2 tbspns cocoa

1 1/2 teasp instant coffee powder

Pinch Salt

125g butter

2 eggs slightly beaten

1/2 teasp vanilla essence

1-2 tbspns milk

3/4cup firmly packed brown sugar

1 tblspn cocoa

2 cups hot water

Sift flour, cocoa, instant coffee and salt. Cream butter and sugar until light, gradually beat in eggs and vanilla. Add a little flour mixture with last few additions of egg, then fold in remaining flour and enough milk to mix to a fairly soft consistency.

Spoon mixture into well greased oven dish and spread

Sprinkle with dry sauce ingredients and pour over hot wa-

Bake in a moderately hot oven for 40 mins,.

"To make democracy work, we must be a nation of participants, not simply observers. One who does not vote has no right to complain" - Louis L'Amour.

I wonder what the American author would make of the Lowy Institute survey that shows many Australians are quite indifferent about democracy and younger Australians in particular do not believe democracy is the best form of government.

Of those aged 18 to 29, 23 % believe that it doesn't matter what kind of government we have.

37 % say non democratic rule can be best, and only 39 % believe democracy is better than other forms of government.

This disconnection of young people from the political system is a problem. While they may seek to excuse themselves from political engagement they are possibly more affected by the outcomes of the democratic process than others. The impact of political decisions today will have a decisive and cumulative effect on their socio-economic circumstances across their lifetimes.

Are they disengaged because we have a stable political system, they don't like the major political parties, or is it just youthful boredom?

What will it take for our younger citizens to embrace and participate in democracy and how do engage them? I am interested in your thoughts.

Book Review

"We need to talk about Kevin" is fictional, although the personality and traits of Kevin and his mother, Eva (who is the narrator), may be loosely based on real people. After all, there are numerous mentions of real life experiences of high school shootings and massacres. The story is a series of letters written by Eva to her husband, although she never sends them, in which she reflects on Kevin and tries to answer the question - was it all her fault?



The letters recount details of Kevin as an extremely manipulative and calculating child, even at the age of 3 years old he is able to plot revenge against his mother. Eva details conversations she has had with Kevin as a child and these conversations give Kevin a sense of intelligence and rationality which doesn't seem to fit with the behaviour of a 'normal' child of comparative age, but then again, perhaps this is exactly the point? Do we question the accuracy and perspective of Eva as she recounts her memories or alternatively do we challenge our own ideas of what is 'normal'? Furthermore, the debate of nurture vs nature is essentially the basis of this book; if Eva had done something different, would Kevin be different? If she had loved him more, would he have done what he did? OR would it all be exactly the same?

The Executive Director has advised that, following a meeting with representatives of the Macedon Ranges Shire Council in April, DEECD has instructed the Valuer-General to undertake a valuation of the site. Once this is completed, it will be offered to MRSC for con-

Likewise, MRSC representatives have indicated they will be giving us an update over the next few weeks. GRAAP remains hopeful that this significant Romsey land will soon be formally controlled by MRSC. This would enable plans for a very special outdoor community space to be finalised.



Draft Municipal Fire Management Plans Released for Community Comment across Loddon Mallee Region

The Municipal Fire Management Planning Committees of the Loddon Mallee Region have each proposed draft fire management plans for community comment as part of the integrated fire management planning process in the region. Municipal Fire Management Planning Committees have been established over the last 18 months. The new committees have a greater scope of responsibility and a broader span of representation than previously required for Municipal Fire Prevention Committees. The new Municipal Fire Management Planning Committees are linked to the Municipal Emergency Planning Committees, thereby ensuring greater alignment between emergency management and fire management. The plans have been prepared in line with new requirements established by the Emergency Management Manual of Victoria.

The Chair of the Regional Fire Management Planning Committee and Regional Director of the CFA, Mr Patrick O'Brien, said: "The new Municipal Fire Management Planning Committees provide a great forum for a more cooperative and effective approach to fire management. The Municipal committees have identified their own community engagement strategies and plans, in line with the community needs, undertaken detailed risk analysis focused on bushfire and prepared draft plans for the community to comment. I encourage all to take the opportunity to review and comment, as our experience was that every comment added some extra content, perspective or nuance that needed to be incorporated."

Draft plans will be available for review from a range of resources with some Committees including workshops, drop-ins or other specialized community engagement activities. All plans will be placed on the IFMP website: www.ifmp.vic.gov.au

Inspector Colin Renton, the Regional Emergency Inspector from Victoria Police, observed: "The Municipal Committees have come a long way in the last 12 months and are to be congratulated for the rigor and determination with which they have approached the task to truly understand the real risk that communities face, and the sources of the risk. The work done, and the information before us, allow us to make significant inroads into building community resilience with regard to bushfire and translating that to other hazard environments."

Municipal plans fundamentally coordinate the different programs that are put in place and bring greater cohesion and collaboration between the fire and emergency services, land owners and managers, the utility and transport sector, the community and business and industry. The plans are not static with the intent to continuously improve, meaning that an improvement plan is incorporated in each. The plans will have a three year life and be reviewed annually. 




