Local Response to Tsunami Disaster

Macedon Ranges Mayor John Connor has expressed his deep sorrow at the enormous loss resulting from the tsunami disaster last month. He said councillors, council staff and people from local communities join the world community in extending their condolences to those affected.

"This disaster has caused devastation beyond our comprehension. That the tragedy has happened at a time when our thoughts are particularly with family and friends makes this all the more heart-wrenching," he said.

To raise money for the tsunami disaster relief effort, Macedon Ranges Shire Council and local community representatives are organising a benefit concert, to be held 2pm-5pm on Sunday 30 January 2005 at Kyneton Town Hall. Council's Community Development Manager, Angie Laussel said confined performers include Debra Byrne, Broderick Smith, Rob Smithies and 10-piece brass ensemble from the Victorian State Orchestra, Bob Bright, musicians from the Melbourne Highlands Pipe Band, the Bobsydie bush band, with Marty Field as compere.

"We will also hold a charity auction, with all proceeds from the day going to the relief effort," she said.

Ms Laussel said she was particularly interested in hearing from local businesses that are able to donate valuable goods, services, a hospitality package - anything that might raise funds through auction. "In the meantime, we would encourage those affected by the disaster to contact the Department of Human Services' Tsunami Hotline on 1800 057 111 for support," she said.



Start of School 2005



From the Acting Vicar:

The tsunami in Asia has certainly triggered a great deal of discussion about the meaning or purpose of life and the activity of God in these disasters. The basic question being, "How could a loving God allow such a thing to happen?"

As we look at our world we see a number of different ways of classifying disasters. In previous times, disasters like tsunamis or earthquakes, mudslides and so on were called "acts of God" and frequently this meant that they were not covered in the policy. We now call these *Natural Disasters* leaving God out of the equation and presumably not holding him responsible!

A second form of disaster is that caused by human intervention, like deliberately lit bushfires, or the Iraq war, (or any war for that matter!) or child slavery and so on.

nese disasters may be sudden and overwhelming or ...ay be on-going and long lasting. Some may question why God allows these to continue, while others would say God asks why we humans allow them to continue. They are the result of human greed, jealousy, irrational rage and so on.

The third form I suggest, is that over which we have little control but which we do have the means to investigate and do something about, like sickness. Tuberculosis was a great killer for many years and yet it has been greatly reduced by the concerted efforts of committed people. *AIDS* is another great scourge on the human race. Some have suggested that this is the result of an immoral lifestyle, but when we see whole families wiped out, (and in some countries whole villages!) it is obvious that whatever was the original cause it has now become a major problem for the world. Any form of serious illness is a dreadful disaster for the individual or family, and if it strikes us we cry out "Why did God do this to us?"

he question always seems to come back to the involvement of God in human affairs. By asking the question it

Christianity asserts that human beings are made in the image of God, so there is a great deal to learn about God from the way in which people respond to disaster. The great outpouring of generous financial support, of practical sympathy, and human response of horror and shock surely also reflect God's attitude to these things. The idea that God is like a puppeteer and that we, and our world are merely puppets on a string denies human dignity and worth. God has made us in his image and has put us in this earth to care for it and delight in it. When natural disasters occur we respond with love and generosity and attempt to restore the scene of the disaster to its former beauty.

When deliberately caused disasters occur we respond with outrage and anger and seek to find the person responsible or the cause and do something about it to try to prevent it happening again. This again is an indication of the human spirit's accepting responsibility for the world and seeking to make the world more secure. In this way we reflect God's attitude to these things.

And, in the case of illness, we certainly are making great progress in working towards ameliorating suffering and seeking to find cures and answers.

So, there are some things over which we can exercise some measure of control, and there are some we cannot. If we do believe that God is active in the world then we must also believe that God is active in us, since we are made in his image, and that what we do is a reflection of the ways in which God is at work. What did we learn as children? "God has no feet but ours to go, God has no voice but ours to speak, and no hands but ours to do his will." If this is true, then God has been very active in these disasters. Human hands have been very active in helping in disasters and in seeking ways to erd suffering from sickness and disease.

God is definitely at work on his world!

Ripper Reads

Dragon's Lair - Sharon Kay Penman

Sharon Penman is perhaps best known for her historical trilogy of the last of the Welsh princes (Here be Dragons, Falls the Shadow & The Reckoning - all in our collection and excellent reads) but in recent years has turned her considerable knowledge of the Middle Ages to writing medieval mysteries.

Dragon's Lair re-introduces us to The Queen's Man, Justin de Quincy, who has been sent to discover the truth about the disappearance of the Welsh ransom destined for the Queen to assist her with the release of her son, King Richard I, from a German dungeon. The complex plot and assortment of characters make for a lively read. If you enjoy this one try reading The Queen's Man, that introduces Justin de Quincy, and Cruel as the Grave as your next reads.

Bypass: the Story of a Road - Michael McGirr

Michael McGirr has only written one other book, 'The Things you get for Free', but as the old saying goes "it's the quality not the quantity that matters," and this book was worth waiting for. When he wrote his first book he was a Jesuit priest on a trip to Europe with his mother, whereas now he is married and a father as well! You might say he has had a bit of a lifestyle change and as this book tells the story of the Hume Highway, which has seen many changes during its lifetime, they are probably well suited to each other. Not only does McGirr enlighten the reader as to the road's history and characters, but cycles its entire length in order to do so. I particularly liked the story behind the Dog on the Tuckerbox. As his training to undertake this journey appears to have been minimal the word penance springs to mind. A great little read about Australia's busiest road.

Are we there yet? - Alison Lester

This is a brilliant little book. An excellent introduction to the better known tourist destinations located around Australia masquerading as a picture story book. It tells the story of 8 year old Grace's trip around Australia for a whole term with her family, as they head clockwise from South Australia to explore such delights as Rottnest Island, Kakadu, the Daintree Rainforest and the Australian Alps. Alison Lester's wonderful cartoon-style illustrations that leap and cavort in various sizes across the pages compliment the simple first-person text that is Grace's story. Although it was a decade in the making it was worth waiting for.



the high loss of life in the South Australian fires has highlighted to need to have fire prevention and protection measures in place

Until a Coroners Inquest has determined the circumstances surrounding the fatalities we can only speculate. With that in mind it would appear that all but two deaths were in cars where the occupants may have been fleeing the fire.

It does highlight the dangers of being caught on the roads in thick smoke, exposed to radiant heat.

The tragedy in South Australia is all the more poignant when the house from which one group left remained untouched.

CFA has for a number of years now urged residents to adopt Fire Plans that include whether to leave early or to stay and actively protect the property.

Actively defending the property implies that you have undertaken measures to:

- Reduce the fuel load around the house
- That you have fire-fighting equipment in good working order (this may be as simple as having a new handle in the mop)
- That you have proper clothing. Again there was television footage of approaching fires where the standard attire
 was shorts and thongs.
- Keep yourself well hydrated.

COUNCIL EFFORT IS GOING TO WASTE

Theres's good news this month for the residents of Romsey and surrounding areas, with the local waste transfer station finally coming to fruition. I pushed strongly for this facility at the by-election last year, and am pleased that we're getting the results we wanted. Allied to this is further good news on the pending closure of the Lancefield tip, and I understand the area will be rehabilitated as part of the golf course. The transfer station, on the outskirts of the town, will enable us all to better play our part in looking after the environment and recycling materials. Officially known as a refuse transfer station and materials recycling facility, it's being constructed at Johnson Crt, off Portingales Lane in an Industrial 3 Zone. A planning permit has been granted, and the plans and specifications are being drawn up now. I expect the work will go to tender late in February, with construction to start in April or May.


The project will have a number of benefits for the area, including the sealing of Portingales Lane from Romsey Rd to Johnson Crt. The Council has noted concerns from some residents about other roads being used to access the facility, and we are taking them into account. An environmental management plan will be part of the operation to ensure a minimal impact on the surrounding area. After the sorting, rubbish will be transferred to the Sunbury tip and the recycled materials will be sent off to processors.

2005 Australian Masters Road Cycling Championships

More good news for our community is the staging of the Australian Masters road cycling championships in and around Lancefield from March 20 to 22. This will ensure that Lancefield is the focus of the cycling world for this event, with around 150 riders coming from as far afield as Darwin to compete on our roads from the Sunday to the Tuesday. Racing on the Sunday will consist of criteriums around the main shopping area of Lancefield, while individual time trials will be held on the Monday, using an out-and-back course on the Three Chain Rd. Road races will be held on the Tuesday on a circuit comprising Three Chain Rd, Dons Rd to Newham, Rochford Rd and McMasters Lane.

Pages 41-43 and 203. I would like to take this opportunity to thank the Shire Parks and Garden's Peter Jones and his staff who continue to maintain the fountain garden even though we are unable to have the fountain in operation due to water restrictions.

POKIES



The Gaming Regulator decides in April-May whether Romsey Hotel should have 50 poker machines. It will consider a submission from Macedon Ranges Council which (unlike Mitchell Shire) strongly opposes such an application.

Romsey Against Pokies has come together from people new and old to the town, who go to church and who don't, business people, and people who've had experience of pokies. We are not against gambling. We believe pokies take huge dollars out of a small town, and that this will be bad for local businesses, make individual families poorer and create hardship for many families.

Even the web site for smart gamblers (www.smartgambler. com.au) does not recommend pokies, and calls them a 'menace'.

Victoria has had pokies for a few years. Impartial studies show:

- Ø One in 5 gamblers gamble with the housekeeping
- Ø Eight times more problem gamblers play pokies than bet on the TAB
- Ø Elderly singles and pensioners are more likely to play pokies and have gambling problems,
- Ø Gambling does not boost tourism
- Ø Gambling leaks more money from local towns than other activities

50 poker machines will take \$4 million each year from the town.

Happy New Year!

These three words, which appear so ordinary and just roll off the tongue at this time of year, seem to be entirely inappropriate for 2005. The tsunamis that struck our near neighbours on Boxing Day have dominated our news and culture since then. Whilst it is certainly a 'New Year', many people would debate that it is 'Happy'.

The scale of the destruction, the size of the death toll and the unfolding human tragedy are almost beyond comprehension. As much as we might think we are beginning to understand, it is probably only by being there nat we could truly comprehend what has happened.

The aftermath of the tsunamis has brought a mix of emotions for many people. There has been horror at the appalling loss of life and property. Some people have had their dreams and memories shattered at the 'paradise lost'. In the midst of disbelief and grief, there can also be a numbness, overwhelmed at the enormous need and constant appeals for help.

Yet the response to the appeals has brought hope. In the midst of tragedy, the human family has rallied together, supporting one another and overlooking past disagreements. The generosity of those who are relatively unaffected has been heartwarming, giving hope for humanity beyond this present situation.

However, we have also heard stories reflecting the worst of human traits, with paedophiles preying on the orphaned and homeless. Whilst the size of the tragedy may be beyond comprehension, so, too, are the extremes of human response.

But on one level, this shouldn't come as a surprise. Human beings are essentially greedy and self-centred. A bold statement, but probably at the heart of most armed conflicts throughout history. Think about your own life and the decisions you make. Who doesn't do what they think is best for themselves and their family?

The Christmas story is a story about hope. It's about God doing something about this human predisposition, showing the world a better way of living, a fuller way of being, a new humanity.

The generosity of Australians, and others, towards those affected on Boxing Day is also a sign of hope. It may be a glimpse of a better way of being. I hope and pray that this spirit of solidarity and support may find its way into every part of life.

On behalf of the Romsey Uniting Church, I trust that everyone had a safe and restful summer.


