

A NEIGHBOURHOOD HOUSE FOR ROMSEY—A STEP CLOSER

A very informative public meeting was held on September 22nd to explore the possibility of establishing a Neighbourhood House and Learning Centre in Romsey.

Speakers on the night included State Member for Macedon Joanne Duncan and Macedon Ranges Shire Council Community Development Project Officer Anne-Louise Lindner. Additional information was offered by the coordinators of the Woodend and Lancefield Neighbourhood Houses, Kathy Dent and Vivien Philipotts. The establishment of a Neighbourhood House and Learning Centre in Romsey offers many benefits to our community:

- providing opportunities for people of allages to learn new skills, build self esteem and share knowledge
- providing a community focus for the town
- providing opportunities for the people of Romsey to share social interaction in a relaxed atmosphere
- providing a local venue where people can learn new skills without having to travel out of town

to mention but a few.

There are one or two venues that potentially could house our own centre, and these are being investigated. If suitable, it may be possible to have this program up and running fairly quickly, once the appropriate organisational and legal structures are in place and a core of volunteers is established to take on the project.

We are now at the stage where we need more committed volunteers to take the project to its next step.

Don't look upon this request as a chorerather, consider it a unique opportunity to get involved in an exciting project that will have a positive impact on you and your community as a whole.

Aerobics Team Success

At the time of writing, our Junior Aerobics team is putting the finishing touches to its routine in preparation for the National Championships to be held in Sydney on 29th September. The team has, in addition to further developing its aerobics skills, been working hard on fundraising to enable the team to compete at this elite level. Our sincere thanks are extended to the numerous businesses and individuals who have supported the team in its outstanding achievements.

Zoo Excursion - Studies of Asia focus

During the second last week of term all Romsey Primary School students participated in an excursion to the Melbourne Zoo. This wonderful experience was linked to our Studies of Asia program. Classes attended special sessions at the zoo from educational staff to give our students greater insights to the issues surrounding the preservation and care of wildlife in Asia. Our upper students program was "Jumbo Dilemmas" with the junior students program being "My Mahout and Me." Naturally this experience has resulted in a great deal of discussion, writing and art work back at school following this excursion.



Beat Concert

On 8th September students from Romsey Primary School combined with students from fifteen other district schools for the annual "Beat Concert" in Kyneton. As well as our students in the choir, ensemble and strings group having the opportunity to share their skills and perform for a large audience; this was a great opportunity for our students to see the musical offerings from students in other schools. The consistently high quality music that our students perform is a testament to the dedication and enthusiasm of teachers and students in all participating schools.

Athletics

On the 1" September the whole school combined for our school sports/ mini Olympics day. While the junior classes participated in a range of activities in their "country" teams, the upper students competed in more conventional athletics activities in preparation for the Cobaw Inter-school athletics day held on 14th September. At the Cobaw sports day we had a large number of winners with these students now eligible to continue on to the zone championships in Bendigo next term. Winners in this competition are then able to progress to the State championships later in the year.



Literacy Week

Our students and staff celebrated Literacy Week during the first week in September. Students made book character masks in the weeks leading up to Literacy Week, and these were on display throughout the week. Additionally, all classes had discussed and chosen a special book for a classroom doorway decoration which was completed during this week. We also had students completing a whole school story which the preps commenced and was completed by our senior students. Each day the whole school listened to a serial story read by our principal at the commencement of lunchtime. The week concluded with a performance of "Knock, Knork," This was a highly entertaining show that focused on box book characters. All students also had the opportunity to perticipate in a whole school book quiz. There can be no doubt that our students love books and reading, and really enjoyed the special activities that celebrated this. As part of the Literacy Week celebrations, the school received a generous donation of books from Romsey- Lancefield Rotary Club. The school sincerely thanks Rotary for this continuing support in assisting us to foster the acquisition of life-long literacy skills. amongst our students.

LIBRARY UPDATE

NEW LIBRARY SERVICE FOR THE EAST OF THE SHIRE

Macedon Ranges Shire Council is about to call tenders for a new library provider to replace the mobile library when Mitchell Shire Council discontinues the service at the end of October. Advertisements will appear in The Age and local papers commencing 18 September.



Macedon Ranges Shire Council has explored a range of options to replace the current service. The options included joining the area to Goldfields Library Corporation, operating the library itself, and calling tenders for another provider to provide the service. Based on the very high cost of establishing a Council-owned library service and the very limited book stock it would be able to afford, Council decided to publicly advertise for a new library service provider. Tendering also enables Council to work towards its longer term goal of operating all the libraries in the shire itself without tying itself to another provider for an indefinite period.

Tenders will invite other library providers to either provide a replacement mobile library service to the towns of Riddells. Creek, Romsey, Lancefield and Derrawelt Guim <u>OR</u> a part-time branch library in the former Council chamber in Romsey. Both options are included in the tender specification to ensure Council retains some flexibility if no tenders are received for a mobile library service.

If the branch library option is decided, Council will convert the old Council chamber at the Romsey Service Centre as a temporary location. Funds have been allocated to renovate and modify this area so it is more suitable for library use. The longer term, a new purpose-built library is planned. Timing for a new library will depend on funding opportunities. J budget priorities, but at the moment Council is hopeful that initial planning will commence as early as 2005/06 and construction in the following year.

COUNCIL INCREASES FUNDING TO LIBRARIES

Macedon Ranges Shire Council has allocated an additional \$150,000 in 2004/05 to increase the total expenditure on libraries in the east of the shire to \$233,000. This includes funds to purchase 5,000 new books for the new library service and funding towards the establishment costs of the new service. The aim is to further increase book stock in the following financial year.

COUNCIL ADVOCATES FOR IMPROVED LIBRARY SERVICES TO SCHOOLS IN THE SHIRE

After consultation and feedback from schools in the shire regarding the poor level of funding for school libraries. Council has written to the Department of Education seeking a commitment to improve funding to schools. As a follow-up to the letter, Council's Mayor, John Connor and Director Community Services, Anne McLennan aim to meet with the Regional Director for the Department of Education and Training to discuss these concerns.

LIBRARY ADVISORY COMMITTEE FORMED

Council has recently formed a Library Advisory Committee to provide advice and guidance on all matters relating to the development of library services in the shire. Four community members were nominated and selected to be members on the committee. There are also two representatives from the newly-formed Friends of Macedon Ranges Libraries' and ex-officio membership of the two current library providers - Goldfields Library Corporation and Mitchell Shire ""uncil. Councillors Todd and Guthrie were elected as Councillor representatives.

Patersons Curse – it's not as pretty as it looks

Now is the time to get on top of Paterson's curse – the noxious weed with a purple flower that can be poisonous to livestock, is very invasive and hard to control.

In recent weeks Macedon Ranges Shire Council has employed a contractor to control Paterson's Curse growing on roadsides in the south-east of the Shire. This will reduce part of the risk of the weed being spread along roadsides.

Paterson Curse has never been a large problem in the Macedon Ranges Shire, but it will be if we don't act on small infestations now, and prevent large infestations from spreading.

Now is the time to get on top of those small patches of weed to prevent it becoming a major problem. The cost of controlling small infestations is insignificant compared to the work required to control large areas. In some cases only one or two plants need to be dug out.

Do not slash any mature plants as this will cause the weed to spread rapidly and large areas should be sprayed prior to flowering with a selective herbicide.

Livestock owners should ensure they do not purchase feed contaminated with weeds as Paterson's Curse is commonly spread in hay and soil movement.

By spending a small amount of effort on control now you can protect your property values, agricultural production and the environment. Please contact Macedon Ranges Shire Council to report Paterson's Curse on roadsides or dig out individual plants. Jesus and John the Baptist

One day Jesus was answering people who were curious about his relationship to John his pre-curser. John was very popular with the people and had gathered a great following and many had been baptized by him.

I suppose John was like many of the popular religious figures of our day, way-out, distinctly different, dressed in animail skins and eating "locusts and wild honey". If he appeared today he would probably have a great following too!

Jesus, on the other hand ate with "tax-collectors and sinners", mixed with rich and poor alike and didn't seem to have too much trouble moving in all areas of society. Mind you he was pretty uncomfortable at times, because he was not slow to make pointed comments about life and situations.

In Luke's Gospel, Chapter 7, verses 31 to 35, he tells people they are like "children playing games". John he said, came fasting and dressed in strange clothes and religious people said he was mad, Jesus came eating and drinking with people and they said he was a "wine drinker and a glutton"! Our world tends to be like this.

The difference is, the games we play on an international and national level are very dangerous games, not like child's-play at all. We are incapable it seems of talking, discussing, consulting, listening or addressing issues of poverty, injustice, difference and so on.

This, it seems, is too adult!

We prefer "children's games", retaliating, shouting abuse, throwing things, being greedy and sulking when we don't get our own way. Sounds like our dangerous world doesn't it.

We can check up on our own attitudes too, while we are criticising the world.

How do we respond to our own private world? What are our relationships like with family, neighbours and friends? Are we prepared to sit down, to listen, to discuss, to attempt reconciliation and work out reasonable responses to our personal situation? Or do we prefer "children's games," and try to settle scores by getting even, becoming bitter and fighting to the last.

We can never win that way! We may perhaps win a battle but we lose the war and become angry, bitter, disappointed and lonely in the final event.

Or, we could try Jesus' way and "love our enemies and pray for those who despitefully use us".



TENDERS CALLED FOR NEW LIBRARY SERVICE

The Macedon Ranges Shire Council has called for tenders for a new library service for Romsey and Lancefield, Mount. William ward councillor Henry Bleeck has advised. Cr Bleeck said he was committed to having a library service available. for residents of the towns, and to ensure that access continues after the Mitchell Shire discontinues its mobile service at the end of October.

"The tenders have invited other library services to either provide a replacement mobile library to Romsey, Lancefield, Riddells Creek, and Damsweit Guim or a part-time branch library in the old Council chamber in Romsey," Cr Bleeck said. "If we decide on the branch option, Council will convert the old chamber as a temporary location. Funds have already been allocated to renovate and modify it to suit a library. In the longer term, a new purpose-built library is planned. Timing for a new library will depend on funds and budget priorities, but I expect that initial planning will commence later next year."

Cr Bleeck said the Council had allocated an extra \$150,000 in 2004/05 to increase the total spending on libraries in the east of the shire to \$233,000. This includes money to buy 5000 new books for the new library service and funding towards its establishment costs. The Council has also written to the Department of Education seeking a commitment to improve funding to local school libraries.

"Libraries are a vital resource for the community, both for children needing to learn and for adults as a basis for learning and recreation," Cr Bleeck said. "I will be strongly promoting initiatives in Council to ensure that we end up with the best ossible service for Romsey and Lancefield."

Walking School Bus Program receives \$55,000



Macedon Ranges Shire Council has received \$55,000 over two years from VicHealth to implement a Walking School Bus Program in the Shire.

The Walking School Bus is an exciting program that encourages more primary school children to walk safely to and from school. A volunteer "driver" walks at the head of the bus and a volunteer "conductor" at the rear, with children taking their walking "seats" in pairs in between. The bus picks up children from designated stops along the route to school.

Parents can be confident their children will have a safe walking journey as all "bus routes" will be safety audited by Council, and all volunteers will be trained, supervised and police checked.

Council's Manager of Community Development, Angie Laussel said, "This program makes walking fun for children, and getting to school an adventure. Importantly, parents know their children are supervised, and will arrive at school safely. And of course, the children and the volunteers increase their overall fitness."

Council will work in partnership with six local schools to implement the Walking School Bus in the first year. Several schools have already indicated they would like to come on board, but all schools will be formally invited to express interest in joining the program.

"We are keen to have involvement from a mix of pry schools, from larger and smaller towns, spread across the Shire," Ms Laussel said. "Schools in the Macedon Ranges can be proud of the work they have done to promote traffic awareness and road safety. The Walking School Bus Program is another way they can do this, while promoting a healthy activity and reducing reliance on cars at the same time. We encourage all primary schools to become involved."

A Macedon Ranges Walking School Bus Kit will also be developed and distributed to all local schools. The kit would be based on Vic Health's Walking School Bus Guide for Parents and Teachers, with additional information about resources, support and experiences specific to the Macedon Ranges Shire.

Jubilation for 'Colourbration'

20

On behalf of the Victorian Central Region of the Australian Alpaca Association please let me tell you about our Victorian Spring Colourbration Carnival, held this year for the first time in Lancefield in the heartland of our region. The name Colourbration is intended to be an amalgam of the words Celebration and Colour - hence Colourbration. A deliberate Celebration of the alpaca rain-

Colourbration was held over two days. It was conducted as a carnival of alpaca events with: Guest speakers: Bill Robbins on "Line Breeding in Alpacas", Elizabeth Paul on "Colour Genetics", and Alan Frampton on "Don't Send your Fibre up the Khyber!" Craft workshops: Victorian Machine Knitters Association, Judy Craig on "Felting with Alpaca", and Nerida Aldred with one-on-one hands on Team (halter training).

Fashion parades, trade stalls including local wineries and all sorts of alpaca wear & products were held, as well as an alpaca swap meet where animals and/ or services were swapped and sold, a social evening dinner and fun auction, and eight separate shows judged across the two days.

In our inaugural Colourbration Carnival this year we attracted 201 animal entries with 26 fleece entries across the eight individual shows over the weekend. WOW! In our first Colourbration we instantly became the fourth largest alpaca show in Victoria.

Our goals in running Colourbration are broadly:

- To provide a career path for non-white/light fawn alpacas which provides a positive incentive for genetic improvement amongst coloured alpacas.
- To foster a climate of welcoming encouragement to small breeders such that the process of alienation and fragmentation within the industry is arrested. Hence, Colourbration.

In this show structure each alpaca is judged against its colour-mates. White is judged against white for Supreme White, brown is judged against brown for Supreme Brown, grey is judged against grey for Supreme Grey, etc. We have eight separate shows. Six of these are for huacaya, two for suri (currently Coloured Suri and Light Suri.) Because this was an inaugural show we only held 6 sections per show (junior male/female, intermediate male/female, adult male/female). Supreme for each show was selected from the blue (first) ribbon winners from each section.

Don't for one minute think that the standard of alpacas was allowed to slip. Bill Robbins was our judge over the two days and rigorously applied the judging standards of the AAA yet his closing comments related to his delight at the standard of alpacas we are now seeing in the show rings.

What's News

So, we finally have a date set for the federal election. Many people will, however, be sick and tired of electioneering by the time it comes to cast our votes.

Does it really matter who we vote for? After all, there will still be a government, we will still be the same country, and whoever is elected will surely be able to manage

things for three years.

According to statistics, 60-80% know exactly who we will vote for, and have done so for quite some time. We may have chosen a party for their ideology, or the general thrust of their policies over time. However, it's the 20-40% of 'swinging' voters that decide each election. And it's these voters that the political parties attempt to sway. It's unlikely that a swinging voter will be persuaded by ideology, but I think it's helpful to understand where each party has come from. In very simplistic (and I hope even-handed) terms, Liberals stand for freedom (liberty), Nationals stand for farmers, Labor stands for justice (equality), and the Greens stand for the environment. All are worthwhile. Which means the most to you? Is it enough to win your vote?

It is much more likely that a swinging voter will decide who to vote for based on a particular policy. Which policy will depend on the particular concerns of the voter. The campaign managers are telling us it is the economy, or healthcare, or education, or the environment, or security, or whatever else they think differentiates them from the others.

My view is that my vote is important. It reflects my values, what I hold to be important. There will need to be some belancing of pros and cons, as I'm sure that no one party will have what I'm looking for on every issue. But what will matter most to me on election day are those things that I feel passionate about, and the party that addresses them 'the best'.

As you vote, I invite you to think about what matters to you. What is important in your life and to your family? What sort of policies will make Australia a 'better' place for you and your children in the years ahead? They may be different to mine, but they are important to you. Your vote is about your integrity. Take it seriously, for the sake of the future.


