Zucchini fritters with olive salsa

1/2 cup pitted green olives chopped

- 1 tomato finely chopped

Combine zucchini and salt. Stand 10 mins. Squeeze out liquid. Combine zucchini, onion, rind, breadcrumbs and eggs. Spray non stick frying pan with cooking oil. Cooking 3 at a time. Pour 1/4 cup of zucchini mixture into pan. Flatten slightly with spatula. Cook over medium heat until browned on both sides and cooked through. Serve fritters with olive salsa

For a change add 1/4 cup grated Parmesan cheese to fritter mixture

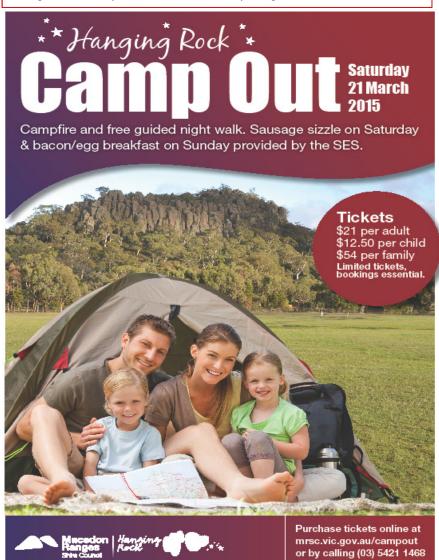

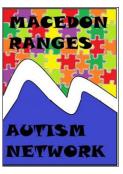

Casserole Cook Family Recipe

Amanda's Chicken Leek and Bacon Pies

These pies I made recently with the help of my daughter Erica. This recipe is as close as I can make it as I have been making these pies for a long time and don't have the recipe written down. So taste as you go and you can't go wrong!

There are several variations to this pie, sometimes I make them in pre made cases (see photo), sometimes in ramekins with puff pastry lids which is quick, easy and they freeze perfectly, or if it's for a family dinner and I have more time, in a shortcrust pre baked pie base and a puff pastry lid. The filling is all the same...here goes.

Makes: enough filling for 4–6 ramekins Ingrediants:

3 chicken fillet breasts cut into cubes

4 slices of short cut bacon fat removed

2 leeks washed sliced into rings

½ cup dry white wine

600mls of thickened cream

Tarragon

Salt & Pepper to taste

3 tablespoons of cornflour

Step 1

Seal the chicken in a non stick fry pan, do not cook all the way through just so that it is sealed and not pink on the outside. Remove from pan and set aside.

Step 2

Cook the bacon and the leeks until the bacon is sealed but NOT crispy and the leeks have wilted. Then return the chicken to the pan include any juices.

Step 3

Add the white wine and cook off the alcohol. Once this has happened add the cream and some tarragon (enough for your own taste, use less if dried tarragon). Bring the mix to a slow simmer. This will allow the chicken to continue cooking without toughening up and will allow the cream to reduce. After 15 minutes if the sauce has not thickened enough to a pie consistency, mix the corn flour with equal amounts of cold water to make a paste and add to the mix, stirring continously until the mixture thickens. You may need to add more just see how it goes. TASTE and now add the salt and pepper.

Step 4

While the mixture cools, preheat the oven to 180 degrees and cut lids out of the puff pastry to fit the ramekins. Spoon the cooled mixture into pots and add the lids. Brush with milk and sprinkle with extra tarragon or poppy seeds (see photo). Cook in the oven until the lids go golden brown, serve with a crispy salad in summer or with vegies in the winter. ENJOY!

After Hours Health Service Opens in Macedon Ranges

The Macedon Ranges has a new after-hours health care service. Happy Bodies Health Service (HBHS) officially

opened its doors on Friday 30 January. The Service will be operating from the Riddells Creek Neighbourhood House, 59 Main Road Riddells Creek, and will be open on Friday and Sunday nights between 6.30 – 10.30pm for a six month trial

After hours services in the Macedon Ranges have been virtually non-existent over the last few years. Carers, parents and unwell members of our community have had to make difficult decisions after their usual health care provider is closed. The options have included: do nothing and wait (which can be extremely stressful); drive considerable distances out of the Macedon Ranges to seek access to other health services; or as a last act of desperation, call an ambulance.



unintentionally tying up the shire's limited ambulance paramedic resources. With the opening of Happy Bodies, there is now a new option.

HBHS will be open when general practice or health services are not available. According to HBHS' research, the need for after hour services peak on Friday and Sunday evenings. HBHS aims to fill the after hour void by offering a walk in, no appointment needed service from 6.30 - 10.30pm on Friday and Sunday evenings. This innovative new service will provide triage, assessment and management (including prescriptions) to the residents of the Macedon Ranges. HBHS is led by a local Nurse Practitioner/Physician Associate and has a supportive staff including a registered nurse, primary care paramedic and health & medical service assistants. The service is designed to supplement services that are already provided by your local doctor during the hours when he/she is not available. Happy Bodies Health Service is NOT a replacement for your regular GP. We are here for those out of hour health crises when you are just not sure what to do.

Nurse Practitioners can assess patients, diagnose, prescribe medication, order tests, refer to specialists and provide an advanced level of patient care. At HBHS, we will provide first line patient care subsequently referring patients back to their usual GP for ongoing management.

So if you, a family member or a friend are just not feeling right, have a tummy ache, developed a rash or require a check up, and it is a Friday or Sunday evening, then come and visit Happy Bodies. No appointment is needed and you don't need to phone. People seeking assessment can simply drop in.

Happy Bodies Health Service has been overwhelmed by the positive feedback from local residents congratulating Happy Bodies Health Service for recognising and fulfilling a vital health service requirement within the Macedon Ranges. What Is article for this month is: What is Anaphylaxis

Anaphylaxis is a severe and potentially life-threatening allergic reaction. It occurs in individuals that are exposed to a particular substance in the environment (called allergens) they are sensitised too, such as pollens, food (eg. peanuts) or stings (eg. bee stings).

Anaphylaxis is characterised by the involvement of more than one body system, most commonly the respiratory and cardiovascular systems. When an individual is re-exposed to the allergen, certain cells called mast cells are activated. Mast cells then release a cascade of substances including histamine, bradykinins, prostaglandins and cytokines. These substances are known as inflammatory mediators. The inflammatory mediators then act on the body causing the dilation of blood vessels, swelling (oedema) and spasm of the small lung tubes (bronchospasm).

The resulting signs and symptoms of anaphylaxis include swelling of the face and lips, tingling mouth, nausea, decreased blood pressure, shortness of breath and coughing/ wheezing. Symptoms may occur within minutes of exposure to the allergen or may take several hours. Anaphylaxis is a life-threatening emergency as these symptoms can progress into respiratory failure and circulatory collapse. Rapid intervention and treatment is required to reverse the effects of anaphylaxis.

Adrenaline is the medicine of choice and is the active drug found within adrenaline auto-injectors or 'Epi-Pen'. Adrenaline works in anaphylaxis by opening the airways (bronchodilation) and constricting the blood vessels to increase blood pressure. Further, adrenaline works to stop the release of inflammatory mediators from mast cells preventing the anaphylactic episode from continuing.

Adrenaline in the form of an auto-injector is administered into the muscle of the leg. If a person is suspected to be having an anaphylaxis attack and/or an auto-injector is administered an ambulance should be called immediately by dialling 000. Paramedics can provide further treatment such as the administration of adrenaline, giving fluid via drip and anti-inflammatory agents.

All individuals who suffer anaphylaxis require further monitoring in hospital or suitable medical facilities as they may require subsequent doses of adrenaline or other medications if symptoms reappear or persist.

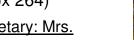

Standard instructions you hear as the plane gets ready for takeoff: "Please fasten your seat-belt and put your seat back in the upright position." Rules and regulations. 'Only 8 people in the lift," 'Speed limit 50ks per hour.' They all make life safer when we follow them, although most of us forget the one about the speed limit. But life can't really be contained by rules. There's more to it than that.

Every day we face situations with no convenient rule to tell us exactly what to do. We have to use our common sense and make our own decisions. We're on our own.

Well, not quite. There are some basics for all of us, whatever our faith. To some the Ten Commandments are old hat, but if we followed them society would be a lot better.

Then there's a rule from Confucius, "Don't do to others what you don't want them to do to you." That's OK, but Jesus put it positively. He said, "Do unto others as you want them to do unto you." It's one thing to say that you've never done anyone any harm, even if it is true. It's quite another thing to actually do some good.

The first rule is one of respect. Acknowledging a person's space, not treading on his or her toes. The other is a rule of love. Not hurting people is great as far as it goes, but love has to be proactive, if you'll pardon the jargon. It means getting out there and doing some good without waiting to be pushed.

Jesus said he had come into the world to offer us a better life. He came. He didn't hang about waiting to be asked. And neither should we, if the love that is at the heart of the universe is going to be part of our lives.

Lord of my life, teach me your rule of love and help me to understand that it offers freedom, not constraint.

These problems stem from the convex nature of the pathway on the northern side of the hall. This path will have to be dug up and have drainage pits and pipes installed. It is hoped that all works will be completed by mid March. We apologise for any inconvenience these works may cause.

Our structural engineer's report from a few years ago identified many works that needed to be done. We hope that we can utilise the scaffolding required for the roofing works to also attend to some masonry and other works. We hope DELPW will assist us with a little extra money so that we do not have to again pay to put up the scaffolding in a year or two to carry out these works.

The Country Women's Association held their District Conference at the RMI on Wednesday February 18th. It is wonderful to see these types of events back in the hall.
