If you hold a Pension Card, Health Care Card or Veterans' Affairs Gold Card you may be eligible for these concessions

- The Annual Electricity Concession came into effect on 1 March 2011 replacing the Winter Energy Concession (for electricity only). It provides eligible Victorian concession card holders with a 17.5 per cent rebate on every electricity bill.
- The *Winter Energy Concession* provides a discount of 17.5% off mains gas bills from May 1<sup>st</sup> to October 31<sup>st</sup> each year.
- The Off Peak Concession provides a 13% reduction on the off peak tariff rates on all quarterly electricity bills.
- If you use LPG, non-mains electricity or an alternative fuel such as heating oil, you also may be eligible for a *Non-Mains Winter Energy Concession*. This is is an annual rebate for eligible cardholders who use an alternate fuel such as diesel, petrol or heating oil as their main domestic energy source. The amount of the rebate depends on the annual amount of non-mains energy purchased

If you are having trouble paying your energy bills, please notify your energy provider who can let you know of the payment options available to you.


NTPs went to M Hall 1 & 16 and L Gaunt 15.





## **A Quiet Winter Night**

Winter is well and truly upon us; a time for soup, open fires, and quiet nights in. In June Sunday@Six will be suitably seasonal, starting with soup at **5.15 pm**, and then a Taizé-style service at **6** 

Taizé is an ecumenical community based in France. Its history goes back to 1940 when the then 25-year-old Brother Roger left Switzerland, his birthplace, for France, the country his mother came from. For years he had been ill with tuberculosis, and during that long convalescence he had discovered a call to create community.

During World War Two Brother Roger provided shelter for refugees fleeing the war in the small village of Taizé, which was close to the demarcation line dividing France in two. Sensitive to the beliefs of those he was sheltering, Brother Roger prayed alone; he often went to sing far from the house, in the woods. So that none of the refugees, Jews or agnostics, would feel ill-atease, each person in the community who wished to pray was asked to do so alone in their rooms.

In autumn 1942 a retired French officer, a friend of Brother Roger's family, warned that everyone should leave at once. Until the end of the war Brother Roger lived in Geneva and it was there that he began a common life with his first Brothers. They were able to return to Taizé in 1944.

Today, the Taizé Community is made up of over a hundred Brothers, Catholics and Protestant, from around thirty countries. By its very existence Taizé is a "parable of community" that wants its life to be a sign of reconciliation between divided Christians and between separated peoples.

Taizé has its own particular worship style. Three times each day, everything stops on the hill of Taizé: the work, the Bible studies, the small-group discussions. Bells call everyone to the church for prayer. Hundreds, sometimes thousands, of young adults from many different countries pray and sing with the Brothers of the community. The short songs sung over and over again express basic truths in few words. Then the Bible is read in several languages. At the centre of every prayer service, a long moment of silence offers an irreplaceable opportunity to encounter God.

The June Sunday@Six will be a Taizé-style service, led by young people from Brunswick Uniting Church. This quiet, meditative style of worship seems particularly suitable for the quietness of winter, as the nights draw in.

## **Old Primary School Site Update**

There has been much recent discussion regarding the future of the old Romsey Primary School site, currently on the Department of Education and Early Childhood Development's list of assets for disposal.

The Monegeetta Room at the Community Hub was full for the "Save Our Public Space" meeting convened by GRAAP on Monday 16<sup>th</sup> May 2011 to discuss this historic site's future. The three East Ward councillors – Crs. Donovan, Morabito and McLaughlin – were all in attendance.

The evening was opened by the GRAAP President, Raelene Mottram, who explained the purpose of the evening was to



explore support for the retention of the site for community use rather than be sold off for private development. She also read a list of apologies from those unable to attend before introducing a panel of speakers. This included Vanessa Meredith

(GRAAP Vice President), Tino Fichera (local business owner), Hugh Drummond (Macedon Ranges Shire Arts Advisory Committee) and Greg Powell (Rotary). They each spoke to the merits of the site being retained as a public space and how it could be advantageous to our growing town's amenity for both local residents and visitors to the region. The notion of a recreational and cultural facility centrally located to compliment the sporting facilities at Romsey Park was discussed. Questions and comments were taken from the floor with the mood being

strongly supportive of such an aesthetically pleasing land parcel being retained for the community.

On Thursday 19th May, a GRAAP delegation and a number of other interested community members were present for a meeting with the Hon. Martin Dixon (Minister for Education) during a visit to Romsey. This meeting had been facilitated by Donna Petrovich, MLC Northern Victoria. Minister Dixon had visited the site and was interested in the presentation delivered to him. He adjourned to the Community Hub to discuss this and other local issues with MRSC councillors.

So, GRAAP remains positive in its quest to lead the charge for the old primary school site to remain in public use and encourages those who support this quest to write or email the Minister and other political contacts as listed below.






## **St Mary's Primary School News**

To all the people who visited us for our Pete Smith day, we hope you had an enjoyable time and no doubt had a wonderful afternoon tea.





## Lessons from Recessions: Cash is Still King

While economists and pundits may argue about whether Australia was officially in a recession recently, there is no doubt in the business community that the past several years have brought on a substantial amount financial uncertainty. Both consumers and businesses alike have watched the economic crises, both at home and abroad, from the same disturbing viewpoint. They have also both taken the same lesson from these troubling times: Cash is still king.

With consumers cutting back on discretionary spending, limiting the amount of new debt they are willing to incur and keeping their cash in the bank, businesses in every sector have had to keep an ever closer eye on their own cash reserves. Not only have businesses had to watch current cash reserves, but also take an increased look at future cash flows as they become more constrained while consumers tighten purse strings.

And even as the world economy rebounds, experts say that those purse strings will continue to stay tight. Kit Yarrow, PhD., writing in Psychology Today, says that the "consumer will not return to rampant pre-recession spending levels. They've become more conscious and mindful about all the costs of consuming—those being money, security and time. And they've learned new ways to shop."


These new and unpredictable consumer spending patterns ripple through the economy, where even businessto-business suppliers see increased hesitancy from their retailer customers to ramp up inventory or invest in production or service capacity increases. In fact, a recent study by American Express of small companies indicated that 49% had cash-flow concerns. While some businesses continue to hunker down and take a "wait and see" approach to future growth investments, others are taking a new approach to cash flow to deal with the new realities of the post-recession world.

In working with a vast array of businesses and business owners, the businesses we see most successfully positioning themselves for stability, and even high growth, are taking lessons from the recent downturn by changing the way they look at their cash flows. In reviewing a representative sample of mid-sized businesses (those with turnover between \$200,000 and \$5,000,000), there is a common trend. What we are seeing is that the most stable and successful mid-sized businesses are doing a much better job at analyzing and forecasting their cash flows so they can be managed in a way that achieves growth objectives. In comparison, businesses that continue to simply manage current bank cash balances are less able to head-off the common problems associated with insufficient cash flows.

By taking action to accurately forecast cash flows, even up to a year in advance, the most successful businesses are finding that they no longer need to hoard cash in the face of uncertain economic times. According to Paul LaRock a principal at Treasury Strategies in Chicago, "Too many companies get blindsided by unfavorable movements in cash flow that are predictable if they really sat down and thought through it." In fact, many local businesses are finding they can take the cash flow discipline that the downturn forced on them to outgrow competitors that lack the forecasting and, therefore, ability to plan for and fund growth efforts.

So, it seems that cash flow is still king, and businesses that have best learned to forecast and control their cash flows are becoming "king of the hill."

## Law Week in Bendigo for Seniors

Nine years ago, 89-year-old pensioner Clem made a verbal agreement with his son that he would receive care and accommodation in return for investing in his son's property. Clem sold his home, gave his son and daughter-in-law a large sum to re-fit and extend their house, and moved in with them.

A month ago Clem's son separated from his wife and moved interstate. Clem's daughter-in-law is not prepared to honour the original agreement and has asked Clem to move out. Clem has few savings, no protected interest in the property and nowhere else suitable to live.

Tabitha O'Shea, a solicitor for Seniors Rights Victoria in Bendigo, says that this is an all too common situation for seniors. "What starts out as a suitable arrangement for an older member of the family, can end up difficult, stressful and destructive, especially when there is a family breakdown".

The 1996 census showed that 20% of people over 65 years of age who lived in private dwellings, shared them with children, relatives or friends. It is estimated that less than 1% of these people have formal agreements in place. This can mean the older person's interest in the property is not legally protected.

Ms O'Shea said "We encourage all family members to sit down and discuss the options for accommodation when considering a 'granny flat' arrangement or anything similar. This will enable all concerned to have a clear understanding of the agreement and to protect their respective interests".

"Often a solicitor can help them draft a document which will formalise the agreement".

"It is far better to discuss and formalise an agreement before situations occur which could possibly jeopardise any one person's interests or end up with the older person becoming homeless".





The day kicked of with all 3 Netball teams donning Pink



Debt waiver to help low-income debtors in financial hardship – we want your debts!

To mark the opening of Law Week on Monday 16th May, the Bendigo based Loddon Campaspe Community Legal Centre will launch an innovative bulk debt negotiation program to help low-income debtors in financial hardship.

The Centre is inviting people who live in the Loddon Campaspe region that receive a centrelink benefit and have significant personal debts to contact the Centre to see if it can assist to negotiate debt relief one their behalf. Case example

Betty was drowning in debt. She simply couldn't afford to spread her disability support pension any thinner, juggling the costs of food, heating, medication while facing relentless calls for interest repayments. She had already negotiated several repayment plans for her credit card debt, but was falling behind again. What she really needed was a clean slate. so that she could meet her day to day living expenses without the pressure of debt collectors breathing down her neck.

## How the plan works

Peter Noble, Principal Solicitor at the Centre said "It's a no-brainer. Instead of negotiating hardship cases or repayment plans on a case by case basis, which wastes everyone's time, matters are bundled together where there is a common creditor (such as a finance company, insurer or utility service providers) and are negotiated together."

The scheme, which has been trialed in metro areas but not in a regional setting, has proved hugely successful, wiping millions of dollars of debts, relieving hardship from hundreds of people who struggle from week to week just to buy food and medicines.

The scheme is good for everyone. It identifies those people that need immediate financial relief through debt waiver and fast tracks a resolution, helping the creditor to wipe a bad debt and move on."

## LODDON MALLEE DRAFT REGIONAL STRATEGIC FIRE MANAGEMENT PLAN - Community comments

A comprehensive plan to manage bushfire for the next decade in the Loddon Mallee Region has been on public display for community comment for the last 6 weeks. The plan was on display and available at service centres of local Government, Emergency organisations and some utilities across the region. Electronic versions were available on line at the IFMP website and in summary form in an A3 give away. The comment period closed on April the 29th.

Seventeen comments were received on the plan from community members, government organisations, local Government and utilities. The electronic version of the plan on the IFMP website received 516 visits from 269 separate persons.

All comments received were insightful and will assist in improving the plan. Comments referred to matters of local, regional and State interest. An amended plan will be presented to the Regional committee for consideration in late May 2011.

Patrick O'Brien, the Chair of the Loddon Mallee Regional Strategic Fire Management Planning committee said.

\*I would like to thank those in the community and partner organisations who took the time to consider the plan and where they felt the need, to contribute to its improvement. The plan provides the basis for our collective direction in the Loddon Mallee and appears to have addressed the interest of a large breadth of the community."

The feedback from the community has included comment on biodiversity management, legislative and regulatory powers, refinement of fire prevention strategies, and changes in State policy. Some of these matters have, or will be, referred to technical specialists for advice or the relevant organisation for follow up action.

Mr O 'Brien further commented.

\*The feedback from the community gives us some things to work on, but provides us with a great deal of confidence that we are heading in the right direction to improve our fire management activities in the Loddon Mallee.\*
