Recipe for this month.

Curried Cauliflower Soup

1Tablespoon Sunflower oil

1medium onion sliced

2 teaspoons curry (or to taste)

1 small cauliflower, roughly chopped

900 ml (11/2 pints) chicken stock

Freshly ground black pepper

4 Tablespoons sunflower seeds, to garnish.

Heat oil & fry onion over moderate heat for 2 mins. Stir in curry powder & cook for 1 Min.

Add cauliflower & stock, season and bring to boil. Cover & simmer for 20 mins.

Cool slightly, then blend.

Return to pan, adjust seasoning if necessary and reheat. Garnish with the sunflower seeds and enjoy.

We are also going to hold a camp early next year so there will be planning for that too. Guide camps are quite different from school camps. The girls choose the theme, decide on the menu and how they will cook it, choose some activities, and decide on names for the patrols in which they carry out the activities. A number of our girls are new so they will spend some time this term learning to put up tents, create a bedroll that stops creepy crawlies getting in, and learning some more camp-fire songs.

The Rise of the Horizontal—Courtesans, Coquettes and Corruption is the evocative title of the inaugural lecture for the new Australian Decorative & Fine Arts Society Central Victoria . Each year there will be a series of broad based arts lectures to be held in the Kyneton Town Hall and everyone is welcome to join this exciting new venture.

This first lecture on Thursday October 5th 2006 at 7.30pm is by Sylvia Sagona of the University of Melbourne. Brilliantly illustrated, she will entertain us with a fascinating insight into the lives of these extraordinary women in Paris in the mid 19th Century. This lecture is not to be missed.

ADFAS started in Britian in 1969 and came to Australia in 1989 where there are now 28 societies all involved in the promotion, advancement and cultivation of the decorative and fine arts. There is much to learn about how works were painted over the centuries and how the processes and materials have changed.

Standard of Living – or Quality of Life?

At first sight it might seem that these are one and the same thing; that they necessarily go together; that you can't have one without the other. But further reflection will show that this is now always so. A high standard of living does not guarantee a good quality of life, and, conversely, a good quality of life does not depend on a high standard of living.

For instance, some primitive races enjoy a good quality of life through their own culture and customs and practices, even though their standard of living is quite meagre and mundane. Some indigenous peoples had a very acceptable and appropriate quality of life until they were overtaken by a civilisation that attempted to improve their standard of living, sometimes with unfortunate results.

Of course they can and often do go together, and there are many instances where quality of life can and does live comfortably with a high standard of living. But there are others where the emphasis, the concentration on standard of living has an adverse and sometimes disastrous effect on quality of life.

Perhaps the most valid and valued aspect of the Gospel message is its close, sometimes uncomfortably close, relevance to modern life. In the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus tells us not to be anxious about material possessions, but to seek first the Kingdom of God and his right-eousness and these other things will fall into their rightful place. This anxiety about material things referred to by Jesus can be related to concentration on standard of living, and seeking first the Kingdom of God to quality of life.

There are a number of ingredients that go to make up quality of life. For many it is centred in belief in God and his abiding goodness and love and in seeking to live in accordance with his will and purpose.

This subject has so many facets that it is not possible, in a few short paragraphs to do much more than touch the fringes of it. But perhaps it is enough just as a reminder that life can hold something eminently satisfying that does not depend on the attainment of a high standard of living.





"Minnaruh", situated at 10 Carlisle Street, home to John & Jenny Shaw since 1970, was built in 1919. Features of this selected garden include one of the oldest gum trees in Woodend, the only native in an otherwise English cottage garden. There are four oaks over 100 years old, one of them being a Macedon oak, and several other old tress including ash, chestnut, maples, and birch. There are rhododendrons, camellias and roses. An interesting vegetable garden sits behind a cinnamon bark tree and leads down to a very efficient compost heap.

"The Gables", an old Victorian house at 19 Brooke Street was built in 1860. It is the home to cooking teacher Diana Marsland. The garden has large 140 year old acacias and cypress. The Michael McCoy designed potager provides endless supplies of herbs and vegetables for the cooking school. Golden elms front the property, large claret ash and golden ash provide shade. A rambling garden of camellias, wisteria, hydrangea and rhododendrons will delight. The small orchard will be in full leaf.

"Woburn" garden at 25 Morris Road is the home of Arthur and Audrey Else. They purchased the property in about 1972 from the estate of the previous owner Mrs Margaret Black, The name Woburn was given by Mrs Black, The name Woburn was given by Mrs Black, who built the house in the early 1930s and comes from her English background. Since his retirement Arthur has been able to find time to fulfill his strong desire to improve the garden,

and has planted many of the ornamental trees and shrubs. Rhododendrons, azaleas, roses, bulbs and annuals. Arthur has a pet sheep which grazes in the meadow behind the garden, an area where the Else children played all sorts of sports during their growing up years.

"Tara Meadow" also known as the Doll's House is at 620 Ashbourne Road. This pleasant parkland garden was created with many hedges and screens, deciduous trees and shrubs, capitalizing on the vistas to the surrounding valley. The current owners, Trevor and Irene Hatcher, have added flowering perennials, bulbs and roses whilst trying to keep the park-like aspect intact. Hopefully this year the new roses will be flowering in soft pinks and white, as well as irises in blue and white. The garden makes use of the hedges in a casual way including westringia, photinia, pittosporum and other mixed hedges. Fragrant shrubs including daphne, philadelphus and choisya are close to the veranda so that the fragrance comes inside. The garden is fairly low maintenance, except to mowing and trimming and is watered during the hotter months by use of bore water.

Special Note: Trevor and Irene Hatcher have agreed to host a Craft Table on the spacious veranda. So do have a look at the Auxiliary's work. You may care to make an early Christmas purchase. All funds raised will go to the Kyneton Hospital.


