer soils. Foliage is stiff with silver underneath. Attractive flowers ranging from pale to bright yellow measuring from 40 – 100mm long appear from September to April. Banksia flowers and seeds are an excellent food source for native birds. In the garden situation, regular pruning encourages dense growth which is ideal for screening and hedging. Banksias look effective when planted in groups.

IDENTIFICATION & PLANT CLASSIFICATION

Whether the Story of Creation as a 'balance' to the Theory of Evolution should be taught in schools as proposed by some writers, I leave to the judgement of others. Nevertheless, as any keen student of nature will observe, there is often considerable diversity within a species and many affinities between species, genera, families and so on up the scale and hence much dissent among scientists as to where one species etc. ends and another begins – especially within the Plant Kingdom – one of the reasons for many of the name changes which so confuse the lay person.

As most observers will have noticed, neither plants nor animals are born with labels attached and the classification of living things into species, genera, families etc. is merely a convenient device established by Carl Von Linne (1707-78) to facilitate international understanding between scientists and other individuals, to which plants and animals have sometimes declined to conform. This is of course, not the only reason for name changes. In other cases plants have been brought into cultivation under a name given in ignorance of an earlier given name, in which case, the Law of Priority should be adhered to.

In other cases, name change is not involved, merely a correction of an error in identification by someone introducing or describing a plant found in the wild or in cultivation. Such errors, omissions, misspellings and other valid reasons as outlined in the Botanical Code often need to be corrected to avoid confusion. As common names vary from time to time and place to place, as well as between languages, their identification with those of ancient times is of course virtually impossible with any degree of certainty. It is interesting to note that the common fruit we know as 'pineapple' is known by the botanical name 'Ananas' in 23 European languages as well as in Pidgin English in some parts of Papua-New Guinea!

A typical example of confusion in changing common names is the use of 'Bird of Paradise' by some nurseries for *Strelitzia reginae* mentioned by Ernest E. Lord in his 'Shrubs and Trees For Australian Gardens' who cites the name 'Crane Flower' as used in its South African homeland and recommends that the name 'Bird of Paradise' be retained for *Caesalpinea gilliesii* (*Poinciana*) by which it has been known in Victoria for many years as has the name 'Bird's Tongue Flower' for *Strelitzia*. It is worth noting however, that although 'Bird's Tongue Flower' is applied to *Strelitzia* by Harold Sargent in 'Garden Trees & Shrubs in Australia' and 'Bird of Paradise Flower' to *Caesalpinea*, Bailey's Hortus Second refers it to *Strelitzia!*.

While the use of common names where no confusion is likely to occur and exact identification is not required, is quite adequate, the use of scientific names may be considered absurd. To suggest to a farmer that he should tell someone to "take the Canis familiaris down to the Eucalyptus camaldulensis and get a couple of Oryctolagus cuniculus" instead of "take the dog down to the red gums and get a couple of rabbits", may not be appropriate!

Fancy names given to new cultivated plants by nursery men are covered by the International Code of Monenclature of Cultivated Plants published by the International Bureau for Plant Taxonomy and Nomenclature which attempts to set standard rules for naming of plants originating in cultivation

In addition, there are growers' rights which protect use of registered names by original growers, the commercial propagation of registered plants and copyright protection for such names as Nellie Kelly for passionfruit plants produced by a particular nursery rather than a particular variety, the alleged infringement of which was the subject of litigation in the mid 1900s that sounded a warning for the unauthorised use of such names.
