Romsey, The Squatting Era.

n August 1835, two parties led by Batman and Fawkner, sailed into Port Phillip Bay to settle on the

banks of the Yarra River. Horses and ploughs, farm implements and farm animals were unloaded, and the settlement of Melbourne began. During 1836, settlers spread out from Melbourne as squatters took out licences for vast areas of grazing land. This land was under control of the Colonial Office, and could only be occupied on a depasturing lease until surveyors completed their preliminary work. Several of the squatters leased land in the Romsey area. They were John Brock, who settled on Bullando Vale in 1836 a run of 25600 acres that ran from Romsey to Clarkefield. John Pascoe Fawkner settled on the Moonee Jettee run of 12800 acres including Brock's Monument west of Romsey and ran as far as Kerrie. Together with James Fulton who settled on the Springfield run of 20000 acres which encompassed Melbourne Hill to the north and Romsey to the south and ran west towards Newham in 1838. The squatters' new life was full of


The squatters' new life was full of hardships, there was no security of tenure, as they survived under the poorest of

conditions. Early shelter came in the form of tents or bark or log shelters. There was an unchanging diet of mutton, tea and damper and the only respite to life's monotony and isolation was the trip to Melbourne twice a year for provisions. The squatter's wife bore the brunt of the isolation as she reared the family, kept house, made clothes, milked cows, made butter and cheese, kept poultry, grew vegetables and nursed and educated the children.

Steels Creek Station pioneer E.M. Curr described squatting as "a lucrative occupation, but its main drawback was the want of mental occupation."

Until the runs were surveyed, few fences were

built and shepherds were employed to mind a flock of about 700 sheep on the open country smaller and mobs in the hilly bush country. The shepherd and dogs guarded the sheep by day and returned the flock to the yards at night



to protect them from wild animals. In his diary, A.F. Mollison recounted the difficulties of bringing cattle and sheep across hundreds of miles of unknown country with no roads and the "Major's Line" the only notable guide He told of trees being felled and laid on the bed of a creek to be used as to form a bridge in order to cross the creeks. Although flooded rivers posed a far greater problem. On one occasion, while crossing the Murray river, Mollison dismantled a dray, removed its wheels, nailed a tarpaulin to the bottom and lashed empty water casks to its side for buoyancy. In this "boat" 500 sheep were landed on the Victorian soil, 40 at a time.

y 1837, there were at least 200 squatters grazing stock in the Port Phillip district, and in March of that year, Governor Sir Phillip Bourke came from Sydney to investigate the unauthorized occupation of land. In central Victoria, he noted the excellent sheep and cattle pastures and declared the district open for settlement.

When the land in the Romsey area was surveyed, the first farm lots came on the market at the Crown Land Sales at Kilmore, in 1855. At this time, an area was put aside for a future township. This area came on the market in 1860. and was referred to as "Five Mile Creek" The Romsey and Lancefield land sales were apparently conducted in an orderly fashion, but this was not always the case. According to the Romsey Examiner, land in the Kerrie area in the 1870's was settled under a somewhat "free-for-all" system. The parcels of land for selection were placed on show for a fortnight and, to get a head start at the peggings, prospective buyers camped overnight in their swags, buggies and chaise carts. At first light, they made a huge rush for the best blocks of land, some of which were pegged by up to 100 people. All applications, accompanied by a lodgment fee of 10 pounds, were collected by officers of the Lands Department at Romsey or Riddells Creek, and referred to a panel who chose the successful applicants.

Bookings essential

Thus from here the early settlement of the Romsey district proceeded.

JUST A LITTLE BIT ABOUT PETER




He has belonged to many of the community groups in the area and raised numerous funds for various community needs, from new tennis courts to working on the Lancefield

THE GISBORNE SINGERS PERFORM CANTATA MEMORIA

Cantata Memoria commemorates the 50th anniversary of the Aberfan tragedy of 21 October 1966.

It was on this day that 116 children and 28 adults perished when a coal spoil tip enveloped Pantglas Junior School together with some nearby houses in Aberfan, South Wales. It was not only the disaster itself, but the following insensitive bungling by authorities, and lack of prosecution of the National Coal Board and employees which has cast this tragedy deep within the Welsh psyche. 22 Gisborne Singers took up the offer to be part of the North American premiere in Carnegie Hall, New York in January 2017. Karl Jenkins work was not new to our choir having performed his The Armed Man (a Mass for Peace) in 2015. Thus preparing and performing the Australian Premier of Cantata Memoria is fitting. It's also worth mentioning that the Gisborne Singers have developed a fine reputation for the quality of their performances. One of our professional soloists said after a recent concert: "Thanks again for having me, I honestly think the Gisborne Singers are the finest amateur choir I've heard in Australia. Very impressive sound."

The music is accessible, memorable and truly moving. It uses repetition effectively and borrows appropriately from other musical sources, and the final result is riveting. As in Jenkins' other works, it shows a truly Jenkins stamp throughout.

There will be two Sunday performances at 3.00pm: 20th May, Church of Christ New Gisborne; 27th May, Our Lady of the Rosary Church, Kyneton.







Why are nest boxes so important?

Australian birds and wildlife have the highest rate of natural nesting hollow dependence in the world, according to the South Australian Department of Natural Resources.

It takes more than 80 years for a tree to form even small hollows, and can take 300 years to form larger hollows for larger species such as possums and parrots. Often by the time a tree gets old and large enough to form hollows, it is removed, due to it being considered a public danger. Different species require different size hollows, which provide shelter from heat, cold, wind, and most importantly, a site to breed and raise their young.

Due to the clearing of bushland, collection of firewood, and urban encroachment, the number of natural nesting hollows has significantly declined. This decline has impacted many birds, mammals, reptiles and insect species.

But it's not all bad news. There is a lot we can do to lend a helping hand to our native wildlife. When you see a hollow tree or log on your property, or in the bush, let it stay where it is. Hollow trees are actually quite strong and sturdy, and provide vital habitat. Mother

Nature is supposed to be untidy, so when you see a hollow log, try looking at it as a warm safe home for an animal, as opposed to something making the environment untidy.

Another way to help is to create nesting boxes, which provide an important supplement to naturally occurring hollows. Nest boxes are a great way to observe native wildlife in all their life stages in your garden, or on your property or local park.

Over the past few years, Deep Creek Landcare Group has installed 15 different sized nesting boxes around our project sites. Our nest boxes are made from hollow logs retrieved from burn piles on acreage that are cut into sections, and fitted in a fork of a large tree. We have made bat boxes, bird boxes and mammal boxes.





HEALTHCARE UNDER THE RAINBOW

Cobaw Community Health's *WayOut* team has launched an educational video that provides a safe platform for LGBTIQ+ young people to speak to healthcare professionals and services about their needs, and offer suggestions and advice about working with the sex and gender diverse community.

The Healthcare under the Rainbow video is a contemporary educational tool for GPs and other healthcare professionals, aimed at improving inclusive clinical practice, and increasing the safety of young people accessing healthcare services.

A group of young people from the Macedon Ranges developed and produced the video. Participants enjoyed the opportunity to develop skills in photography, film, editing and events, as well as the experience of researching and developing health promotion messages for healthcare professionals.

This project was funded by a grant from Kyneton Community and Learning Centre's LETS! A seven month process, the video was launched last month with an event at Brooke Street Medical Centre in Woodend.

Margaret McDonald, Cobaw's CEO, encourages all healthcare professionals to view and share this short video.





No one to Help John 5: 1-9 Christ stands ready to help us.

It was the Sabbath. Jesus and the disciples were in Jerusalem when they encountered a number of people who were blind, sick, and lame waiting by the pool of Bethesda. These people believed that its water possessed healing powers. While walking by the pool, Jesus encountered a very lame man who had been ill for a long time. Jesus showed mercy to the man and healed him. When Jesus asked him if he wanted to get well, the man replied, "I have no one to help me into the pool when the water is stirred. While I am trying to get in, someone else goes down ahead of me."

When we read these words, we can picture the man trying to get into the pool and missing his opportunity every time - for 38 years - until the day Jesus walked by and the man's life changed forever.

This passage from John's Gospel reminds us that no matter how hard we try; some things cannot be accomplished without the help of Christ. How many times do we try to succeed on our own, only to find it too difficult. Eventually Jesus comes along to tell us 'pick up our mat' and to trust his way and his power for our life.



FULL CIRCLE

Six months have passed during which time we have celebrated all the events in God's great plan for Man's redemption - us. Perhaps more rain will see these destructive creatures move off. The Foursomes format sees teams of two alternating strokes, a challenging format which does not easily allow individual golfers to get into a rhythm. It was great to see life member Pater Scanlon back on the course after his recent operation.



Avocado Soup

1 avocado chicken stock freshly ground black pepper ½ cup cream

1 Moreton Bay bug tail

watermelon, when in season, or else thin crescents of a red-skinned apple (with the skin on of course)

Peel the avocado, and take out the core. Put the flesh into a blender with chicken stock, and blend. Add more chicken stock to make it the consistency that you like, either a thick soup, or a thin one. Pour it into a large saucepan, and add in freshly ground black pepper. Heat it slowly, but don't let it boil. Just before you serve it, stir in the cream, and then re-heat it for a minute or two. **DON'T BOIL**. Add Moreton Bay bug tail and strips of watermelon (or apple) as garnish in each individual dish.





Romsey Primary School has adopted a SWPBS framework.

This is also known as Positive Behaviours Support or PBS. PBS involves the establishment of a Continuum of Behaviours Support that considers all students and emphasises prevention.

It is a proactive approach and focusses on teaching all students agreed expected behaviours and pro-social skills, rather than reacting to inappropriate behaviour. This in turn creates a safer and more effective school environment. Teaching behavioural expectations & acknowledging students for meeting them, is a much more positive approach than waiting for misbehaviour to occur before responding.

At Romsey Primary School, the students and teachers agreed to use our school values to guide our expected behaviours:

- 1.Respect 2. Integrity
- 3. Responsibility

Why focus on positive social behaviors?

In the past, school-wide discipline has focused mainly on reacting to specific student misbehaviour by implementing punishment-based strategies, including reprimands, loss of privileges, time out, and suspensions. Research has shown that the implementation of punishment, especially when it is used inconsistently and in the absence of other positive strategies, is ineffective. Introducing, modelling and reinforcing positive social behavior is an important aspect of a student's educational experience. Teaching behavioural
