Clinker Slice

250 gram packet of malt o milk biscuits

200 grams clinkers

1 cup condensed milk

125 grams butter

200 grams chocolate melts

Place biscuits in food processor and blend. Crush clinkers roughly and combine with biscuits.

Melt butter and condensed milk over low heat, stirring constantly for 2 minutes. Pour into clinker mix and stir through until well mixed.

Line a slice tray with alfoil and press slice in. Melt chocolate and pour over slice.

Place in fridge to set for 2 hours. (may need longer)

FUNDING ANNOUNCED FOR ROMSEY PRIMARY SCHOOL, LOCAL LIBRARIES AND LGBTI YOUTH IN MACEDON

Member for Macedon Mary-Anne Thomas announced that Romsey Primary School is one of five schools across the electorate that will share in more than \$700,000 in maintenance grants to ensure students can thrive in a safe, modern and comfortable environment. Ms Thomas was alongside Catherine Andrews, partner to Premier Daniel Andrews for the announcement. Romsey will receive \$112,000 for the refurbishment of classrooms, this is in addition to the \$130,000 received last year for the gym, art room and canteen space upgrades.

The additional funding coincides with Romsey Primary School's 150th celebrations that will take place from October 22nd to Oct 24th and members of the community are encouraged to join the celebrations.

On the same day, Ms Thomas and Catherine Andrews toured the electorate, visiting the Woodend Library to remind parents and young readers about the final weeks of the *Premier's Reading Challenge*. In good news for local libraries across Macedon, Ms Thomas announced that Goldfields Libraries Corporation would be receiving \$1.2 million as part of the *Public Libraries Funding Program*. These funds can be used towards all aspects of local library operations including staffing, community programs, book purchases and technology upgrades. The Woodend Library received \$68,000 in the last round of funding. Cobaw Community Health will also receive \$195,000 to support WayOut with aims to deliver youth suicide prevention programs targeting LGBTI young people in Macedon and surrounds. This grant is part of the Andrews Labor Government \$1.2 million in 2015-2016, to fund programs that promote the rights, health and wellbeing of young LGBTI Victorians. Ms Thomas said, "Equal rights for LGBTI Victorians are not negotiable. Our Government is committed to removing discrimination against LGBTI people from Victorian laws, and this funding will support work to educate and raise awareness about gender and sexual diversity in our community".

There are planned activities at the show and the following week as part of the fossil roadshow. Discussion boards looking at causes of why species are threatened, example habitat loss, introduction of exotic species, global warming and over exploitation of natural resources are examples.

A working bee was held at Lancefield Primary School on 20th Sept in the wetland. The myna bird numbers trapped for those that are interested were 38 July and 71 August. There are still myna bird traps available if interested

The 1st round of the 2015 Club Championships drew a good field however a few late scratchings reduced the size of the A Grade competition. With generally good conditions it was reasonable to expect some top scoring but this was not the case as "Royal Romsey" again bared her teeth. Only excellent golf was rewarded, those who strayed from the fairways or overshot the greens found it extremely difficult to get "up and down in regulation". Saturday August 22nd - Stableford - Drummond Golf Charity Golf Weekend



Over the past few year the Golf Club has worked very hard to clear away and burn numerous fallen branches, we have also trimmed all trees so that there is about a metre of clear space before allowing for mowing and keeping linger grass down. Currently we are working our way through the NE corner of the park clearing many noxious weeds and damaged and low branches. These works along with the recently installed re-cycled water system will make Romsey Park a much greener and safer place for the whole community. Trimmed rough and green fairways will make it almost impossible for a fire to move across the park and the removal of large logs also means there is little high density fuel for any fire.

RGC will hold its annual Working Bee on Friday October 2nd. This day will see all greens cored, sanded, seeded and fertilised. We also hope to carry out a number of improvement works across the park making cross-overs clearer and filling in holes in both fairways and the rough. Members will spray around newly planted trees and distance markers.


Students in Year 3 will end the term with their sleepover at school on the second last day of term, and everyone is eagerly anticipating the last day of term with a special Footy Day.



Survey shows high satisfaction with Western Water

Gisborne Singers' Production of 'The Armed Man'

The Gisborne Singers are collaborating with the Ballarat Choral Society for their next production-'The Armed Man—A Mass for Peace' to form an 80 person choir, accompanied by 20 professional musicians. This is to be performed at Ballarat on Sunday November 15 and at Woodend on Sunday November 22 (St Ambrose Church Hall). Both performances commence at 3 p.m. This is a stunning work by Welsh composer Karl Jenkins. He charts the growing menace of a descent into war and ends with a hope for peace. All the innocent victims of war are commemorated in its text regardless of race or creed. It is an exciting work both to sing and hear in concert. The work is presented in recognition of the Gallipoli landings in 1915.

The Armed Man was commissioned by the Royal Armouries in Great Britain to mark the transition from one millennium to another. It reflects the passing of "The most war-torn and destructive century in human history" and looks forward in hope to a more peaceful future. It was first performed in the year 2000.

It is essentially an anti-war composition based on the Catholic Mass combined with other texts including the fifteenth century French folk song 'L'Homme arme', the Islamic Call to Prayers (Adhaan), excerpts from the Mahabharata, as well as from the writings of Rudyard Kipling, Alfred Lord Tennyson and Sankichi Toge. During the singing, we are considering projecting images of war photographs onto a screen behind the choir. We are also considering reading messages from soldiers in the various war zones to their families at home in Australia. We hope to use local material for both ideas.

DETERRING INDIAN MYNA BIRDS from your backyard

Indian mynas are an invasive and aggressive pest species. They are intelligent and opportunistic and they will use superior numbers to occupy and defend territory. During breeding season, they seek out nesting hollows which they take over from native birds and animals, after harassing and evicting them. Indian mynas destroy the eggs of other birds, or kill their chicks or build their own nests on top and smother them.

Here are **SIX THINGS** you can do in your backyard to help discourage Indian mynas and reduce their feeding and breeding opportunities.

- ✓ **Deprive** mynas access to your chook food. Seal bins and runs.
- ✓ **Feed** pets inside, or put pet food inside during the day. **Clean up** leftovers afterwards.
- ✓ **Cover** compost bins.
- ✓ **Block holes** in roofs or eaves to stop mynas nesting.
- ✓ **Plant** natives to encourage native wildlife.
- ✓ **Become** a trapper.





St. Francis of Assisi

A service for the Blessing of the Animals will be held at the Romsey Uniting Church at 10am on Sunday, October 4th, 2015. This day is the Feast Day of St. Francis: World Animal Day. This will be a combined service with Lancefield Uniting Church and all members of the community are invited to attend with their animals.

You may bring any living creature, whether they be animals, such as cats and dogs, or birds, reptiles and fish, domesticated or wild. If you are not able to bring an animal you may wish to bring a picture of an animal or an endangered species in the wild. There will be a time during the service when the animals will be blessed.

The service will be held in the Gazebo at the back of the church grounds, if the weather is cold/wet it will be held in the church hall.

There will be a Sausage Sizzle after the service. Please come with your animals and make this day a blessing service to remember.

Saint Francis of Assisi 1172-1226)

Francis was a universal person whose love extended across boundaries of class, religion and race. His reverence for everything led him to call animals, plants, and all of creation "brother" and "sister".

Animals responded to his respect and love with an amazing docility. As Francis walked across medieval Europe, people caught glimpses of what Eden must have been like.

St. Francis helped reform the Roman Catholic Church in the thirteenth century through his example of personal poverty.

He simply lived the Gospel as he took monastic life into the streets. Living among the poor, his example was so compelling that soon he had thousands of followers.

Francis' great goal was to follow Jesus as closely as possible. Near the end of his life he spent forty days in solitary prayer on Mt. Alverna.

He had lived as God's troubadour, a bright flame by which others could read the Gospel with fresh insight and vision.

The Prayer of St. Francis

Lord, make me an instrument of Your peace. Where there is hatred, let me sow love; where there is injury, pardon; where there is doubt, faith; where there is despair, hope; where there is darkness, light;

where there is sadness, joy. O, Divine Master, grant that I may not so much seek to be consoled as to console; to be understood as to understand; to be loved as to love; For it is in giving that we receive; it is in pardoning that we are pardoned; it is in dying that we are born again to eternal life.

Peace begins with you, Lord. With you. It is in you that I can find the answer to my fears, that I can find the love which modifies and kills my selfishness and pride.

It is in you that I can find acceptance as I am, that I can know that I am loved and safe.

And that brings peace such as the world cannot give. And in that peace I can move out, taking the risks of love.

Building right relationships. Sharing in the creation of the community which is your church.

Working with others to find understanding. Breaking down the walls which separate us.

Offering, not glib words, but myself. **Lord, make me an instrument of your peace**



SECRETS FOR FILM SOCIETY

Who doesn't love a good twist in a film? Members of the Macedon Ranges Film Society were amply rewarded in this regard with the September screening of *The Secret in Their Eyes*, a 2009 film from Argentinian writer/director Juan Jose Campanella. Kyneton Launch for Solar Bulk-buy in Macedon Ranges

Kyneton residents can now find out about the MASH2 community solar bulk-buy a lot more easily. That's because MASH2 will be starting its roll-out into Macedon Ranges Shire with two info meetings at Kyneton Mechanics Institute on Wednesday 21 October at 5-6.30pm and 7-8.30pm. MASH2 is organised by the Hub Foundation Castlemaine, a not-for-profit set up in May 2014 to organise projects that help tackle climate change and save money for residents. So far, 300 homes have been installed with solar PV through MASH in Mount Alexander Shire. That's saving residents \$200,000 per year off their electricity bills and cutting CO2 emissions by 1,500 tonnes annually, the equivalent of taking 294 cars off the road. "Now we want to do the same for the Shire of Macedon Ranges Shire", says Jo Kaptein, Project Officer at the Hub Foundation. "Currently 16% of households in Kyneton have solar, the same percentage for the Macedon Ranges Shire as a whole. Mount Alexander Shire has 24% of homes with solar rooftops, largely because there have been five solar bulk-buys in the last 8 years or so." There will also be a community bonus for the people of

Kyneton in the form of a free solar PV system for a community group once 50 MASH2 systems have been installed.

"We've got a bulk-buy offer that works on all fronts - prices are competitive, the panels and inverters are high quality, the service is there and the personal touch too, with free home visits and community meetings. It's taken us almost 2 years to get MASH to where it is now. It just makes sense for everybody, we reckon, to make MASH more easily available to people in Macedon Ranges. Nancy and Geoff who live in Kyneton came to the MASH2 info meetings in Castlemaine a couple of months ago. Their MASH2 system was installed at the end of August.

Nancy said, "We heard about MASH through the local newspaper. We liked the fact that MASH2 is a community effort; it sounded genuine with good principles and we trusted that the Hub Foundation, the organisation behind the MASH project, had done the homework.

"MASH2 is a terrific example of something that's working successfully so we are very happy to be part of it. It is a community effort to change things so instead of feeling helpless we feel we can contribute a bit.




