Dear Friends

Although there has been some recent rains, the drought across much of Australia continues and locally our water catchments have had little runoff. We need to remain focussed and seriously consider how we use this most precious resource.

Australia's rainfall is the lowest of the continents (excluding Antarctica), yet despite this, Australia has one of the highest per capita water consumption rates in the world.

The State Government has invested significantly in reducing our water consumption through various water saving measures including rebates, grants and permanent water restrictions.

A key feature of this campaign to reduce our water consumption is the 'Our Water Our Future' advertising campaign which has no equivalent anywhere else in Australia. This is a campaign that has been designed to show the extent of the problem we are facing, and inform us of what we can do to assist.

There has been a lot of comment recently in the media about the Government's use of advertising for this educational campaign, but as they say the proof is in the pudding and 55% of Melbourne household's have reduced their overall water consumption. I believe this is money well spent.

I am proud to see how our community has embraced the water saving challenge, but this is not a short term effort but a long term challenge.

Remember every drop counts!



FROM CR HENRY BLEECK Tapping in to our water needs

The future water security for Romsey, Lancefield and Woodend is currently being investigated by a Community Reference Group established by Western Water.

As the Councillor representative on this group I will push to ensure that a sustainable plan is developed and we can look forward to a secure, permanent supply.

The quality of water in the region is also being considered during the investigation.

After years of drought and water restrictions, this review is imperative to develop a sustainable plan for the future. A plan for a secured water supply and quality will allay the concerns of the local community and give everyone confidence for the coming years as our region continues to grow and develop. A newsletter will be sent out to the community in the near future.

A feedback form will be included, and it important for everyone to return their form. This will enable our reference group to develop an accurate view of what the community's expectations are.

Topical Gas

Residents of Romsey and other parts of the East Ward should have noticed that work is progressing on delivering the long-awaited gas to them. Work is currently taking place on the 'gate' on the main line, and resulting works will then start happening in the town. Residents that missed the March 23 natural gas community meeting for Romsey, Lancefield and Riddells Creek are encouraged to visit the SP AusNet site www.sp-ausnet.co.au – once on the site select 'regional town gas' and Romsey.

The maps showing the location of the reticulation system of the town are available. Some areas in each town will not initially be connected to gas, but this is being worked on. I realise that information has been sent to each household by SP Ausnet, but feedback I've received from the community indicates that not everyone is up to speed on what's happening.

Gold congratulations

Congratulations to local resident Daniel Repacholi of Romsey, who has won a Gold Medal in the 50 metre pistol event at the Commonwealth Games and a bronze in the 10 metre pistol pair. This demonstrates the talent we have got in the Macedon Ranges Shire and should be an inspiration to all residents.



ROMSEY PRIMARY SCHOOL NEWS

Our School Carnival held on the second last Friday of Term 1 was another outstanding success. The tireless work of our Parent Club in organising this event really paid off. Most gratifying was the support for the school from businesses and the community and especially from all our volunteers on the night. The school raised in excess of \$10,000 through this event; these funds will be put directly into maintaining and expanding the high standard of classroom equipment and resources for our students.



Throughout the term all classes have been working on the Commonwealth Games. This major event gave us a wonderful opportunity to study different Commonwealth countries as well as a range of sports and Australians past and present who have made a contribution to these pursuits. Such a focus as this enables classroom programs to combine a range of curriculum areas such as English (writing, reading, speaking and listening), Mathematics (number and measurement), Science, Studies of Society and Environment and Technology as well as Sport and Physical Education.

Peer Mediation Training

Each year a number of interested senior students are trained in Peer Mediation. Training covers the personal attributes of being a peer mediator. Skills covered focus on assisting others see the other person's point of view, to come to a win / win solution, and to assist others in solving their problems. Students who have worked as Peer Mediators in the past rank this as an experience that has had a high impact upon them in equipping them for life beyond primary school. On completion of training, Peer Mediators are rostered on during recess times to assist students in solving small conflicts or disputes. Our mediators debrief with the teacher in charge of the program regularly, and refine their skills in assisting other students to solve their own problems. Being a Peer Mediator clearly is learning for life.

Young Leaders Conference

School Captains Sabrina Raverty and Ben Noel attended a National Young Leaders Conference in Melbourne. Throughout the day these students were able to hear from a number of well known speakers (AFL legend Ron Barrassi, Olympic rowing gold medallist Drew Ginn, author Hazel Edwards and Antarctic explorer Peter Bland) on setting and achieving personal goals and on the qualities of good leadership. This was quite an inspirational experience for the students and was a wonderful part of the induction in assuming their leadership positions at school for this year.

Parent Helpers Course

Training for interested parents in classroom helping commences this term. The program covers the ways to be an effective classroom helper in both literacy and numeracy, and also how to assist children at home with their learning. This program has been very effective in the past in enabling our parents to assist more effectively in the classroom, as well as helping parents understand to a greater depth, current practices in learning and teaching in these curriculum areas.

Artist in Schools

Romsey Primary School has been lucky enough to be one of the 28 successful schools, chosen out of 120 applicants, to participate in the Artist in Schools program supported by Arts Victoria and the Department of Education and Training. The school has gained funding to employ Diane Thompson, a visual artist who specialises in the area of mosaic and sculpture. It is planned that our senior students will work with our visiting artist and Miss Skinner to create a mosaic tiled amphitheatre/ performing area near the tennis courts. The project will involve senior students researching their family history, exploring the local environment and creating artworks in response to these discoveries. To kick off our project we will be having a visit on the 30th March (the first Thursday of term 2) from Murrindindi, a member of the local Wurundjeri indigenous group. Students in the involved classes will spend some time in workshops with Murrindindi learning about local indigenous culture.

Other Grants

Towards the end of term we heard that the school had been successful in obtaining a Catchment Management Grant and a Community Water Grant.

The Catchment Management Grant will enable us to undertake a direct seeding project to expand corridors of indigenous planting along perimeter boundaries. This is a highly innovative and effective method of planting with a high rate of success in other areas. Currently we are undertaking weed eradication and soil preparation with the direct seed planting to be completed in early spring. Romsey residents with both small and larger properties who would like more information in regard to this project are welcome to contact the school.

The Community Water Grant is a federal initiative through which we will be able to install a rainwater tank. This will enable the school to consolidate the plantings in a number of our environmental projects as well as assist with the establishment of our new corridor plantings this year.

Five Mile Creek News

Piles of dirt ... old willows felled ... don't be surprised to see an excavator travelling along the creek!

Work is underway with Melbourne Water at the west end of the Five Mile Creek park. From January 2006 Melbourne Water (not Southern Rural Water) is responsible for Five Mile Creek, Deep Creek and waterways flowing into Port Phillip Bay.

The work was to be done through the creek committee where willows on steep banks had clogged up the stream. As the job uses machinery, Melbourne water had to inspect and approve it. The local contractor has been certified to work with Melbourne Water to:

- Remove large old willows at the west end, one or two of which are leaning badly
- Remove sand banks building sand has silted up storm water outlets
- Remove isolated hawthorn
- Dig out the new willows growing in the creek at the bike jumps area

The work will be done hopefully in the next few weeks.

The piles of dirt at the Couzens Lane path entrance will then be spread over the west side of the creek at Couzens Lane, where it is sloping from the road. Thankyou to the contractor on the new estate who donated this dirt to improve the creek bank.

New Romsey Parks Committee

For those people not aware, Romsey Park is Crown Land, under the control of the Department of Sustainability and Environment (DSE). In the second half of 2005 a new Committee of Management of the park was elected - this voluntary group (of 15) consists of representatives of most of the user groups of the park, plus some community members.

The role of the committee is to coordinate activities in the park consistently within DSE guidelines, and to maintain the areas not controlled by the various sporting and activity groups. The committee has access to (very) limited funding – small contributions from each park user group, and a grant from the Macedon Ranges Shire Council – to spend on insurance, mowing, maintenance and improve-

Unfortunately the level of senseless vandalism requires increased money spent on repairs, leaving less for improvements. If you see any damage or dumping of rubbish in the park, please call the police - it is a community resource!

The park is in the midst of two major upgrades: The football/cricket ground has just been resurfaced, and the tennis club is about to embark on replacement of their 3 entout-cas courts (lost due to the drought) with all-weather mod grass courts.

VIEW FROM THE VICARAGE

Welcome to the latest edition of the view from the Vicarage, Last edition. I left you with the guestion...Why do people spend 40 days preparing for Easter? This edition, I provide you with the mind-blowing answer.

The answer is found in the fact that the church celebrates the new life it has due to the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. The Easter eggs in the shops now are aimed at symbolising new life because of the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ.

So why spend 40 days preparing for the death and resurrection of one man, Jesus Christ? The answer is in two parts: Firstly, the 40 days are used to help people understand who Jesus really is and as a result of that, we come to a greater understanding of the importance of the death and resurrection of Jesus for us individually.

Firstly, it has been often debated about who Jesus is. Many people have suggested many things such as Lord, liar or lunatic, prophet or just another man. Unless you are a believer in Jesus Christ, very rarely is the term Saviour or Messiah used. Throughout the Gospel of Mark, Jesus is seen by the people as one who heals physically, one who heals spiritually and one who heals both. Yes, heals people physically if they trust in him and then ask him to heal in His time not ours but what he most importantly came to heal is our relationship with God. Jesus Christ came to rescue our relationship with God after we rebelled against Him. The consequences for that is death or eternal separation from God. But there is hope for those who have rebelled against God and escape the consequences.

That hope comes about because of the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. How does this provide hope?

Jesus' death and resurrection provide for us an opportunity for us to bridge the gap between God and us. Jesus' death took the punishment of sin that should have been ours because we were the rebellious ones and not Jesus. But the fact that he came back to life again showed that he conquered death and gave us an avenue for us to get to God. John 14:6 tells us that Jesus said, "I am the way, the truth and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me." This means that the only way to God and to heaven is by accepting Jesus as the Saviour of one's life. Jesus' death and resurrection opened the way people for people to go to heaven by accepting the gift he has given us of making our relationship right with God, we too can have eternal life. This is why Easter is such a joyous celebration in the Christian Church.


As a community, let us all consider the claims of Jesus, the reason for the Easter Season, for ourselves.

Dear Editor

I'm writing this as a discussion starter - hope some people respond!

We used to think that we had unending water now we have heaps of ads on saving water and the cost of water is going up and up.

We used to take good food for granted now we look at the travel hardenned tomatoes that are tasteless and remember buying glossy stone fruit which had no flavour - and we pay more at Farmers Markets because everyday fruit and vegies are not chemical-free or tasty any more

We used to welcome new foods -

now we worry about bird flu or other diseases, exposure to chemicals, and proper health checks if vegies are grown in Asian or other overseas markets

We used to drive everywhere -

now we think about the cost of the car trip, or take the train to the city, or worry about the weekly petrol bill.

What will be important for our children to grow up healthy ... and our grandchildren?

Healthy food grown close so transport doesn't price it out of our reach, collecting rainfall from our hills, and breathing fresh forest air ... We have taken these things for granted. Should we look at what is happening in the

world and think about what we might protect for the future?

Recently there've been meetings in Woodend about having much freer access for dwellings on rural land. This is an issue for everyone who lives in the Macedon Ranges not just farmers who are retiring, or more tree-changers, or developers, or people who value the top quality soil (it really is as good as Gippsland). Those of us who live in local towns enjoy being here because it is not an unending suburb of Melbourne.

Our closeness to Melbourne means that more people will challenge the shape of town and country. My concern is that undeniably, building houses on very rich soil means that it will not be available ever again for producing food.

I know farming is changing – but it will always change, and newer farmers are doing it differently, with smaller as well as larger farms. Good soil doesn't change.

Working Lives

I've been in Romsey for 3 years. I was asked to describe my work, as the second person to do this, so that we can understand more about what people do who live in Romsey ...

I work in a school which educates children who have a serious disability. My job is to be an integration aide, which in this school means helping students in whatever he or she needs to be able to take in the classwork.

One class of autistic children is physically independent but mentally demanding because they are so curious. They are full of questions, and "just come out with it". The other class I help with has students with high de-

pendency needs - they could want help with feeding, moving around, or toileting.

I love the work – you can be yourself. work with a team of 3 aides, in small classes of 7 or 8 students. Some students don't have speech, but they have signs or special noises to communicate with you.

Getting past the disability is easy for me ... I enjoy seeing the child's qualities, and they are so spontaneous. I know it's not like that for everyone. I use music and colour - singing and simple music chords. I used to do colour therapy, helping people express feelings in colours and drawing.

I started this work by doing an integra-

tion aide module at Adult Education, and I did voluntary work for 2 years in a mainstream school. I've always liked working with children.

That's what I like about Romsey too ... it's child oriented. The kids are close and you see people locally all the time, kids come up and say hi. It's easy to feel safe about your children doing sleepovers and you don't feel afraid for your kids. The older folk were so helpful and friendly when we arrived, the people at the Lions village saying hello and giving me plant cuttings.

Play to the End - Robert Goddard

The latest Robert Goddard book is set in Brighton where a previously undiscovered Joe Orton play 'Lodger in the Throat' is all set to close its rather inglorious run after a rather brief season. However, the leading man, Toby flood, finds himself involved in events slightly more sinister than the play's dubious script and discovers that he is being manipulated by a seriously strange local, Derek Oswin. Throw in Flood's estranged wife Jenny, her soon to be husband Roger Colborn, several cancerous deaths of workers as a result of Colborn industries, not to mention a murder or two and, as usual with Goddard, the plot well and truly thickens. This tale has more twists and turns than a boa constrictor with belly ache.

Affluenza: When too much is never enough – Clive Hamilton & Richard Denniss

This book was recommended to me with so much enthusiasm that I just had to read it for myself and I wasn't disappointed. It is a compulsive read about the major problem besieging our society today – affluenza – 1. The bloated, sluggish and unfulfilled feeling that results from efforts to keep up with the Joneses. 2. An epidemic of stress, overwork, waste and indebtedness caused by dogged pursuit of the Australian dream. 3. An unsustainable addiction to economic growth.

Although it deals with economics the writing style is lively and entertaining. The authors emphasise that even though we are earning 4 times more than our parents did in the

1950s the money just isn't enough. We are more stressed, dissatisfied and in debt than ever. We have forgotten that want and need are not synonyms. If you have ever thought about downshifting, or the damage to our society and environment that is happening as a result of our rabid over-consumption, then you'll enjoy this book too.

The Running Man - Michael Gerard Bauer

A powerful story of value judgements, tragic occurrences and the power of miracles. Teenager Joseph Davidson finds himself manoeuvred into drawing the portrait of his next door neighbour, a reclusive Vietnam veteran, Tom Leyton. Neither of them is terribly pleased by the idea. However they eventually form a friendship through their mutual interest in silk worms.

They are haunted by secrets in both their lives and the reader is skilfully drawn into their confidences. A great debut novel.

Assistance Sought from Landcarers

Help Locate Flora Species

Below is the copy of a letter that was recently sent to me by Terri Williams (Department of Sustainability and Environment - Bendigo) seeking assistance with the location of specific flora species in North West DSE region, which includes all of Macedon Ranges Shire.

Prepared By: Terri Williams (Threatened Species Project Officer - DSE)

To Whom It May Concern:

My name is Terri Williams and I am one of the Threatened Species Project Officers from the Biodiversity Group at the Bendigo DSE. My position entails me locating, monitoring and conducting studies on the Red Swainson Pea (Swainsona plagiotropis), Slender Swainson Pea (Swainsona murrayana), Small Scurf Pea (Cullen parvum), Southern Shepherds Purse (Ballantinia atipoda), Matted Flax-lily (Dianella amoena), Clover Glycine (Glycine latrobeana), Creeping Hop-bush (Dodonaea procumbens) and Fragrant Leek-orchid (Pterostylis sp. aff. bicolor (Woorndoo).

In this position I try and locate as many of the above species as possible. The reason for this is to obtain a more accurate count of the species throughout the North West DSE Region. This is used to determine its status. By accurately accounting for the populations it can be determined wether the species is endangered, threatened or stable. Another part of this is to possibly set up study plots to learn more about the plants habits and wether they are increasing at a site and possibly determine why.

If the property owner wants to participate in the study I will let them know what I am doing and give them any infor-

mation that I get if they are interested. Assistance by the landholder is always welcome if they want. If the landholder wants to learn more about the plants I am happy to meet with them and discuss it.

I will in no way try and control the management of the site unless requested by the property owner. Assistance in managing the site may be available if requested.



'IF ONLY' Surely two of the saddest little words in the whole English language - or any other language for that matter, and not many would claim never to have used them. They always speak of disappointment, or regret, or self-reproach or opportunity lost which, if grasped at the time, would have made a world of difference. Vain longings for what might have been.

On the first Palm Sunday Jesus rode a donkey towards Jerusalem. The crowds cheered and shouted their Hosannas and threw down garments and branches of trees along the way in a fervour of glad acclamation.

But the storm clouds were already gathering, and before long the betrayal by Judas, a sham trial, and Pilate washing his hands of the whole affair - Hosanna turned to mockery and derision. Judas in bitter remorse, flung down his ill -gotten thirty pieces of silver and the tomb received its dead and was sealed with a great stone. All hope had gone, only bitter disappointment was left. It was the end.

The disciples ran away and hid themselves for fear that they might suffer the same fate; and it was easy to imagine them saying with despairing lament - "If only we had persuaded him not to go to Jerusalem; if only we had known the true nature of Judas; if only Pilate had stuck to his belief that he could find no fault in this just man; if only..."

But they were wrong.

They were wrong because the gloom of that first Good Friday gave way to the glory of Easter Day; and the great 23rd 9am. Worship and Sunday School stone was rolled away, and the tomb was empty.

The cry went up - "He lives; he is risen"; and in due time

the Holy Spirit came down, and the world would never be the same again.

Current Grants and Opportunities from John Robinson-Landcare Coordinator

1. Envirofund - Round 8

Applicant eligibility

Applicants must be a legal entity, such as: an incorporated association; a body corporate; a company; a trust; a partnership; an Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander corporation, council or incorporated association; or an individual per-

Applicants that are not a legal entity must arrange for another legal entity (eg. local government or an incorporated community group) to accept and administer the Funding Agreement and receive the funding.

Applications close: Round 8 applications close at **5pm** on Friday 28 April 2006.

Funding: community groups and individuals can apply for grants from Envirofund of up to \$50,000 (GST inclusive) to carry out on-ground and other actions to target local prob-

Matching Funding: applicants for Round 8 are asked to contribute \$1 (ie cash or in-kind) for every \$1 sought from

When will the funding be available: from July 2006 When can projects commence: successful applicants will have 18 months to complete their projects, commencing in August 2006, at the earliest.

How many applications can a group submit: applicants that are incorporated community groups (such as Landcare groups) may submit more than one application. Other applicants are still limited to one application.

Eligible activities

Many of the activities that were eligible in Round 7 are still eligible in Round 8, although with a different focus and some different limits. For example, weeding and feral animal control are still eligible, but in more limited circumstances. Among the activities that are eligible for Round 8 include, but are not limited to:

- 1. Native vegetation planting or other works to stabilise soil or conserve biodiversity/habitat
- 2. Fencing or other management techniques to protect and preserve habitat
- 3. Controlling stock access to watercourses to protect streamside habitat and improve water quality
- 3. Awareness-raising activities that directly lead to significant local on-ground benefits for biodiversity conservation or sustainable natural resource use.
- 4. Relevant skill and knowledge development for resource

managers and users through education and training where this is required to achieve the local on-ground biodiversity conservation or sustainable natural resource use objectives of a project.

- 5. Weed control on public land, but only where there is a high biodiversity conservation benefit and where it is clearly the most cost effective way of achieving that benefit, otherwise will only consider weed control activities that are a limited but integral part of projects that address broader natural resource management issues.
- 6. Feral animal control to protect threatened native species or ecological communities where the species or community has been identified in national or State threat abatement or recovery plans.
- 7. Demonstrations or trials of new techniques for sustainable farming, forestry or fishing practices or solutions to local problems.
- 8. Monitoring of water quality, species, habitats, or other natural resources where this will have a clear local benefit for biodiversity conservation or sustainable natural resource management.
- 9. Purchase of small equipment by community groups where such equipment is a legitimate part of a larger Envirofund project.

Ineligible activities

The ineligible activities are the same as for Round 6, with the inclusion of the following:

- 1. These Round 7 (2005 Drought Recovery Round) activities: temporary feedlots; shelter structures; desilting, decommissioning or constructing dams; maintenance of plantings funded under previous rounds of the Envirofund.
- 2. Fencing for the purpose of paddock subdivision or cell grazing, or yards for stock management.
- 3. Activities designed to raise revenue such as production of publications to be sold on a cost-recovery or profit basis.

Whats new in Round 8

- Among the new aspects of the program for Round 8 are: 1. The standard rate paid by Envirofund for fencing has been increased to \$2,500 per kilometre.
- 2. A Fencing Management Agreement is required for project fencing funded by Envirofund at more than \$800 per kilometre, an increase on the previous rate of \$600 per kilometre.
- 3. Purchase of small equipment by community groups is now eligible where such equipment is a legitimate part of a larger Envirofund project.
- 4. The funding of dung beetles is now eligible if they are a minor part of a larger project focused on sustainable agriculture.
- 5. The costs of hiring equipment and of contractors to undertake earthworks to install water infrastructure are now regarded as part of the cost of water infrastructure, to which applicants are required to make a cash contribution.

Amount: grants of up to \$3,300 (inc. GST) are available for local community projects

Closing dates for 2006 Grants: Round One - 31 May 2006; Round Two - 29 September 2006

Purpose: to enhance the capacity of community groups to undertake Landcare and other environmental projects What can the funding support: environmental projects such as those that meet a direct environmental need (eq erosion, water quality, or weed issue), field days, tools and equipment, promotion to encourage volunteer involvement, propagation and care of indigenous plants etc.

Examples of possible project types: newsletter printing/ postage, rehabilitation/restoration using indigenous plants, water conservation, environmental monitoring, setting up Landcare groups, improving native animal habitat, training, planning/mapping Landcare projects etc.

How many grants are available: groups may submit multiple applications (but are only eligible to receive one grant per year). Networks may support applications from more than one group.

When does the project have to be completed: grant funds must be spent within six months from the date funding is received.
