SPECIAL CENTENARY MT MACEDON ANZAC DAWN SERVICE

The Centenary commemoration of the Gallipoli landings will see some special features added to this year's Mt Macedon ANZAC Day Dawn Service including stories featuring families from across the Macedon Ranges, and additional audio visual capacity to cater for a larger attendance.

Following the huge success of the bus services provided last year, buses will again be provided to the Service from Gisborne, Woodend, Macedon, Romsey, Lancefield, Riddells Creek and Sunbury.

Chair of the Mt Macedon ANZAC Day Dawn Service Committee, Bruce Mildenhall, said that the Committee had worked hard to ensure that the content and quality of this year's Service would match the significance of the occasion.

"This year's Service will feature the staging of a mini-drama using historical materials and letters, special music written especially for the Centenary and the offering of prayers from a number of faiths", Mr Mildenhall said. "We are proud that over recent years, the Mt Macedon ANZAC Day Dawn Service has grown in size and become one of the largest attended Dawn Service's in regional Victoria".

Anyone wishing to attend the Service will need to catch one of the following bus services:

Gisborne Train Station at 4:15AM and 5:15AM, Woodend Train Station at 4:30AM and 5:15AM, Romsey Community Hub at 4:30AM and 5:00AM, Lancefield Mechanics Hall at 4:45AM and

Riddells Creek Primary School at 4:15AM.

A bus will also be provided for Sunbury families wishing to attend the Service and will depart the **Sunbury Train Station at** 5:00AM.

A continual shuttle bus service will operate from **Tony Clarke Recreation Reserve-Waterfalls Road, Macedon** with the first bus departing at 4:00AM and the last bus departing at 5:20AM.

Mr Mildenhall said that the 2015 Mt Macedon ANZAC Day Dawn Service was expected to cost the volunteer-led Committee in excess of \$35,000, up \$30,000 from the 2005 Service, and people attending are requested to make a gold coin donation when they board the bus to the Service.

Mount Macedon Road will be closed to Dawn Service traffic from the corner of Mount Macedon Road and Honour Avenue, and Mount Macedon Road and Straws Lane from 3:00AM on ANZAC Day. All private cars will be directed to Tony Clarke Recreation Reserve.

A strong field teed off on a very hot afternoon, the wind swung around from the north to the east then to the the west however it was rarely strong enough to effect balls in the air. The rain of last week had quickly disappeared and it was back to hard dry fairways on top of that the day passed the predicted temperature of 34 to reach 36 at about 2.30 pm. The fairway grass had stood up valiantly through December and January but by the end of February it was beginning to crumble and blow away leaving an increasing number of bare spots. As the round progressed there were numerous roars of success, from both the golfers and the nearby cricketers, as birdies dropped or wickets fell. It is hoped that the club will be able to disconnect from the mains drinking water system and turn on our re-cycled water system during the morning of Friday March 20th. This will be the culmination of stage one of the Romsey Golf Club's project to irrigate the greens and large sections of the fairways. This re-cycled water project will see a saving of 10,000,000 litres of precious drinking water.

The re-cycled water project began at the end of October, we estimate that club members have put in \$100,000.00 worth of labour to get all the infrastructure in place. Stage two of this project will see all tees irrigated some extra fairway sprinklers and allowances made for irrigationg new and existing gardens. Romsey Golf Club has approached the Macedon Ranges Shire Council to assist us with stage two. Our application has been put forward as part of the coming budget but we will not know if we are successful until later in the year. We have invited our ward councilors down to Romsey Park to view the works that have been completed and to explain stage two and other plans for the golf course. We hope that this will give our councilors enough information to support our request for funding of stage two.

By 11.15 am the event players had registered and were sitting down to a hearty lunch. Before the groups teed off Anthony Lakey officially welcomed everyone, on behalf of the organising committee and thanked the very generous tournament sponsors; Drummond Golf, Niddrie and NewEarth Constructions, the tournament would not be possible without their support. A bus load of selected students from the three schools visited the Shrine of Remembrance, toured the new museum and heard additional information about its significance. What is a Febrile Convulsion?

Febrile convulsions are when a fit or seizure occurs in children with fever. Fever is a normal response to fight infection, and in children is classified as over 38°C. The fever often occurs on the first day of illness and it may not be obvious that your child is unwell before a febrile convulsion or fit occurs.

The fit is brought on by a rapid *change* in temperature, not how high the child's temperature becomes. The brains of some children are more sensitive to changes in temperature than others, resulting in "hot" fits. Febrile convulsions are common and will occur in about 1 in 30 children aged 6 months to 6 years.

There are some things you can do if your child has a fever - keep them cool; don't overdress or overheat the room; encourage drinking smalls sips of fluid often to keep hydrated; and if in pain or miserable, give paracetamol or ibuprofen, however these measures may not prevent a febrile convulsion.

Febrile convulsions can be scary to watch. Signs and symptoms include: loss of consciousness; twitching of limbs; difficulty breathing; change in skin colour (often the child goes blue) and their eyes roll back. The child experiences no pain or discomfort during the fit. A short fit will not cause brain damage and even a long fit almost never causes harm. Afterwards your child may take 30 minutes to fully wake up and when they do, they may be irritable. If your child has a fit:

Stay calm.

Don't put anything into the child's mouth, including fingers.

Make the child safe by putting them on a soft surface.

Time how long the fit lasts, or record it on your phone.

Take your child to see a health professional or emergency department as soon as possible afterwards.

If you are very worried, or the seizure goes for longer than 5 minutes call an ambulance on 000, as paramedics can administer medications that can help stop a fit, convulsion or seizure.



Recipe for this month

Stuffed Capsicum

1/4 cup olive oil

1 large onion finely diced 2 cloves garlic, minced

500g beef mince 2 cans crushed tomato

1 tbspn dried oregano

1 tsp ground cinnamon

3/4 cup white rice

6 capsicums

500ml chicken stock

Pre heat oven 190 C heat oil in a large frypan and add onion and garlic. Saute until onions are soft. Add mince and fry until just browned. Add the crushed tomatoes, oregano and cinnamon. Simmer 5 mins. Add rice and simmer for 15 mins over low heat. Cut the stem end off the capsicum. Remove the seeds and membrane, place in a baking dish. Fill each loosely with meat mixture and replace capsicum top. Pour stock into baking dish so it surrounds the base of each capsicum. Cover dish with foil and bake for 1½ hours. Check that rice is cooked, if not, return to oven for 15 mins. Serve immediately



Life Circle I was talking to a friend the other day about how in general, we lay judgement on others, wheth-Solutions er it be consciously or unconsciously .Why do we do that? Do we do it as a referencing point for our own self awareness, or do we use it as a tool by which to make a decision?

That other person may set off a negative trigger in your mind and that trigger could make you angry frustrated, annoyed, overwhelmed and that person is just being himself not doing anything wrong yet you allow them to effect you.

This scenario can be placed in different circumstances and each scenario could end in a different way—a friendship gone wrong, a pub brawl, a punch up on the street, a broken relationship, a loss of a job, a bad job interview and so the list goes on.

Often we are on the receiving end of the judgement. When this happens to us we are made to feel inadequate by a look given, a word spoken, body language. Why do we allow these things to bother us? What reaction do we give? It's all about how we perceive an action, word etc, how we interpret it. So if this happens to us then what happens to others when we pass judgement.

Ever heard of the saying never judge a book by its cover? This is what we do when we lay judgement on others. If you never open the book to read the story then you never have all the information to make what I call an educated judgement. So by opening the book and reading the story we can have a better understanding of the situation and deal with it appropriately.

We don't destroy the book, burn it if we can't be bothered to read it, as we sometimes do with people, relationships etc We have a choice to do or not to do. We make a decision.

So I leave you with these questions: How judgemental are you in your life? And for what purpose do you lay judgement? Use this tool. Interesting - we all do it all the time.

GRAAP News

Former Romsey Primary School Site's Future Still Uncertain Following South Ward Councillor's Motion

The Greater Romsey All Abilities Park (GRAAP) project to develop the historic former Romsey Primary School site into a regionally significant passive recreation and cultural outdoor space has hit a "speed hump" at the Macedon Ranges Shire Council meeting in Gisborne on Wednesday 25th February. This follows Cr. Russell Mowatt's surprise motion for Council to rescind its unanimous resolution of 22nd May 2013 which was - "That Council resolves to purchase the former Romsey Primary School site at the restricted crown grant price."

Council has been negotiating for some time with the State Government one particular special condition in the Contract of Sale which required the purchaser (Council) to indemnify the vendor (Government) from any claim or loss. DEECD has been reluctant to concede this special condition despite the fact that the government insurance authority recommended that an insurance indemnity clause is *not* required in a contract between the state government and local councils.

Even the Victorian Government Solicitors Office advised that to the best of the Department of Education and Training and Department of Treasury and Finance information, knowledge and belief a) there is **no known Contamination at the Property**. and b) there is no known previous, current or potential claims with regard to Contamination of the Property.

At the Council meeting, Cr. Mowatt chose to move that his Notice of Motion be put on the table rather than be debated and voted upon. A majority of councillors, agreed to this including two of the three East Ward councillors (Crs. Hackett and Ellis). GRAAP's concern is that whilst this motion is on the table, it keeps alive the possibility of MRSC walking away from its unanimous decision to save the historic former Romsey Primary

School site for community use and as a regional attraction. "After seven years of hard work and working closely with council officers towards a positive outcome for the Romsey region and, in fact the Macedon Ranges, GRAAP's disappointment with what appears to be a lack of support from some Councillors for this important site and the proposed project is intense," said GRAAP President Ms. Raelene Mottram. "We find it difficult to understand what has motivated this motion, for which we had only two days' notice, now given the Government Solicitor's advice regarding the site.'

GRAAP believes the Romsey region desperately needs projects such as this to proceed to not only support the wellbeing of its community, but to also support local business through the knock on effect of increased visitation to the town. East Ward's Cr. Ellis only just last week remarked publicly on the region's significant growth which, of course, is one of the arguments for facilities such as the Greater Romsey All Abilities Park.

"In a year when Romsey Primary School celebrates its 150th Anniversary and the Lone Pine at the site will feature in Gallipoli centenary commemorations, the need for this site to be retained for public use is brought into sharp focus. It is both disappointing and distressing this is not resonating with some of our East Ward councillors." said Ms. Mottram, "In addition, this move by Council has the potential to test the trust and confidence from the local community towards its local government."

GRAAP continues to work closely with Council officers to progress the Master Plan process and hopes the sale contract's special condition debate can be hastily resolved by Council and State Government.



Romsey's Summer Water **Use Down on Last Year**

Romsey residents used around 205 litres of drinking water per person per day this summer, almost a 30 per cent drop on last year.

Across the Macedon Ranges average water use over summer was 230 litres per person per day, well down on the 300 litres used last summer.

Summer 2013-14 was marked by several heatwaves and bushfires in the region, while this summer was dry but significantly milder.

Kerrie Reservoir, which supplies drinking water to Romsey, is being topped up with supplies from Riddells Creek and Gisborne's Rosslynne Reservoir.

Romsey and other towns in the Macedon Ranges remain connected to the Melbourne drinking water supply as a backup during very high water use peri-
