After many year of negotiations between the Romsey Primary School Council and the Macedon Ranges Shire Council, we celebrated the opening of this joint usage facility for the young people of Romsey During school days the oval is available for school use and after hours the community can benefit with this quality oval. For many years Romsey Lancefield Little Athletics have managed on an inferior site on the school ground and now will have a flat fully irrigated surface for their events. Junior cricket and junior football will also benefit. The oval was opened by The Honourable Minister for Sport and Recreation Hugh Delahunty. Also in attendance were a number of representatives from The Macedon Rang- Bicycle Education es Shire Council including the Mayor, Roger Dukes, Peter Johnston, Rod Clough and Graham Treadwell whom we worked closely with to see the completion of this excellent project. Other guests included local councillors and Donna Petrovich.

I was particularly excited to attend and to be able to acknowledge the work of our School Council in negotiating the Joint User Agreement, in particular past presidents Jenny Stillman and Sue Hayes who gave significant time during these negotiations along with all school councillors. A group of year 5 students and the school captains Abbie Q. and Keith T. accompanied me and were excellent role roles and enjoyed meeting Hugh Delahunty the Minister for Sport and Recreation. After he'd declared the oval open he joined the students for cricket and Abbie hit several good shots off his bowling. The oval is an outstanding facility for our school and will be enjoyed by Little Athletics, junior cricket and junior football and we look forward to our first school athletics carnival being held there. This project was funded jointly with the Victorian Government from Community Facility Funding contributing \$500,000 and the Macedon Ranges Shire Council \$466,662. The Macedon Ranges Shire Council has worked hard to achieve this joint project and a great sporting facility for Romsev community.



Street Festival

The members of the school community joined the parade and gathered behind the school banner with a group of students riding their bicycles or scooters. It was pleasing to have parents, grandparents and younger students joining with present students. Thank you to Emily W., Emily M., Gabriella M. and Jorja B. who helped by carrying the school banner. I'm sure everyone one who attended the festival had a fun time.

Transition Visits for All Students

At Romsey Primary School we believe it is very important for students to transition smoothly to their next level of school. Kindergarten students have several visits to the prep area and when the first day of school begins they know the area well and feel com-

fortable within the school environment and with the types of things that happen in classrooms. It is equally important for students to feel confident if they are going into year 1/2, 3/4 or year 5/6. Within each area of the school there can be different expectations so we organize 3 visits to their next year level. Each student will have the chance to work with different teachers and to ask questions about what may be different. Today students had their first visit and they all did a writing task. With the whole school approach to teaching, literacy and numeracy students will hear the same language and there will be similar expectations about how they will do their work. Next week on Tuesday there will be another visit focusing on numeracy and the final visit will be on Tuesday 18th December when they will find out their class and teacher for 2013. Year 6 students have their orientation visit to secondary providers on Tuesday 11th December.

Year 4 students recently began the school's bicycle education and safety program which will culminate in a town ride. We are pleased to have a close association with the Romsey Police Station and three of their members have conducted the bike safety check. This is an important program for our students as safe riding skills are essential especially correct hand signalling and scanning and are sometimes not taught by parents/guardians.



All bikes are safety checked by local police before the Bicycle Education Program commences.

Year 3/4 Energy Inquiry Learning

The year 3/4 classes are having an exciting time enjoying a range of experiments related to their inquiry learning on energy. Each teacher is specializing in a different area and on a weekly basis classes rotate around the rooms. In Mrs Woods' room students experiment with heat energy, Mrs Dettmann covers light, Mrs Byrne/Mrs Petran wind energy, Mrs McGuffey sound energy and Miss Hipwell electrical energy where they learn about conductors and circuits. As I visited their rooms all students were highly engaged and enjoying the hands on experiments.

Planning for 2013 is well underway with all students visiting their next level of schooling for 2013. We will be having small classes and would welcome new families to Romsey to make an appointment to visit our first class facilities. GETTING TO KNOW FR ARNOLD HEREDIA AND PAKISTAN

Fr. Arnold Heredia has been appointed Parish Priest of St. Mary's Catholic Church Lancefield/Romsey and commenced mid September 2012.

My sister and family had migrated to Melbourne in 1981. If anyone had then said that one day I too would be migrating to Australia, I would have said: "Go tell that to the Marines." Because of my in-

volvement in demonstrations and rallies against violations of human rights and increasing Islamic fundamentalism, my sister was increasingly concerned about my safety. It was only in 2001, when I faced the likelihood of being booked under the 'blasphemy law', that I heeded her plea to come to Australia. I experienced no problem in feeling at home here, as I had travelled to several countries, including Australia since 1970.

I was born on 10 October 1940, in Karachi Pakistan. I was ordained a priest on 24 January 1965. Besides being a pastor for 35 years, I was rector of the national seminary for 6 years. I also headed the inter-religious Justice and Peace Commission for 25 years. I was among the founding members of the national Human Rights Commission of Pakistan. Both my parents have passed away, as also my elder and younger brothers and sister.

Pakistan is the size of Britain and France. It gained independence from the British in 1947. Its present population is 170 million, 95 per cent of whom are Muslim. Christians and Hindus are about 1.5 per cent of the population (5 million each). Though rich in resources, Pakistan continues to be a poor country because of endemic corruption. The political, economic, educational, social and health systems are in shambles. There is high unemployment. Barely 50 per cent are literate. The infant mortality rate is very high. Child labour and honour killing of women is rampant. Most of the budget is spent on defense. Pakistan prides itself of being a nuclear power.

In 1979, the US secured Pakistan's assistance to fight its proxy war of ousting the Russians from Afghanistan. The US termed it a 'Jihad' (holy war). This constituted the beginning of Pakistan becoming an Islamic state. A host of ancient Islamic laws were promulgated. A ban on alcohol, gambling, lashing was introduced, chopping of hands, stoning for adultery, etc. The latter two were never implemented by the government. Even voting, right up to 2002 took place on religious basis.

After ousting the Russians, the US did nothing to rehabilitate the thousands of young Islamic militants from several Muslim countries and the widows and orphans of Afghanistan. There was chaos in Afghanistan, with one tribe warring against the other to gain political supremacy. Mullah Omar was able to harness the young militants to form the Taliban and establish a barbaric Islamic rule. Osama bin Laden came from Saudi Arabia, to assist the widows and orphans and formed his social welfare group called Al-Qaida. The Afghans and the militants were seething with anger for having been used by the US. It was now pay back time. The Taliban and Al-Qaida joined forces and initiated a series of terrorist attacks on US establishments, which culminated in the 9/11 tragedy, which shook America and the world.

Pakistani militants made their anger felt by targeting churches, Christian educational institutions and social welfare organizations. They were set alight, or blown up with hand grenades and time bombs. Militants also gunned down worshippers in churches. On 25 November 2002, two armed militants entered the J&P Commission Office. They rounded up the 8 staff members present, bound them to chairs and shot them in the head. One survived miraculously. When I planned to go on a vacation to Pakistan in 2004, I was cautioned not to come, as the militants were on the lookout for me.

With the Fire Danger Period having already commenced in several municipalities across the Loddon Mallee Region, and the introduction of these in Greater Bendigo, Campaspe, Loddon, Central Goldfields and Mt Alexander Shires at 1:00 AM on Monday 26 November, it is likely that the Macedon Ranges Shire will follow on Monday 10 December.

With hot weather forecast over the next week, CFA is urging Victorians to take extra care when doing that last minute clean up and burning off prior to the start of restrictions. The community are also urged to register any burn-offs by calling 1800 668 511.

CFA Operations Officer Justin Daly said "Residents must take responsibility and be aware that any fire they light is their responsibility. The size or location doesn't matter as all fire has the potential to get away if not properly controlled. You are also liable for any damage caused by a fire you have lit."

He went on to say that "If people register their burnoffs, we know what is happening in that area, which is very helpful when brigades are being dispatched to jobs". "This reduces the chances of CFA being called out to a false alarm when the public calls about a fire they have seen.

"The community needs to understand that, for the most part, we're talking about volunteers who have to leave their work or spend time away from their family by responding to false alarms" he said.

Mr Daly also said that "residents should also be aware of council by-laws." He added that "people should also be careful with their burn-offs when weather heats up."

"During these conditions it is important the community take extreme care. If a fire is left unattended in windy conditions it can spread quickly and burn into bushland or onto neighbouring properties,"

A few simple steps landowners must take when burning off:

- Take responsibility for any fire you light;
- Never leave a burn off unattended;
- Be aware of council by-laws;
- Register the burn on **1800 668 511**;
- Check weather conditions;
- Tell your neighbours when you plan to burn-off to avoid brigades being called out unnecessarily to a fire reported by a neighbour or passer-by;
- Ensure an adequate supply of water is nearby in case a burn-off escapes;
- You should leave a 3 metre fire break, free of flammable materials around any burn-off:
- If the fire does get out of control call '000' immediately;

Empowering rural communities in Ethiopia

In Ethiopia, 44 per cent of the population is undernourished. Several times over the past 30 years, the country's precarious food security has tipped over into full blown famine. Last year, famine in the Horn of Africa left more than four million people in need of emergency food assistance. Act for Peace empowers rural communities in Ethiopia by supporting a program to improve food security and manage water distribution by controlling soil erosion. Through this program, communities have been able to build and maintain more than 360 check dams and establish tree nurseries throughout the Goncha region. Local people have been given skills in safe and effective construction of small dams, as well as seedlings, tools and the techniques for successful propagation of seedlings.

"Thanks to your support," says Abebe Gellae from the Goncha region of Ethiopia, "Our community had the seeds, tools and training last year to harvest more than 600,000 seedlings in this nursery. Our land is protected from further erosion, and I can plant crops to feed my four children and wife."

Clearing mines, saving lives in Irag

Iraq is one of more than 70 countries in the world littered with landmines, cluster bombs and other explosive remnants of war as a result of decades of conflict. The presence of these weapons means that people's lives are in constant danger, and farmers can't use the land to grow and sell food. Act for Peace supports work to safely clear land of these unexploded weapons of war. Last year, our project partner cleared 4 million square metres of land in Iraq-the equivalent of over 400 soccer fields. When the land is cleared, farmers can go back to their land to grow food for their families. "Soon after the first rain, I started ploughing the land you have cleared for me. I will use the land for growing wheat and barley which will increase my income and improve my family's life," says Khorshed Jabar, a farmer from Farqan in Iraq. Healthy families in Gaza

In the Gaza Strip, communities live with the daily threat of air strikes and struggle to rebuild due to a lack of access to building materials, as well as other daily needs such as medicine. Act for Peace supports family health centres in Gaza, which provide much-needed medical care. Maha, 25 years old, says, "My children suffered from malnutrition and anaemia because we were unable to provide the proper food and milk. Thanks to the family health centre, we are provided with the necessary treatment, medication and milk for my family. The staff's kind attention and proper treatment with follow up, both at the clinic and our home, have helped my children overcome malnutrition and anaemia. Families urged to update details for January Schoolkids Bonus

This week families with kids who could be starting primary or high school next year will receive a text, email or letter from Centrelink asking them to update their kids' enrolment details in order to get the Schoolkids Bonus in January

About 400,000 families need to go online and update their kids' school details before the end of the year to ensure they receive the right amount of Schoolkids Bonus. The Gillard Government is helping lighten the load for around 10,000 families across the McEwen electorate with the new Schoolkids Bonus. Each year eligible families will receive up to \$410 for each child in primary school, and up to \$820 a year for each in high school. The Schoolkids Bonus – paid in two instalments in January and July each year - helps parents buy uniforms, shoes, school books and stationery, as well as other costs like school excursions, music lessons and sports registration fees.

Federal member for McEwen, Rob Mitchell MP, today encouraged parents to go online and update the school details for their kids.

"The next Schoolkids Bonus payment comes in early January. If you don't let Centrelink know your child is starting school next year, you could miss out on \$410," Mr Mitchell said.

"And if your child is starting high school we also need to know, so you can get the \$820 high school payment. "Christmas and January are a busy time for many families, so that's why we want parents to update their details now before the silly season kicks in."

Once families have updated their details, they will receive the Schoolkids Bonus straight into their bank account in January and July next year.

"The Schoolkids Bonus replaces the Education Tax Refund, which means families no longer need to keep receipts and wait months to claim back education costs through their tax return.

"All they need to do instead is check and update their children's study details online, then receive their bonus in time for the school year."

Families receiving Family Tax Benefit Part A, as well as young people in school receiving Youth Allowance, and others receiving certain income support or veterans' payments are eligible for the Schoolkids Bonus.

LOCAL ORGANISATIONS ENCOURAGED TO APPLY FOR ENVIRONMENTAL COMMUNITY **GRANTS**

Parliamentary Secretary for Sustainability and Environment, Donna Petrovich, is encouraging local Landcare and environmental groups, schools and community groups to lodge their applications for around \$1 million in community grants to support a range of environmental partnership initiatives.

Mrs Petrovich said \$700,000 in round two funding was available as part of the Victorian Coalition Government's \$20 million Communities for Nature program and \$300,000 for the Healthy Parks Healthy People program. "Communities for Nature grants are targeted towards local community groups and organisations, including schools, to support them in improving, protecting and conserving our environment," said Mrs Petrovich. Mrs Petrovich says successful Round One funding recipients included Baynton Sidonia Landcare Group (\$6,000), Newham & District Landcare Group (\$5,310) and St Mary's School Lancefield (\$9,260). "Healthy Parks Healthy People grants are available to

community-based groups and not for profit organisations to help them deliver projects which protect and enhance the natural, cultural and heritage values of parks and reserves," said Mrs Petrovich.

Environment and Climate Change Minister Ryan Smith officially launched the grants program and the Coalition Government's Environmental Partnerships plan last

"We all have a part to play in keeping our environment healthy," Mr Smith said.

"The Coalition Government is focused on practical local action that delivers on-the-ground results for our community and the environment, now and into the future

"The grants programs will help local groups deliver projects that protect and enhance the natural, cultural and heritage values of our parks, reserves, waterways and bays as well as benefit local economies and the people that take part in them."



What is Fire Ready Victoria?

Before and during each fire season in high risk bushfire or grassfire areas across Victoria, CFA hosts free community meetings as part of our Fire Ready Victoria program.

How can I find out about meetings in my local area?

Visit cfa.vic.gov.au/meetings or contact your nearest CFA district office.

I've been to Fire Ready meetings before. Is it worth my while to go again?

Absolutely. Every meeting is different because every fire season is different. Local conditions, shelter options and emergency warning systems can all change year to year. so come along with questions you'd like to ask.

Fire Ready meetings are also a great way to make contacts in your local area, share experiences and views, and even talk about pooling resources.

So I'll find out locally specific information?

Yes, you'll hear seasonal information about where and how fires are most likely to start, spread and threaten around your local area, and the potential effects of a wind change.

You'll also find out how to access local fire information and warnings.

Can CFA come and speak to groups?

CFA encourages clubs, groups or employers to book a customised Fire Ready session - we'll come to you.

Where are the meetings held?

Meetings may take place at your local hall, fire station, park, footy club or even street corner, so remember to look out for signs or notices around your area.

What if I can't attend a meeting? How do I find out more?
