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BOLINDA PRIMARY SCHOOL NEWS

By the time you read our news it will be the middle of the term holidays. How time flies when you are busy working with children!!

The **2005 Bolinda Annual Report** was recently tabled and accepted by School Council and has been sent to Bendigo Regional Office. I believe it is very interesting to note some of the following facts from the Report –

In Reading and Writing for Prep, 2, 4, and 6 combined, 93 % of children were at or above expected levels. In Speaking and Listening for Prep, 2, 4, and 6 combined, 96% were at or above expected levels. In Number and Measurement for Prep, 2, 4, and 6 com-

bined, 93% were at or above expected levels.

The Year 5 AIM tests indicated our children at the 90th
percentile when compared to all children in the State.

The Year 5 Number results showed that on a ranking of 1 -5, our 3.3 score was above the State average of 3.2 Three of our Year 6 children were accepted into Gisborne Secondary College's Enrichment Program. This program represents the **top 10% of year 7 students** and these children had been at Bolinda for their 7 years of primary

In the annual Parent Opinion Survey, ALL parent indicators were higher than the previous year and well above State Primary Benchmarks.

The Years 5 and 6 Students Attitude to School Survey is a formal DE&T survey for all children across the State relating to their connectedness to school, teachers, peers, motivation to learn, student safety and self esteem. This indicated that all students were very happy with an overall satisfaction of 86.5%.

The children, parents and staff are all very proud of these results and of our school, and consequently we are proud to share them with you, our community.

The **Chess Team** has been to Bendigo for the Regional tournament conducted by Chess Victoria where we played seven teams from Bendigo schools. Our team finished third in our section, even although we beat the second team during competition, we unfortunately just missed out on qualifying for the next round. Nevertheless it was a great learning experience for the children who all played to the best of their abilities and represented their school with distinction. Congratulations to the team from Darraweit who played very well to finish second in their section and progress to the next round.

This term we have continued with our morning physical activities walking around the Bolinda Walking Track bouncing a ball as we go or using our skipping ropes as a means to prepare for the annual **Jump Rope for Heart** fundraiser. We had an afternoon Skip-a-thon to music including pairs and group skipping activities which was a lot of fun. At the end of term the children had raised the **remarkable total of \$575** to send to the Heart Foundation.

We certainly have been and continue to be very busy at Bolinda. We had a terrific visit from an extremely colourful

Melbourne dance troupe performing Dances of Asia that kept every child from Bolinda, Clarkefield and Darraweit captivated throughout the performance.

We have had a Grade 6 Orientation visit to Gisborne Secondary College, Grade P12 children have been to Sunbury as part of their Community theme to visit the library, the fire station and to go behind the scenes at Coles. The Grade 234 class went to Ballarat to the Wildlife Park as a culmination to their Wildlife of Australia theme and also visited the new POW memorial in the gardens.

Our Grade 6's took part in the annual Alliance Francaise Competition at Braemar College where they have to recite a poem in French in front of an examiner from Melbourne. This can be a very daunting experience but it helps show our children that they are more than able to compete educationally and successfully with students from other schools who are doing the same things as them.

Our **Bolinda Blooming Lunch project** culminated on the second last day of term with a wonderful lunch prepared by the children for their parents who had been invited along.

All children took part in either the harvesting, preparation, presentation or serving of the lunch. Peta Heine, who is the wonderful driving force behind this project and who worked with Stephanie Alexander at the Collingwood Children's Kitchen, told us that the Government is about to fund another 20 schools to start the same type of project, that Bolinda has been doing with our children for twelve months!!!!!!!

Do you get the idea of how busy we have been at Bolinda and some of the fantastic experiences that our children have gained from??

We are indeed well into preparations for our annual **Spring Fair – September 10th**, mark it in your diaries now for a great day out and all the fun of a country school fair, the children just love it!! The Army camels are coming back and the **Telstra Country Wide Mobile Phone Toss** is to be held again with wonderful prizes to be won. Some market stalls are still available for booking, look for more information next month.

Many parents are presently considering their educational options for 2007. Perhaps a **Bolinda Educational Experience** is what you are seeking for your children? An information Morning Tea will be held at school during August for those people considering their options. Look for the brochure in your Kinder. We would welcome anyone, at any time, who wants a 'cuppa' and a chat about what we at can offer you and your children.

A look into our future

Romsey's population is set to increase by 139% in the next 25 years – so we all need to ensure that we're planning for the future now to ensure that it is a prosperous and happy one. The town's population is predicted to increase from 2938 people in 2001 to 7024 in 2031, which will provide the community with a whole range of new challenges. The increase – particularly in the 65-plus age group – will need a range of new services and supports, and I will be pushing Council, and other levels of government, to ensure that we plan for them and don't get left behind. The facts and figures have been compiled in an excellent report prepared by the Council's

Dr Lorraine Beyer, from the Social Planning Unit.

There is no point in sitting back and allowing this growth to just happen – we need to be planning for it, and ensuring that the Federal and State Governments are doing the same. There will be increases in numbers across all age groups – with an increase of 126 children aged up to four; 105 aged 5-9; 129 aged 10-14 and 123 aged 15-19. But the biggest growth area is in the older population, with all age groups from 65 onwards increasing in numbers five-fold – an extra 297 people aged 65-69; 226 aged 70-74; 145 aged 75-79, 108 aged 80-84 and 109 aged 85 and over.

So what will we need to cater for our extra people? I believe we will need to maintain pressure on other levels of government to boost doctor training and recruitment strategies, as we will definitely need to recruit more GPs to live and work in our area. Older people are big users of allied health, so our community health services will need to be boosted. The increase in young people will lead to pressures on our education services, so we will need to think about new or expanded primary and secondary facilities.

There has been evidence in cost-shifting from other levels of Government to the Shire in terms of aged care services, and we will need to be vigilant to ensure that it doesn't continue and that services such as Home & Community Care, home-help, home maintenance and Meals on Wheels don't get shoved increasingly on to us. There also need to be more planning for services such as water supply, power and public transport.

We also need to ensure the East Ward gets its fair share of services – with Romsey's population to grow by 139%, Riddells Creek 128% and Lancefield 102% - compared with an increase of 57% across Macedon Ranges as a whole, we're the growth area of the Shire, and need further attention. It is estimated that 1600 new homes will be built in Romsey in the 30 years up to 2031. Couples with children will continue to be the most common household, but lone-person households will almost treble over that time, and couples without children will more than double. This reflects our changing demographics – 43% of Romsey households in 2031 are predicted to be families with children, down from 56% in 2001.

Romsey will continue to be an attractive place to live for adults, with the number of people aged 25-64 to increase by 2540 – from the present 1499 up to 4039. The increase alone in this age group is almost comparable to Romsey's present total population!

These figures provide us with plenty of food for thought, and the knowledge that our future won't just happen – we have to plan for it to ensure that it's what we want, and that our town in 2031 is the attractive place it is now, with the services we need.



The school vegetable garden has been a wonderful success with congratulations to the staff, students and parents who have worked to produce so much from this small area of the grounds. Next season with the size expanded it is hoped to devote one area to giant vegetables.

Investing in Schools Grant

Romsey Primary School has been successful in our application to the Federal Government's "Investing in Schools" program. We submitted a plan to upgrade the re-locatable atrium area. Following the development of the space we hope to achieve a warm learning area that brings these classrooms to a similar level of amenity to the rest of the school. This project should be able to be completed over the next twelve months, once the funds have been deposited to our school account.

Water Saving Grant

This year the school was successful in applying for funds under the *Community Water Grants* scheme. As a result of this grant we have now installed a 22,700 litre water tank on the north side of the main school building. This will assist the school in maintaining our recent plantings of indigenous plants unit they are fully established as well as maintaining areas such as our frog ponds in a healthy state. All we need now is some good winter rain to complete the project to be fully operational.

Student Enrolments for 2007

The next round of information sessions for parents of prospective students for 2007 will be held at school on Wednesday 19th July at 2.30 and again at 7.00PM. At this program parents will find out about both the wonderful school programs and facilities available in Romsey and also receive information on our transition to school program for students starting school next year. Prior to this date school information and enrolment packages will be distributed to all local kindergartens and child care centres. Enrolments for 2007 will be accepted now. Enrolment forms will be included with the information packages and are also available at the school office.

VIEW FROM THE VICARAGE.

Kindness is a word used to describe extreme generosity. The dictionary defines Kindness as being of a gentle nature and being friendly in one's conduct. One thing to note about that definition is that there is no restriction on whom kindness applies to. A great model of displaying kindness God's way appears in the story of the Good Samaritan in the Bible. A story where a Jewish man gets beaten up, two people walk past him and then a third helps him. That is the basic story line but in the story, we are shown what it means to be kind to another.

The first Section being the act.

The act started with the Jewish man that was beaten up. Not only was he beaten up but he was left lying on the road half dead. Then a Jewish priest was walking on the same road some time later. A Jewish priest was a man of high standing. The priest's role was to help people, read them the Old Testament and make sure the Jewish laws were administered correctly. Another of his roles was to care for the people who were of the same racial group. The priest walked by. Not just walked by but made the decision to cross over to the other side of the road to avoid the Jewish man completely. This would amaze any reader of this story. That one of such high community and moral standing would act in such a manner. I don't believe this is how Jesus would want us to model being kind to one another.

However, there was another character in this story. That character was a Levite. Jews and Levites were the same race and only different in name. At this point, you would think that one of the same race would bend down and help his fellow man in both nationality and humanity from his predicament. Nuh! He walked by straight passed him. He didn't thumb his nose at him but he may as well have. Not what you call patriotic let alone kind.

But wait! There's one more. The Samaritan.

Jews and Samaritans were enemies of the highest order. Their relationship was like that of George Bush and Saddam Hussein at this point. Or Pauline Hanson and Asian people a few years ago. Given this information it wouldn't surprise anyone if the Samaritan walked passed on the other side of the road. It wouldn't surprise anyone if the Samaritan bypassed him on the same side of the road. And given their history, it wouldn't surprise anyone if he laid a couple of kicks into the half-dead man whilst he was on the ground. None of those happen. Instead, we are told in the Bible that, "He went to him and bandaged his wounds, pouring on oil and wine. Then he put the man on his own donkey, took him to an inn and took care of him." But that's not all he did. The story continues, "The next day he took out two silver coins and gave them to the innkeeper. 'Look after him,' he said, 'and when I return, I will reimburse you for any extra expense you may

have." In this, we see kindness in action.

But what was the **motive** behind the Samaritan's actions? The Samaritan possessed an attitude of mercy to his neighbour. Mercy is showing kindness to one who has no claim to it. In the eyes of the Samaritan, the Jew did not deserve kindness from Him. But because he had God's mercy upon him, he was able to be kind to his fellow man. Through his act of kindness to us on the cross, Jesus transcended all racial barriers. His act of kindness was for all people. The result of this act of kindness was it gave us an avenue to God. And throughout his ministry he displayed his acts of kindness in times when it was illegal in the eyes of the religious leaders at the time to do anything. But Jesus did not discriminate in any of his acts of kindness at all. So in essence, Jesus modelled what kindness truly is for the whole world to see. Kindness is aimed at building up a person whether it is physically, emotionally or spiritually. It involves a spirit of gentleness to the other person. It involves caring for the other person to the point that they are built up to the point that they can cope on their own as Christians and stand firm. In the case of the Jew that was beaten up, the Samaritan showed extreme kindness by paying for his hotel bills while he was recovering. The Samaritan only stopped paying once the man was able to get home to wherever he lived. That was kindness expressed in the form of generosity.

What's the challenge for us? The challenge is to go and do likewise. We are called to be kind to each other. That's how God wants us to behave towards each other. We are to care for those who are having a rough trot. We are to ensure those who are having a good trot are still having a good trot and if we know of someone in need encourage them to shower the needy with acts of kindness. Being kind to one another means being gentle and caring with all we meet. A kindness we can only have through God's Holy Spirit and expressed without fear or favour in a manner equivalent to that of the good Samaritan.

During these winter months let us express kindness to those who need it.

There is no friend so faithful who will share all our sorrows, who knows our every weakness; the Lord to whom we can take everything in prayer.

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
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Drop-In Craft Mornings





BUSINESS PROFILE - LANCEFIELD FRUITSHED

Lancefield Fruitshed opened is beautiful blue doors approximately 4 months ago at 42 High St, Lancefield. Owners Joe and Kitty Schembri have been living in Lancefield for two years having previously lived in Chintin (just outside of Romsey) for six years.


The fruit shed is a family concern with Joe and Kitty's four young children helping out at the shop from time to time, with the youngest often carried on Kitty's back in a rucksack as she goes about setting up the shop with the new day's fresh produce. The three older children attend St. Mary's school in Lancefield.

The family decided to open a 'fruit and veg' shop in Lancefield as it was so hard to buy fresh produce locally and there was always the need to drive out of town to a Sunbury, Woodend, or Kilmore and beyond to buy good quality fresh produce. Most of the Fruitshed's produce comes from the Footscray wholesale market where Joe goes 3 to 5 times a week - depending on demand to keep the produce always fresh.

The business predominantly consists of quality fresh fruit and vegetables and freshly squeezed fruit juice made from any selection of produce before the customers' eyes - no preservatives or additives just juice! - as nature intended. Other stock includes fresh eggs (both free-range and caged), honey, fresh herbs and nuts. Joe and Kitty are looking at expanding their range further with produce and products not readily available locally such as dried fruits, cous cous, olives and extra virgin olive oil to mention just a few.

The Lancefield Fruitshed is now embarking on a home delivery service to aid the sick and older members of the community as well as the 'time poor' people who may not be able to get into the shop during trading hours. Our operating hours are Mon to Fri 9am - 5.30pm and Sat 9am - 1pm.

The Lancefield Fruit Shed and all Romsey and Lancefield businesses need the support of the wider community to be able to continue to provide and expand their services, now and into the future, so next time you are out of your local area doing your shopping have a think "Can I buy it in Romsey or Lancefield?" If the answer is 'yes', STOP and consider; Shop Local and help your local towns.


