Cottage pie (Serves 4)

1 kg Sebago potatoes, peeled, chopped 40g butter

Quarter cup milk

One and half tablespoons olive oil

1 brown onion finely chopped

2 cloves garlic crushed

600g beef mince

425g can diced tomatoes

Half cup tomato sauce

1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce

1 teaspoon dried mixed herbs

One and half cups frozen peas

2 thirds cup grated tasty cheese

Seasoning – salt and pepper optional

Heat oil in large pan, cook garlic and onion, stirring until onion softens. Increase heat, add mince, cook, stirring often,

for 5 to 6 minutes or until mince is browned. Add undrained tomatoes, tomato sauce, Worcestershire

sauce and herbs, bring to boil. Reduce heat, simmer uncovered for approx. 20 minutes. Stir in peas.

Meanwhile, boil or steam potatoes until soft, strain then mash with milk and butter.

Preheat oven to 200 degrees Celsius. Grease a 5 cup capacity ovenproof dish.

Spoon mince mixture into dish. Top with mash. Sprinkle with cheese. Place on a baking tray and bake uncovered for 15 to 20 mins until pie is piping hot and top is browned lightly.





Safeguarding Your family Online

A New world order?

I grew up in the days when telephones, black and white TV, AM and Short Wave radio were the ways we gathered our instant information from the world around us. To a lesser extent we also had the Print Media for those times when we did not need to know news "As it happened".

How things have changed! Smartphones, Smart TV's, the Internet, Chat Rooms, Facebook, Twitter, Tablets, GPS and a host of other online media in which we and our children are deeply engaged in, have dramatically altered our view of the world and the way in which we interact with it. More and more I see the outcomes of inexperience in defending our privacy and our values, eroded and resulting in outcomes that we cannot erase, often resulting in financial and emotional loss or anguish.

So what can we do to safeguard our children in our increasingly online world?

I have two young boys in the latter stages of primary school. They both have Windows 10 Tablets (Yes Windows), an Xbox One Gaming Console and access to a full sized laptop at home. Now neither of them are into any of the plethora of social media online sites/apps (yet), and we have been trying to educate them about the "cause and effect" situations we read about daily and the ongoing issues that ensue.

How do we protect them? In our case I have created Microsoft accounts for both my children. This is simply the creation of an email account which is then managed by Microsoft online safety. Account set up is free and you can dictate who the parents are, and who the children are in the Family you create. This has a cascading effect on all their devices they are logged in to. Because the account knows their ages, when they are online the browser prevents them from accessing unsavoury or unsafe sites and blocks them instantly. This also blocks them from downloading or installing programs and apps that do not meet the child level standards dictated by the service.


Quite often I get complaints from my child about not being able to view a "funny" video on YouTube because the rating was blocked by the system. Cries of "Dad, it won't let me use Skype because it says I'm too young for this app" ring out, but, only once. When they log on their Xbox the system keeps on protecting them as they use the same credentials on this device as they do their Tablets. Having explained why the system does this to them, they then go on their merry way in complete understanding that this is there to protect them not hinder them.

Quite often parents allow their children to use their computers whilst logged in as the parent account. This is not a smart idea. Creating logins for each of your children on your PC or Mac is the first step to safe computing. When you do create them you can then decide what level of access they have. You can create Child accounts on a Mac and Windows PC's quite easily. If you are unsure how to do this, then ask the question in any of the mainstream search engines to pull up a list of "How to" articles on the

topic. There are some links at the end of this article which may help.

Every week I receive an email report of my children's online activity. This displays the days of activity and how many hours they have been online, which sites they have been most active on, how many sites were blocked and so on. This is a very informative way of managing your online safety.

Good Anti-Virus and, more importantly, a good Anti-Malware solution is imperative for all online users.



But, ultimately, it is up to parents to do the most important part of the education of their children. Talk to them about it. Sit down and discuss the issues we all are facing. I'm sure this has certainly helped our boys understand and address issues that they face daily.

There are plenty of programs that you can purchase that also help in protecting your online experience, and everyone will have different methods and levels of concern that will need to be addressed. My experience has worked for my family, but it may not be the option of choice for others. In this case you must customise the solution that suits your needs and expectations. There are no wrong solutions. You are exposed whether you are on PC, Mac, Linux or Chrome.

In the Running for Another Community Award

Macedon Ranges Running Club are pleased to be one of the finalists in the community focused Fire Awareness Awards, a venture by Victoria's fire agencies. The running club was selected, from 85 entries, for its hydrant inspection project in collaboration with local CFA and Western Water.

Essentially, the project involved runners to assist in the inspection of the local community's network of fire hydrants, their locators and road markers in Riddells Creek. The process was to include the inspection of hydrants into the clubs weekly running schedules, using maps provided by Western Water. Each hydrant had to meet a specific maintenance standard for fire services to access in an emergency. The club was tasked with reporting any hydrants which didn't meet CFA standards which included missing markers, visibility and access problem due to natural or man-made barriers. ANZAC CENTENARY COMMEMORATIVE POPPY

Mr Ron Davis of Trentham was invited to attend a meeting with members of the Romsey-Lancefield RSL on 6 November. Ms Mary-Anne Thomas MP, was also invited as a guest, to attend the presentation of a lead based enamelled poppy to the RSL.

Ms Thomas presented the red enamelled poppy in its wooden frame, on behalf of Mr Davis to the RSL president Mr Reinhard Goschiniak and in turn Mr Davis presented a cheque for \$300 to the RSL.

Mr Davis has collected thousands of British-issue .303 calibre bullets found near Bald Hill at an old rifle range dating back to 1906, where cadets learnt to handle guns and was aware that many of these men would eventually have gone on to serve in WWW1.

Mr Davis has recycled these old bullets by melting down the lead contained in the bullets and then ingeniously turning them into commemorative poppies to coincide with this Gallipoli Centenary as a tribute to the ANZACS.

He has sold over 180 poppies and with each one of these sales he has generously donated \$20, to Legacy and various other RSL branches. His aim is to bring poppy No 303 to Canberra and to have it displayed at the Australian War Museum. It was agreed at the presentation to

support Mr Davis in his plan to donate this last poppy to the museum.



Pass Cyclists with Care Campaign

The annual Bike Safe "Pass with Care" campaign returns this summer. You will see our big campaign trailer out in the Macedon Ranges and billboards on the roads conveying a simple message that asks motorists to pass cyclists with care.

Please wait a few seconds before overtaking a cyclist until oncoming traffic has passed. If there are no double lines and when safe, move into the next lane and pass as if passing another vehicle. Cyclists ride at around 20 to 30kph so allow plenty of room when pulling in. If you drive too close, your vehicle causes a draft and can cause cyclists to crash. Since our last campaign a cyclist has been killed on our local roads and a number very seriously injured. These are avoidable tragedies. We want everyone to get home safely to their families.

We thank Gisborne & District Community Bank and our partner, RoadSafe Central Victoria for providing generous financial support for the campaign this year, without which there would be no safety campaign and we appreciate the support that our community newspapers give us in publishing our safety messages



Keeping yourself cool – drink water, dress for the weather, go somewhere cool, stay in the shade, reduce physical activity, look after your pets, go shopping before it gets too hot, call 000 when you're not feeling well

Better managing your home - homes heat up for a number of reasons and these reasons may vary according to the direction your home faces. Keep windows and blinds closed until it cools down outside, reduce drafts, zone off areas

Improving your home – small improvements to your

home can make a big difference to the temperature. Windows are one of the biggest sources of heat gain. Put external blinds on your sunniest windows, draught seal gaps and cracks and ensure there are thick curtains on windows

Mayor, Cr Jennifer Anderson said the frequency of heatwaves in Australia are increasing, and this is cause for concern.

"Our region can experience very hot weather during summer, and Council wants to ensure that everyone within our community, especially the elderly and vulnerable are informed of how to manage this uncomfortably hot weather."
