3.30pm. The daily school pick-up... park the car. In the distance you see little Suzi and Jack running towards the car with excitement, cause they can't wait see you and boy you've missed them. The children climb into the back seat. Asking with interest, "How was your day possums?" "Oh, alright" is the usual reply, "Mum, Mrs. Peters said I've got nits" states Suzi loudly. "Shut the door quickly,' I say as I die of embarrassment, because Kaye parked beside me looks over attentively.

Quickly I head to the nearest Chemist to purchase another bottle of Headlice treatment "Good Grief, Not Again" I say loudly to myself upon entering the Chemist, I'm dying of embarrassment still, because the Pharmacist served me not long ago when I brought my last \$12.00 bottle of Headlice treatment. What will he think?

This scenario, I'm sure is a familiar one for most parents. When our children get Headlice, our only option is to buy over the counter products, which don't seem to work, or if they do, you still need two or three treatments. This can be quite expensive. That's the experience I've had with treatments. Our large family previously lived in Sunbury. Every few months someone seemed to become infected. I'd do all the right things. Tie their hair back, bath them every two days. They would still get nits! Thank goodness, I could go down to the Hume Council Office and buy six bottles of Lice Rid for each of my children for \$1.00 per 20ml and one for me, because my children just love cuc' dles.

Two years ago, our family relocated to Riddell. To my despair within a short time we had nits again... Off I go down to Macedon Council Offices to purchase Lice Rid again... To my frustration Macedon Ranges, do not supply Lice Rid to its residents and haven't for a few years. They felt their residents were able to purchase treatment from the chemist themselves. This made me feel quite disappointed in the fact that Hume, cared about its children's health, yet Macedon Ranges didn't feel it was important. "Shame on you Macedon"!! Upon discussing the issue with Mr. Jeff Innes, Macedon Ranges Health Office, he said "his hands were tied unless there was pressure to do so." Helpfully, he suggested parents contact our council members to bring back the supply of Lice Rid. Well us parents and residents of this shire need to pressure the council. Unless we speak up nothing will change. Mr. Innes said by writing to him or council members this will help him to help us. Our children are important too!!

Classroom Helpers Program

We have started the classroom helpers program for a large and enthusiastic group of parents. This five-week program provides training about literacy and helping groups and individual children in the classroom. Through activities and discussion parents are provided with information on how to assist children with their reading and writing, spelling, listening and speaking. The program covers teaching ideas, strategies to improve spelling, reading, writing, and prompts to use with children. While the program is focused on parents who plan to assist in classroom activities, it also gives these parents a great insight to their TOGETHER WE LEARN AND GROW own children's learning and literacy development as so provides parents with great strategies to use at home.



Prep Parent Information

The school's transition program for preps to school continued this term with our prep students attending school for the half days during January (2 days) and attending for four full days each week throughout February, having a rest day on Wednesdays. Prep teachers held additional information sessions during the second two weeks of school. At this time the initial start of school program was outlined as well as the daily timetable, our basic approach to learning, particularly literacy and day-to-day issues of the school routine and classroom program. All of our preps have settled into school very well and are well on the way to a successful learning journey at school.

Values Education- A Quality Beginning

During the first seven days of school all students explored our values and worked to better understand how to live them. While focussing on learning each class decided how they would define quality work, which they call "5 star work." Students have also set their own learning goals for this term. They will have been sharing these with their parents at the first round of parent/ teacher interviews last week.

All classes have started to work on finding opportunities for improvement in their classroom learning environment. This empowers students to take greater control and responsibility for more of what happens within the classroom. Class meetings complement this and will be held on a weekly basis throughout the year.





Book Reviews From Mitchell Library

Wire for Hire - Dianne Blacklock

Last year when I reviewed Dianne Blacklock's first book 'Call Waiting', I made the comment that I could hardly wait for her next one. Well it has arrived and 'Wife for Hire' is yet another great read. So good in fact that as I was voraciously devouring it at 3am in one morning, Peter reminded me that I only had 4 hours of sleeping time left... and nothing gets between me and my sleep, except perhaps a good book! Samantha Driscoll's idyllic world mother, wife to Jeff and occupier of an oversized house in an up market suburb - is shattered when Jeff informs her that he is having an affair. As she had been accusing him of this for years it wasn't so much his infidelity that floored her as the time he chose to tell her - they had just refinanced their mortgage! She finds herself coping solo with the children, the bills and a total reassessment of her life. but with a crazy bunch of friends, a new job and the oh so elusive Hal Buchanan she has very little time to feel sorry for berself. A well-paced and compulsive little read.

Stupid White Men...and other sorry excuses for the state of the nation. – Michael Moore

Well, what can one say about this book that hasn't already been said? It was all published, ready to distribute, when September 11 happened and just missed out on being pulped, as some of the chapters in it were seen as unpatriotic in the wake of the attack on the American people. Personally I think that as Michael Moore hasn't been sued for its contents then his comments about contemporary American society, and George W in particular, must be

quite accurate and as a result make for illuminating reading. For instance did you know that, as the USA doesn't have anything like the Australian Electoral Commission - which not only supervises all voting but actually declares 'the winner', that it was the Fox News Channel that declared George W. Bush had won Florida and therefore the election – and this before votes had even finished being counted! Why? Well it just may have had something to do with the fact that the man in charge of Fox's election coverage is first cousin to George W. and brother Jeb, who was Governor of Florida at the time. Interested in finding out more...then read on, as it is a compelling and engrossing read.

The Same Stuff as Stars - Katherine Patterson

The latest book from Katherine Patterson is yet another great little read. She has always drawn her characters well and succeeds in engaging the reader's sympathy or contempt for them in just a few pages, as well as telling an excellent story, and this book is no exception. Angel and her brother Bernie have the most useless, selfish mother who decides that she has had enough of the responsibility for them and dumps them at their greatgrandmother's house. With their father in jail the children just have to make the best of it. 11 year old Angel finds herself being both mother to Bernie and carer to her grandma and wonders what she has done wrong. If it wasn't for the mysterious 'Starman' to show her all the wonders of the starry sky then life would be abysmal. But when her brother Bernie disappears she has to confront the fact that the only person she can really rely on is herself.

We have already done forward planning with Clarkefield and Darraweit Guim schools, where we come together for sports days, an Olympic Day, visiting performers, cultural activities and joint school days. This gives our children the opportunity to mix in with others as part of the process of learning to participate and enjoy activities in a happy environment.

V nave commenced an Activities Program with the aid of 9 parents who are giving their time to help the small groups of children keen to improve their skills in activities

such as gardening, cooking, sewing, bike riding, chess and computing.

The new Children's Fundraising Committee which comprises four Grade 6 students, have decided to have their first activity in support of the "National Sunnies for Sight Day" which we also participated in last year. For every \$5 raised, an underprivileged child can have an eye examination, get a pair of suitable glasses and gain the enjoyment of learning to read and have a successful education. The Committee have decided to expand this day to beach shirts and board shorts as well as wearing their extra special decorative sunnies.

All schools have many hard workers behind the scenes that help the school in ways that everyone does not often see and don't necessarily know about. This is often the case during school holidays. People who water gardens, clean out chook pens, sweep pathways, check out water pumps, cut grass, check spouting, mend desks, wash tables and a lot of other little jobs that just have to be done. In a small school like ours, people just tend to jump in and help where and when they can. We have also had our major "Back to School" working bee and family sausage sizzle where a lot of work was done around the school. This all helps to make the school environment a little more pleasant and enjoyable for children to come along to each day. A very big 'Thank You' to all the helpers.



What's News

In polite company, it's considered good etiquette not to discuss religion or politics, but to focus instead on things like the weather. Since I consider religion to be political pretty much by definition, and I won't be doing my job if I don't talk about religion, it might be best if I avoid polite company. This is, of course, no reflection on whomever I happen to talk to when down the street!

But even discussing the weather can turn religious or political. As I write this, we are recovering after a couple of sweltering days. Fortunately, there were no serious bushfire outbreaks during this time, and I hope and pray that nothing has changed by the time you read this.

Extreme heat brings to my mind drought, and for us, that also means water restrictions. Whilst these circumstances make it difficult for us and our gardens, it is even more difficult and frustrating for farmers, even (or perhaps especially) irrigation farmers.

Over the past decade or so, there has been much discussion about changing weather patterns. Some of this discussion has centred on the Spanish brat 'El Nino', and his little sister, 'La Nina'. Others have focussed on 'global warming' and the 'greenhouse effect.' However, since El Nino and La Nina are determined by the Southern Oscillation Index (temperature variations in the Southern Pacific Ocean), and it is the ocean temperatures that 'prove' global warming, then everyone is really talking about different aspects of the same thing. And what that boils down to is the impact human beings are having on the earth and weather patterns. (See, I told you it would become religious and political).

One of the problems with discussing the 'greenhouse effect' (and several other issues) is that science is not usually as definitive as some would lead us to believe. What is clear is that humans make a difference to the world. Fossil fuels, waste disposal, water management, farming practices, etc. all impact on the environment in which we live. And part of our problem is that we don't fully understand the impact we are having because we don't fully understand the world.

It might be naïve and easy to say that God made the world, so God alone knows how all the elements work together, and God alone can fix any problems that we, as part of God's creation, cause. But there is a sense in which this is right. If we don't understand the world, then how can we 'do the right thing', whatever that may be?

In one sense, it comes down to self-preservation and selfinterest. There's not much point in ravaging the world if we want to continue to live here. Planning, care and concern for the world, care and concern for future generations, these are the starting points for making a difference.

And at the heart is thinking beyond me, here and now. I believe that from that starting point, we can do much more than just ensure the survival of the species. We can thrive as human beings.


