




School Bus Driver needed For Candlebark School

December in the garden

And still the rain falls! I've never seen it this constantly wet! Not even in 2010 when the millennial drought broke. The grass in the drain out the front is nearly 700mm high because the mower would get bogged if it ventured into there! I have my fingers crossed that no fool tries to turn around in front of our place – we would have to call a tow truck!

My lovely 20-year-old manzanita (Arctostaphylos) did not recover. I think it was a combination of wet feet and a savage frost that knocked it off (luckily, I have about ten cuttings doing well!) As a gardener you have to treat every failure as an opportunity; and so it was after we pulled out the manzanita. I stood and stared at the large hole; then I shifted my gaze slightly to the left to the large clump of Sedum 'Autumn Joy'. Out came the spade and up came the clump. I divided it into five pieces, cut the new growth back by half and replanted the clumps in the hole. I experimented with cutting these herbaceous perennials back by half last year and I've discovered it means I will get more smaller but denser heads of flowers. I have no problems with that at all. They are resprouting already.

The annual shifting of the succulents from the back of the deck to the front of the deck has taken place. Trouble is I'm running out of room! So I made the decision to take some of the bigger plants around to the backyard and

"Big Joe" enters the Shell Rimula and the Road Transport Hall of Fame

Joe Dickerson, known as Big Joe, was born in Daylesford in January 1951. He started driving at 17 in a Commer with his father but he did not gain his licence until he was 18.

In 1969, Joe started his first real job, driving for Woodend General Freight. He then went to work for Romsey Stock Transport, carting to Newmarket. Joe moved onto interstate driving, travelling between Sydney, Brisbane and Adelaide and working for Bert Dunn Transport in Trentham.

After this Joe started his own business with his wife, Gloria, carting sand and gravel locally. In 1974 Joe and Gloria bought a larger truck for carting electricity poles and general freight interstate. Joe and Gloria welcomed two sons, Paul born ('71) and Anthony ('72). The boys loved to accompany Joe on trips, but they were both battling cystic fibrosis. Joe and Gloria organised many concerts raising money for Cystic Fibrosis, sadly Paul and Anthony passed away in 1984.

Later Joe went to drive for his nephew at RSD Transport in Kyneton completing five trips a fortnight to Sydney. Joe then went to sub-contact for Donegan Transport carting brewers yeast from Carlton United Brewery.

Joe claims his worst experience was driving on unsealed roads in the seventies to Mt Isa Queensland. On one occasion Joe transported Allan Moffatt's Cenovis Ford racing car to the annual Bathurst 1000 and was a member of the pit crew. According to Joe the best part of truck driving was getting back home to share a beer or two with his mates and family. In his spare time Joe liked to race hot rods in Daylesford and later participated in mud car racing all over Australia. Joe continues to drive trucks.

Joe is a well-known and much-loved member of the Romsey community. He is often seen mowing nature strips well away from his home and helping people in any way he can. He even put a stile in over his back fence so locals could take a short cut through to the Uniting Church.

Cooking with Peter Russell-Clarke

Our daughter Wendy (named after my mum Wendy - the Russell Street dressmaker - of Tumut), operates with her business partner Nicola, four dance schools (Dance Explosion).

They've had a hard time because of the Corona virus lock-down. Their students are scattered and the worry of social gatherings was prominent. Hence no pas de deux or the like in their lives until things relaxed.

Fortunately, they are back in business, therefore I thought I might invent a food which was dance specific.

Jumping beans seems obvious, but then again not all dance is bouncing up and down. F'rinstance Swan Lake suggests a soup with whipped egg whites floating on top. Or the Nutcracker suggests unimaginable pain with walnuts being de-shelled to make a nut loaf. ('Loaf' isn't a word one associates with dance - certainly not a Dance Explosion class.) But my daughter teaches tap, jazz, ballet and all abilities students of all ages - so maybe a mixed stew of sorts, eh? As long as it has the ingredients which feed their active bodies.

I remember I once interviewed Robert Helpmann for TV Week. I asked Sir Robert what his favourite food was - "Food that is light and airy I suggest, as you do your famous leaps." (Grand Jetes).

"Fettuccini," he replied "and then for afters, more fettuccini." And he was right. Pasta gives instant energy which is what Wendy and her crew need now they are inundated with pupils.

FETTUCINE HELPS YOU DO

A GRAND JETË

Here's a fettuccini recipe.

FETTUCCINI DANCE EXPLOSION

Ingredients

- 500 g fettuccini
- 4 tablespoons butter
- 1 clove garlic
- 1 1/2 cups shelled walnuts
- 200 g mascarpone
- 3/4 cup freshly grated Parmesan cheese.

Method

- 1. Chop the garlic finely and carefully sauté in the melted butter (carefully!!!) in a small saucepan. Chop the walnuts and stir into the garlic and keep stirring for a couple of minutes then take off the heat.
- 2. Cook the pasta in boiling water until it's done to your liking.
- 3. Stir the mascarpone into the nuts and gently heat through. Drain the fettuccini, toss in the Parmesan cheese, stir in the nut mixture and serve straight away.

PS. Santa's on the hop at Christmas - all those chimneys and TV aerials to chassé around - so maybe leave a serving of Fettuccini in the stocking by the mantlepiece instead of a bickie or two with your glass of milk or beer, eh?

2022 has seen four elections in Australia

In South Australia a change of government, in the Federal election a change of government, and in the ACT and Victoria, both governments returned to office.

Each of these elections is planned and operated by fully independent state and federal Electoral Commissions. These commissions do everything from organising staff, furniture and other infrastructure, pencils, disinfectant, masks, staff jackets etc and selecting polling sites.

The staff come together at a site with the vast majority never having met before. They are courteous and helpful to all. Since 2020 individuals can bring their own biro/pen to mark their ballot.

Votes are counted after 6.00pm on election day with scrutineers from all/most political groups observing this count. These scrutineers have the right to question any ballot and have it set aside to be checked later in the night or coming days.

All votes are then recounted, numerous times, at each electoral central polling/ counting place. Postal and absent/declaration votes are all counted there. Again, a very mixed work force drawn from all walks of life within Australia.

We are fortunate that we live in a country where the results of an election are respected and we allow the new/old government to get on with their job.

These are things that we, as Australians, have the right to feel very proud of. While we may or may not be happy with the result we know that everything is above board.

Top 8 water tips that could save the planet, your budget – or a life



Saving water has so many easy environmental and financial benefits. But you may not realise some of these simple tips from Greater Western Water (GWW) could assist in an emergency or even save a life.

- 1. **Be smart. Choose tap.** It's the best choice for your health, the environment and your budget. After all, the best drinking water in Australia is right here in Victoria!
- 2. **Store water in your fridge for emergencies.** In the event of a burst water main or bushfire, you'll always have drinking water on hand.
- 3. **Be prepared.** Water pressure and supply could be interrupted during a bushfire. GWW has backup and staff on call, but if you live in a high-risk area, consider keeping an alternative water supply. Contact CFA to find out more about bushfire preparation.
- 4. **Check for leaks.** Avoid steep water bills by checking for water leaks now. Read the numbers on your meter, then recheck after a period when you haven't used any water. If the numbers have changed, you may have a leak.
- 5. Adopt a hydrant. Help to clear grass and soil from fire hydrants or let us know if you spot one that needs attention you'll be helping the CFA when they need to fight fires and keep property and people safe.
- 6. **The three Ps.** Remember only flush pee, poo and (toilet) paper down the loo and avoid a costly (and smelly) plumbing fix. Look out for the new flushable symbol on products too. You'll be helping to keep our sewers operating at their best.
- 7. Shorten your shower. Save water by keeping your shower to four minutes.
- 8. Can you claim a concession? Shrink your bills with a concession pensioners, healthcare card holders and Veterans' Affairs gold card holders are all eligible.

In November 2022, National Asbestos Awareness Month, the Asbestos Education Committee & Cherie Barbour, who lost her grandfather due to asbestos-related disease, reminds us of these facts:

Fact 1: Over 4,000 Australians die every year from asbestos-related diseases – around 265% more than the annual national road toll, so as long as asbestos-containing materials remain in homes built or renovated prior to 1990. DIYers, homeowners, renovators and tradies heed the warnings, respect the dangers of asbestos. It's not worth the risk. Fact 2: "Many homeowners wrongly believe that asbestoscontaining products are only found in fibro homes made from asbestos-cement sheeting," said Ms Barber. "The fact is, **asbestos was used extensively in the manufacture of more than 3000 building and decorator products** that can still be found in brick, fibro, weatherboard, apartments or sheds built or renovated before 1990. Fact 3: There is no cure for mesothelioma, a cancer that can develop between 33 and 44 years after inhaling asbestos fibres with the average survival time following diagnosis, just 12 months.

Fact 4: Growing evidence suggests current occurrences of asbestos-related diseases are as a result of **exposure** to asbestos fibres during DIY and renovations. Fact 5: Because there is no known safe level of exposure to asbestos fibres, without knowing where asbestos might lurk in and around properties, or how to manage it safely, people could be playing 'Renovation Roulette', risking their families health and that of bystanders if they disturb these hazardous materials.

Council's soft plastics recycling services not impacted by REDcycle announcement

Council has confirmed that its kerbside soft plastics collection trial in Romsey and soft plastic drop off at transfer stations will not be impacted by REDcycle's announcement to halt collection of soft plastics from Coles and Woolworths stores from Wednesday 9 November 2022.

Plastic collected in the Romsey trial and from transfer stations is not processed by REDcycle. Instead, it is taken to two different plastic processors.

The soft plastic collected via the Romsey kerbside trial will go to Council's comingled processor APR, which has a soft plastic pyrolysis plant in Dandenong that will transform the collected plastic back into crude oil for reprocessing back to plastic.

The trial is being driven by the Australian Food and Grocery Council (AFGC). Members of the AFGC will buy the material back for packaging, closing the loop.

The plastic taken to Council's transfer stations by residents will also not be impacted. This is collected by local Kyneton company, Victorian Regional Recyclers, and is taken to GT plastics in Geelong for mechanical reprocessing to pellets.

Council's Chief Executive Officer Bernie O'Sullivan said, "Council will consider whether any other interim local solutions are needed to help residents with their recycling needs in light of REDcycle's announcement. We know this is a popular service for locals to use.

"I'd like to remind residents they can still take their soft plastics to our transfer stations for free. We also encourage our Romsey residents to support the soft plastics kerbside collection trial taking place."

Following the Romsey trial, Council will investigate the potential to roll out the soft plastic kerbside collection process across the whole shire.

Has Deep Creek reached a Turning Point?

In August, I wrote of a 'voice' for the Maribyrnong River/Deep Creek – like the Yarra & Werribbee River Keeper Associations. Now, events show the need to remedy centuries of exploitation of this waterway.

A strong voice for the Maribyrnong and its waterways was set up in July. In October, Deep Creek Landcare was at a second forum to establish this organization ie. name, a logo, governance, 3-year focus, strategies and Fundraising. A Facebook page is now up and funding gained. The rapid progress is exciting- "watch this space"

Two days after this, the Maribyrnong flooded with water levels the highest in decades. Upstream, the impact was greatest in Deep Creek. Months of rain and saturated farmland meant heavy rain on 11/10/22 flushed straight into the creek. It flooded, damaging everything in its path. Our sites at Forbes Crossing and Gallagher's Crossing were not spared.

Flood impacts are known. Our thoughts go out to all those affected. What is less understood was highlighted by Nicole Kowalczyk, Maribyrnong Riverkeeper:

"Floods are an impetus to restore and protect the river, its parklands and floodplain. An overlooked value of rivers is the way (they control) flood when left with some natural environment intact. Given enough floodplain, rivers have a remarkable capacity to absorb rainfall and runoff. Stripped of those, they inevitably flood.

"The Yarra Riverkeeper Association believes that rather than build higher flood protection works and prevent floodwater from moving onto floodplains, we should encourage floodwaters to move into areas benefitting from inundation, enabling the myriad of ecosystem services floods offer.

It is .. significantly cheaper to preserve a river's natural course, to give it room to move, and to absorb flood waters than to build huge monuments to protect what cannot be protected and to pay astronomical damage costs caused by the inevitable flood."

A consequence of recent rainfall has been the inability of the Romsey waste water treatment plant to cope. The plant will continue to discharge into Deep Creek until late November. We wrote to Ministers and state election candidates of our displeasure, noting "Western Water, back in 2019, said the Romsey Plant was at risk of uncontrolled spills in years of average rainfall. Now, GWW has had to truck waste water out of the facility and discharge waste water into Deep Creek in this wet period."

I invite you to be active on this issue. We cannot simply ignore the situation. "Water quality of Deep Creek and the Maribyrnong is highly important. Farming and agriculture along the waterway need clean water. Flora and fauna rely on clean water; the survival of the endangered Yarra Pigmy Perch and local Platypus population are at stake. The Maribyrnong is a prime recreational facility for fishing, canoeing and rowing."

We believe that "The discharge of waste water into our waterways may be a cheap and easy solution to the problems faced by GWW but it is not a solution that is acceptable to us or the general population.
