A cuppa for your thoughts

It's 'T' time for Kyneton District Health, which is rolling out an innovative Tea for Ten community engagement project across the Shire. KDH is keen to know what the local community thinks, knows about and wants from its health services. At morning teas hosted at tables in townships across the Macedon Ranges, KDH is inviting groups of ten people to think, talk and tell their thoughts on three key questions about KDH. Over a cuppa trained hosts facilitate a frank and open conversation based on the questions. A scribe takes anonymous notes so that KDH can gather community perceptions. The format is adapted from grassroots engagement used in local contexts like Cathy McGowan's successful Indi campaign at the last Federal election. It's a way for the community to express its ideas and opinions that help shape KDH planning and communications. Strategic Projects Manager, Veronica Strachan explained how valuable it is for KDH to have direct engagement with locals. "Whatever we hear, we will feed it back to our community so we are all clearer on what people think, know and want. We see this open communication as an important part of KDH building better relationships," said Mrs Strachan. KDH has just successfully piloted conversations in Woodend and Kyneton. It's now seeking others to get involved and host a kitchen tea in towns across the Macedon Ranges Shire. The two pilot groups have shown that the information

gathering is incredibly valuable. Amongst the diverse range of community experiences and ideas there were, as expected, misconceptions about the services KDH does or does not provide. Things like snake bites, stitches and elective caesareans were all wrongly assumed as off the KDH radar.

"The discussions so far have highlighted what matters to local people, and given KDH ideas about how we can better explain to the community how we help people of the Macedon Ranges to get well and be well, " said Mrs Strachan.





Tips for being fire ready

With the fire season just around the corner, Macedon Ranges Shire Council is urging residents to ensure they, their families and their properties are fire ready. Council has begun its roadside slashing program and has also commenced slashing Council property.



1. Prepare your property

A well-prepared property reduces the risk of fire to residents and their neighbours. Council Fire Management Officers are currently undertaking annual property inspections to ensure they do not present a fire risk over the summer.

Residents who receive a fire prevention notice are urged not to ignore it. If the notice is not complied with, Council will be forced to complete the work required and you will be charged the associated costs, in addition to a \$1,444 fine.

For tips on preparing your property, visit mrsc.vic.gov.au/fireready and cfa.vic.gov.au/plan-prepare. Residents with concerns about a neighbouring property can call Council's Customer Service staff on 5422 0333, who will advise when a Fire Management Officer will be in their area.

2. Develop a fire plan

Everyone in the shire should have a fire plan, and for those living in high risk areas, leaving early is the safest option.

In your plan, identify where you will go on high fire risk days e.g. to family or friends, in Melbourne or elsewhere. Nominate a safe place to go should you decide to leave when an emergency warning is issued.

Neighbourhood Safer Places—Places of Last Resort should not be your 'go-to' place when you decide to enact your fire plan. These places are a 'last resort' option when all your plans have failed and the fire is about to impact your home. They are not staffed, may not have electricity or other services, and there is no guarantee that the CFA or other agencies will be able to defend the building if it is threatened by fire.

For tools and tips on developing a bushfire survival plan, visit www.cfa.vic.gov.au. For local advice on preparing for fire and other hazards, like the Macedon Ranges Emergency Alerts Facebook page.

3. Understand the CFA Emergency Alerts

When there is a fire, three types of alerts are issued by the CFA via a variety of sources including the FireReady App, the Vic Emergency website, ABC radio, and CFA social media channels.

Each type of alert will have extra information specific to the emergency. When you receive an alert, make sure you read the message



There is fire activity in the area and you should keep informed on its status through a range of sources including radio, smart phone, computer and local networks. You can also call the Bushfire Information Line on 1800 240 667

WATCH AND ACT

Conditions are changing, you could be impacted in the next two hours and you should enact your fire plan. If your plan is to leave, then now is the time to leave. Go to the place you have identified in your plan e.g. family, friends, Melbourne

EMERGENCY WARNING

You are about to be impacted by a fire and it is too late to leave. The safest option is to shelter in place. This means stay where you



President's Report 2014 (excerpt)

This year's report has an underlying theme of development of partnerships. I believe it is of increasing importance for not-forprofit groups, regardless of their focus area, to develop such working partnerships particularly in an era where people are generally time poor and volunteers and resources are often hard to

It is hoped this report will demonstrate RRBATA's ongoing commitment to the promotion of the Romsey region in a business and tourism context whilst fostering engagement with local community.

The Year In Review:

RRBATA's year commenced with the "Light Up The Sky 2014" event to promote the Shop Local concept. Funding support from both Macedon Ranges Shire Council and Romsey Community Bank branch of Bendigo Bank enabled this very successful event to proceed. High attendance, a family focus, free activities, community group involvement, great weather and another wonderful fireworks display ensured a memorable evening. This event was full of collaborations. I want to acknowledge the assistance of those Rotary and Lions members who provided much needed people power on the night. I also want to mention the appreciated collaboration with *Romsey CFA* with their supervision of the fireworks display. In addition, Romsey Primary School's willingness to allow their oval to be used must also be acknowledged. The 5th Annual *RRBATA Business Breakfast* was held at Cleveland Winery, Lancefield. RRBATA received overwhelmingly positive feedback for this event helped largely by the engaging speaker - renowned retail analyst, Mr. David Errington. RRBATA and RSL partnered for the 4th August unveiling of the World War 1 Commemorative Plaque at the Lone Pine. RRBATA organised Romsey CWA to cater for the luncheon component of the event which they insisted on doing at no charge this was much appreciated. Solar lighting of the plaque has been installed by RRBATA.

Romsey Online (www.romsey.org.au) - RRBATA had fruitful discussions with Lancefield Neighbourhood House ahead of a joint Community Bank grant application for a Romsey Lancefield partnership project to both upgrade the Romsey website in conjunction with the development of a Lancefield website. Despite the grant application being unsuccessful, RRBATA is committed to upgrading its site to at least enhance its aesthetics to users. Greg Powell must be acknowledged for his work as the "webmaster" for Romsey Online.

MRSC's Economic Development and Tourism Unit, with our special contact Leanne Davey, has again been a great support to RRBATA. We look forward to ongoing collaboration in 2015.

The Way Forward in 2015:

Despite it being increasingly difficult for RRBATA to engage local businesses in either membership or general involvement, I think there is much for RRBATA to look forward to in the year ahead:

- Streetscaping Community Forum to be held in March 2015. The aim of this event is to provide an opportunity for business, tourism and community interests to brainstorm a future streetscape vision for Romsey.
- 2015 Business Breakfast will be held in August 2015.
- Further development of collaborative partnerships will be a focus next year.
- Innovative revenue raising (that is, more grant applications and other fundraising in addition to encouraging subscriptions from local businesses and interested parties). Revenue needs to be maintained to allow RRBATA to operate at a basic level (insurance, miscellaneous expenses) let alone the task of conducting events and projects.
- The opportunities for RRBATA in the broader "Romsey Region" (Clarkefield, Monegeetta, Bolinda, Lancefield, Darraweit Guim and Riddells Creek) remain to be tapped into in 2015.



News from the Romsey Uniting Church

On Sunday 23rd November at 2.30pm a service was conducted for the Blessing of the Emergency Services. It was a good afternoon. Clergy from the local churches were present and took part in the service and representatives from the CFA, SES, Red Cross RediSupport, VCC, Ambulance, Police and the Macedon Ranges Shire Emergency Management were present. The Romsey Uniting Church hosted this event and we all had a lovely afternoon tea afterwards.

The Birth of Jesus The Shepherds and the Angels

Scripture: Luke 8-19

In that region there were shepherds living in the fields, keeping watch over their flock by night. Then an angel of the Lord stood before them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were terrified. But the angel sad to them, "Do not be afraid; for see - I am bringing you good news of great joy for all the people: to you is born this day in the city of David a Saviour, who is the Messiah, the Lord. This will be a sign to you: you will find a child wrapped in bands of cloth and lying in a manger."

And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host, praising God and saying, "Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace among those whom he favors!"

When the angels had left them, the shepherds said to one another, "Let us go now to Bethlehem and see this thing that has taken place, which the Lord has made known to us". They went with haste and found Mary and Joseph, and the child lying in the manger. When they saw this, they made known what had been told them about this child; all who heard it were amazed at what the shepherds told them.

Shepherds in the time of Jesus were near the bottom of the social pecking order. They were seen as ruffians, thieves, and nogooders. Their testimony was inadmissible in court, and they were not even allowed inside some cities. It is to these marginalized people, living outside in the fields with their animals, that God's angels announce the Good News of Jesus' birth. Not inside religious buildings, not in the places of political power, but right in the middle of messy and marginalized life. Right from the beginning, Luke tells us that God is interested in society's outcasts and outsiders.

This story of Jesus will introduce a new kind of power structure. Mary has already responded to the news of Jesus' expected arrival by expressing her faith in God, her Song of Praise (Luke 1: 46-55) declaring that God's activity will turn the world upside down: God will lift up the lowly and bring down the powerful. Now, she sees the beginnings of this great reversal as rough shepherds seek out a newborn baby and praise God when they find him. She treasures and ponders this in her heart. She continues to let God surprise her.

Do we still treasure in our hearts the remembrance of who Jesus is? Do we still expect that this Jesus will turn the world upside down?

God in Christ, surprise me again this Christmas; turn my world upside down.

We are extremely thankful to all the people who supported this venture including those

More than 100 million shoeboxes have been given to children in over 130 countries since Operation Christmas Child began in 1993 in a backyard shed. It has since become a worldwide project. Our boxes went to a huge warehouse behind the Mitcham Baptist Church. Here these special boxes are packed into larger boxes and sent in shipping containers to Asian and South Pacific countries. A record 316,323 children in 7 countries, Vanuatu, Samoa, Fiji, PNG, Vietnam, Thailand and Cambodia, received shoeboxes from Australia and New Zealand in 2013.





SHOU MEI SUMARAC

Shou Mei was born in a remote mountain village in the north of Taiwan. Whilst studying English language in Taichung, by chance she walked by a gallery where a artist was working in the window. Mesmerized by his work she used to gaze at him until one day they finally exchanged smiles. Shou Mei, dreaming she could paint like him walked by for the next few months until she plucked up the courage to step inside the gallery. During this first conversation they realised that they came from a very similar poor village background. On subsequent meetings, realising Shou Mei could speak a little English, they agreed that she would translate for his American and British customers that frequented his gallery in exchange for painting lessons. He would allow her to sit next to him and he would instruct her in his techniques. After six months he gave her a blank canvas and urged her to begin painting. She asked if could she copy one of his paintings, her favourite being a autumn forest scene. This was to become her first work.

Too embarrassed to be seen, she painted in the back room and after six attempts both where satisfied with her first painting (this painting will be exhibited). The artist that mentored Shou Mei for two years is non-other than Wong Shong Kwan who later became the most famous and celebrated artist in Taiwan. All his paintings are now collectors items. Shou mei will have two of his original paintings on display at Wu Lin Retreat for her inaugural exhibition.

Shou Mei came to Australia in 1976 and continued to paint on and off in her spare time. Her favourite subjects are Australian rural scenery and classical Chinese style. In this exhibition "IMAGES FROM TWO WORLDS" she will display a blend of Australian/ European & Chinese works dating from as far back as 1975 to the present.





"The more people in the Macedon Ranges who like our page, the quicker we can get important information to locals when they need it." said Cr Jukes.


