





December can get so hectically busy with buying presents and preparing for family gatherings that even the most committed Christian can find it hard to observe Advent, the four weeks before Christmas.

This year the Romsey and Lancefield Uniting Churches are celebrating Christmas in July, as well as in December. Over the first four weeks of July we will celebrate the four Sundays of Advent, the period of preparation for Christmas, spending time in thoughtful exploration and preparation for the astonishing Incarnation of God in a baby born to an ordinary family.

Then, at Sunday@Six on the 24th of July, we'll celebrate the Feast of the Incarnation, Christmas, the astounding idea that God loves us so much that God became human to share that love with us.

If family commitments or summer holidays mean that you can't come to church on Christmas Day - come and celebrate in July. There'll be Christmas food beforehand from 5 pm, and then a service of glee and gladness at Romsey Uniting Church from 6 pm.

(If you're worried about celebrating Jesus' birthday on a date other than December the 25th, be reassured that we don't actually *know* the date of Jesus' birth. The shepherds were keeping their flocks outside that night, but that could have been anytime from March to November. We're not sure why the Christian church decided in the fourth century to celebrate Jesus' birth on December 25, but scholars suspect it was because the Christians were competing with pagan festivals.)

So we can celebrate the Incarnation in winter – and get to sing carols like "In the bleak mid-winter"!



The week prior two bystanders rescued a baby from a burning home in Bentleigh East after clothes drying near a heater caught fire. The home did not have a working smoke alarm. Three days later in Carnegie, an elderly man heater went up in flames.

And just weeks ago there was a fire fatality in regional Victoria - believed to be caused by a blanket on an electric fan heater – where there was no smoke alarm in the home.

In 2010, more than 1200 Victorian homes were damaged by fire. Of these, 42 percent started in the kitchen and 12 percent in the bedroom. Cooking and heating were the two greatest causes of these fires.

Speaking at the joint Country Fire Authority and Metropolitan Fire Brigade launch. Fire Services Commissioner Craig Lapsley called on all Victorians to be more careful, and to

follow the advice being put out by CFA and MFB.



Dollars that may save lives

The Macedon Ranges community is being urged to dig deeper to fund medical equipment for ambulances. An appeal launched this month by the revitalised Woodend Ambulance Auxiliary has raised \$5200 but a further \$23,000 is needed to purchase the equipment deemed vital to transporting patients from rural regions to metropolitan hospitals.

The auxiliary aims to purchase vacuum mattresses, ventilators, syringe pumps, fridges, vacuum arm and leg splints, and mobile phones.

Woodend Ambulance Team Manager Murray Kennedy said donation boxes were located across the shire and Woodend businesses and residents in particular had already been generous.

"We hope to see more donations coming from the Macedon/Mt Macedon area as more people become aware of the new "Macedon" ambulance operating out of Woodend from July 11."

Mr Kennedy said the Macedon unit would service the Macedon Ranges at peak periods of the day, and would be joined in October by two state-of-the-art Mercedes sprinter vehicles

"I urge everyone to give so we can get the best equipment onto these new ambulances. This equipment is vital so that our paramedics can further enhance our service delivery to the entire community. Our aim is to get you to the best hospitals with as much comfort and care as possible." The new equipment being sought would ensure the 24-hour rostered vehicles at Woodend offer optimal comfort and care.

Among those who have answered the ambulance auxiliary's call for financial support is Frank Gorlitz, owner of Schatzi's restaurant in Woodend. Frank, a regular and generous contributor to health related charity causes, has agreed to match all donations made into his restaurant's donation hav

"We are so grateful to Frank and local businesses such as

MR Projects, Joan Gladman Real Estate and the 19th Hole Shopping Centre for their support," said Mr Kennedy. Improvements to the regional ambulance service coincide with an increase in paramedics from seven to 15 and a major redevelopment of the branch depot. Perfect Partnership (alternative title Trish and Craig's Big Adventure)

Trish Mitchell had been at Café Colenso in Woodend for almost five years. For the last two years of that time she had owned it. "I was really exhausted and I needed a break. When I sold the café I remember saying I would never own another café" she recalls.

On the other hand, Craig Steans had worked as Trish's chef. When Trish sold, Craig realised he was tired of working for someone else. He needed his own café. "I looked at about five cafés in Woodend, Gisborne and Kyneton. None of them were quite right" he explains. Then Trish, a long term resident of Romsey, mentioned that The Baytree Coffee Shop was up for sale.

Craig wanted a café / restaurant rather than a coffee shop. This meant significantly overhauling the kitchen. The dining areas and the garden also needed a makeover. "It was too big a project for me to handle by myself" he recalls "But I just could not let it go. It is such a lovely old place, with a fantastic garden. It was also clear to me that locals really loved the place."

Craig approached Trish and suggested a partnership. Everything suddenly came together and they realised that it was the perfect partnership and the perfect place. "We decided to keep the name, out of respect for the history of the venue"

explains Trish. "We also made sure the open fire places were working and chose colours and fittings to suit the warm country feel of the place." In three weeks of sometimes frantic activity, the kitchen and dining areas were transformed so that the coffee shop became a café / restaurant.

"The kitchen is still quite small, so I need to be smart about what I put on the menu" says Craig. "The daytime menu has a lot of variety. However, when we opened for dinner in March, we opted for a small seasonal dinner menu." The café has a loyal following. A small seasonal menu gives variety for those customers that come for dinner often.

The kitchen was also designed so that Craig can bake a lot of the breads used in the café on site. He also makes his own pasta. "Most of what comes out of the kitchen is honest, home style food" he says. "It's just much tastier that way."

Space constraints also meant they needed to be very selec-

space constraints also meant they needed to be very selective with their wine list. The aim was to keep it small, local, good quality and excellent value for money. "We could have gone for cheap and cheerful wines, but we wanted our customers to enjoy the wines as much as they enjoy the food" says Craig.

The Baytree Coffee Shop is located at 119A Main Street, Romsey. It is open Wednesday to Sunday during the day and for dinner on Friday and Saturday nights.

National Diabetes Week 10 – 16 July 2011

There are 2 aims for this years National Diabetes Week's campaign the first is to encourage the 2 million Australians at high risk of developing type 2 diabetes to assess their risk. The other is to encourage those who have known diabetes to have regular eye checks. Diabetic eye disease or retinopathy is a significant cause of vision loss and blindness in adult Australians. About one in six people with diabetes is affected by retinopathy.

Data shows that there are currently 1 million people diagnosed with diabetes living in Australia. The number of people in Victoria with diabetes has doubled since 2001 with approx 220,000 Victorians now having diabetes. The diabetes epidemic is growing by a staggering 275 new cases every day. Type 2 diabetes is the fastest growing chronic condition in Australia with many Australians not aware of the seriousness of diabetes. Ongoing high blood sugars can cause complications including blindness, kidney disease, and amputation. Type 2 is the most common type of diabetes and is often tied to obesity. It develops when the body fails to produce enough insulin to break down glucose, inflating blood sugar levels. The disease can be managed with diet, exercise and medication. For those at risk of developing diabetes there is good evidence that lifestyle changes including diet changes, regular exercise and weight loss can either delay or prevent the onset of the condition.

Ann Bush the Diabetes Educator at Macedon Ranges Health regularly sees local residents who are currently living with diabetes or have just found out that they have diabetes. Unfortunately Ann is concerned that she is seeing a lot of people with complications of diabetes including renal failure, vision problems, heart conditions and problems with their feet and legs. "What I would like to see are more people who are newly diagnosed or at risk of diabetes so that we can start working with them to make the lifestyle changes necessary and help prevent these complications. Most of the diabetes complications are preventable and it breaks my heart to see people struggling with their diabetes when we could have empowered them to manage the condition from the start and prevented these problems. Once a complication is diagnosed all we can do is manage it and hopefully make changes to prevent it becoming life threatening".

Macedon Ranges Health will be holding a number of events to promote National Diabetes week including Pharmacy based health checks where people will be able to access diabetes risk factor assessments and blood pressure checks. Health professionals will also be available to provide personal assistance with your diabetes including our Dietitian Naomi Adams and Diabetes Educator Ann Bush. 

CFA Executive Manager of Operational Training and Volunteerism, Lex De Man, joined the CFA delegation to the Summit and was extremely impressed with the calibre of the representatives selected by each district.

"Our delegates conducted themselves with enormous professionalism," Mr De Man said. "They actively contributed in the open forum discussions and breakout sessions, and did themselves and the organisation proud whilst shining light on the CFA brand at a conference of national significance."

With an emphasis this year on the younger generation, social media including Facebook and Twitter were incorporated real-time into the summit program, adding another level of discussion to the summit as well as involving volunteer members from around the country that could not physically attend the summit.

There were 17 presentations over the two-day conference that addressed topics such as inter-agency training partnerships, national transferability of qualifications, challenges to volunteering, young volunteers as leaders, respecting volunteers' time, engagement through social media, public perceptions of volunteers versus paid emergency service workers and other challenges for the sector.

Since last month's edition of the Romsey Rag, GRAAP has followed up on the

meeting with the Minister for Education, Martin Dixon regarding the old Romsey Primary School site, currently on the Department of Education and Early Childhood Development's (DEECD) list of assets for disposal.

Letters requesting an update on the discussions had on 20th May have been written to Minister Dixon, Donna Petrovich (MLC, Northern Victoria), Peter Johnson (CEO, Macedon Ranges Shire Council), and Cr. Henry McLaughlin (Mayor and East Ward councillor).

At this stage, no response to these queries has been received.

GRAAP is currently exploring funding options which could possibly facilitate a purchase of the site by Macedon Ranges Shire Council if it was offered to it by DEECD as part of the disposal process.

The enthusiasm demonstrated at the recent Save Our Public Space Meeting and in correspondence received by GRAAP has reinforced the commitment to saving this site for public use.

The notion of a recreational and cultural facility centrally located is still loud on the discussion radar. Thankyou for attending the public meeting and the letters of support sent to GRAAP, to the Minister and local members.
