

#### Reduce the risk of house fire

- Take extra care when using heaters, electric blankets or open fires.
- Use a fire guard in front of open fires
- Never leave lit candles unattended

Never dry clothes on a heater

While not all risks can be totally eliminated, you can definitely reduce fire risks in your home with just a few common sense simple steps you can reduce your risk of becoming a fire victim.



#### **Making Maths Learning Fun**

Romsey Primary School is committed to ensuring our teachers and education support staff have regular opportunities to plan, reflect and improve their teaching capacity. On the last day of term two we spent the day working with Michel Ymer. He is an experienced mathematics teacher/consultant who is involved in numerous Victorian state initiatives in Mathematics. His enthusiasm for teaching Mathematics is infec-

tious and he has a clear and practical approach to the challenges that confront schools. His main message focused on the importance for all students to have fluency with low numbers and to be able to manipulate and understand their interrelationship. The other important component is a clear understanding of place value. His presentations included a variety of engaging activities which involved cards, dice and real life situations and an understanding of what does and doesn't work in classrooms. Within classrooms there is a 5 year span of ability and Michael demonstrated many ways of altering a learning task to suit this wide range of abilities.

I would like to invite members of the community to attend our parent session with Michael on Monday 28th May for 7:00 to 8:00pm in the library.

#### News from the Classrooms Preps

It is very pleasing to report that all Prep students have made a terrific start to the term. Refreshed and rejuvenated, all students have been participating enthusiastically in their classroom programs, working to the best of their ability. This term their Integrated Inquiry studies will be based around investigating the properties of materials used in the classroom and toys. Students will explore the suitability of materials and changes to classroom materials and toys over time. Literacy and Numeracy activities will at times incorporate aspects of this topic. Already, students have shown a keen interest in the topic and are looking forward to expanding and refining their current understandings.

#### Year 1/2 Inquiry for term two is What's Living in the Garden?

Within the unit students will be exploring questions such as;

- · What are the differences between living and non-living things?
- · What are the differences between plants and animals?
- · What characteristics do minibeasts and plants have?
- · What are the stages of the lifecycle of a minibeast/plant?

Students will be encouraged to explore and discover minibeasts and plants in their gardens at home.

#### Year 3/4: Life in the Water

Students have had a positive start to term 2. They are well prepared for learning and demonstrate awareness of behaviours that contribute to a successful learning environment. Positive social relationships have been established and this is assisting students to feel happy and safe within the school environment. The Integrated Inquiry Topic this term is Life in the Water. Students will be exploring the life of living and non-living organisms, and their requirements for survival. They will develop an understanding of human impact on water ecosystems. Students will continue to have the wonderful opportunity to use the schools' netbooks throughout the curriculum, building on their ICT skills. In Maths students will continue to extend their knowledge of place value, number patterns and learn efficient methods for addition, subtraction, multiplication and division. A focus in measurement will also be to estimate, measure, order and compare length and area and describe angles in everyday situations

#### **Year 5/6 Learning Priorities for Term Two**

In Literacy there will be a continued focus on reading with an emphasis on summarising. Teaching students to summarise improves their ability to identify key elements, comprehend content and connect information to the text. In Numeracy this semester students will continue to look at number, in particular multiplication and division, and working mathematically. Areas to be covered include fractions and decimals, perimeter and area and time.

The Integrated Inquiry will be looking at the formation of Government. Key understandings will include:

- · Rules and laws provide a framework for living safely, justly and fairly within a community
- · Australia's government is a democracy and laws can be made or changed through parliament and enforced through the
- · Democratic systems are based on the ideal that all people can participate in decision making
- · In Australia we have three levels of government that are elected by the people
- · Some international governments are not elected through a democratic process
- · The media has a responsibility to present information in a balanced way

## MEN'S SHED FUNDING ROUND OPENS FOR LOCAL COMMUNITIES

Applications have opened for funding from the Gillard Government for tools, new activities and more local workspaces under the men's sheds program, Rob Mitchell, Labor Member for McEwen announced today.

"Up to \$10,000 in federal support is available to men's sheds in our local community – and I encourage them to apply under the Government's latest funding round," Mr Mitchell said.

There are more than 700 men's sheds in Australia, with more than 55,000 members. Including 13 run by local organisations across the McEwen electorate. The program is funded by the Gillard Government because it helps encourage preventive health care among men who work in the sheds alongside their friends.

"I know how men's sheds make a positive contribution to the community with the projects they work on and the social connection they provide for the blokes who use them." Mr Mitchell said. "It's also a chance for men to come together to talk about men's health which we blokes tend not to do enough. I've seen first hand how men's sheds have given opportunities to youth at risk to gain practical skills from experienced older blokes, particularly retired tradesmen."

Local sheds can apply for up to \$6,000 to improve access or utility connection for existing buildings; up to \$5,000 for local fundraising costs and \$4,000 for tools and equipment including work benches and safety gear.

#### \$79.800 COALITION GOVERNMENT FUNDING FOR A NEW SUNBURY TAXI RANK

"The Coalition Government will provide \$79,800 to improve safety and access at Sunbury's railway station taxi rank," Donna Petrovich, State Member for Northern Victoria, announced today.

Mrs Petrovich said that the Coalition Government's Taxi Rank Safety Program (TRSP) will allow the construction of a new taxi rank by the Hume City Council.

"The new taxi rank will be built in Brook Street and assist not just local shoppers and nightclub attendees but also result in an improved waiting area for train and bus passengers who need a taxi in Sunbury," Mrs Petrovich said.

Minister Mulder said the TRSP was making real improvements to taxi rank safety and amenity all over Victoria. "So far the TRSP has allocated over \$1.5 million to councils across the state. The TRSP is part of the Coalition Government's commitment to build better taxi services for passengers, taxi drivers and the local community," Mr Mulder said.

Mr Mulder said "Professor Alan Fells will hand his Taxi Industry Inquiry draft to the Government in the next few months."

Mrs Petrovich said today that "Sunbury is one of 13 municipalities in the third round of the \$4 million TRSP, announced by Minister Mulder.

The project is expected to commence in February 2013 and will compliment the modification of the railway station under the Sunbury Electrification Project.

This is a significant boost to the redevelopment at Sunbury."

Mrs Petrovich said "Full details are yet to be finalized but it is likely that new lighting, seating, shelter, better access for disabled passengers, signage and information will be included. I believe the existing taxi pick-up arrangements in the Sunbury Town Centre will be improved to better satisfy the requirements of the current modernization of the transport system."



## Macedon Ranges to share in \$400,000 heritage support

Donna Petrovich has welcomed Planning Minister Matthew Guy's announcement that the Macedon Ranges Shire Council is one of 36 councils across Victoria to receive funding towards the provision of Heritage Advisory Services for 2011-12.

Mrs Petrovich said she was pleased that Macedon Ranges Shire Council received the maximum funding of \$14,000.

Councils supplement the funds with a minimum \$1 for \$1 expenditure to provide Heritage Advisory Services through the appointment of an experienced professional to:

Provide free advice to owners of heritage places

Assist councils with the management of heritage assets

Promote heritage conservation in the municipality.

Mrs Petrovich said heritage advisors helped residents make appropriate decisions on restoration and development plans for heritage sites.

"These services can help people recognise the importance and historical significance of early buildings and how they can enhance streetscapes and enrich our understanding of our local history," said Mrs Petrovich.

Mr Guy said the programs provided by Heritage Advisory Services, first trialled in Maldon in 1977, have been successful in developing a positive attitude towards heritage through the provision of free heritage advice to councils, communities and owners and managers of heritage properties.

"The benefits of these services are now evident in many towns with restored heritage buildings, appropriate signage and upgraded streetscapes," Mr Guy said.

#### **Book Review** Rodney Hall, Silence

Silence is a collection of 29 short stories, each exploring an experience, interpretation or memory of silence - in all its forms ranging across continents and ages and from the very personal to the historically tragic and contemporary political. Silence is not just a theme that weaves its way



(sometimes imperceptibly) throughout the collection, it is also a feature of Hall's inspiration, in that the stylistic approach and events at the heart of each story are a nod to the works of fellow the State Library of Victoria. writers - his 'silent partners' as he refers to them in the afterword.

Some in the group found the stories too short or the 'silent partners' too contrived. One found the stories too bleak and disturbing to finish the book. The majority of the group, however, were deeply moved or enthralled by the stories, and marvelled about how Hall's mastery of language and imagery could conjure whole worlds, other ages and states of being so vividly in such distilled form. Some are barely more than a page long – like the exquisite 'Korean House' in which a servant woman is determined to shame the invading Japanese army by leaving a house in immaculate order. Others, like 'Winter Campaign' builds layers of evocative imagery across several pages to tell the haunting story of an army of 9000 men making camp in the tundra at nightfall, against the backdrop of battle at dawn, and heavily falling snow.

The majority of us agreed that this is a collection of stories that we will want to re-read and savour. Despite the few who didn't warm to the book, the overwhelming enthusiasm of the rest of the group has put this collection of stories on our 'favourites' list.

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



## COOLER WEATHER MEANS A HIGH RISK TIME FOR HOUSE FIRES

With Victoria set to experience an early dose of winter this week, CFA is warning all residents for the increased risk for house fires.

Already in the Northern and Western Metropolitan Region, CFA crews have responded to a number of major house fires in Melton, Sunbury and Wyndham Vale.

With much of the state now experiencing cooler temperatures, Sunbury Leading Firefighter Gary Andison said the risk for house fires was high.

"Winter is one of the highest risk periods for residential fires, and many of these incidents can actually be avoided." he said.

LFF Andison said this included fires that were caused by heaters that had not been properly checked or maintained.

"It is around this time of year that people will be turning on their heaters and other heating appliances for the first time in a number of months," he said.

"All heating appliances must be installed by a qualified tradesperson and correctly maintained in line with the manufactures recommendations."

LFF Andison said residents with an open fire should also have their chimneys checked and swept annually.

Another danger area around the home is the kitchen, with one of the most common causes of winter fires being accidents or distractions from cooking.

"Never leave cooking, heaters, open fires or candles unattended. This includes drying clothes too close to heaters," LFF Andison said.

"In the bedroom, people should ensure electric blankets are turned on, no more than 30 minutes before getting into bed and are turned off, once you are in bed. You should never have heavy items on the bed when the electric blanket is turned on.

"There are many precautions you can take to help safeguard your home and protect your family from the threat of fire.

"One of the most important things is to ensure your home has a working smoke alarm."

Last year there were more than 250 residential fires across the North West Metro region, with the highest number of incidents in Sunbury, Hoppers Crossing and Werribee.
