At the last meeting of the committee a hearty vote of thanks was carried to Mrs Robert Clarke, of Bolinda Vale, for her gift of the Encyclopaedia Brittanic to the library."

Romsey Primary School is excited to be introducing TOGETHER WE LEARN AND GROW the social emotional program "You Can Do It". It

consists of explicit, weekly instruction on the development of five social and emotional capabilities: confidence, persistence, organisation, getting along and resilience. Each component is made of a number of Habits of the Mind which are important life skills for all students. These are Accepting Myself, Taking Risks, Being Independent, I Can Do It, Giving Effort, Working Tough, Setting Goals, Planning My Time, Being Tolerant of Others, Thinking First, Playing by the Rules and Social Responsibility. These Habits of the Mind are taught explicitly, as well as integrated into the whole school curriculum. Bringing the parents on-board will also be important and a range of opportunities will be available to inform them of the program and how they can support their children. With depression being of concern in our community it is important to teach children about their emotions, how to control them and to give them a range of strategies to improve their social skills. Research from schools which use this program shows that children who understand and display these capabilities achieve higher learning outcomes.

Classroom News

Preps

Our preps are making excellent progress with their reading and have already fitted into the consistent approach all teachers use to teach reading. From the beginning of the year they have gradually extended their independent reading with Just Right Books to 20 minutes, the same as all students at Romsey Primary School. We are encouraging parents to understand the strategies we use to teach reading and welcome them to attend an information session on Just Right Books on Thursday 2nd May at 9:00am. This term Preps Integrated Inquiry is based on investigating toys and how they work. Already, students have shown a keen interest in the topic and are looking forward to the upcoming interactive incursion 'Toying with Technology';'

Year 1/2 Inquiry is Animal Detectives

Students in this area will be learning about animals, their habitat, characteristics, survival requirements and the purpose of zoos. An excursion to the zoo will be a highlight. Students will be designing and producing an enclosure for an animal that meets the animals' needs. In literacy they are reading and using questioning to deepen their understanding of information reports and in numeracy students play lots of games to reinforce and build on their number facts.

Year 3/4 Integrated Inquiry Topic -**Forces**

Students are exploring five different forces - push, pull, changing shape, changing direction and movement. Rotations will occur amongst classes for 90 minutes once a week where they will learn about

Grants help local farmers tackle climate change

The Federal Member for McEwen, Rob Mitchell MP, is encouraging farmers and land managers to put in their application for a share of \$30 million under the next round of the Gillard Government's Carbon Farming Futures Action on the Ground program.

"This program will help implement real on-farm trials of new practices that reduce carbon emissions," Mr Mitchell said. "Individual grants of up to \$775,000 are available to farmers, land managers, non-government organisations and research and industry sectors. Farmers and landholders are responsible managers of their land. They are on the front line of climate change and this program will help them find new methods to reduce their emissions. I encourage farmers and landholders in McEwen to get involved."

The grants will support innovative projects that will reduce methane emissions in livestock production systems, reduce nitrous oxide emissions or increase carbon sequestration in soils.

Minister for Agriculture, Fisheries and Forestry, Joe Ludwig, said the program supported trials that would help develop new Carbon Farming Initiative methodologies.

"Action on the Ground is about turning research into real world practices for use across the agriculture sector," Minister Ludwig said. "This program supports trials and demonstrations that can reduce on-farm greenhouse gas emissions or increase soil carbon, while maintaining or improving farm productivity and sustainability." The Action on the Ground program is also a key

element of the Carbon Farming Futures Fund, a component of the \$1.7 billion Land Sector Package under the government's Securing a Clean Energy Future Plan.

Outcomes from the program will also contribute to the development of Carbon Farming Initiative offset methodologies, paving the way for farmers and land managers to earn additional income through carbon credits.


Macedon Ranges Shire Council Mayor, Cr Roger Jukes, stressed the importance of the draft plan and encouraged the community to provide comments:

The Romsey Mechanics Institute (RMI) held its Triennial General Meeting in late February. The meeting was attended by a number of community members, officials from the many Regular User Groups

and representatives from the Department of Sustainability & Environment.

A report on the previous three-year's activities and operation at the institute was presented and DSE representatives and committee members answered a number of questions arising from that report. Nomina-

tions for the committee were called for and a new Committee of Management was elected. The committee includes representatives from Regular User groups, other community groups and interested members of the community.


Our hall is well over 100 years old and is in need of serious maintenance and some modernisation to bring it up to the standard expected by current society. During the life of the last CoM a structural engineer's report on the RMI was obtained. This report is the first step in the process of formulating a master plan for the RMI. The report listed a number of works to repair and maintain the main hall and many other elements that make up the RMI.

The committee is actively seeking funds via a variety of local/state/ federal government and other grants. These many grants will range from ~\$2,000 to ~\$100,000+. These monies will be used to modernise the kitchen, install safety equipment on the roof to allow maintenance works, modernise the main hall lighting, purchase items such as new tables and chairs and undertake more serious works as identified in both the structural engineer's report and the master plan.

The CoM was informed in early April that DSE will provide an initial grant of \$40,000 to begin these works. This money will begin the works program listed in the structural engineer's report.



BE ENCOURAGED!

A teacher one day gave her pupils a lesson all about magnets. The next day she set a written test which included the question, "my name has six letters, beginning with the letter m and I pick up things what am I?" When the test papers were handed back she was astonished to find that almost 50 percent of the children answered the question with the word mother. Yes I suppose mothers do pick up things, but they do much more than just picking up clothes and toys from around the house. This is demonstrated with a true story which comes out of World War 2 and the holocaust that took the lives of millions of people – it's about Solomon Rosenberg and his family.

Solomon Rosenberg and his wife and their two sons and his mother and father were arrested and placed in a Nazi concentration camp. It was a labour camp and the rules were simple. "As long as you can do your work, you are permitted to live. When you become too weak to do your work, then you are exterminated."

Rosenberg watched his mother and father marched off to their deaths and he knew that next would be his youngest son, David, because David had always been a frail child.

Every evening Rosenberg came back into the barracks after his hours of labour and searched for the faces of his family.

When he found them they would huddle together, embrace one another, and thank God for another day of life.

One day Rosenberg came back and didn't see those familiar faces. He finally discovered his oldest son, Joshua, in a corner, huddled, weeping, and praying. He said, "Josh, tell me it's not true." Joshua turned and said, "It is true, poppa. Today David was not strong enough to do his work. So they came for him."

"But where is your mother?" asked Mr. Rosenberg. "Oh poppa," he said, "When they came for David, he was afraid and he cried. Momma said, 'There is nothing to be afraid of David' and she took his hand and went with him."
